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Purcell Opposes Compulsory Union Part of Postal Bill

Congressman Graham Purcell today announced he is dissenting from House Post Office Committee postal re-

form recommendations because of the bill's so-called "compulsory unionism" provisions. Purcell announced he will co-sponsor an amendment to reinstate freedom of choice for postal workers who do not want to join a union.

In making the announcement, Purcell stated his general agreement with the idea of postal reform. "However," Purcell said, "the bill which

the majority of Members of the Committee and the Administration support flies square in the face of the 'freedom of choice' policy originally outlined by President Kennedy and continued by President Johnson. It was also originally supported by President Nixon, but it is obvious this is one of the prices the Administration feels it must pay to get union support for its bill."

"I disagree with this serious departure from past policy," Purcell continued, "since it opens the door toward forcing postal workers into a union, whether an individual wants it or not. I have nothing against unions," the Texas Democrat said, "but they should rely on their own merits to get membership. The Federal Government has no business forcing workers to join one."

Purcell did stress that, even as written, those states with "right to work" laws may continue to have their workers protected. "I have been assured by the Postmaster General," Purcell stated, "that the bill, even now, will not affect our right to work law in Texas. The major problem will be elsewhere in the nation where states have not enacted 'right to work' laws," Purcell concluded, "but the entire issue is being hidden behind some confusing statements."

Health Department Warns of Hazards In Water Sports

The season of fishing and boating enthusiasm is now in full swing. But those enjoyable occasions out at the lake or stream could turn into catastrophe unless a few simple rules are followed. The Texas State Department of Health reminds you that a safe summer of excitement and fun is in your hands.

All fishermen — experts and novices alike — should know how to swim, should know basic first aid, and have a first aid kit with them. Since fish hooks sometimes "catch" anglers as well as fish, carry needlenose pliers, wire cutters, and pocket knife in your tackle box. Always keep hooks in covered containers. Always look before casting, and make certain you have room to do so without hooking someone else. Use an overhead cast when in a boat with others. It's much safer to fish with a companion, but when fishing alone, always leave word where you will be and when you plan to return. Wear thick soled boots in densely wooded or marshy areas. Do not wear waders while in a boat. Wade cautiously to avoid slipping on unseen rocks or stepping suddenly into deep water. Stay in open areas. Avoid swimmers, water skiers, and skin and scuba divers. Learn how to hold a fish pro-

perly while extracting a hook. Many species have sharp teeth or fins that can cause deep hand wounds.

All water skiers should know it takes a team effort, with at least three people involved — one person to ride behind the boat, one to steer with eyes front, and another to watch the skier and his hand signals. Although skimming 75 feet behind a powerboat doing 30 miles per hour may look dangerous, it need not be if you use the right sign language and follow a few safety rules. Even qualified swimmers should wear a flotation device while skiing, preferably a life jacket. Have a good communication system between the driver, the observer, and the skier. Learn the hand signal system developed by the American Water Ski Association. The skier can use these signals for everything from making turns to adjusting speed.

If you are involved in a boating accident, do not panic. The one most important factor in avoiding panic is training and preparation. Boats will float, and you will too, if you don't lose your head. Never overload the boat, and always insist that all passengers wear life preservers. If the boat overturns, stay with the boat — it will float. Keep a level head, and practice the most important rule of them all — use common sense.

Farmers Cautioned To Observe Law on Hormone Herbicide

Cooke County farmers and ranchers have been using the hormone type herbicides for weed and brush control very successfully for many years.

This is a very good way to control weeds and brush when used properly. Laws have been on the books to cover the use of the chemical since the herbicide was developed and recommended as a weed control.

Due to the many reports of damage to other crops the State Department of Agriculture has started checking and enforcing the rules and regulations that apply to individuals using the hormone type herbicides.

No person shall apply herbicide as a custom applicator to a total of more than 10 acres in any 1 year without first obtaining a permit for such application.

All equipment used for custom application must be inspected by a representative of the State Department of Agriculture and receive a license.

A person spraying his own land or crops must make application for a permit and pay 10¢ per acre for a permit fee if spraying more than 10 acres annually.

If a person is spraying his own land or crops, and spraying less than 10 acres, he must give notice of each operation to the Commissioner of Agriculture prior to such opera-

tion, but the permit fee of 10¢ per acre is not required.

Applications for permits are available from the dealer where the herbicide is purchased. For ground type equipment it is recommended to not exceed 40 lbs. of pressure when spraying. It is the responsibility of the dealer to keep an accurate list of the individuals purchasing herbicides and send this list to the

State Department of Agriculture. If additional information is desired, contact the County Agricultural Agent.

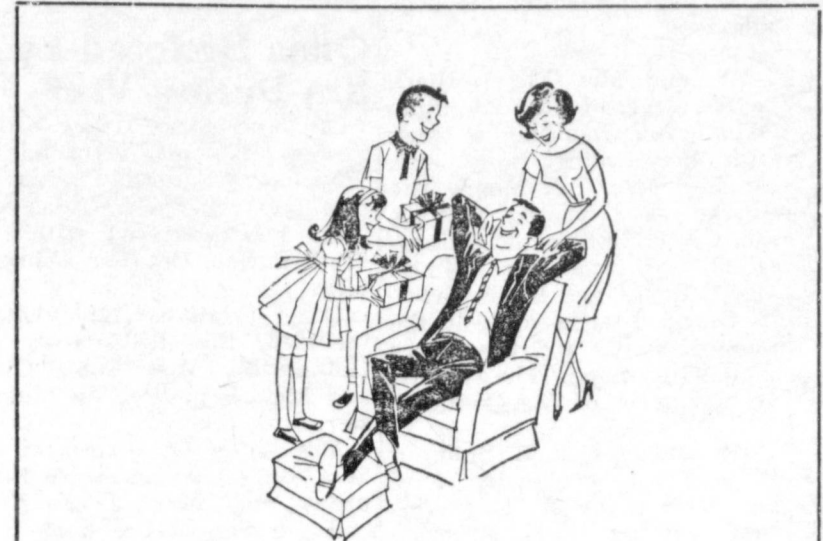
Trio Makes Tour Of Shrines during Week's Vacation

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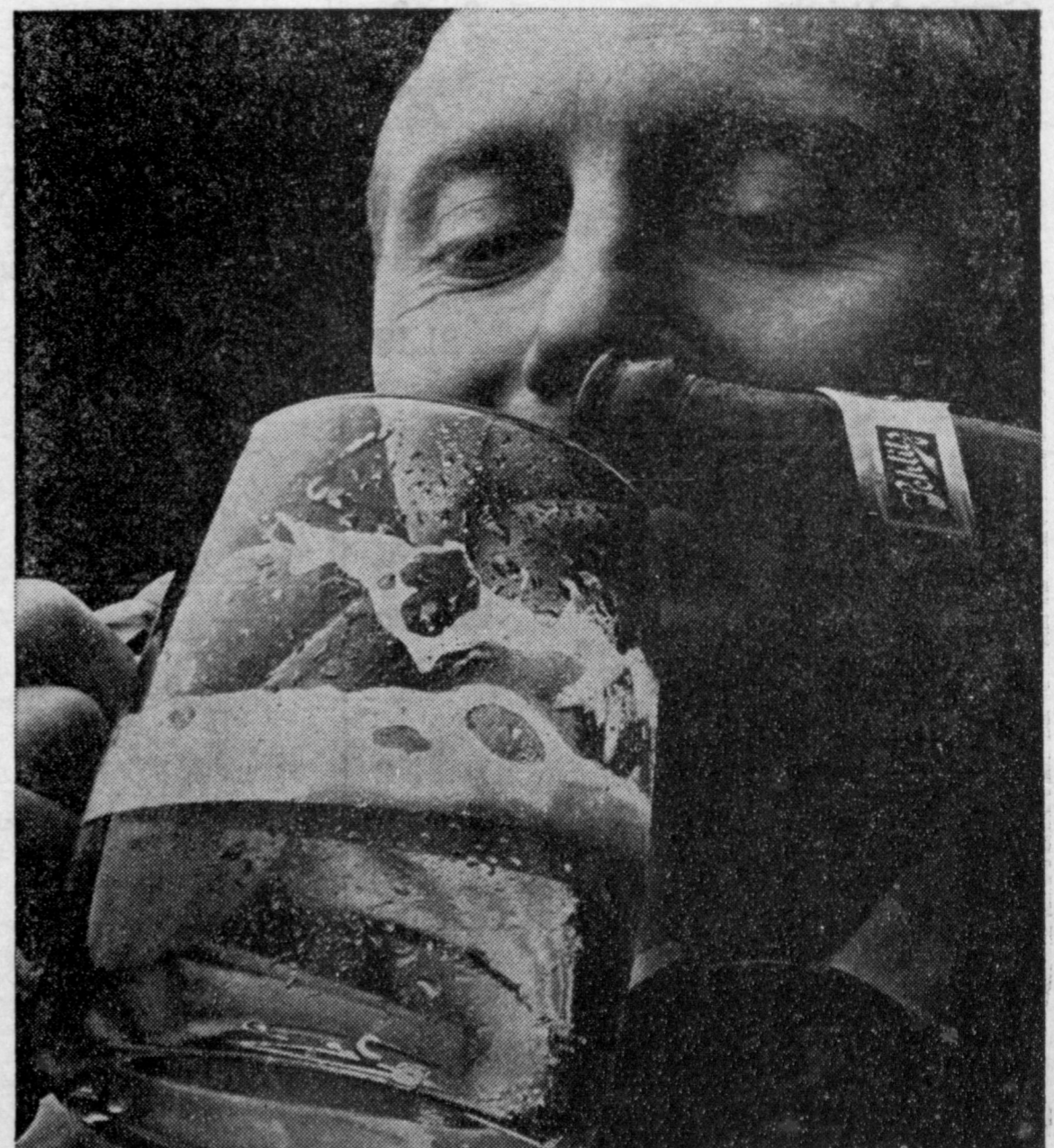

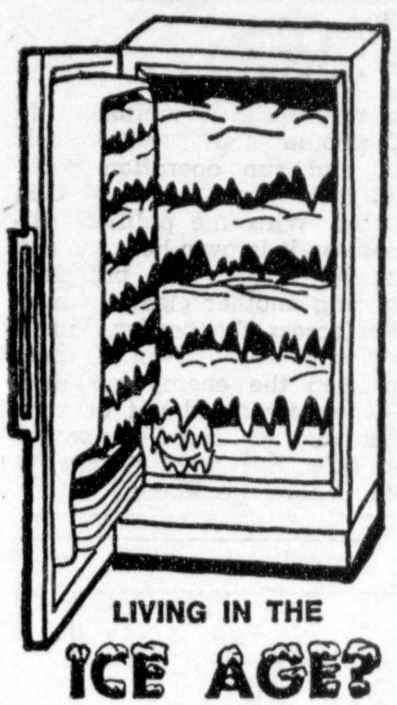
