A person who is eligible but has never enrolled in part "B" of Medicare can sign up during this "Open" period which ends March 31, 1971, Mr. Jones stated. Medical coverage will be effective the following July 1.

Part "B" of Medicare or medical insurance helps pay for doctor bills, diagnostic tests, and certain other medical expenses incurred outside the hospital, Mr. Jones added.

This will be the last chance to enroll for those people born between October 1, 1902, and September 30, 1903, the manager emphasized. Those born before October 1, 1902, and who never enrolled are not eligible.

A person who enrolls for part "B" during the open period will have to pay a slightly higher rate if he has had an earlier opportunity to sign up.
