Since the Poor People's March on Washington began, Senators and Congressmen have been swamped with letters from angry constituents who strongly resent this obvious effort to intimidate the

nation's lawmakers. Congressman Wayne Hays of Ohio was so impressed by the forthright letter from one of his constituents, Mrs. Sadie Willis, that he entered it in its entirety in the "Congressional Record."

"First of all, I am not a white racist talking, but a forty-year-old Negro woman who knows what she is talking about."

"What is wrong with you men in Washington? You keep giving people more free hand-outs and more free checks, when what they need is a job so they can learn to work and help themselves. The welfare alone has been their ruination. If you give a check, make them do something to earn it. If you give commodities, make them earn it. If you give free education or job training, make them earn it. I am sick and tired of seeing the rest of us pay and pay for one-tenth of the people to learn that all they have to do is pretend helplessness and someone else will foot the bill. I would not blame the whites in this country if they started a revolt. There are many things to be done in this country that could be done by those who get free benefits."

"You are completing the total destruction of the manhood of the Negro male by all the so-called progressive programs. Giving a man an education is no reason to expect he will no longer be a problem. I have a mother-in-law, and two brothers-in-law who are college graduates, but

DUTY, HONOR, COUNTRY

The August issue of The American Legion Magazine carried an article reporting on a Defense Department survey concerning the number of American servicemen who have sought haven in foreign countries in order to escape their military obligations.

It revealed that of all of the thousands of GI's in various posts around the globe, a mere 282 have sought asylum in other nations to elude the authorities. Of these 282 only 181 were citizens of the United States. Fifty of them have already returned to face the music.

In the same two-year period covered by the survey prepared for Congress more than 25,000 European-based soldiers have volunteered to go on active duty in Vietnam. During the same period, more than 60,000 of the young Americans in that war zone have requested extension of their tour of duty for a minimum of six months beyond the normal one year of combat.

The figures prompted us to dig into the files for a copy of a speech General Douglas MacArthur made to the corps of cadets at West Point in 1962 when he accepted the treasured Thayer Award. The General told the officers who

would one day soon be leading our soldiers abroad:

"And what sort of soldiers are those you are to lead? Are they reliable? Are they brave? Are they capable of victory?"

"Their story is known to all of you. It is the story of the American man at arms. My estimate of him was formed on the battlefields many many years ago, and has never changed. I regarded him then, as I regard him now, as one of the world's noblest figures; not only as one of the finest military characters, but, as one of the most stainless."

"His name and fame are the birthright of every American citizen. In his youth and strength, his love and loyalty, he gave all that mortality can give. He needs no eulogy from me, or from any other man. He has written his own history and written it in red on his enemy's breast..."

The survey shows the General was correct.

Crowley Asks for Revival of Respect For Law and Order

RICHARDSON — It is important to our political system that concerned citizens from all walks of life involve themselves personally in political and governmental affairs, 13 District Congressional candidate Frank Crowley said Monday night.

"It is more important than ever this year that all citizens exert their influence on public officials and candidates to bring about a revival of respect for law and order, to bring our country to a stable course," Crowley told the Richardson Knights of Columbus meeting at St. Paul's School.

"I call upon each and every one of you and every citizen to set to work to end the climate of violence that is hanging over America. We must impress upon our national and local leaders the importance of restoring and preserving respect for law and order and respect for the men who uphold law and order,"

he added. "When looting broke out in Washington last spring America was horrified to see television film of Americans casually looting the businesses of other Americans while police and troops were prohibited from doing anything about it."

"Permissiveness will never put an end to the fires and the looting. The Congress makes the laws for the District of Columbia. I can assure you that as your Congressman I will work for legislation that will authorize stern, uncompromising treatment for those who try to burn down our Nation's Capital. It is our duty as citizens to impress upon our officials and candidates the absolute necessity of dealing sternly with lawbreakers, be they individuals or mobs, be they white or black. When it comes to war on crime, I am a hawk," Crowley said.

We submit the following as the first question to be asked by the investigators who look into the Chicago happenings: "Would you have preferred that the police not be there?"

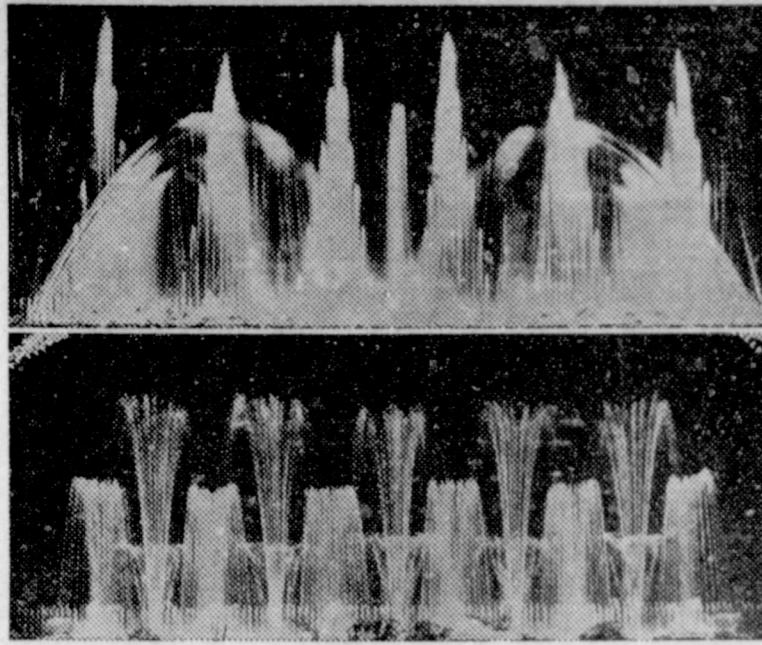

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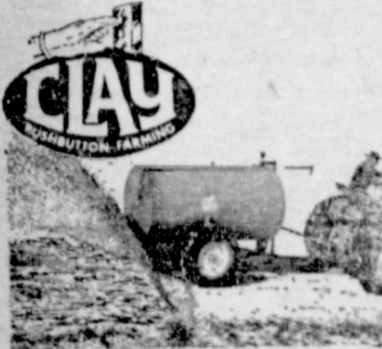

Completes Leave

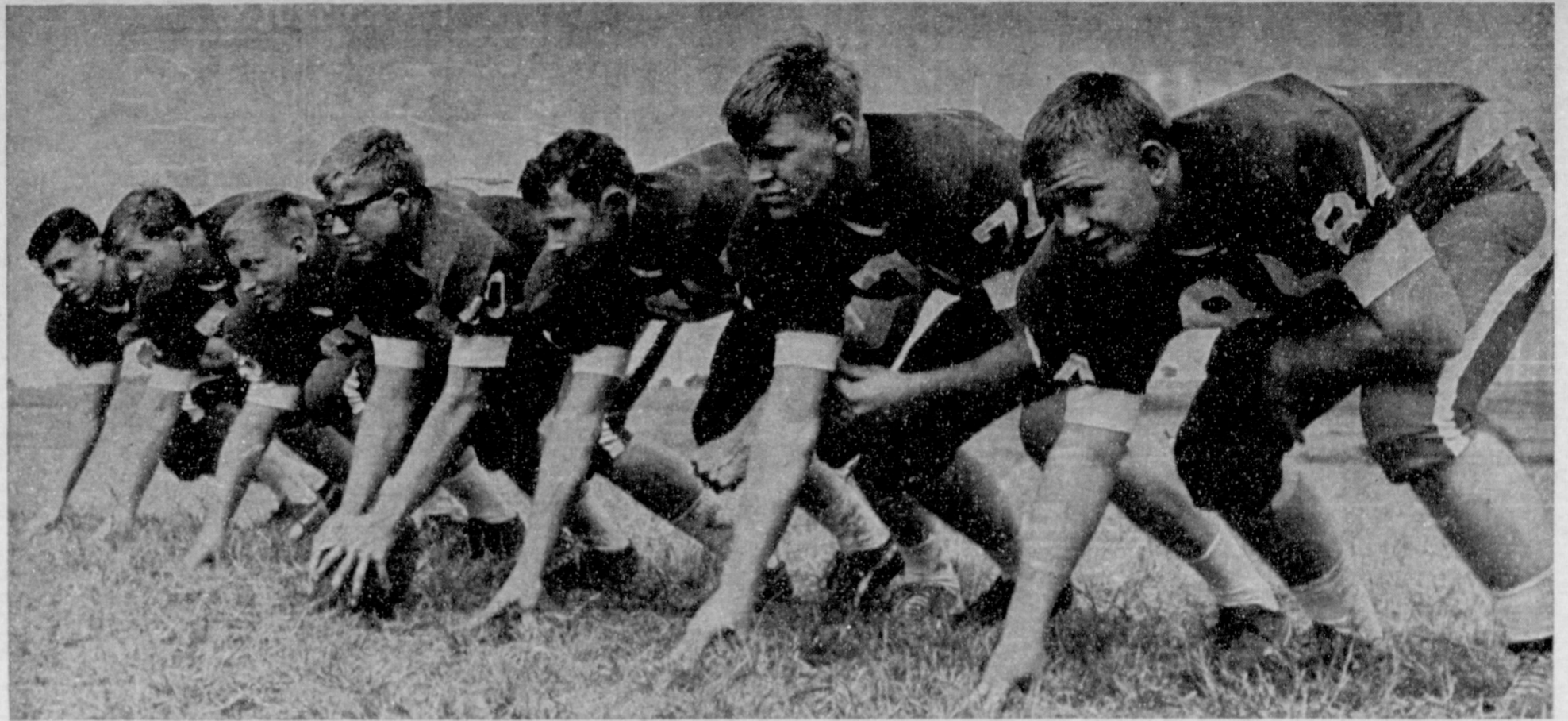

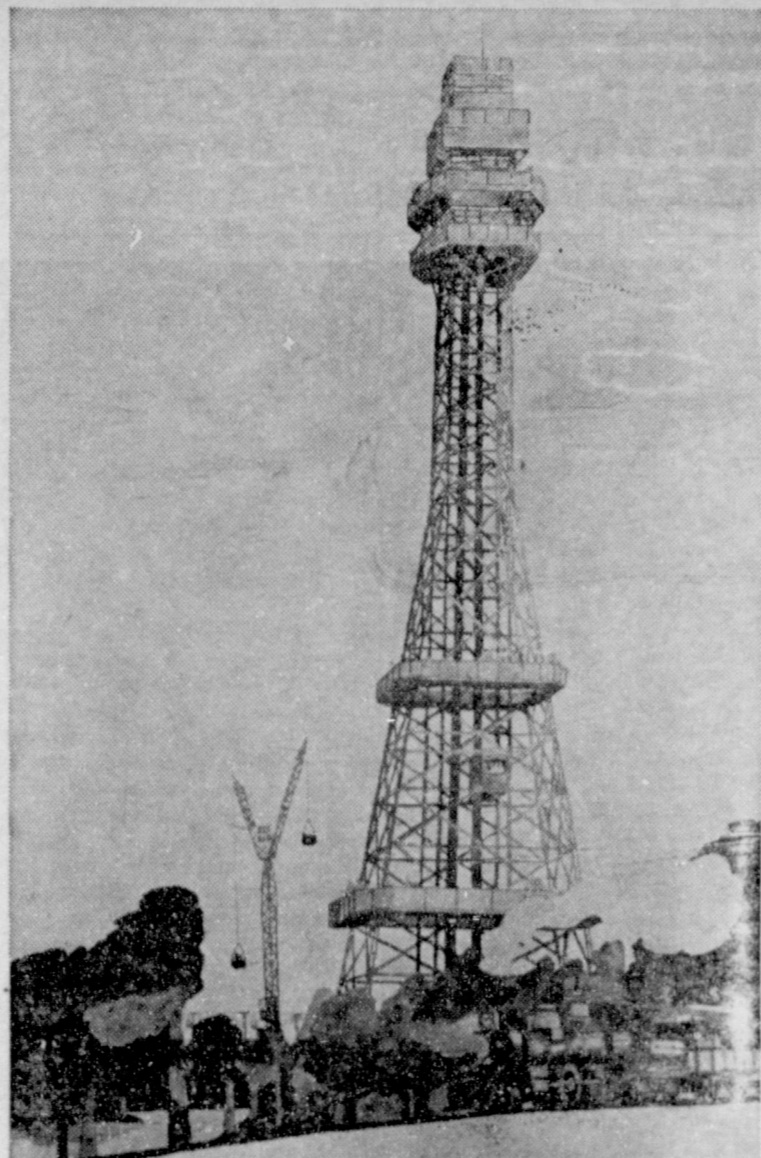
