Ask my opinion instead of demanding.

Be trustworthy.
Sometimes it takes me a long time to explain why I did something and I'm convicted before the trial begins.

I would like my parents to be more thoughtful of one another. Love one another. Love me.

We are not told where the survey was held. But it is interesting, and significant, that the students should express the wish that parents "be stricter." This would appear to indicate that the so-called "permissive society" of the adult world is not entirely to the liking of young people.

The replies show that these youths felt a need for more discipline, along with understanding — and a healthy measure of self-discipline on the part of the parents, too.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Do yourself a favor. This is good advice to anyone, but especially to the landowners with terraced cropland.

The favor I have in mind is parallel terraces, Davis continues. The Soil Conservation Service has been selling parallel terraces for several years now because they are better. I am not saying that regular gradient terraces are now "no good," nor am I saying that parallels do a better job of controlling erosion and moving excess water to a safer outlet than do the regular gradient terraces.

You might ask then, how are they better? The answer: they are better for the farmer. A system of parallel terraces eliminates most of the point rows. This in turn saves the farmer time and money when plowing, planting and harvesting.

This favor which the farmer does for himself results in a three-fold favor to the 35 other people in the United States who are depending on him for food, clothing and shelter. (One farmer produces enough for himself and 35 other people in U.S.) Each time a conservation practice is applied by a farmer and the practice saves him time and money this means the product he produces costs the public less money. It also means that the land is protected for future needs and that the water which leaves that farm is clear, not polluted with eroded soil which fills lakes, kills fish and wildlife and is ugly to look at.

Landowners in our area have been conserving the soil for years by using gradient terraces. We ask that you continue to build terraces and conserve the soil, but do yourself a favor, build parallel terraces. See your local Soil Conservation man soon.

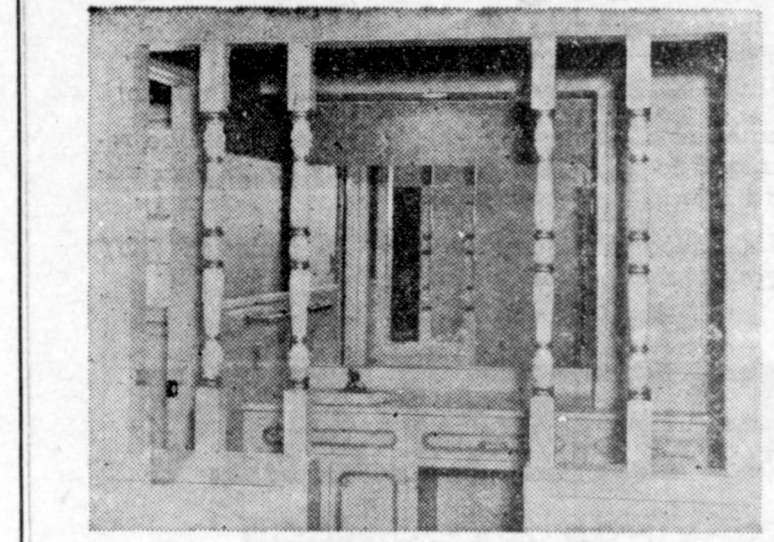

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Misused Safety Feature

A Phillips Petroleum Company publication reports that, "According to the Texas Safety Association, the most misunderstood and misused safety feature in late model automobiles is the head restraint. To quote a recent association news release 'Head restraints are not built or designed for use as pillows. They are designed to prevent the head and neck from being thrown backward during rear-end collisions to minimize whip-lash-caused injuries. In order to do this, head restraints should be adjusted so they are centered at the back of the head — not at the neck. Slow-motion studies of rear-end crash situations show the head can be thrown backward in as much as a 90 degree angle, causing severe injury. When adjusted properly, the head restraint can reduce such whiplash injuries. However, a recent survey shows a large proportion of motorists are leaving the head restraints adjusted where it would strike the back of the neck if a rear-end collision were to occur. Leaving the restraint in that position could result in a major injury.'

If everyone thought alike this would be a stagnant world.

"Did You Know?", asks Commerce magazine that, "The Federal Income Tax Law is so complicated, as a result of repeated congressional additions, that it runs 930 pages and is 'explained' by some 17,000 pages of court decisions and Internal Revenue regulations."

Day's Work for Day's Pay

The National Association of Manufacturers released the following interesting item: "The golden rule of employment — an honest day's work for an honest day's pay — seems to be gathering more and more dust on the back shelf. Unit labor costs rose sharply in the first quarter of 1970 due to a combination of higher wages and declining output per man hour, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reports. After two quarters of increases, the average hourly production for each employee dropped at an annual rate of 0.6 percent during the first three months of this year, the Bureau says. Labor costs rose at an annual rate of 8.4 percent. If inflation is to be licked, then productivity must at least match any wage increase."
