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It will be interesting to see how the states react to the proposed constitutional amendment which would give the District of Columbia equal representation with the 50 states in the Congress of the U.S. It means that DC would have two persons in the Senate and one in the House of Representatives.

The subject is one of the many on which our two senatorial candidates disagree. Krueger voted for it when it passed the House by 289-127 in March, and Tower opposed it when it passed 67-32 in the Senate. Supporters of the proposal claim that the 700,000 persons of DC are disfranchised citizens who are denied a vote in their government. Krueger makes it a racial issue, saying Tower's vote is certain toirk Texas blacks since about 70 per cent of the Washington DC population is black.

Tower insists that DC representation in Congress is a constitutional issue rather than racial. He says that the intention of the founding fathers in establishing the government was to set up the separate area as a residence of government employees to preclude undue influence on the nation's affairs.

What the amendment amounts to is giving the federal bureaucracy voting representation in Congress. Those residents are the employees of government, which is intended to represent us millions of taxpayers. If the measure passes the DC representatives would be the representatives of bureaucrats rather than the rest of us.

Of course there's more to the issue. The real incentive is to unbalance the Congress even more in favor of the liberals. While reports from all over the country tell us that the conservative movement is slowly making progress, the liberals would like to have a bit more support to help them keep running the show. In fact they could have used such help very recently when the so called labor reform bill was before the senate. Regardless of anything that can be said on the subject, the most important consideration is the additional liberal clout in Congress.

Provision of the proposal is that it will become a part of the constitution if ratified by three fourths of the states within seven years. It will be interesting to observe how the states react. How many of them will favor the idea of diluting their own influence in the legislative halls, especially the Senate, by creating the two DC votes? Also, how will they like the idea of adding that much clout to the already excessive influence of bureaucrats in DC?

To our way of thinking, the bureaucrats already have too much power. Millions of them, as administrators of the thousands of federal regulations, are already pushing the public around shamefully. If they get representation in congress we can assume that the burden of bureaucracy will become worse instead of better.

And now, since extension of the ERA ratification period, we have still another problem. If the required 38 states fail (Continued on Page 10)

## Scholarship Test Set for Oct. 24 At Muenster High

Tom Fluker, Counselor at Muenster High School, has announced that juniors, will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall. The test, co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college plans.

Scheduled for October 24, at Muenster High School, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude — two abilities important in doing college work. The test can also lead to other opportunities for high school students. For example, students can ask to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service which helps colleges learn about students like them.

Along with their score reports, students will receive a copy of ABOUT YOUR PSAT/NMSQT SCORES, a booklet that contains valuable how-to information about: estimating SAT scores; finding out where to get and how to use detailed information about colleges and financial aid, and planning for financing a college education.

Also, students can use the College Board's COLLEGE HANDBOOK, to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,800 colleges and universities.

Temperatures are slightly higher than last week. Low-high readings were recorded as follows by Steve Moyer: 12th, 67 and 94; 13th, 61 and 85; 14th, 42 and 79; 15th, 47 and 85; 16th, 47 and 82; 17th, 47 and 77, 18th, 47 and 86.

## Ordinance Changes Caused by Moonies

After a confrontation with members of the Unification Church, often referred to as the "Moonies", the Muenster City Council met in a special emergency session Monday night to update its peddler's ordinance and hopefully to avoid future unpleasant incidents.

The troubles started several weeks ago when William Poe and others of the "Moonies" disregarded the city's peddler's ordinance and went into the Muenster residential area selling items and asking for donations. After complaints by residents, Police Chief David Province told them to leave and warned that they would be arrested if they return.

The incident led to a suit in district court alleging that the Moonies had been denied their constitutional right to freedom of religion. It was filed by a Denton attorney, Ed Stapleton, seeking court costs, attorney's fees and other payments by the city of Muenster along with overthrow of the ordinance.

On advice of its legal consultant, Al Rochelle of Dallas, the council met last Thursday night to repeal the ordinance prior to appearing before the district court on Friday.

Judge W. C. Boyd dismissed the suit on grounds that the ordinance was no longer in effect and assessed a court cost of \$500 but no other costs. The city council feels fortunate that its costs were not higher. Testimony in court revealed that Poe has initiated a number of such suits in Texas and the costs in other cases ran considerably higher.

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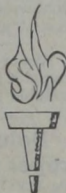


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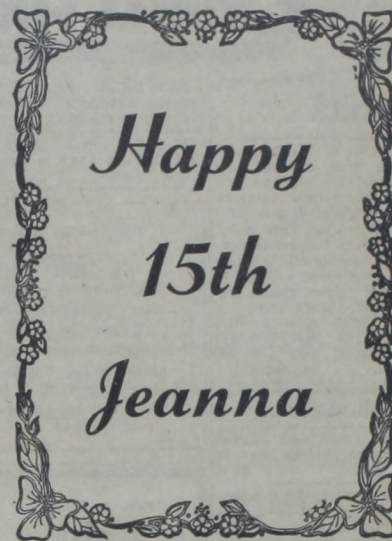

### Tigers Bow to Nolan, 28-14

Two factors had a big bearing on the Sacred Heart Tigers' 28-14 loss to Nolan High of Fort Worth Saturday night. First of all they made mistakes, such as turnovers and penalties, some of which came at the most inopportune time. And secondly they were meeting a worthy foe, Nolan being a large school that would be classed 3A in UIL.

It was a disappointing loss to the Tigers who had visions of finally getting shaped up before going into the TCIL district season next week with Christ the King of Lubbock. Actually their stats were better than their score and would have been much better if the jinx had not hounded them.

The troubles started on second play after kickoff with a Tiger fumble recovered by Nolan on the SH 33. Yorek and Schmidt, a pair of nifty ball toters, began operations then and there, and made the distance in 8 tries. Yorek scored from the 2 and booted the extra point as the clock read 8:13.

Next kickoff was followed by an exchange of punts, then a Tiger effort stopped by a major penalty. Vikings also had to kick on first series but a 15 yard penalty for roughing

the kicker turned the play into a nice gain and great position on Sacred Heart's 39. Second play after that Schmidt broke 3 tackles in a 36 yard romp to the goal. Yorek kicked his second PAT. The score was 14-0 at 1:36.

On first series following the next kickoff the Tigers lost a fake punt gamble but promptly got back into business on an interception by Jeff Hess on first play of the second quarter. Then, with 54 yards to go, SH put together a scoring drive. It started with a run by Mark Nasche from a 4th and 5 kick situation and netted 14 yards. Seven more tries did the job, the big gains being 12 by Bartush and a 13 yard crossback by Kenny Hartman for the TD. The PAT kick missed leaving the score at 14-6 at 7:10.

Nolan bounced back with another drive that went strong until Angelo Nasche's fumble recovery at the Tiger 7, preventing what appeared to be a cinch touchdown. On second series after that the Tigers punted out of danger with only second remaining in the half.

After intermission Nolan started with a 35 yard kickoff return to the SH 39. Three plays later a facemask penalty gave free yardage to the 15 where Tiger defense rose to the occasion. Four tries gained only 4 yards and SH took over on its 11.

Aided by 23 free yards on a pass interference call, SH went 64 yards to the 25, and three plays later Bartush reached the 3 on a beautiful screen pass. But the play was nullified and penalized 15 for holding. SH was back to the 40 instead of on the 3. Two more penalties came in a rash of mistakes, a 5 yard loss and a 15 yard gain before the confusion finally ended in a fumble recovered by Nolan on its 27.

That was the point of origin for Nolan's next TD. Five runs, mostly by Schmidt, gained 31 to the Tiger 42 and Yorek, on first play of the 4th period breezed around right end and all the way.

Finally SH clicked again. A pitch out Bednorz to Hartman to Angelo Nasche was a dandy, going 58 yards to the Viking 2. Hartman scored on the next play and ran over again for extra points. SH was back in the game, trailing 20-14 at 11:15.

Nolan's response started with a 22 yard kickoff return by Schmidt to the 33, and the drive, including 15 free on a penalty, gained 48 to the SH 14 before Chris Hennigan's fumble recovery stopped it. Tigers then moved to the 30 and fumbled the ball back to Nolan. Yorek made that distance in three carries, the score on an 11 yard scoot through the middle. Yorek's run added 2, upping the score to 28-14.

In the remaining 200 seconds no one scored, but there were exchanges. Both teams fumbled, Sacred Heart's recovery being made by Mike Bayer.

### County Farm Bureau Elects And Adopts 24 Resolutions

Members of the Cooke County Farm Bureau at their annual convention last Thursday elected officers and adopted resolutions to be presented at the state convention. Seventeen of the resolutions pertain to national policies and seven to state policies.

President Ray Sicking reminded the members that the state FB convention will be held November 26 & 27 in the Dallas Convention Center. Cooke County will be entitled to 12 voting delegates.

In the election, Ray Sicking and E. V. Fox were re-elected as president and first vice president respectively, and Lanny Lewter was elected second vice president. Secretary and treasurer are appointive officers to be filled later.

Resolutions on the national level are as follows.

1. Prohibit use of federal funds to pay individuals to testify at hearings.
2. Oppose federal development of a national nutrition policy dictating daily meal menus.
3. Require imported meat to meet the same inspection standards as domestic meat.
4. Require that all beef imports be labeled.
5. Urge Congress and USDA to develop programs stimulating exports of beef and other livestock products.
6. Recommend formation of a grain cartel with major grain producing countries for export of wheat, corn, soybeans, etc.
7. Raise target price of wheat and feed grain the same percentage as organized labor's wages and benefits in order to compensate for inflation.
8. Require exploration for oil and gas in all 50 states.
9. Adopt an energy program that does not discriminate against energy producing states but is fair to all states.
10. Permit only aged or disabled persons to be eligible for welfare.
11. Recommend 100 per cent membership participation in contacting state and national legislatures to continue working on a more favorable trade balance of agricultural commodities.
12. Oppose the upcoming referendum to create a check-off program in the beef industry.
13. Urge all members to support existing county, state and national policies of the Farm Bureau.

14. Recommend passage of the Bentsen bill taking import quotas away from the president and placing them under the USDA.

15. Adopt a FB policy to supply periodically each district with a record of legislation at state and national levels already analyzing each bill and its effects and how our representatives voted thereon.

16. Require that all imported agricultural products be so labeled.

17. Require that all agricultural imports meet the same standards of inspection that US products do.

#### The State Resolutions

1. Continue present voluntary system of soil and water conservation with absolutely no mandatory controls.
2. Promote more favorable publicity about agriculture in the news media at national, state and local levels.
3. Require liability insurance before auto license can be purchased.
4. Continue screwworm eradication program.
5. Support National Livestock and Meat Board in promotion of the meat industry and urge local livestock markets to participate in the voluntary check-off program in its support.
6. Support the upcoming referendum on tax reform. (Nov. 7 election.)
7. Recommend updating of trespass laws.
