

Special Train Brings Classes To Trainees

Permacel Express - perhaps the most unusual private passenger train in operation today.

During 1967 the train will make a nation-wide tour. Train buffs will easily spot its brilliant red, white and black exterior, with gold trimmings, as it chugs along behind a steam locomotive and coal tender converted to diesel power. Nicknamed Choo Choo College, it is the only private passenger train operating on commercial U.S. railways.


The really unusual part is the inside. Its three coaches have been remodeled and decorated in the style of the 1890-1920 period when railroads were king.

The train is replete with antiques and furnishings from the late Victorian era. One coach serves as a dining-parlor car and is elegantly outfitted with oldtime parlor chairs, plush carpets, a magnificient canopied oak bar, black marble cocktail tables, oil paintings, gold striped and fringed window shades, ornate carvings, silk and satin embellishments, and a player piano.
