



# Vital Facts About Money

QUESTION: Why is Money Expensive Now?

ANSWER: Interest rates are the price of money, and like any other price they are set by supply and demand. Right now, the demand for money is heavy, because people fear that prices will continue to rise, and they want to spend now before things cost even more. Meanwhile, the supply of money has been restricted by the Federal Reserve to stop spending and slow inflation. This makes interest rates high.

QUESTION: Why Has The Federal Reserve Had To Restrict The Supply Of Money?

ANSWER: The fight against inflation has to involve some restraint on spending, and in the U.S. we feel it is better to let the official agencies merely determine how much money will be in the economy, and allow the free market to decide who gets this money that is available. This is felt to be superior to a system under which the government enters the market place and decides who will get the available funds.

QUESTION: What Can End Tight Money?

ANSWER: Two forces can help. First, an end of the fear of inflation would stop the heavy borrowing that is now undertaken by people who fear that prices will rise if they wait to borrow and spend. Second, if the deficits of the Federal Government and the state and local governments are kept under control, this will reduce the demand for borrowed funds from these government units. This lessened demand from both the public and private sectors would reduce the cost of borrowing money.

QUESTION: Do Higher Taxes Cause Inflation?

ANSWER: Higher taxes are both a cause and cure of inflation. Tax increases do add to the cost of living. But a nation that expects its governmental bodies to provide more and more public services must expect taxes to rise to pay for these. For the alternative would be that the government would have to finance these services through the creation of new money, which would be highly inflationary. This would cause far more inflation than the rise in taxes would.

QUESTION: Why Should We Fight Inflation?

ANSWER: Some people say they have never lived better than they have during periods of inflation, when prosperity was continual - just as long as their wages rose as fast as inflation advanced. But inflation remains an extremely harsh tax, even though these people do not feel it immed-

First, it penalizes the saver, who provides the nation with growth capital, by perpetually eroding the value of his savings.

Second, it penalizes the pensioner and others on fixed incomes, as their inflow of funds does not rise to match the increased cost of living.

Third, inflation can not be kept modest. Small inflation snowballs as people try to spend faster to beat the rises in prices. And this rampant inflation has to be followed by a period of digestion, as the nation uses up all the goods bought during the inflation, before new purchases are

Thus inflation first wipes out much of the value of money, and then it follows this with a steep recession or depression, as the nation makes up for its prior purchase of goods long before they were needed. This is a cost paid by all-including the man who feels that inflation brings him permanent prosperity.

QUESTION: What Is The Role Of The Federal Reserve Discount Rate?

ANSWER: The discount rate of the Federal Reserve is a rate that the Federal Reserve charges banks when they borrow from it. This rate is usually below what banks charge for their loans, and thus some people think the banks borrow cheaply

from the Federal Reserve and then lend the money out to others at higher prices.

This is not the case. The discount rate is the rate the Federal Reserve charges on its loans to the banks, but these loans are only for very short time periods to meet emergency needs that arise as money leaves the individual banks unexpec-

tedly. Banks can not borrow from the Federal Reserve and then turn around and lend this money out to others. They can only borrow for a short time until they can sell investments or otherwise find new money to meet the deposit drains.

QUESTION: Do Bank Charge Cards Cause Inflation?

ANSWER: Some people feel that the expansion in bank distribution of charge cards has contributed to inflation in the U.S. by making it easier for people to borrow and spend. There are two reasons why the growth of the charge card movement has not been a basic cause of inflation.

First, people have not increased their borrowing sharply since the bank charge card expansion developed. They have simply used their charge cards to shift borrowing from other, less convenient forms over to borrowing through the charge card. Second, the cards have been used mainly for purchase of consumer goods that have not been in scarce supply. So to the extent that the cards have increased public spending, it has not created a shortage of goods that could lead to price increases.

QUESTION: What Is The Prime Rate?

ANSWER: The prime rate is the lowest rate charged best-credit companies when they borrow from a bank. It is used as the basis from which other rates are determined.

Generally the prime rate moves up or down at most banks at about the same time, and this makes many people think the banks get together to change the prime rate. This is not the case. What happens is that when the leader changes the prime rate, and this change is economically justified, other banks go along and change their rate too. Money is a national commodity, and if one bank has too high a rate, its large customers may well switch to other banks that have the lower rate. Similarly, if the rate is increased and this is economically justified by supply and demand, other banks will also raise their rates, or else the ones that do not raise their rates will be swamped with demands for loans.

Sometimes a rate increase may not be justified. The customers of the bank find that other banks are anxious to make loans at the old rate, or they can borrow elsewhere at lower rates. In such a case the bank that raised the rate merely has no choice but to lower its rate again to the justifiable level. For in the long run, it is supply and demand for money that determines what the prime rate will be, not the desires of individual

QUESTION: Do Bank Earnings Benefit From Tight

ANSWER: On the surface, it looks as if banks benefit from rising interest rates; for the rate they charge the customer for money advances when interest rates rise. But there are several offsets:

1. The banks have less money to lend when interest rates rise. (It is this lessened available of money that brings the higher interest rates.)

2. The banks have to pay the people who provide them with, money - the savers and the companies with liquid funds - a higher rate for their money too as interest rates rise, or else they will move their money elsewhere. Thus banks are merely middlemen between the saver and the

3. As interest rates rise, the bonds that the banks have fall in price, for they become relatively less attractive in yield as new securities come out that offer higher yields. The only way an old bond with a lower fixed interest rate can be made saleable as new, higher yield securities come to market is to cut the price. Thus banks find that their old bonds fall in price as interest rates rise. As they have to sell these bonds to find money for their borrowing customers, the banks take marked losses on these bonds. In many cases these losses more than wipe out any increase in earnings that would otherwise result from the higher interest rates.

The three factors combine to curb the bank profits as interest rates rise. And the result is that bank earnings are hurt by tight money just as the earnings of other companies in other industries are hurt when economic restraint is necessary as part of the fight against inflation.




