**A critical time in US legislation begins this week as members of the Senate start consideration on Bill No. S1883 which is euphemistically referred to as the Labor Law "Reform" Bill. Big Labor's allies in the Senate have arranged to put this measure at the top of the agenda as the legislature gets back to business hoping they will be able to sneak it through before the country wises up and starts to howl. Hopefully, however the word is getting around and there's a good chance that opposition will snow-ball in time to stop the scheme.**

**People are starting to understand that if the phony reform bill is railroaded through, union organizers would be handed a variety of new legal weapons with which to blackmail employers into delivering employees to compulsory unionism.**

**As a result hundreds of thousands of additional workers would be forced to join and support unwanted unions. And millions of dollars in compulsory union dues would be automatically deducted from employee's paychecks to help finance Big Labor's drive for complete control of America's political system.**

**The bill's passage would mean that a handful of union bosses had succeeded in broadening their already immense powers and fattening their warchests. And then, as AFL-CIO president George Meany told a congressional subcommittee, they'll "get on to --14(b)," the provision in the Taft Hartley Act authorizing state Right to Work laws.**

**"Just as they did before last year's vote on common situs picketing," Reed Larson, president of the National Right to Work Committee, said, "union bosses are already boasting of the way they're forcing Congress to toe the line on S1883. They're gloating aloud over the new powers with which they intend to menace American workers."**

**By way of pressuring their kind of a vote on this bill, union lobbyists are warning US Senators that S1883 is the "key" bill. . . far more important than legislation to combat the energy shortage, unemployment or inflation. Pass the "reform" bill as the first order of business, the lobbyists are threatening Senators, or join the "enemies list" of those to be hit at election time.**

**And the Carter Administration, taking its cue from the union lobbyists who bankrolled the President's election, is echoing the same line. As Vice President Mondale said at the AFL-CIO biennial conference in December, the Administration "has no greater priority in '78 than passage of the Labor Law Reform Bill in the Senate."**

**So, there is the situation. President Carter's signature has been assured if the bill is passed, and Big Labor is twisting the arms of Senators who are indebted to the unions for their election success. They are being reminded that now is the time to do what they were elected for . . . to take care of the union's interests regardless of their own conscience or the nation's good.**

**Realizing that Labor is already able to exert this kind of pressure, we have to wonder just how much more power it will have if this legislation passes. When it can force millions of new members to join — in order to keep their jobs — and pay many millions into the political slush fund, Big Labor will have more influence than ever on elections and legislation. It will become the power behind the government, the dictator of our way of life. While admitting that this is a serious charge we ought to understand that Labor's power, as being demonstrated now, is already frightening.**

**The report is that Labor already claims to have the bill in the bag. Counting the usual pro-labor senators, plus those who have been intimidated by the arm twisting, supporters say they have the majority. But there's still a chance that justice will prevail. There's a strong possibility that debate will lead to a filibuster and the bill will be talked to death. Another possibility is that while the showdown is delayed some senators may have an awakening of con-**

## City Police Will Start Crackdown On Poor Driving

A determined effort to improve the driving habits of Muenster was announced this week by Police Chief Jim Eaves as an official immediate reaction to the fatal accident here Saturday night.

Referring to 29 accidents in the city since May 1, 1977, and nine more within three miles of town, he said that the crashes have caused three deaths and twelve injuries. While recalling that two of the fatal accidents happened outside of town and did not involve Muenster people, he said that local people have often been at fault and many are lucky to have escaped serious injury.

The officers' aim is to make drivers safety conscious so that they will by habit avoid the situations that can lead to trouble. They are concerned with all kinds of capers and carelessness and especially speeding and intoxicated driving.

Drivers are reminded that the intention is to make local streets as safe as possible, hoping to prevent the kind of situation that can lead to death or injury. And they should understand that they can be ticketed for failing to cooperate.

Eaves said local patrol will be stepped up when traffic is heavier, like the beginning and end of the school day, and also at night. And the officers expect increased patrolling by the state troopers.

## Jim Snowden Is Candidate For Congress, 17th District

TYE — Jim Snowden, former Mayor of Tye, has officially announced his candidacy for the 17th Congressional District seat being vacated by Omar Burleson. Snowden, was elected to five two-year terms as Mayor of Tye, a small city near Abilene, and is presently serving on the City Council. Snowden was previously employed as the Base Documentation Manager at Dyess AFB in Abilene but retired from that position November 1, to devote full time to campaigning.

When asked why he was entering the race, Snowden replied, "The prime motivation came from a letter written by Attorney General John Hill, which was placed in a capsule to be opened 100 years from now. In this letter John Hill warned that the people should start protecting themselves from the abuse of mass bureaucracy. I thought at the time that he was exactly right but 100 years too late. I think we must begin now!"

A one-time stock farmer, Snowden is also deeply concerned over the fact that the "little man" is invariably ignored in this era of big time politics.

Snowden gained the spotlight in the Big Country area through his service on the 42nd District Court grand jury from late 1976 to early 1977. He initiated the grand jury investigation of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC) in Abilene for alleged abuse of power and violations of the Texas Liquor Control Act. His main objective was to see that the Liquor Control Act was enforced equally among the public as well as members of the TABC,

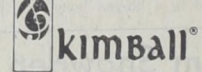
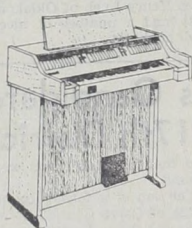

**Texas Farms Are Fewer But Larger**  
 Indications point to a continued decline in the number of Texas farms in 1978, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown reports. Forecasts by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service indicate that the pattern of losing 3,000 farms a year has slowed to 2,000. "But when you consider that we have lost 12,000 farms since 1974, this steady decline is an alarming one," Brown said. "Total Texas acreage is expected to be 139,800,000. The loss in farm land since 1974 has been 2 million acres. The projection for loss in acreage for 1978 is 200,000," Brown added. The size of Texas farms has been increasing each year, from 678 in 1974 to 710 acres in 1978. "This means that those farmers and ranchers going out of business have for the most part sold their land to other agricultural producers," Brown explained.
