



## Conservation District Sponsors Eleventh Annual Essay Contest

The eleventh annual essay writing contest sponsored by the Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District was announced this week by J. H. Bayer, chairman of the board of directors.

The essays, to be entitled "Our Natural Environment — Preserve and Protect It" will deal with conservation of soil, water and plants, and is limited to 300 words in length. The contest is open now and entries will be accepted through January 31, 1971.

Eligibility is limited to boys and girls living in the Upper Elm-Red District who are not more than 19 years old and

have not graduated from high school. A person under 20 who quit before finishing high school is eligible.

Bayer suggests that the contestants describe how soil, water and plants provide a more healthful and more beautiful environment but not to attempt a technical paper on conservation methods. He said that the directors hope to receive 750 or more essays this year. They received 507 last year. Some districts regularly receive more than 1000 each year.

Prizes will be cash awards of \$15, \$10 and \$5 respectively for first, second and third places. All essays will be judged in the district.

The best essay, besides winning the local award, will be sent to the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce as the district entry in regional and state contests. The top state prize is \$200 and a silver tray.

Bayer urges all vocational agriculture and English teachers in the three county district to use the essay contest as an incentive in urging students to improve the composition and their knowledge of conservation.

Entries are to be submitted to J. H. Bayer, Route 2, Muenster, Tex. 76252 on or before January 31, 1971. Each essay must have the writer's name and address and name of the school plainly written on the front page or attached thereto.

Things that are vital to the nation, like food, medicine, fuel and the mail all depend on the railroad. So do the jobs of men in industries which use railroads for incoming and outgoing shipment. A rail strike is not just a dispute of railroad people. It is a calamity involving millions who are helpless victims.

Indirectly Congress has been notified that it needs to correct this mess and do it soon. C. L. Dennis, head of the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline clerks, said that the union might strike again if contract negotiations were not "productive" by March 1, the end of the no strike period decreed by Congress.

By then let's hope there will be a law to outlaw all future strikes in public service — that transportation people, police, firemen, teachers, postal employees and utilities employees will not be allowed to strike but will have to submit their demands to an arbitration board and accept the board's decision.

This may seem like overriding the rights of some people, however, we must also remember that the alternative is to override the rights of many other people. On the other hand we have little reason to claim that this arrangement would really violate a worker's right. A board of arbitration is assumed to be a fair and reasonable group that will give a square deal to both sides.

As a matter of fact, it seems like a good idea to work out the same kind of strike prevention in all industry. Strikes hurt all of us. Their combined effect is to increase all prices which have a bearing on our cost of living. We're not directly concerned but we can't avoid being involved. All of us know that the rash of strikes and wage raises in the past several years has been a big factor in inflation. It's effect was to steal a big portion of the purchasing value of our money.

In a free country like this the idea of compulsory arbitration doesn't quite seem to fit. But some people seem to have forgotten that freedom implies restraint and self discipline respecting the rights of others. Too many negotiations nowadays aren't a matter of right but economic coercion. If American labor and industry will not observe the real spirit of freedom they do not deserve to settle their own disputes.

## SH School Adopts Program of Free Lunch for Needy

The new school lunch program whereby needy children receive free or reduced price lunches is in effect at Sacred Heart School, according to an announcement this week by Father Placidus Eckart, superintendent.

It is made possible under provisions of the recently approved Public Law No. 91-248 whereby federal and state agencies cooperate with the school in providing the price reductions.

Regular price of meals is 30 cents. Children who can qualify because of financial need will receive 15 cent, 8 cent or free meals, depending on the degree of need.

Basis of determining eligibility is family income relative to family size. A table indicating who can qualify and to what extent has been prepared by Father Placidus and was sent along with application forms to the parents of Sacred Heart students.

Parents are urged to reply promptly so that the list of eligibles can be completed next week. The completed application, signed by a parent, should be sent to Father Placidus at Sacred Heart School.

Applications will be reviewed promptly and the family will be notified within three days. Information on the application will be confidential.

## Persons Near 65 Advised of Coming Medicare Sign-Up

A very important date is near for some area residents over age 65, stated Gus Jones, manager of the Sherman social security office. This date, January 1, is the beginning of a three month "General Enrollment Period" provided for under the Social Security Medicare law. A person who is eligible but has never enrolled in part "B" of Medicare can sign up during this "Open" period which ends March 31, 1971. Mr. Jones stated. Medical coverage will be effective the following July 1.

Part "B" of Medicare or medical insurance helps pay for doctor bills, diagnostic tests, and certain other medical expenses incurred outside the hospital, Mr. Jones added.

This will be the last chance to enroll for those people born between October 1, 1902, and September 30, 1903, the manager emphasized. Those born before October 1, 1902, and who never enrolled are not eligible.

A person who enrolls for part "B" during the open period will have to pay a slightly higher rate if he has had an earlier opportunity to sign up.

At a regular meeting of the City Council, held in the City hall on the 7 day of December, A.D. 1970, the following ordinance was presented...

SECTION I - DEFINITIONS

A. "City" shall mean the City of Muenster, Texas. B. "Person" shall mean any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation, partnership or group...

S. "Unpolluted Water or Waste" shall mean any water or waste containing none of the following: free or emulsified grease or oil, acid or alkali, phenols, or other substances imparting taste and odor...

T. "Standard Methods" shall mean the laboratory procedures set forth in the latest edition, at the time of analysis, of Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Sewage...

USE OF THE PUBLIC SEWERS A. No person shall discharge, or cause to be discharged, any storm water, ground water, roof run-off, subsurface drainage, down spouts, yard drains, yard foundations and

Any person who refuses to comply with this Ordinance or who willfully violates Section 2 or any portion of this Ordinance or who uses to comply with the provisions of these Sections the services provided by the Approving Authority with a written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a 30 day time limit for satisfactory correction thereof...

SECTION 4. REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF INDUSTRIAL WASTES INTO THE PUBLIC SEWERS.

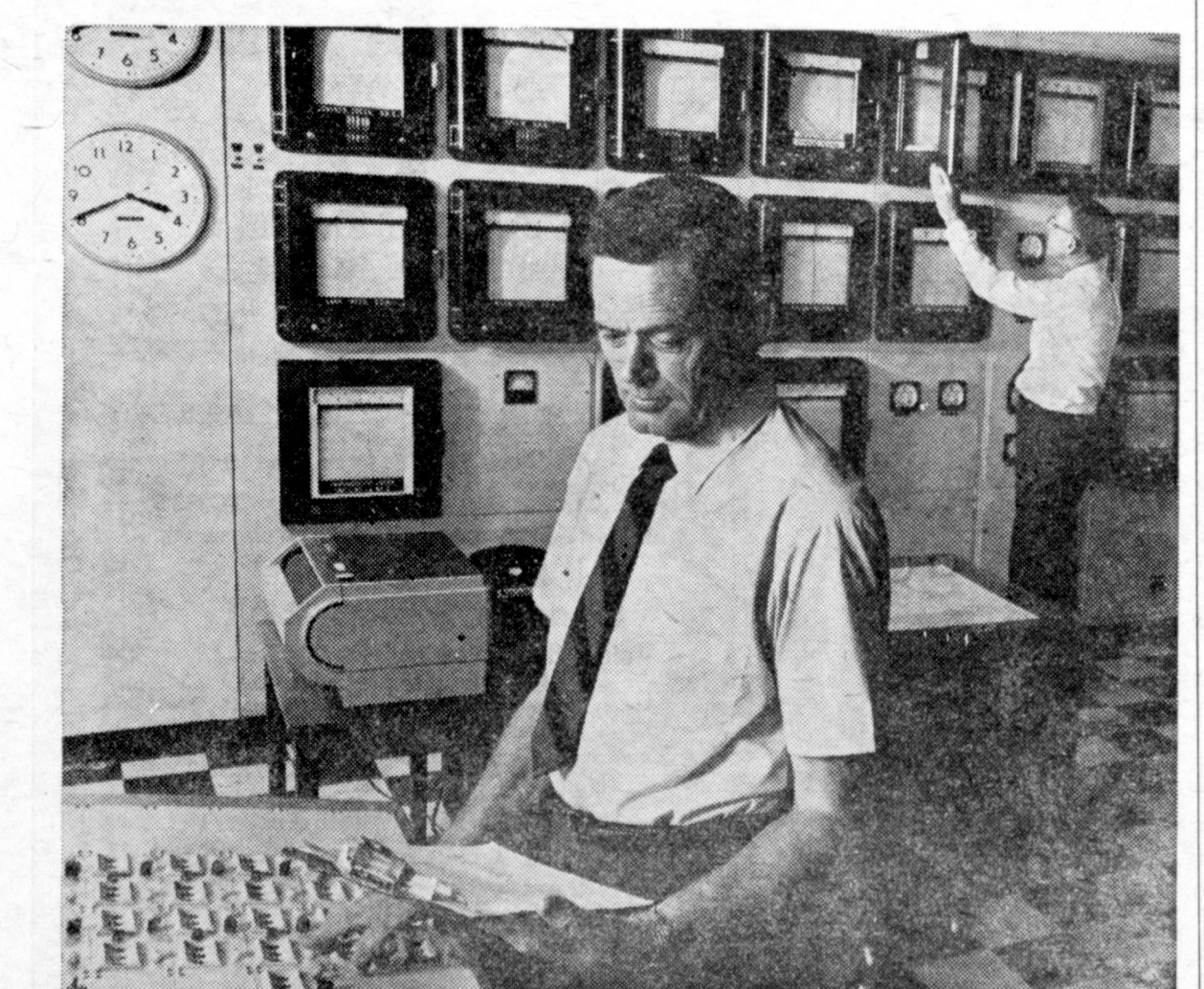

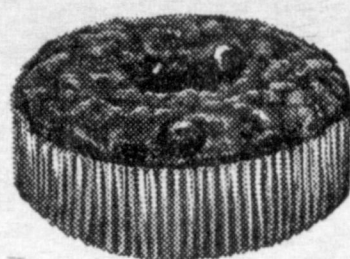
