An interesting comparison of the speed in space travel with the speed in deficit federal spending is offered by an editor in Kentucky. He quotes estimates of scientists to the effect that Mariner 4, which was sent on a wide orbit around the sun two years ago, has now traveled more than a billion miles and will keep traveling in space until the end of time.

Even at that dazzling speed Mariner 4 will have to continue on its way for 653 years to reach a total distance of 326.7 billion miles. But our government needed only 35 years to attain a national debt of 326.7 billion dollars. To put it another way, we go almost 20 bucks in the red for every mile that craft goes into space.

Another observation worth noting, this one from Washington State. A man suggests special legislation for draft dodgers: Permit all who so wish to refuse serving in the armed forces provided they will sign papers agreeing to give up for life their right to vote, their right to hold public office and their right to receive any kind of federal financed benefits. That sounds like a fair deal. If those punks have no obligation to their country, it should have no obligation to



MONTAGUE - More than different varieties of peaches, believe it or not, have been studied since 1939 here at the Fruit Research-Demonstration Station.

And several hundred guests will see many of these varieties when they take part June 30 in the annual field day at the station.

In addition to seeing the the guests will in spect the current progress of research in grapes, berries,

plums and pears. The June 30 program will be in two parts:

-Tours of the station, beginning at 8 a.m., with stops for inspection and discussion at eight sites.

-General session under the famous Grape Arbor at 11 a.m., when specialists will talk about numerous problems facing the North Texas fruit growers today. The program ends at noon. (Most prolific grape at the

station in tha Beacon, a juicytype variety of purplish color which has produced an average of 41/2 tons per acre for 15 years.)

Host for the day will be the longtime superintendent of the station, U. A. Randolph, horticulturists with the Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas

A&M University. Program chairman will be Ted Martin of Denton, district agent for the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University, and vice chairman, Frank Bumpus, Montague County agent.

The station is located 21/2 miles southwest of Montague, just off a county road interecting State Hwy. 59.
