Muenster herds are listed among top producers in the monthly report last week released by Cooke County Dairy Herd Improvement As-

Leon Fleitman's herd was second in both milk and butterfat production and Paul Fisher's herd claimed third in both categories. Vernon Friedrich's cows topped the list. Figures show Friedrich's herd with 1680 pounds of milk and 54 of BF. Fleitman's cows chalked up 1350 pounds of milk and 46 of BF. Fisher's herd produced 1260 pounds of milk and 43 of BF.

Pete Prescher had the champion individual milk producer. The cow logged a total of 3030 pounds of milk.

A cow owned by F&M Dairy was high in test pounds at 6.3 and a cow in the Richard Frasher herd led in butterfat production with 125 pounds.

A total of 332 cows in eight herds were tested during the month. Eighty-eight produced 50 or more pounds of butterfat. Milk average per cow was 1115 pounds with average pounds of butterfat at 40.

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




