The current bulletin of Texas Farm Bureau has a comment on the US announcement of December 19 revealing that trade restrictions on nonstrategic goods between U.S. and Red China are lifted. The FB bulletin remarks that "anything sold or traded with any of the Communists or their allies, from a toothpick to a milling machine, will be used to wage war, both hot and cold, against the United States.'

That statement is based on one of the most obvious and most significant, facts of this century. Communism, as a social, economic and political system, was a complete flop. On its own merits it could not have lasted more than a few decades. In fact, the Soviet Union was on the verge of starvation and economic ruin in less than fifteen years.

Nevertheless it has grown until the red menace now occupies a large part of the globe and threatens to take over all of it. The reason is that its leaders were the all time greatest in using other people and other countries for their own advantage. A trusting world has been exploited and it continues to be exploited.

The Vietnam situation serves as a good example. Supplies flow endlessly through North Vietnam into the South and about 80 per cent of them are furnished by Russia, which in turn gets a large portion of them from Czechoslovakia.

The Czechs of course, have no choice in the matter. They are a captive people, especially since the Soviet crackdown over a year ago. 

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

The unavoidable sight caused by short skirts when a girl seated causes an inner problem to all normal boys, in the opinion of the Juvenile Bureau Commander of an eastern city of 350,000. Yet skirts get shorter and underclothing skimpier.

The Main Question

On the main question, the experts in our nation's largest cities voted that miniskirts are a probable cause of the increase in sex crimes. Is a girl more likely to be a victim of sex crimes, including statutory rape, if she wears a mini-skirt? Two thought no. but 56 said yes. Does the wearing of daring clothes increase the chances that a girl may become involved in immoral behavior? Seven said no, while 48 said yes. And what about pornography? Is the combination of pornography and revealing clothes more dangerous than either one alone? Two thought no, but 56 said ves. The nation's experts on crime went further. One hundred per cent voted that provocative clothing such as mini-skirts can encourage crime. Forty-three to eight attributed the decline in morals partly to the short skirt fad. Forty-nine to five said that sexy styles make moral character more difficult. Thirtytwo to one warned parents that shorter dresses should be considered a cause for increased cases of molestation. Over half of the officials hought that provocative styles added to race tensions. Fiftyfive per cent said that increased tension from seeing revealing styles tends to increase other problems such as andalism, reckless driving, drunkeness, and the use of drugs.
