There is no doubt that lots of people have a better impression of the community and some have a favorable first impression.

One fact for sure is that the parade committee did plenty of hustling in shaping up such a big and colorful event. But their big effort by itself did not produce the gratifying result. All of this, of course, was just an introduction to the main event for the next four days at Colonial Acres Farm. It was a public relations opportunity made possible by the national cutting horse championship finals brought to Texas and Muenster by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Medders, the community's Number 1 ambassadors of good will. Except for them Muenster would not have had the occasion for its big party.

In another sense the big party was just a beginning for local people. They are out at the contest in droves, helping with the many chores that go along with conducting such an event, mingling with the crowds, seeing the action and joining in social activity. It is an occasion for fun as well as showing off a cooperative community for which Muenster hopes to be favorably remembered.

It's a privilege and a pleasure to have the thousands of people visiting us from all parts of the nation. May they enjoy every minute of their visit, and may Muenster make the most of its golden opportunity to make friends and influence people.

## George Cassidy Dies in Arizona

Funeral services for Brig. Gen. George S. Cassidy, 58, retired, were held Saturday in Scottsdale, Ariz. He died in a Mesa, Ariz., hospital Thursday.

Cassidy is well remembered by old timers of this community as a frequent visitor during his teens. He was a licensed pilot at that time, later joined the Army Air Corps and flew over the Burma-India "hump" during World War II. During his 30 years of service he had more than 10,000 hours in the air. He became a brigadier general in 1952.

After retiring from the service in 1961, he lived in Phoenix, Ariz., until becoming general manager of the Salt River Indian Reservation at Scottsdale four and a half years ago. Cassidy is survived by his wife, three daughters, a brother and a sister.

## Colonial Acres Charity Ball Boosts Jean Dixon Project

Party people had a fabulous time at Colonial Acres Coliseum when Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Medders were hosts entertaining for the phenomenal Jean Dixon of Washington, D. C., who was the honored guest for the Thursday night gala.

Mrs. Dixon, subject of the best seller, "A Gift of Prophecy," is famed for her extrasensory perception. She foresaw the death of President John Kennedy, the communication of China, launching of the first Sputnik, the airplane death of Carole Lombard, the blackout of Eastern states and Texas last year and other historical events.

But she wasn't in Muenster to foretell the future; she didn't bring her crystal ball.

Mrs. Dixon is founder and president of Children to Children, which sponsors cultural exchanges in the arts, sciences, crafts, literature and health. The foundation attempts to instill in needy children continuing spiritual growth so they may know the true meaning of love, achieve their full mental and physical development to become adequate citizens and to develop the ability of helping themselves so they in turn help others.

Established in 1964, the foundation places abandoned children in foster homes, provides housekeepers for families who have been abandoned, and other similar work.

Principal Speaker This was explained by Mrs. Dixon who was the featured speaker on the night's program. She was introduced to the audience by Harold E. Mott, Washington attorney who, in turn had been introduced by Charles Smiddy. Proceeds from the \$25 a couple black tie event went to the foundation.

Mrs. Dixon first introduced her husband, James, a real estate executive in the capital city. He is a celebrity in his own right as a composer of songs and sang one of his favorites, "The District of Columbia is My Home Town."

Entertainers Featured entertainers during the evening were Jo Ann Castle, the cute blonde who plays the Dixieland piano specialties on the Lawrence Welks' TV Show and Myron Florin, outstanding accordionist on the same show.

Bouncy, bubbly Jo Ann literally "tore up" the piano, did comedy bits, and walked into the audience for dance partners including Mr. Medders, Ervin Hamric, Jim and Charles Smiddy. She also did a comedy bit with Mary Medders and Steve Walterscheid.

More than 500 formally gownned guests attended from all over Texas and throughout the nation. Chartered buses took groups from Dallas and Fort Worth to the coliseum where a pink champagne fountain flowed and floral mobiles with candles orbited over the dance floor.

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## Cutting Horse World's Eyes Turn to Muenster

Cutting horse interest of the nation is centered at Muenster this week as competition is under way to select the best cutting horses in the professional and non professional divisions.

Action got under way Wednesday morning with sixty horses pre-entered in the championship division and forty one pre-entered in the non-professional division, and the list remaining open for more entries. Eliminations will continue daily ending with non-professional finals Friday night and championship finals

Saturday evening preceding an awards banquet. By the end of the first day's competition the number of entries passed 150 and more entries were expected Thursday. The first day's attendance was about 500, which was regarded as about normal. The big crowds are not anticipated until preliminaries are mostly finished.

Also on the program are three gala social events. Wednesday nights was a dance featuring the nationally famous orchestra of Jan Garber. Thursday night's will be another dance featuring Spanish music by Ray Herrera's orchestra. And Saturday nights will be an awards banquet following the champ finals. All of those social events are under a tent on the portable flour moved out of the coliseum to make room for the cutting horse events.

During the four days of the contest organizations of the community are going all out to help with the detail work. Catholic Daughters have a coffee and rolls concession each morning until 10 when the Underwood Catering Service takes over to serve the noon meal. The same caterer serves barbecue plates in the evening.

A crowd estimated at over 700 jammed into the auditorium, and had a gay time cheering and clapping as the oldsters and youngsters competed in two divisions. One of the judges said the audience was one of the most lively he has seen.

Still more spice for the contest was added by Cloyce "Red" Gordon of Gainesville, the master of ceremonies. And Gordon's band was an added attraction.

Winners of the over 60 division were Fred Haney of Gainesville, first, Willard Barton of Marietta, second, and A. E. Brown, Madill, third. Awards were presented by Gene Riggs.

Winners of the under 60 division were Danny McAllister of Bowie, first, John Beasley of Whitesboro, second, Dale Norris of Fort Worth, third.

One of the contestants was 12 year old Kenneth Sears, the fiddling sensation of Liberty, Okla. There were five entries in the over 60 division and 11 in the under 60 group.

Crippled Hornets Crushed 55-6 in Panther Runaway Disaster hit the Hornets at Saint Jo last week. The league leading Panthers mauled them by a count of 55-6.

It wasn't only because speedster Gary Lovett and his companions were showing off the might of their offensive power, but also because the Muenster fellows, already in the cellar position, were at their season's worst. Two regulars were out of uniform and three more were eliminated by injuries.

Quarterback Chris Cain started with a bad shoulder and lasted only a few plays. He was replaced by Freshman John Monday who did a nice job in his first try with the first string. Later Ken Stormer and Herbie Sicking were replaced.

Muenster made its only score on two big pass plays in the third period. First Stormer took Monday's short pass in the open and raced for a 59 yard gain before he was crowded out on the 11. And another Monday to Stormer combination on the next play was good for the touchdown.

The Hornets missed another opportunity near the end of the first half after Cason recovered a Panther fumble on the 22. Four plays gained 10 but the next four lost 3.

Again late in the game the Hornets gained three first downs for 53 yards to the 28, then got fouled up. The next four tries lost 2 yards.

W. A. Griffin, 73, Dies of Injuries In Pickup Crash William A. Griffin, 73, a long time resident of the Hardy community died in Muenster Memorial Hospital at 5:30 last Thursday afternoon, about two hours after being involved in a two-pickup crash on FM 1630 near its intersection with the Forestburg-Saint Jo road.

A Montague County highway patrolman reported that Griffin's pickup, east bound, collided almost head-on with a truck driven by Silas Frank Myers, 26, of Dectaur.

With Myers were his wife, 15, and a one-year-old son. The three were also taken to Muenster Hospital where the mother was dismissed Sunday and father and son are reported in satisfactory condition.

Funeral service for the deceased was held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Geo. J. Carroll and Son Chapel with the Reverend Cleatus Ice of Fort Worth officiating. Burial was in Valley View cemetery under direction of the Carroll funeral home.

Griffin, a resident of the old Freemound Community, was born Sept. 16, 1893. He was a veteran of World War I and was married to Miss Ellwood Lewis in 1927. She died in 1949.

Survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Velma Bates of Gainesville and Miss Velva Griffin of Forestburg; and three brothers, Oscar of Fort Worth, Ovel of Dallas, and Allie of the Freemound community.

That's the big question for Friday night when Muenster and Alvord, both winless in the 7-B district race, will end the season with a struggle that leaves just one at the bottom — unless both are tied there. The game will be in Alvord, starting at 7:30.

On paper, the Hornets in this one will have their first even break of the season. Both teams have miserable records. However, it is doubtful whether the Bulldogs at this time are hurting quite as badly from injuries.

The Hornet casualty list includes Wayne Klement, Chris Cain and Herbie Sicking and possibly also Glenn Klement. Kenny Swirczynski, who missed several games, was back last Friday. And Ken Stormer, who missed the last quarter at Saint Jo, should be ready for the finale.

A factor that may possibly compensate for injuries is the improving lineup of reserves. Five freshmen, John Monday, Bobby Bruns, Frank Tuggle, Ken Walterscheid and Andy Knabe, along with Sophomore Paul Rennels showed possibilities against the Saint Jo powerhouse last week. They could look good against a weaker team, in case they are needed.

Parade Was Tops Western Week arrived in Muenster Tuesday afternoon with a big and colorful parade that would have done credit to a much larger city. It was more than a mile long and took up more than a half hour in moving past a given point. Spectators, estimated at 3 to 4 thousand were scattered along the entire route, and crowded in spots. And the weather was ideal, clear with just a little chill.

In it were six riding clubs, over thirty floats and vehicles, a band and drill team from Sheppard AFB, the Muenster High band, Sacred Heart High drill team and a number of other entries.

First prize for the floats was awarded to the Gainesville Boy Scouts for their Indian life display, second prize went to the 49ers square dance club of Gainesville and the third to Cooke County Junior

College on a physical fitness display. A favorite, but ineligible because trophies were for visitors only, was Leonard Hartman's hounds treeing a coon. Two live coons were there in a cage and the dogs were fretting and baying.

In the riding club division the judges had hard choices among five entries. Saint Jo's which has been a consistent winner elsewhere was disqualified as the host club. The trophies went to Big Loop Club of Clay County, Gainesville Riding Club and Bowie Riding Club.

There were no takers for high school band trophies. Muenster High, ineligible because local, was the only one there. So the first prize was given to the MHS band and second to Sacred Heart drill team.

The parade was loaded with unusual units. There were wagons, a stage coach, clowns on scooters, a three team hitch of massive Belgian horses, old cars, a shetland and cart, a prospector with his burro, a lady and three children on a horse led by a pioneer. And there were cars with queens and duchesses and representatives of organizations from Muenster and Gainesville.

The parade formed east of town, entered the highway at Mesquite and followed it to Main and Seventh to the break up area in front of the public school. Weldon Dennis of Saint Jo was parade marshal and Gene Robinson of Marietta was announcer.

After the parade most of the participants and many spectators got together for a barbecue supper served by Muenster Jaycees at the corner of Main and first streets. It was a scholarship benefit event and plates were served to more than 1350 persons.

## First Colonists Arrived 77 Years Ago November 14

It was 77 years ago Monday, Nov. 14, 1889, when the first settlers arrived in the open prairie which was to become Muenster. None of that group of pioneers is living to tell about the arrival.

Mrs. John Rohmer who was a baby, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hesse, is the only survivor of that small group of brave colonizers.

Muenster history records that a small piece of paper nailed to the nearest telegraph post informed these people they were in Muenster. It took men with courage to tell their families that this was the place where they intended to settle, to work, to pray, to raise families, to build church and school, to make their fortunes.

They made the best of circumstances as only pioneers can do. One of the barns was converted into a community kitchen, another into a dormitory for the men who outnumbered the women at the time. Women and children slept in the land office of Flusche Bros. John Knoll soon erected a tent which had arrived by wagon from Kansas along with other supplies including several barrels of apples. This tent served as a temporary boarding house.

During the next few weeks landseekers from the Midwest arrived in droves, even before the surveyors had finished their work, before arrangement could be made where they could stay. Some found temporary housing in Gainesville; quite a few returned to their midwestern homes.

Mrs. Otto is a graduate of Mary Washington College in Fredricksburg, Va., with a degree in science and has been employed in Washington, D. C.

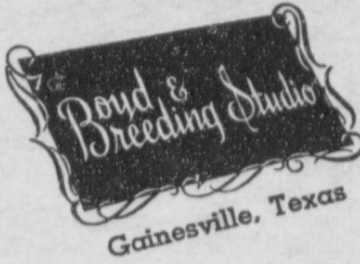

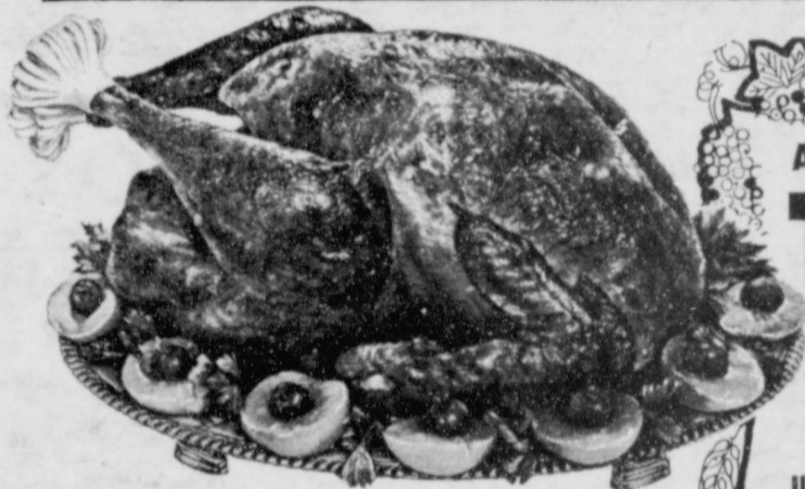

**Cards Mailed for Livestock Count**

Rural mail carriers from the Muenster Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning November 20.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Arthur Endres explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Endres said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Edward W. Endres, Route 1; and Henry J. Pels, Route 2.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

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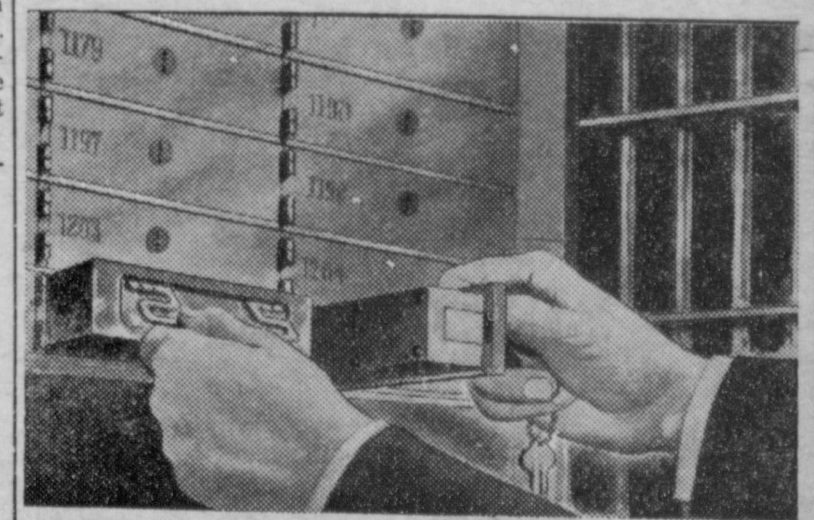
