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As the world marvelled at the scientific triumphs of trips to the moon during the past fifteen months nobody dared to imagine that an even greater achievement would originate in disaster. The rescue mission of last week is the epic story of modern times.

Unlike the precise success of other flights, when everything went according to weeks and months of careful calculations and all gadgets were operating perfectly, this flight suddenly became a brand new challenge when the craft was more than 200,000 miles from home. New calculations were needed as new functions of equipment were improvised to take over the job of disabled units.

All of that was carried out with the exact control of previous flights and ended in a perfect splashdown. The trip is a tribute to courage and skill, in the space center and in the space vehicle.

Another very pleasing aspect of the ordeal was world wide concern for the well being of the three space men. Reports from everywhere said that people were praying for them. It's pleasing to know that, despite global frictions, people react like human beings when fellow men are in distress. They seemed to ignore nationality and think of the astronauts as brothers under God.

Concerning the prayers, we like to think that they were heard. Even though the rescue can be explained all the way by marvelous application of scientific know-how, one can't rule out the possibility that Divine Guidance inspired some of the vital decisions. At least one point has to be admitted. Even if this was an all-human operation it reveals as much as previous flights the infinite wisdom of the Creator. It must be very puzzling to someone like Madame Atheist O'Hare.

The Liberty Amendment Committee USA reports that it has filed legal action against the Internal Revenue Service challenging the constitutional validity of bureaucratic directives.

Legal validity of the suit is fuzzy to the average layman's mind, and chances of bucking the IRS seem remote in view of that organization's job of providing spending money for our government.

Nevertheless the implications are very interesting to the millions of us who have to remit regularly to Uncle Sam. Obviously the committee thinks that IRS is out of line and we taxpayers are not getting a fair shake.

The report includes a statement by the committee's chairman, Willis E. Stone, saying: "Liberty has been steadily diminishing. The alterations in application of the Constitution have not been arrested. As a result, federal agencies have now taken over 40 per cent of the land area and 20 per cent of the industrial capacity of the nation without constitutional authority, and the losses and hidden costs of these political empires consumes more money each year than all Americans combined pay in federal income taxes."

That statement summarizes the big beef of the committee and explains the reason behind its proposal of the Liberty Amendment, which seeks to get government out of business and abolish the income tax.

The statement seems fantastic to us average people. We can't imagine the government owning that much, nor that the cost of owning it is so high. But we suppose that the charge must be based on extensive careful study and that it must have some validity.

Annual Tests for TB Scheduled Friday, Monday

The annual TB checkup in Muenster will be conducted Friday of this week and Monday of next week on children of the first and seventh grades in both schools.

Mrs. Martin Kralicke, local chairman said that the testing will be conducted by Mrs. Lois Williamson of Fort Worth, a member of the TB division of the Texas Health Department.

Health skin tests will be given on Friday and readings will be taken on Monday. If a positive reaction is found the pupil will be given a chest X-Ray in the mobile unit which will be standing by. No special permission is needed for the X-Rays. The permission slip for testing, which was signed by the parents, includes permission for X-Ray if the test reads positive.

However, additional cooperation is urged. All other members of the family will be asked to take the chest X-Ray along with a child who got a positive reading. Any pictures, like the test, are a free service of the state health department.

Saturday Rainfall Measured 1.24 in.

Last Saturday's rain, which was reported as a downpour measuring up to 5 inches in near by areas, was comparatively gentle here. The reading Sunday morning on Steve Moser's weather bureau gauge was only 1.24 inch.

Added to measures of .48 early in the week and .06 early in the month, this brings the April total to 1.78 inch, about half of average for the month.

The year's total to now is 8.54 inches, slightly less than the average through April and considerably less than the past two years. Totals through April were 13.85 in 1969 and 16.42 in 1968.

Muenster's FFA chapter had three teams entered in Area judging contests last Saturday at East Texas State University and one of them qualified for the state contest to be held at College Station on May 2. The teams are coached by Edgar Dyer ag instructor.

The livestock judging team ranked fifth in the area contest, thereby earning strong eligibility for the state event. The top ten teams of the contest are eligible at College Station. Members of the Muenster team are Tim Hartman, John Monday and John Schneider.

Finally, in dairy judging, the top ten advanced to the state contest, but MHS was not included in the list. The only satisfaction for the team was seventh in individual score by Leon Klement. Others on the team were Jim Endres and Steve Sicking.

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

With memories of ancient Spain and Italy still fresh, Mr. and Mrs. Marty Klement and children Karl and Karlyn settled back to routine activity this week following their return Sunday from a flying trip to those countries. The trip home included a flight over the Swiss Alps, a short stop in Amsterdam, Holland, and air travel by way of Iceland, Greenland and Canada back to New York. They traveled in two Dutch Airlines DC-8s, each with a carrying capacity of 147 passengers.

For Karl and Karlyn, ancient history and geography in their school work has been made much easier by their travel abroad.
