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Open House Will Observe Bank's 50th Anniversary



Along with business as usual there's going to be something special next Tuesday at Muenster State Bank. An open house from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. will observe the golden anniversary of the bank's founding on July 3, 1923.

Commemorating that event, all of the bank's personnel as well as wives of officers and directors will be hosts, giving souvenirs, serving refreshments and showing the facilities.

Herbert Meurer, bank president, says a general invitation is extended to the community and to the bank's friends in other places. He reminds people that regular banking services are available during the regular hours, and people are specially invited to stay and visit.

The souvenir favors will be ball point pens and key identifications. The latter introduces a new service by the bank. Each key ring has a number which will be registered at the bank in the customer's name. In case keys are lost they may be returned to the bank which will forward to the owner. Another way is to put it in the mail, as hotels have asked many years for return of their keys.

This event is also the occasion to show the bank's facilities, an opportunity offered especially to anyone who has not seen the place before. And of course, there will be refreshments of coffee, punch and cookies.

An additional favor commemorating the anniversary is a personal gift which J. M. Weinzapfel, cashier at the bank's founding and now chairman of the board, has been giving for several weeks. It is an attractive little personal savings bank shaped like a lantern and with printing to identify it as an anniversary souvenir, as ornamental as it is practical. Mr. Weinzapfel is still working at his project of getting one into the hands of

every child and every married couple of the community.

As a salute to the bank on this occasion, the Enterprise published a tabloid size 40 page anniversary special. It contains the congratulatory messages of all business firms in town and a number of out of town friends. In addition it presents a short history of the bank, some interesting facts about the city and local organizations and an assortment of pictures, some from way back. That section is a part of this week's Enterprise.

Concerning the old pictures, the Enterprise had a fine response when it asked for them — many more than could possibly be used. So, the Enterprise is cooperating with the bank at the open house. Dozens of the old pictures will be on display as an added attraction. It's assumed they will be specially interesting to old timers who remember many of the faces and places.

People who tour the building will get to see facilities that are still almost new, following extensive addition and remodeling in 1970. In effect this makes the third home for the bank. The pioneer building in which it started remained until 1940. Then a brand new building and in 1970 so many improvements that the building was practically new again.

Survivors are his wife; four sons, Herbert Jr. and Ronald, both of Fort Worth, Earl of Lindsay and John Cunningham of Muenster; one daughter, Mrs. Charles Bridier of Tolar; seven grandchildren; seven sisters Mmes. Julia Bergin and Angie Godbersen of Ramsey, Dorothy McNary of Vandalia, Margie Schmitt of Shobonier, Ill., and Elizabeth Kraus of St. Louis, Mo., all attending the funeral, and Mmes. Marie Smith of West Alton, Mo., and Eileen Weaver of Shobonier; and two brothers, Jim Cunningham of St. Louis who attended the funeral and Leo Cunningham of Ramsey.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Hereford.

Warning Period on Traffic Violations Expires July 1

Another appeal for cooperation by local drivers was issued this week by James McDonald Sr., city policeman, who points out that traffic violations continue to occur in spite of warning tickets and verbal warnings.

In keeping with his original appeal, his aim is to keep order in Muenster without the issue of traffic violation tickets, so he asks all to heed the warning and avoid unpleasantness.

Some of the violations observed since the warnings were listed as follows by the officer.

1. Unnecessary use of horns during hours of darkness (can be filed on for disturbance of peace.)
2. "Cutting doughnuts" on city streets (can be filed on for exhibition of acceleration and/or disturbing the peace.)
3. Failure to stop for posted stop signs and/or red traffic signal. The new Texas law permits right turn on red traffic light after a complete stop when clear of traffic — unless otherwise posted.
4. Blocking intersection and/or driving abreast on a city street.
5. Driving on sidewalks with motor vehicles including motorcycles.
6. Driving without driver license and/or without valid safety sticker.
7. Using city streets for racing (Violators can be filed on for exhibition of acceleration, reckless driving and/or disturbing the peace.)

McDonald stated that the warning period has expired. Traffic laws will be enforced as of July 1 and all violators, without exception, will be subject to receiving traffic summonses.

He also urges public cooperation in establishing orderly traffic. Whoever sees a violation is asked to try to get the license number and report it to him.

Week of Clear Weather Puts End To Grain Harvest

A week of warm, clear weather was just right for the grain harvest season. Combines have been running steadily and most of them have finished the job. Indications now are that all the crops will be in by the end of the week.

Reports on yields have been as good as advance estimates. When the final calculations were made a number of wheat fields figured to more than 50 bushels per acre. And the poorer crops were not bad. Low yields generally were 25 to 35 bushels per acre.

Oats likewise did well, better reports going to about 90 bushels per acre. A bad feature, however is that some oats fields had heavy losses by shattering and pest attack. Vandalistic worms crawled up the straws and nipped the very thin fibers holding the separate kernels of grain. It was exasperating to find many stems without a kernel and all the grain on the ground surrounding the stalk. Losses by shattering occurred when the grain matured too far before harvesting machinery could be brought into the fields.

Meanwhile the grain market has slipped slightly. Wheat dropped from \$2.50 to \$2.35 a bushel and the test has deteriorated slightly.

Next to its own birthday on December 8, 1889, there is no occasion so meaningful to the history of this community as that which will be commemorated next Tuesday. While the one event marks the actual physical beginning of Muenster, the other marks the origin of the spirit which is due much of the credit for the community's growth and progress. If it can be said that there was a dominant influence in the development of our town and the rural area around it, that influence has to be the Muenster State Bank.

The situation here reminds us of a slogan in use nowadays by so many banks. Ours is a full service bank. A difference however is that the slogan was being applied long before it was created by public relations men, and it served with the old fashioned values of leadership and a helping hand rather than a variety of accommodations tailored to a customer's convenience and pleasure. The services of our bank were the origin and pursuit of many ideas on which our present success is founded.

Of course it has to be admitted that self interest was a contributing motive behind this most valuable service. However it was the most commendable kind of self interest. Because it involved a round-about method of helping others to success as a way of increasing their own business.

The story is repeated hundreds of times in routine banking service. Like any other good bank, ours supplied the advice and the funds whereby its clients were able to make personal progress. To begin, it counseled with regard to the size of obligation a person was able to take on. And often it furnished the patience and encouragement that enabled a borrower to pull through trying times. In buying a farm or business, in stocking additional cattle or merchandise, in erecting a new home or barn or store building, in replacing old equipment, the person got the backing he needed at the bank.

But there was also another service which was above and beyond call of regular business. This was creative service, recommending and helping attain community projects that would be of value to everybody. Looking back at some of our most important businesses and organizations we find them originating at the bank, and usually Mr. Weinzapfel was also the original correspondent who got the project in motion.

That applies to the Farmers Marketing Association's success with butter and cheese factories, to the long details leading to Muenster's status as an incorporated city, to the early bird activity which organized the rural electric coop as the nucleus of the present expanded business, to originating and supporting road development and improvement projects. In this respect the long time membership of J. M. Weinzapfel on the Texas Good Roads Association has been a community asset.

Formation of the Upper Elm Red Soil Conservation District is another endeavor which got the bank's help, and which has been a big factor in the area's phenomenal agricultural progress in the past two decades. Thanks to the far sightedness of that organization, today's good soil stewards are keeping more soil at home and improving on its productivity. Built up farms now are yielding more than virgin soil did 70 or 80 years ago. Soil conservation promotion is truly a case in which the bank's bread cast on the water came back a hundred fold. Prospering farmers have been good for the bank.

Also associated with the bank, and particularly with Mr. Weinzapfel, is Muenster Memorial Hospital, an outstanding, highly qualified institution which would do credit to a city several times as large as ours. While being proud of the excellent service it renders, the convenience and value of its nearness, and its economic value as a provider of jobs, we can bear in mind where it got its start and its biggest push.

Remembering those things, it's most appropriate to remember the bank next Tuesday with mixed sentiments of praise and appreciation — congratulations for having come a long way, and thanks for having done so much for us.

Furthermore, we wish the folks at the bank lots of continued success, especially the kind that leaves its mark on us while on the way to them.

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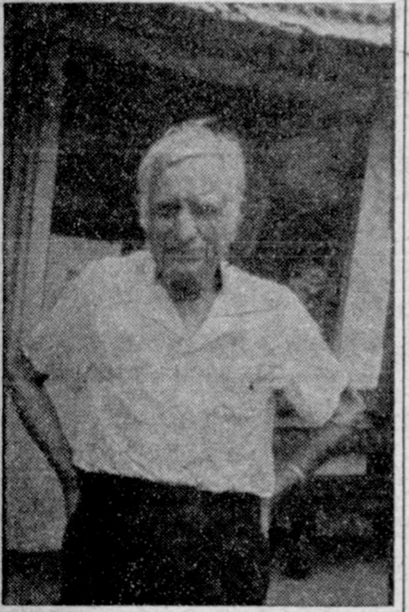
Joe C. Trachta Muenster's Oldest

Having been in business in Muenster longer than anyone else 67 years, gives Joe Trachta the distinction of being Muenster's senior business man. Joe was one year old when he arrived here with his family from Minnesota in 1889. He lived on the Trachta farm southwest of town until the death of his father, then came to town to make his fortune.

He was dishwasher and cleanup boy in several cafes and saloons but in 1906 he bought the building now occupied by Floyd's Bar. At first he bought cream, eggs and poultry but later opened a creamery and was in the butter making business. Production reached its peak during World War I at which time he sold butter to the Army. Along with the creamery he operated an ice house. The nearest ice manufacturing plant was in Gainesville where Joe bought the ice and trucked it to Muenster. During summer months he often had to make two trips a day to satisfy local demands.

When the Farmers Union became active they cut into Joe's activities so he again went back to cream, eggs and poultry in the Charles Pagel building. He later bought out Henry Walterscheid's drug store and has been in that business ever since.

Joe also had Muenster's first movie house. He had shows



five nights a week, dancing one night, and one night of roller skating. The movie equipment later was given to the church and movies were shown in the parish hall on Sunday nights thereafter.

Joe moved into his present location in 1948. Muenster went dry in 1910 but thanks to his ingenuity the town did not suffer for lack of spirits. Paying fines was a regular occurrence, he paid hundreds, but never spent a night in jail.

Joe Trachta served on the city council six years. He is a charter member of the third and fourth degree Knights of Columbus and the Muenster Fire Department.

He does not like to travel stating he sleeps better in Muenster. He has seen many people come and go and still vividly recalls incidents that happened before most of us were born. Joe still works seven days a week, he says to have something to do, but all know it's to keep in touch with his properties and to add to his fortune.

Joe will long be remembered because of the character he is but one of his nicest deeds was to give the Sacred Heart Church its chimes.

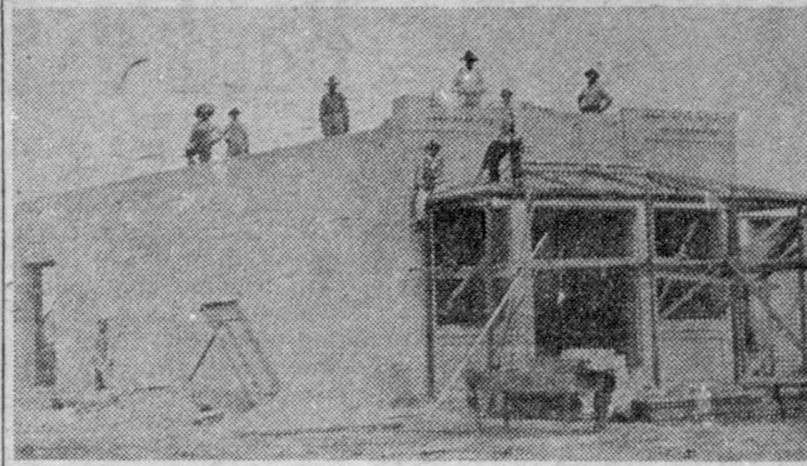
Farm Bureau Will Choose '73 Queen, Princess June 29

Under construction here in 1909 is the brick building for the hardware, harness and saddle store combined with leather repair shop operated by Bill and John Gehrig. The business originated across the street about 1905 and moved into the wood building which was replaced by this brick building — the wood building being moved to the east end of the block to become Bill Gehrig's home. After John's death in 1913 Bill continued the business until his death in 1933. Since then Bill's son, George, has carried on in the same building but with variations. Harness business has gone with the times and shoe repair is almost gone, but the hardware line is still there — with emphasis on sporting goods and appliances.

Culminating the day's activities was a barbecue dinner held at the Waco Convention Center. The group of over 4,000 guests was addressed by Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz.

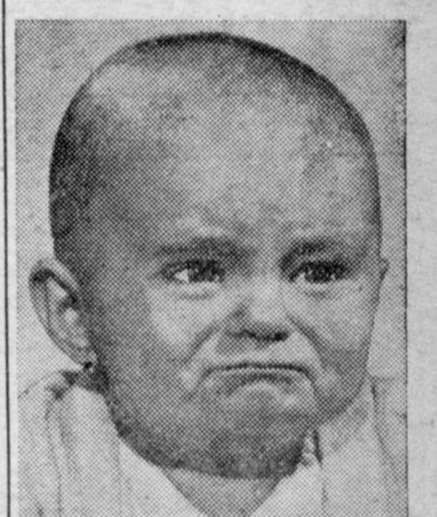

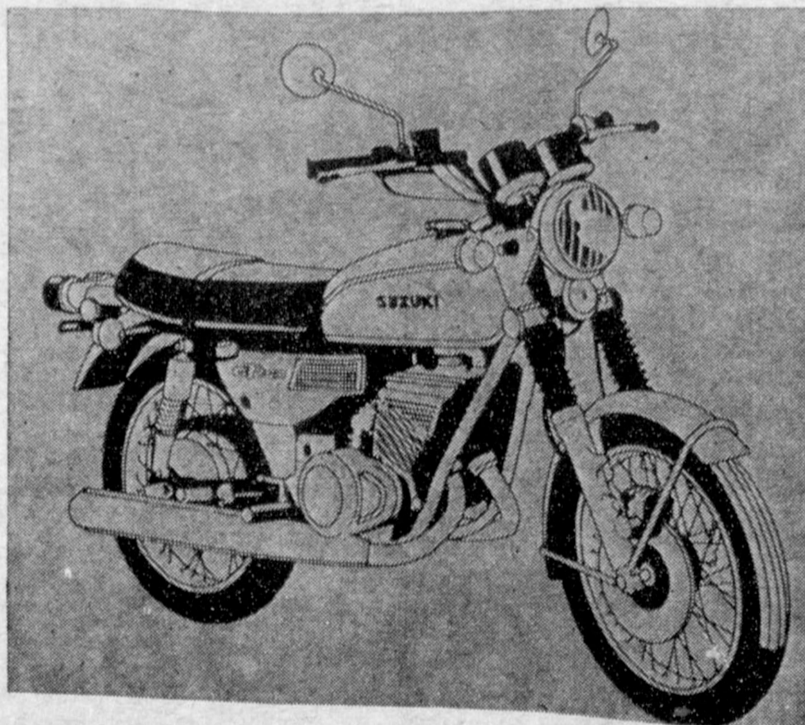

Beautification Is Garden Club's Goal

Muenster Garden Club, the primary purpose of which is to make this a good looking community, was organized in 1937 as the Ladies Civic League of Muenster. Since flowers were very much involved in their interests, members decided two years later to affiliate with the Texas Federation of Garden Clubs and changed their name to Muenster Civic League and Garden Club. Only recently they changed to the present name, Muenster Garden Club. One of the club's very first

projects was to promote a sewer system for the city, installation of which began in 1940. Another early project was general beautification, particularly in killing weeds and planting more lawns, flowers and shrubs. In that project special attention was given to the cemetery, which was one of the more neglected places in town.

The ladies took on that job with enthusiasm. They removed the deteriorating, unsightly concrete curbs around many graves and converted the weed patch to a Bermuda lawn. Likewise they planted more than 750 trees and shrubs

around the cemetery and at both sides of the sidewalk from the front gate to the central monument. They also took on the maintenance job, and still carry on that work, financing it by two special collections a year.

Other notable beautification projects are landscaping at the public school and the hospital and planting thirteen liveoak trees at the baseball park as memorials to Gold Star service men of World War 2. During the war they helped the national effort through USO, Red Cross and Camp Howze activities, home gardens, food canning, etc.

Flower shows have been held annually to bring the community's more attractive specimens to public attention and hopefully stimulate more interest in flowers.

Typical projects for a year are these listed in the club's current yearbook. 1. Book donations to library. 2. Landscaping of hospital grounds. 3. Replace memorial trees in ball park. 4. Landscape and maintain cemetery. 5. Sponsor environmental improvement programs. 6. Participate in improvement program. 7. Have flower show. 8. Have Arbor Day program.

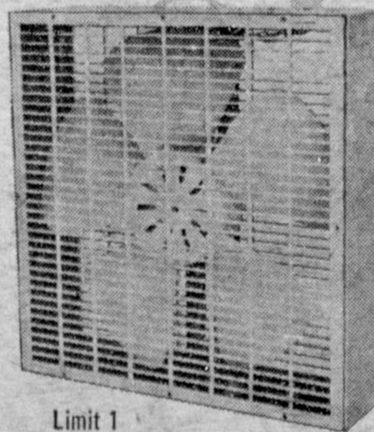

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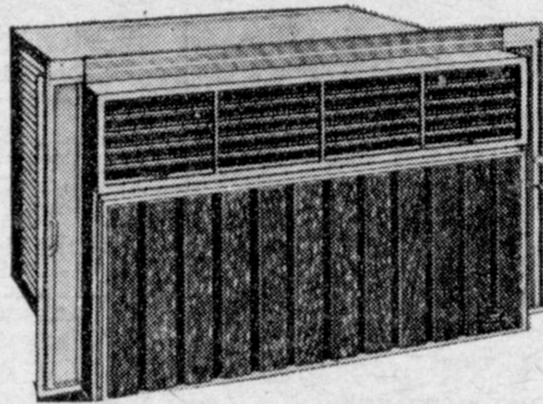

Tips Offered on Saving Gasoline In Energy Crisis

AUSTIN — With summer trips soon to begin motorists can conserve fuel and save money by heeding a few good driving tips, reports the Consumer Services Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"Fuel shortages in certain areas of Texas have already been reported by agricultural users. With thousands of vacationers soon to be on the highways the situation could become critical," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White stated.

Commissioner White has already informed the federal Office of Oil and Gas that fuel shortages are affecting the farming industry in Texas and urged immediate compliance to federal guidelines that would assure adequate fuel supplies for Texas agriculture this year.

"All of us need to do everything we can to make certain that the vital food industry has the energy it needs," Commissioner White stated.

The Consumer Services Division gave the following advice to drivers:

Unnecessary idling, excessive low or high speeds, and quick starts and stops wastes gasoline. Coasting to a stop when possible and starting at normal or below normal speeds are other fuel savers. Braking a car to a stop from 30 miles an hour wastes two and a half times as much energy as when braking to a stop from 20 mph. From 60 mph the loss is nine times greater.

A steady speed of 50 mph is 25 per cent more economical than varying speeds from 30 to 70 mph. The most economical cruising speed is 55 mph. Dragging brakes, underinflated tires, an out-of-tune engine, and a too heavy motor oil also contribute to wasted fuel.

According to the Division, savings will depend on the type of car, but a properly driven automobile can increase its gas mileage up to five miles a gallon. Maintaining an average speed on the highway will save between 1½-2 miles a gallon.

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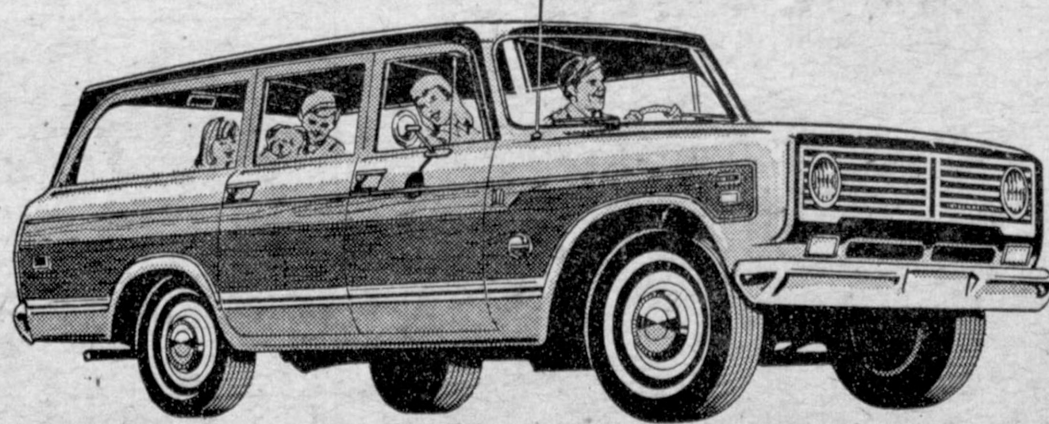

Anthony Luke of Muenster, uncle of the bride, provided organ music.

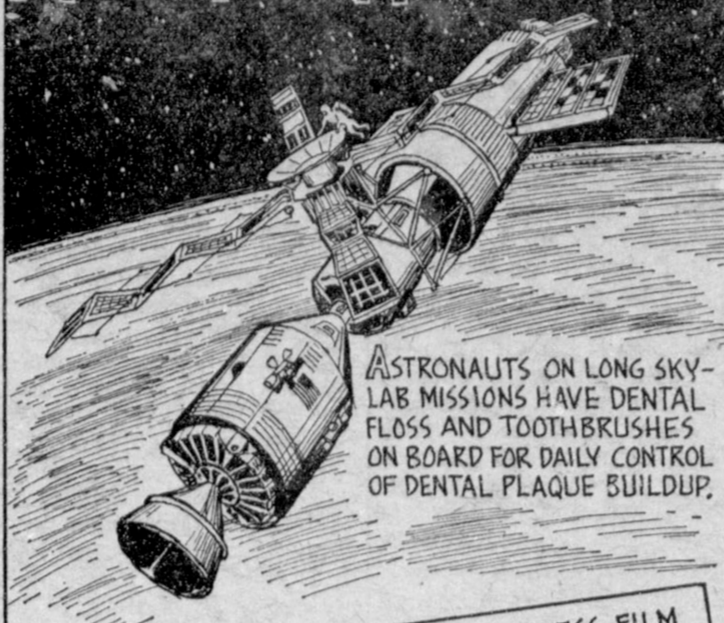
Wedding reception with dinner was held in the Lindsay School Cafetorium, and the band Lucifer played for dancing.

Medicare Premium Upped 50c a Month

Everyone knows that the cost of living is going up, and this includes the cost of medical care. Because of this, the monthly premium for Medical Insurance under Medicare will be increased 50 cents a month beginning with the month of July 1973, according to Gus Jones, District Manager of the Sherman Social Security Office.

The new rate will be \$6.30 per month, up from the current \$5.80. This increase is necessary to keep this part of Medicare on a pay-as-you-go basis, as required by law. A few individuals will have to pay more than the \$6.30 premium . . . those who delayed signing up for a long period of time after their first chance on who signed up after cancelling this insurance in the past, must pay an additional 10 percent for each full year they were eligible but not enrolled.

Mr. Jones stated that the covered individual pays only half of the total cost of this Medical Insurance protection, with the Federal Government paying half the cost.

The premiums are automatically deducted from monthly checks for people who receive social security benefits, railroad retirement benefits, or civil service annuities. People who do not receive any of these monthly benefits pay their premiums directly to the Social Security Administration either on a monthly or quarterly basis.

The Social Security Office has available, free of charge, a revised edition of Your Medicare Handbook. This handbook explains the protection you have under Medicare and will answer most of your questions about Medicare. If you would like a copy of this handbook, or if you have any questions about the Medicare program, contact the local Social Security Office. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. and the telephone number is 893-4301. A representative may be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the Federal Building.

Price Freeze Has Danger Elements FB Head Claims

The President's 60-day freeze on retail food prices is a "stop-gap measure that carries with it some real dangers for consumers as well as farmers," J. T. Woodson, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, said today.

"There is a real possibility that we may soon see shortages of milk, eggs, and meat if prices are too low for farmers to make a profit," the head of the state's largest farm organization said.

"Although farmers appreciate the President's exemption of prices of raw agricultural products, the freezing of prices at the retail level does affect prices all the way back to the farm," Woodson said.

Commenting on the cost-price squeeze, Woodson said that some producers have absorbed all the increased production costs they can handle.

"Farmers will not produce for very long when their prices are at or below the cost of production," he said. "When producers feel the pinch badly enough, it won't be long before the consumers will, too, in the form of empty grocery shelves and meat counters."

The farm leader said the

only way that consumers can be assured of a bountiful supply of food at reasonable prices is to have adequate production and that this can only come from price incentives in the marketplace.

Woodson said that food prices are not out of line.

"The American consumer spends only about 16 percent of his take home pay on food," he said. "This is lower than any other nation on earth and lowest of any time in our history."

The Farm Bureau leader said that the "real culprit behind inflation is still wasteful and deficit spending by government."

"Until we cut out spending beyond our means, we will continue to have our pocketbook robbed by inflation," he said.

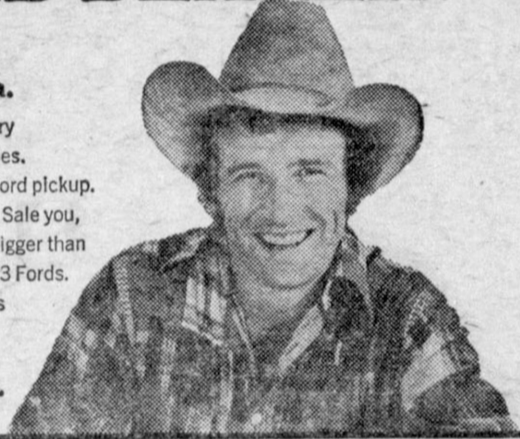

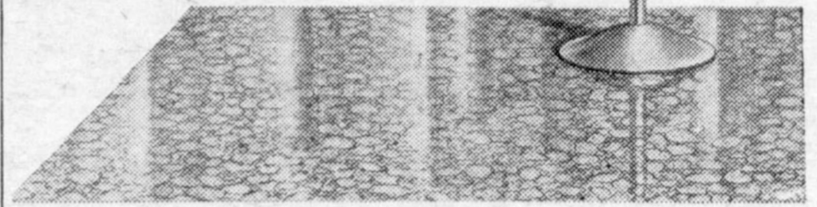
Delegates, who were required to be 15 years of age or older, have been active in county 4-H programs, Jordan said.

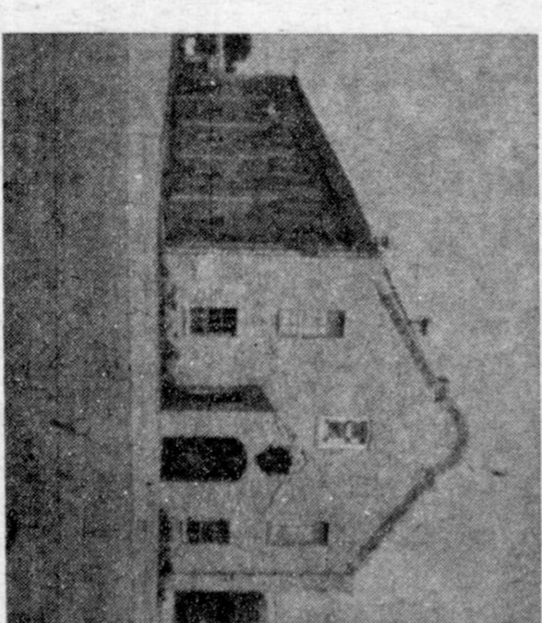
Since August 1966 Pagel's Store is in a new home, same site, located just south of the old building which was torn down and replaced by a parking area.

50 Good Years of Serving Münster

A most gratifying day in the community's fine record of history of Münster State Bank will arrive on Tuesday, July 3, when it observes the golden anniversary of its founding. The occasion signifies much more than just 50 years of aging, but rather a busy era during which the bank made steady progress on its own while supplying much of the initiative behind the

community's fine record of progress. However, progress soon got under way and has continued, often with the bank's advice and help, up to the present time. The bank and the community each is indebted to the other for a record of noteworthy achievement.

A bit of background is in order as an introduction to the bank's founding. Prior to then Münster had little banking experience, and some of it very unpleasant. The first of four dates back to 1892 when J. W. Towers and E. A. Peifer conducted limited banking service in connection with a general merchandise store. It was abruptly put out of business by a robbery in 1894.

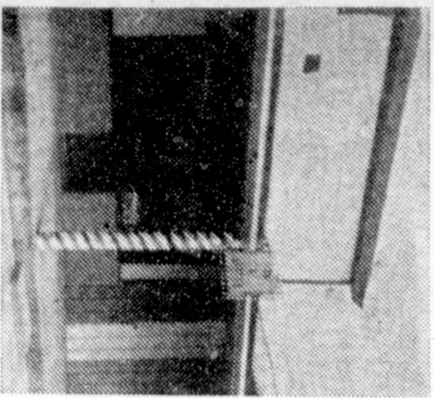
Two Prior Banks

The next banking venture started in 1904 when a Harry Blaum organized a private bank named the Farmers and Merchants State Bank. A number of years later Blaum sold the bank to J. H. Theisen, former agent of the local MK&T depot. Then came a private bank organized by Dr. R. W. Crawford (Continued on Page 5)

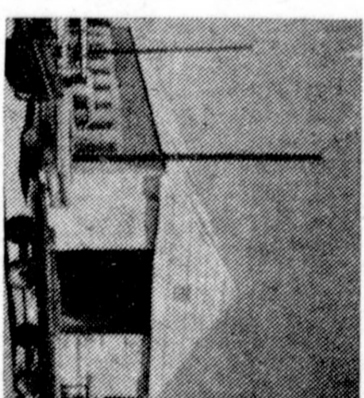
Following the latter's death in 1935 it was operated by Mr. Stock until his death in 1944. That brought an end to cotton ginning in Münster.

The machinery remained idle because an insufficient amount of cotton raised in the area did not justify continuation of the business. In June 1946 it was sold to McCool Brothers et al who rebuilt the cotton gin at Era to replace the one there destroyed by fire in May.

In August 1946 Theo Schmitz of Lindsay bought the remaining buildings from owners Mrs. William Walterscheid, Olivia Stock and Rosa Drever.

Early day employees included C. M. and Martin Walterscheid, Joe Kathman, Joe Luke and Albert Schilling.

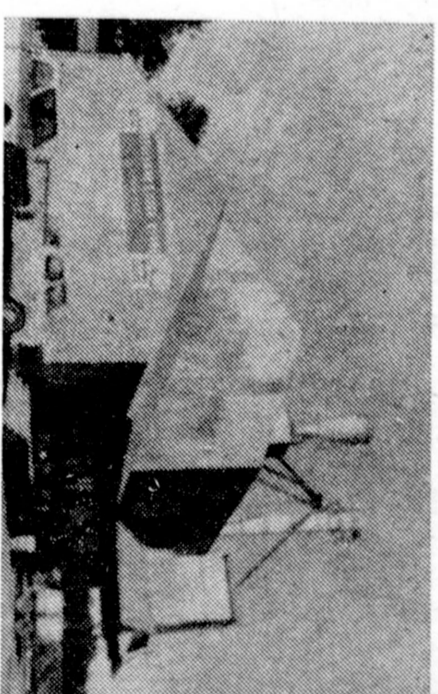

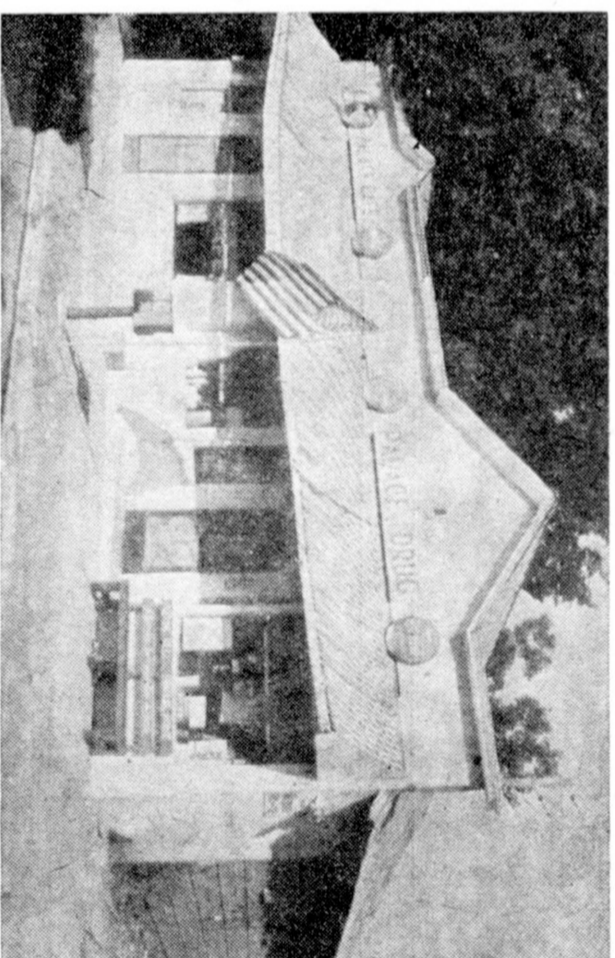

ford, and for a short time Muenster actually had two banks. In 1909 that brief era came to an end when the two banks merged with Dr. Crawford as the president under the name of German American Bank.

It was Muenster's bank during World War I and a short boom period during which prices soared upward and prosperity seemed to be assured. A result was that local people bet on the future by buying high priced land. But conditions changed abruptly and Crawford's bank overreached itself in an effort to finance some of the farmers through their troubles. It had to close in 1921 a victim of the post-war depression which spread its ill effects over the entire nation.

First Interest in Parish
 Also highly pertinent in Muenster's early history, were a number of factors in the community's slow but substantial growth. The principal interest of its early settlers was the development of an impressive parish plant. By 1923 that had developed into a handsome church, school, rectory, parish hall and sisters' home.

Members of the parish were the principal people involved in other important developments such as the Muenster Mutual Fire Insurance Association founded in 1893 for mutual protection against

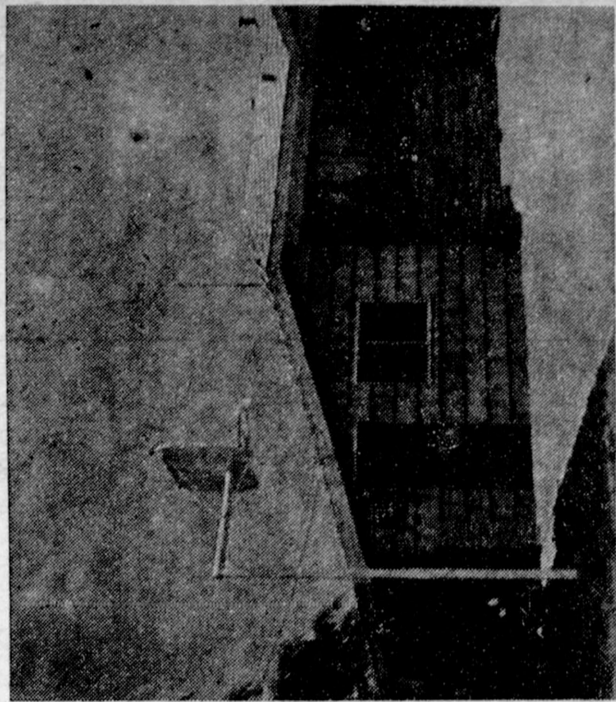

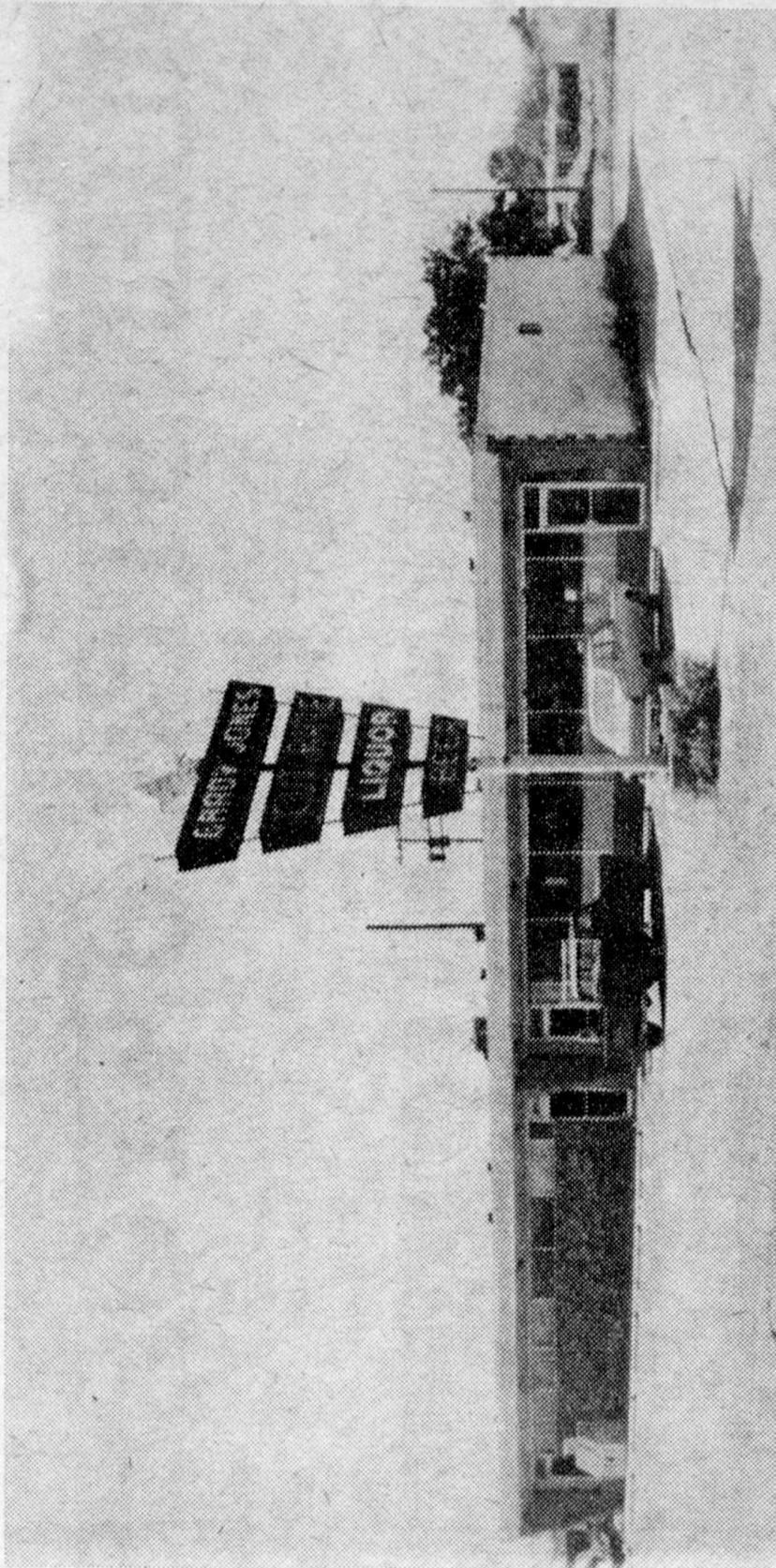

losses by fire and storm. They also organized a mutual telephone system in 1907. And in 1915 they formed a local unit of the Farm Labor Union.

FMA Organized

After a few years that organization fell apart on a national scale, but Muenster members stuck together forming their independent local unit and changing the name to Farmers' Marketing Association. Its purpose was to promote organized selling of grain, livestock, produce, etc., as well as volume purchases of such items as binder twine, baler wire, potatoes and apples. Later the FMA was to establish its cheese factory and grocery store.

The population of Muenster in 1923 is not known because the town, not incorporated, was not actually counted in a census. However it is estimated at near 300, because the actual census count in 1930 was 439.

In the two years following the German American Bank's failure neither the local attitude nor the economy was favorable for anyone interested in organizing another bank. Muenster depositors were still painfully aware of the losses they had taken, and the depression which had caused the failure was still hanging on.

At the same time, however, people remembered the former benefits and convenience of having their local bank and

becoming increasingly aware that their community was handicapped without this vital service. Hence public response was both good and bad when a local hardware merchant, J. W. Meurer, and a Winthrop merchant, J. M. Weinzapfel, undertook the project of establishing another bank here.

Bank Gets Charter

Nevertheless a firm determination to build a sound financial structure, coupled with the local desire for one and confidence in the community's future, led to eventual success in the venture. After patient local promotion and preliminary work to satisfy the investors as well as the state banking department, the organizers raised the minimum requirement for their charter, a capital of \$17,500 plus a surplus of \$1,750.

By present standards those figures are small. But in that time of scarce, uninfated money, it was a higher goal than \$100,000 would be today. The application for charter was submitted on June 25, 1923, the state's charter was issued on July 2, and Muenster State Bank was opened for business on July 3, 1923.

Directors, Stockholders

Original officers of the bank were J. W. Meurer, president; J. M. Weinzapfel, cashier; and Frank Trachta, vice-president (inactive). Other directors were G. H. Hellman, Wm. Walterscheid, Sr., Joseph Kreitz, Joseph Fisher and Joseph Dangelmayr, Sr.

Along with the directors the following are also listed as charter stockholders of Muenster State Bank: James Leeper, Henry Steizer, Charles Chen, Hubert Felderhoff, Mrs. Christina Felderhoff, Joseph Felderhoff, John Bayer, W. H. Endres, Henry Meurer, William Hellman, Henry Fette, I. A. Schoeb, and Henry Weinzapfel. J. M. Weinzapfel and Hubert Felderhoff are the only survivors of the charter stockholders.

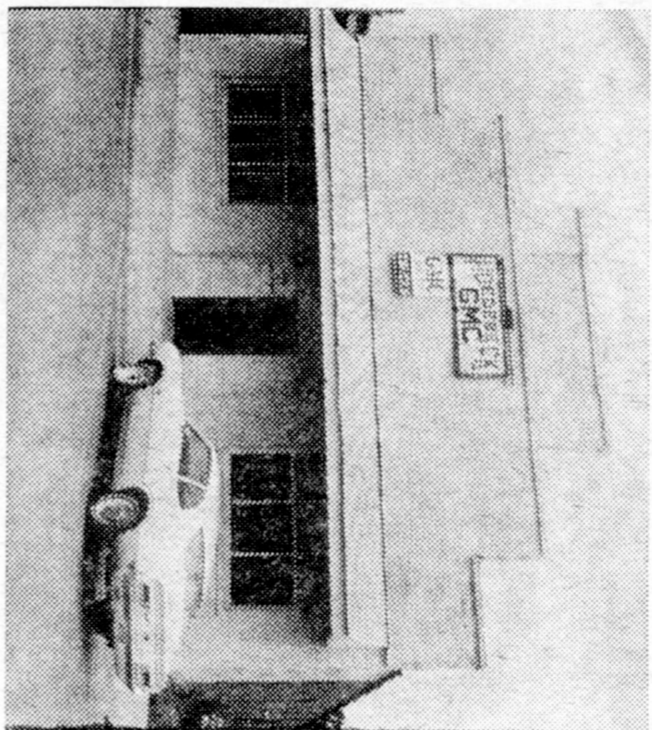
During the first few years of operation the bank was a member of the Guaranty Fund System — until it was discontinued. The system was a volunteer association of Texas banks creating a fund to protect depositors in case of bank failure. In later years during the great depression, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was established by an act of Congress and Muenster State Bank became a member of that system.

Mr. Meurer continued as president of the bank until his death in 1941, and Mr. Weinzapfel continued as cashier until that same time, when he succeeded Mr. Meurer as president. For the following 28 years, until 1969, Mr. Weinzapfel was president and since then he has been chairman of the board. Herbert Meurer, son of the first president, has been president since 1969.

Herbert Meurer had been a bank employee from its opening until 1932, when he became the Muenster postmaster. He returned to the bank as cashier.

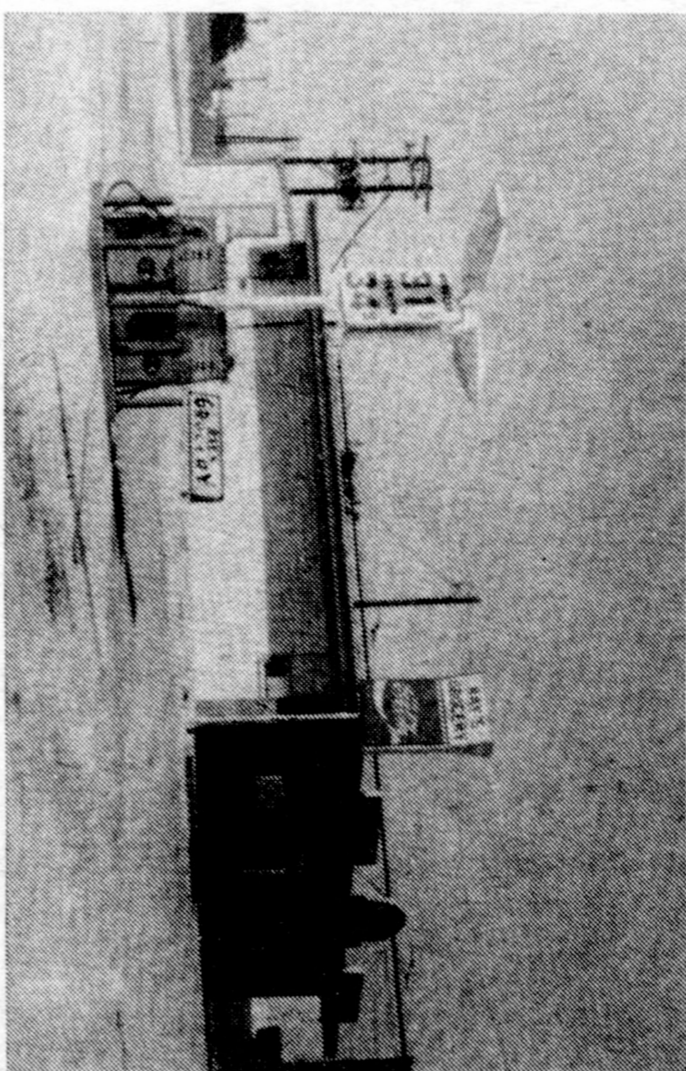

phia, the telephone building, the dress factory, the field house and elementary buildings at the public school plus 12 houses.

The next high year was 1932, the permits being for 9 homes and 3 other buildings including Sacred Heart Church. Then came \$418,450 in 1961 for Sacred Heart convent, the post office, Wilde Chevrolet and Fisher's store remodeling plus 11 houses.

Other comparatively high building permit years were 1967 when the figure was \$372,500 mostly for Valentine and 7 homes; 1971 when permits included H&W and Fisher slaughter houses; The Dairy Inn and 13 homes; and 1950 when the public school and 8 houses added to \$332,200.

An item not to be overlooked in the town's construction history is 1939, the year Muenster voted itself wet by a landslide. A result of it was construction of The Center, three liquor stores and three beer warehouses.

Also, there are older buildings which date back before 1946 and have been remodeled and enlarged a number of times. This applies especially to the AMPI plant, which was originally FMA and later NPPA. Likewise Tony's Seed and Feed enlarged and remodeled after taking over the Waples Painter location. Muenster Mill has made extensive expansions on its original plant, and Hess Furniture has remodeled and renovated the building originally used by John Meurer.

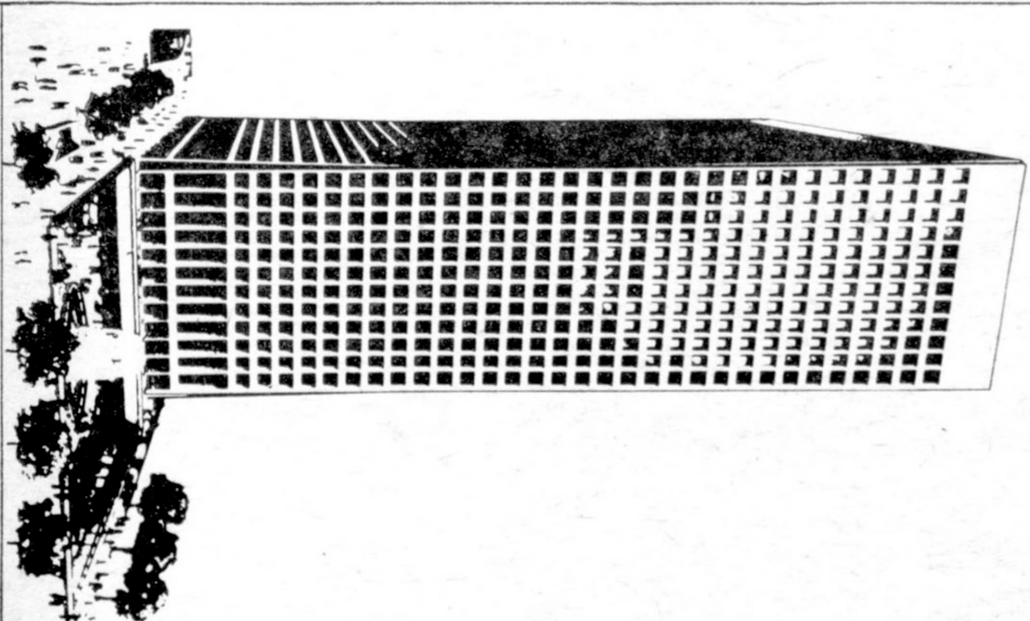

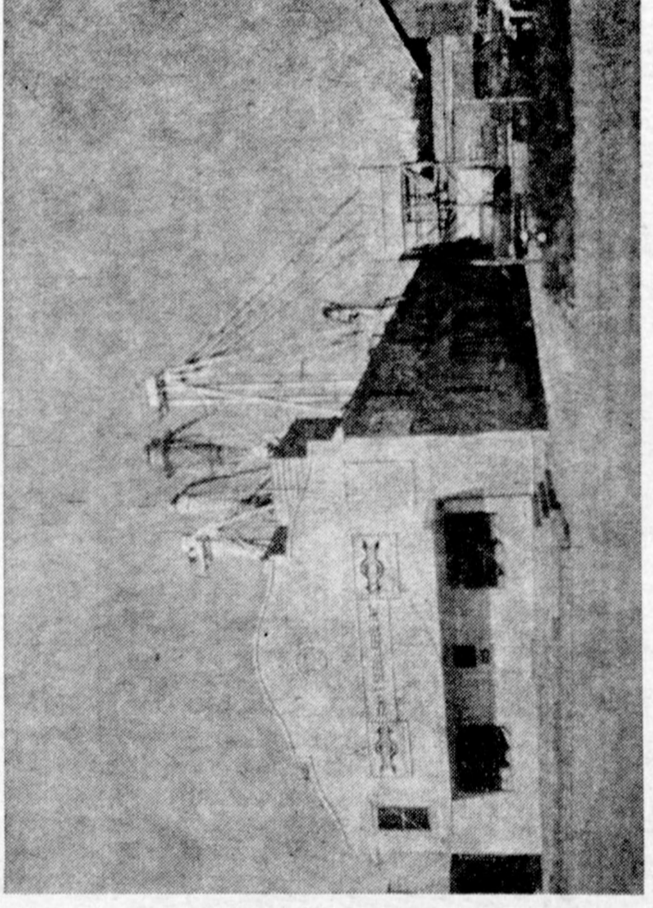

Furthermore, there have been dozens of jobs that did not require permits, such as remodeling without adding space. And when we consider the entire community we can possibly add as much as \$6 million more. There are no permits and estimated values pertaining to rural construction, but there are many. 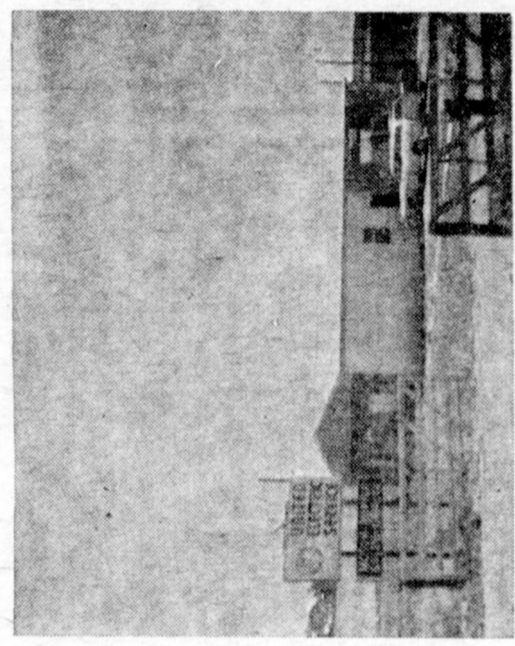

Primitive Methods
Early day banking, like so many other things, changed greatly over the past half century. Muenster State Bank started business with one hand-operated adding machine and one hand-operated customer posting machine. The general accounting system was all handled in a general ledger, known as the Boston Ledger, and all entries therein were made with pen and ink. Journal entries likewise were handwritten in ink.

The sign on the old front door stated "Banking Hours, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.," but it did not apply to bank personnel. Their working day began at 8 or earlier and continued until 8 or 9, and even 10 or later, depending on how much incidental work came in or how much difficulty was encountered in balancing books for the day.

Getting Involved
For instance, in grain or cotton harvesting season it was customary for buyers to depend on the bank for their calculations. They did not bother to figure the amount due a seller, but brought the sales ticket to the bank for completion. Frequently the process was further complicated in the case of tenant farmers. That involved dividing the proceeds according to

rental terms, and even making deductions to pay for threshing and hauling grain.

The bank was similarly involved in many other interests of its customers. The average depositor took it for granted as a helper or advisor in transacting important and non-routine business such as leasing or selling property, preparing contracts, seeking information, etc. The reasons are that bank personnel had experience in such work, plus, of course, the typewriter and ability to use it. Mr. Weinzapfel especially was widely regarded as a sort of community secretary.

A Community Fair

He became involved early in community activity. Hardly a year after the bank's founding he was working with a group of local people known as the Muenster Community Council in promoting a community fair, which was presented on September 10, 1924. It had exhibits of livestock, poultry, grain, vegetables, clothing, cooking, canning, etc., and awarded small cash prizes as well as ribbons in many categories.

It was the only exhibition in the county that year, the Cooke County Fair still being inactive after closing down during World War I. Whether or not influenced by the Muenster event, Cooke County Fair was re-organized in (Continued on Page 9)

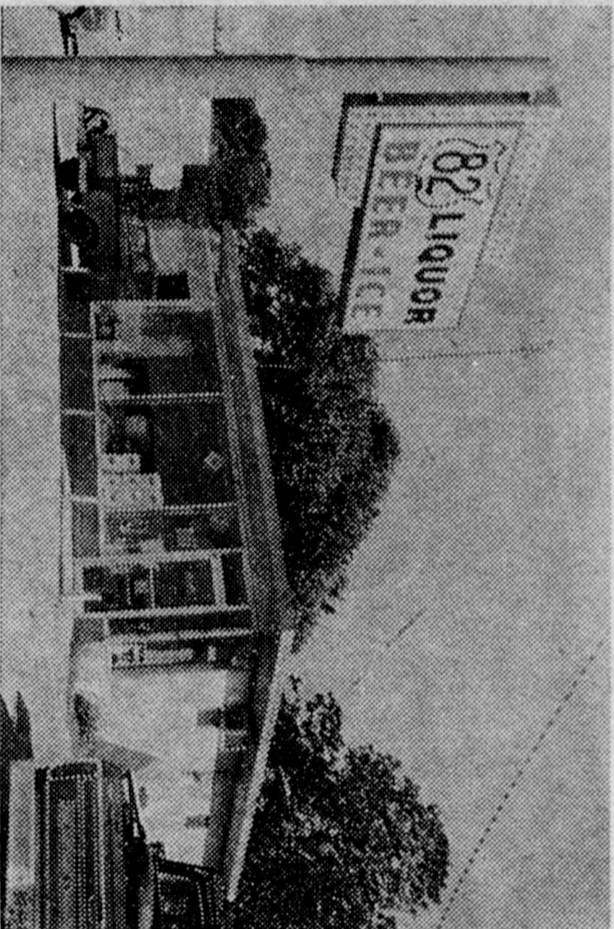

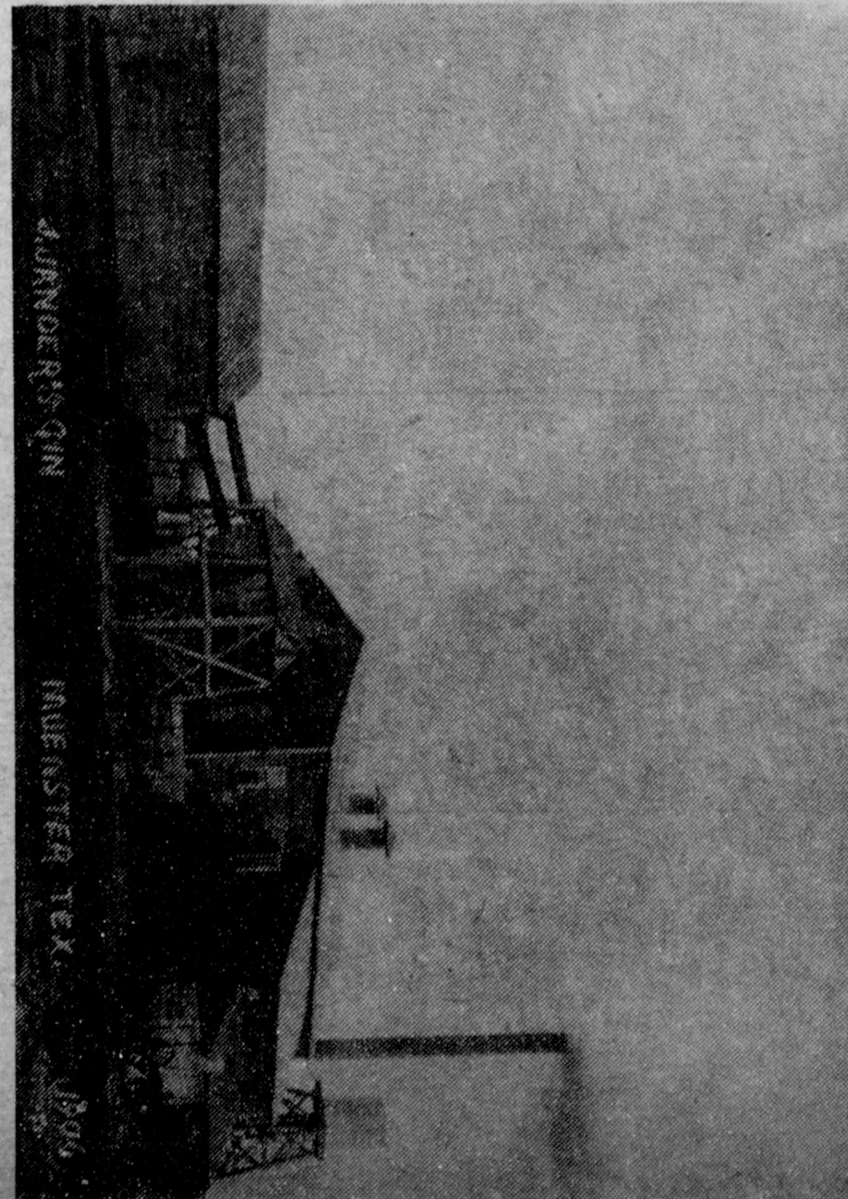

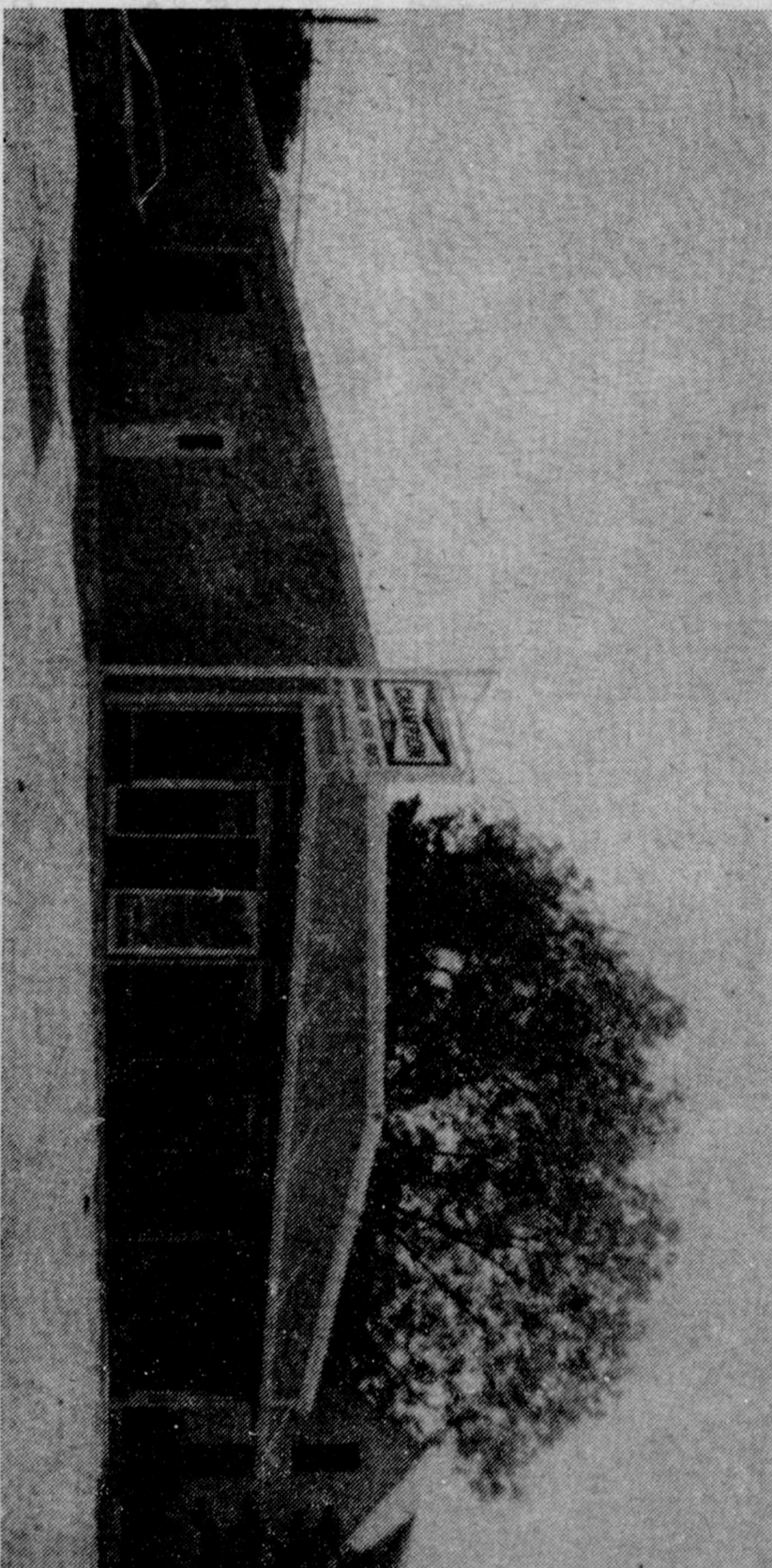

A normal year of rainfall in Muenster, in case you did not know, is 33.61 inches. That figure is the average of all the annual totals since the local moisture record was started in 1950. Nine of those years were above normal and fourteen below normal. Also only one of the years had more than 50 inches, and only one had less than 20.

Another look at the figures shows that the later years have been slightly wetter than the earlier. An average for the ten years beginning with 1963 was 34.71, but the average for the decade starting with 1950 was 32.17 — a difference of 2.54 inches. Here are the figures.

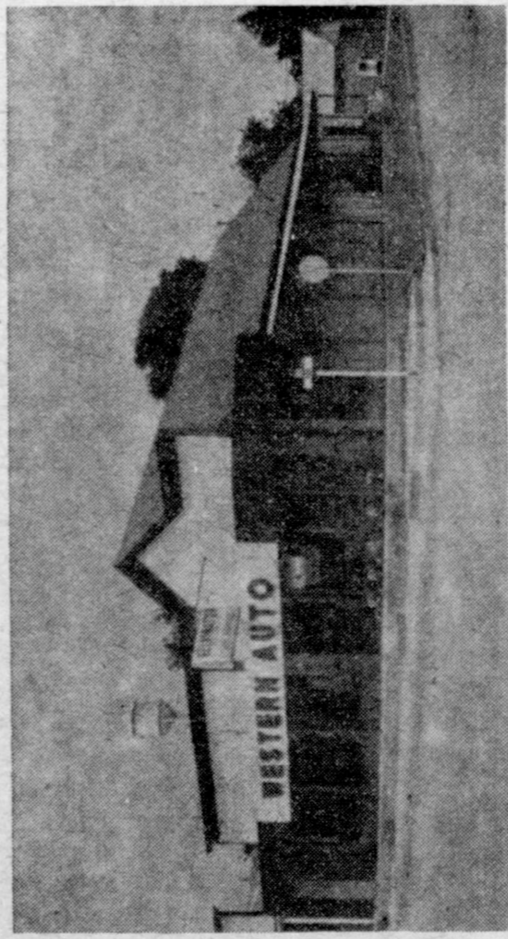

1925 and has continued since then. Muenster has not had another fair, however, with the bank's encouragement it organized pig and calf clubs, also supported 4-H and FFA programs to improve the quality of local livestock.

Local involvement likewise came early for the bank. FMA, which was buying cream in 1923, was assisted by the bank in setting up a butter manufacturing operation in 1925. It had a good product, judged first at the Texas State Fair in 1926, but it lacked an assured market.

To remedy that situation the bank initiated dealings with the Kraft Corporation on a marketing agreement on cheese. It also conducted a survey to determine whether expected milk production could be made into a sufficient volume of cheese to interest a nationwide corporation. The end result is that FMA's very successful cheese factory opened in 1930.

Oil Discovered
Probably the greatest challenge to Muenster and the bank came with the discovery of oil in 1926. It brought on a boom town of mushrooming disorderly growth. Population more than doubled while essential services and the means of providing them were both lacking.

Incorporation, Lights, Gas
Fortunately for the community, bigger discoveries

were soon made elsewhere and many of the oil field adventurers moved to greener pastures. But an important lesson business practice rather than boom and bust. The city was ready for steady, orderly growth.

Pavement on Main Street was completed in 1936, just in time to become the lead story in the first issue of the Muenster Enterprise, which like so many other firms of town, got advice and encouragement from the bank. Another major achievement of 1936 was completion of Highway 82 overpass just west of Main. The structure was a part of the Highway 82 paving project which was completed between Muenster and Gainesville in 1937.

The routing of Highway 82 was another of the projects which had birth at the bank. In building its power line TP&L secured a direct right of way from Gainesville to Muenster. Next, at the bank's inspiration, local leaders were urging the county commissioners to abandon the round-about road through Lindsay and Myra and open a new, shorter road beside the power line. The road was built and later became the route of Highway 82.

Water System, Pavement
First substantial result of the city's incorporation in 1927 was installation of its water system in 1932. For the first time residents had an adequate source of water for domestic use as well as fire protection. A volunteer fire department was organized and equipped the same year. Efforts were made then to install a sewer system as well, but citizens would not approve taking on two projects at once. Sewer construction had to wait until 1940.

Another important city project was street improvement. That consisted of gravel on a number of the streets and especially pavement on Main Street. All of which was very timely. Oil activity, which faded out in '27 following a short boom, was resumed on

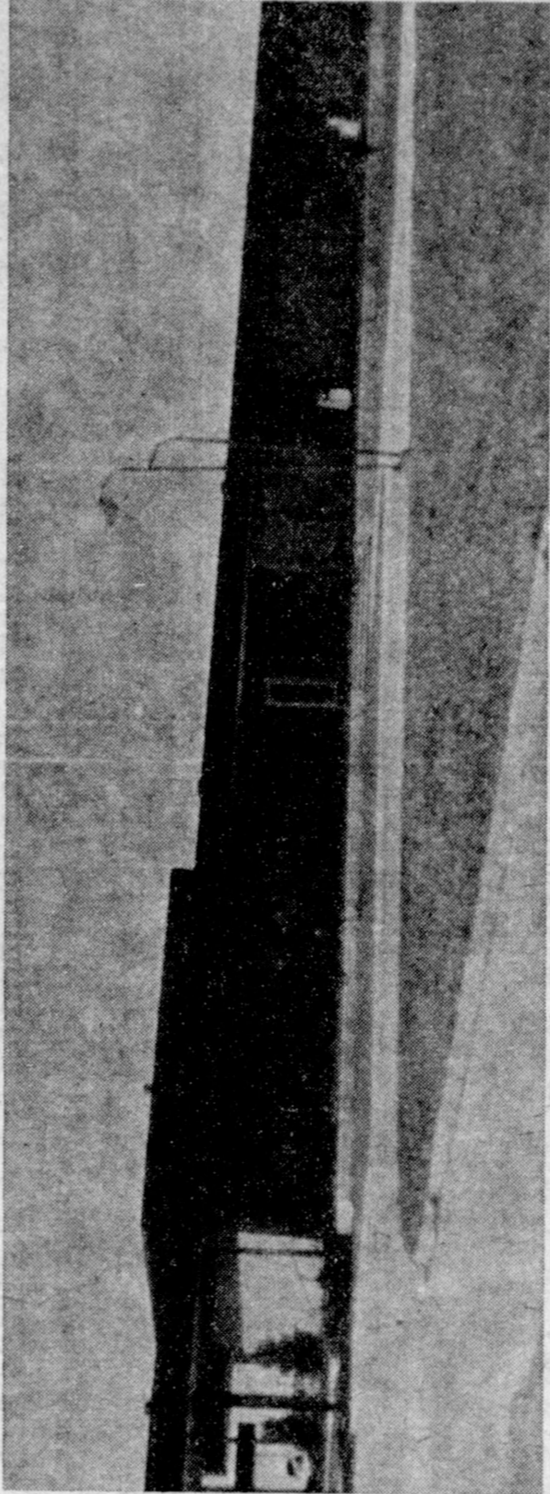
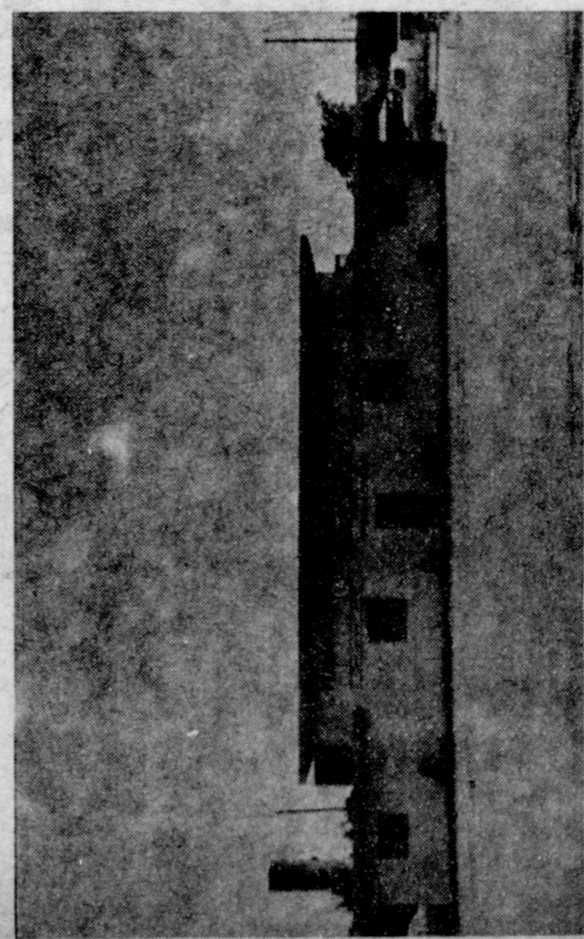
a substantial basis in 1934. Unlike the earlier experience, this activity followed sound business practice rather than boom and bust. The city was ready for steady, orderly growth.

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The Electric Co-op
The presence of Cooke County Electric Cooperative at Muenster can be credited to a great extent to two of the local bank directors, J. M. Weinzapfel and J. W. Hess. They started correspondence with the Rural Electrification Administration in 1937, soon af-

Münster Count Estimated at Over 1500

The population of Münster, according to the official census of 1970 is 1411, but according to city estimates, which are based on births and deaths as well as gains and losses related to water connections, the number ending 1972 was 1617. This figure necessarily has to be a guess, and probably it is high because in the water connection, for instance when older children of a family get jobs elsewhere. That circumstance may reflect the fact that the estimates showed a count of 1498 in 1969 but the official census count was 1411 in 1960.

Regardless of the tendency to overcount, however, it is a known fact that Münster has been gaining at a steady pace. At the city's first census count in 1930 the population was 459. In 1940 it was 590, a ten year gain of just under 30 per cent. In 1950 it was 890 for a 10 year gain of just over 50 per cent. Next decade increased to 1190, a gain of more than 34 per cent. Through the sixties the rate of growth declined and the 1970 count was 1411, which figures to a gain of just under 20 per cent for the decade. If the same percentage still

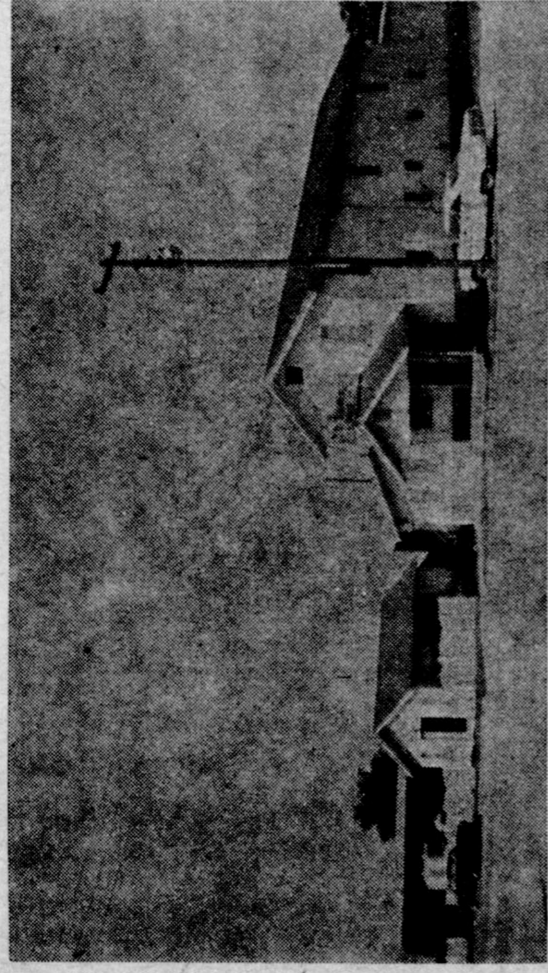
During the 47 years of Muenster's incorporation as a city it has had 47 persons serving on its city council, and a number of them were on the job for ten years or more.

Record setter for the group is John A. Fisher, who served as alderman for 20 years. Next was H. G. Stelzer who was here for 15 years. And Rudy Hellman, with 14 years to his credit, might have topped both of their records if death had not interrupted in 1962. Also a possible contender is Richard Grewing, now in his fourteenth year on the council. Next in line is Herbert Meurer with 8 years as alderman and 4 years as mayor.

M. J. Endres, H. P. Hennigbauer and J. J. Wisler are tied with 10 years each in office. M. J. Endres had 6 years as alderman and 4 as mayor. Urban Endres had 4 as alderman and 6 as mayor. Hofbauer, Hennigan and Wisler had 10 years as alderman.

Another possible contender for longevity was Ben Seyler, who died in his fifth year as alderman after 4 years as mayor.

Ben Hellman, the city's first mayor holds the record for length of service in that office. He was there 8 years. Earl Fisher had 7, J. M. Weinzapfel and Urban Endres each had 6. M. J. Endres, Ben Seyler, J. J. Hoffman and Herbert Meurer had 4 years each. Arthur Federhoff served 2 years and Mike Sloan 1. That accounts for 46 years and David Bright is now serving

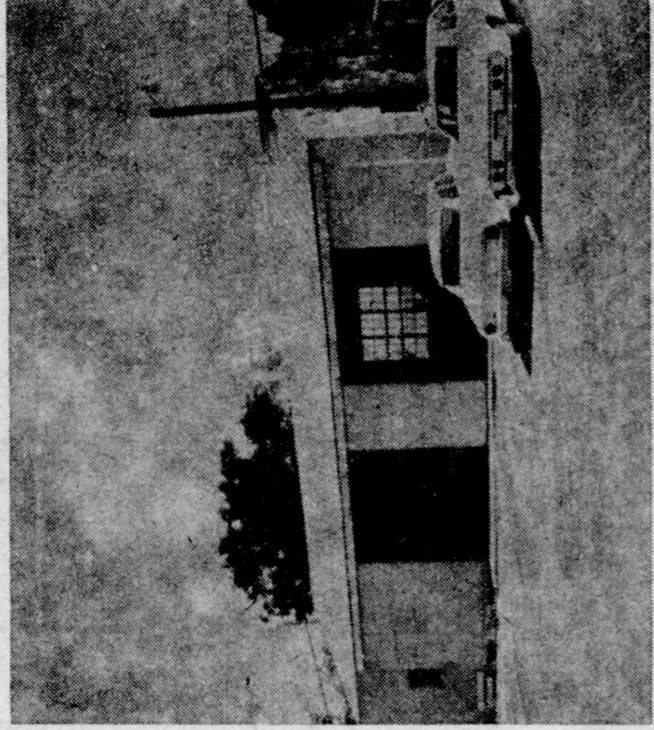

ter the REA act made low interest loans available for rural electric systems. Because of that Cooke County Electric had a head start in this area and was in a position to extend its service to other communities. Otherwise the headquarters for this system would most likely be located elsewhere. It should be noted that the bank, with Hess and Weinzapfel as co-chairmen, was actually the co-op headquarters while the project was being established.

Another worthy community asset that received a big assist from the bank was the soil conservation district. Consistent with its policy of community improvement, it encouraged local cooperation in the federal program of technical and financial assistance in farming.

Muenster Hospital
The biggest project of all to originate in the bank now stands as an eloquent personal tribute to Mr. Weinzapfel rather than to the firm. He was the man behind all the financing efforts — including local drives for funds, securing Hill-Burton federal aid, selling bonds and finally establishing a hospital district. He's also the man who wrote reams of letters concerning all phases of the project and attended to endless details while construction was under way. The hospital, finished since 1964, is one of the finer hospitals of (Continued on Page 16)

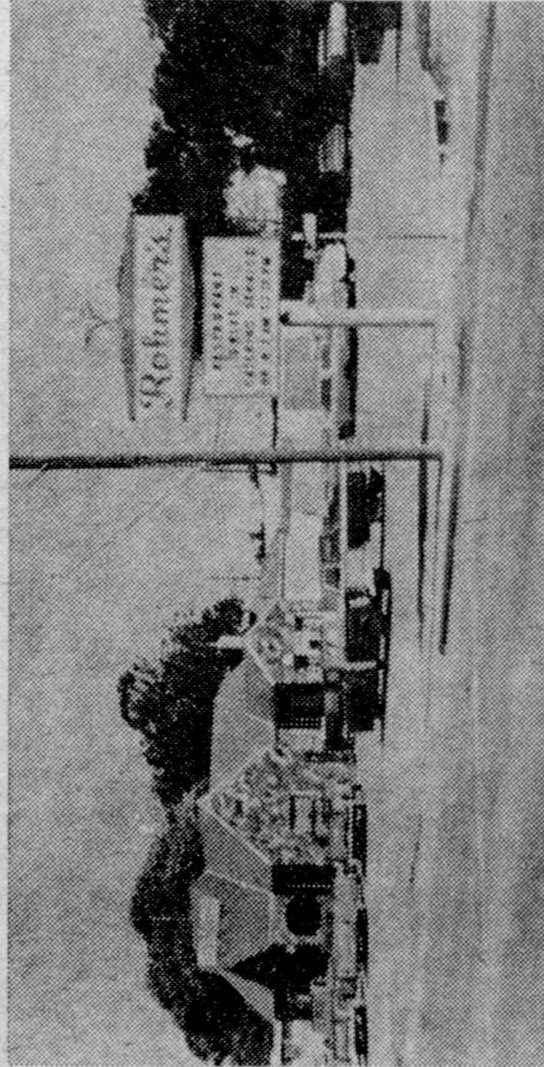

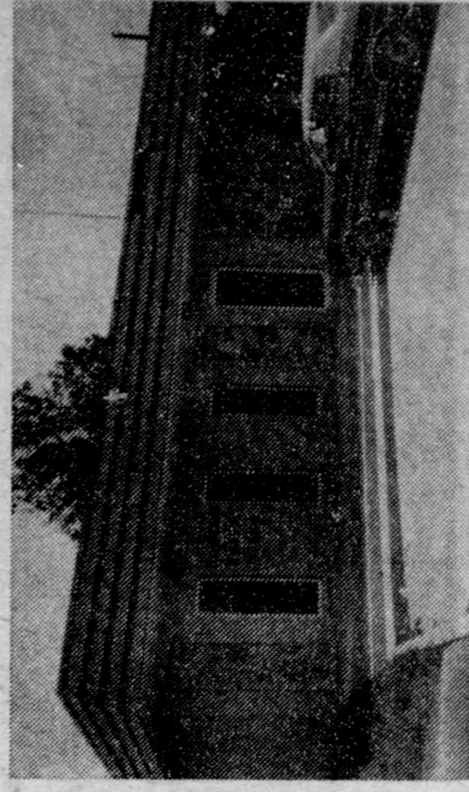

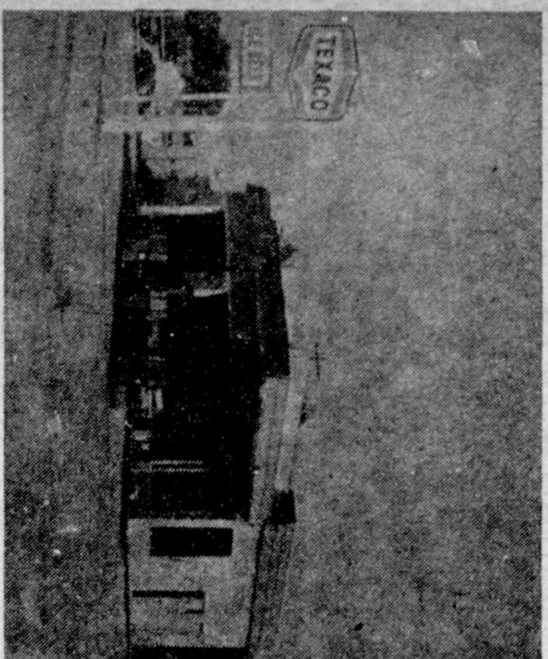

a credit to the bank by all the standards of that time. This building, with minor remodeling and addition of air conditioning, was destined to serve the bank until 1971.

Enlarge and Remodel
Then a two-floor addition at the back cleared the way for major remodeling in which former storage and utility rooms were converted to office rooms and vaults. The addition provided increased storage space along with a combined meeting room and coffee room. Meanwhile the building was extensively modernized and fronted. A night depository and additional safety deposit boxes were put in. A drive-in window was installed and teller stations were moved to adjacent building, so that the same personnel were available to both areas. Also, posting machines, records, etc. were moved to the room next to the service areas. And the lobby got a thorough face lifting. Two office areas were glassed in, the floor was carpeted, windows draped, ceiling done over in acoustical tile. All that was complemented by new fixtures and furnishings. Still another feature of the 1971 improvement job was the change of exterior. It is dominated by a large sign, separate from the building, telling the time and temperature, also changing the top front design as well as the south side drive-in to the client structure fell short of the bank's need in space, comfort and prestige. A New Building

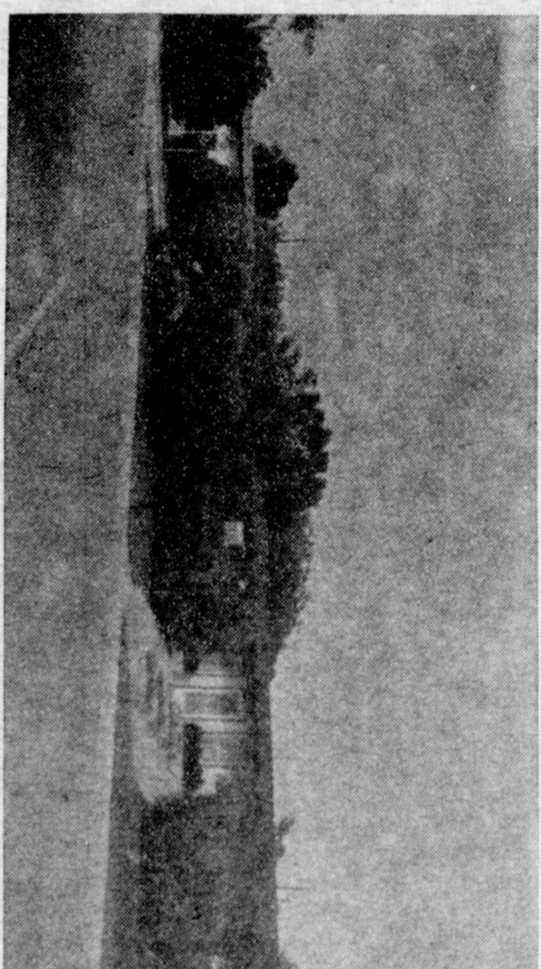

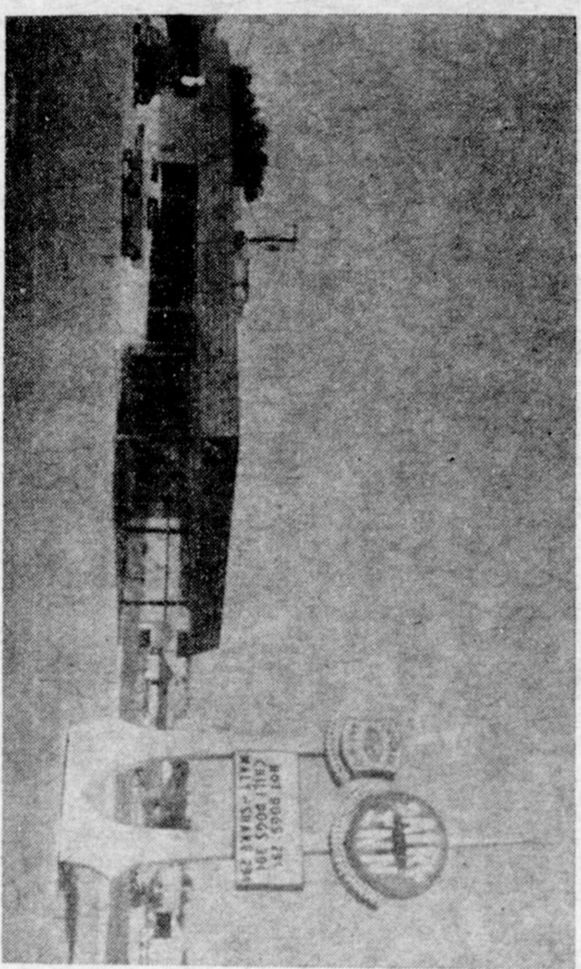

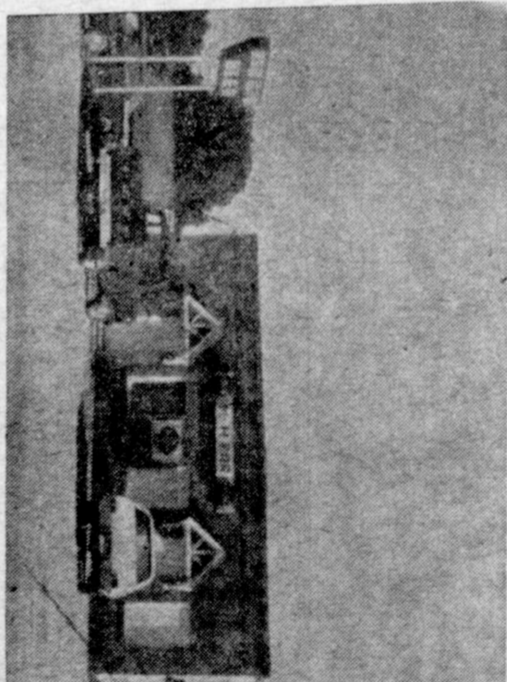

Münster Uses 90 Million Gallons Of Water a Year

The record of water consumption in Münster tells why the city council is concerned about water sources for the future. Pumping records show the annual use increasing from 8 million gallons in 1940 to 90 million in 1972.

One reason, of course, is that population has more than tripled, but it's also true that per capita use is about four times as high — from 38 gallons per person per day in 1940 to 132 in 1972. That's the result of dividing the average daily volume, 246,600 by the population figure.

It may surprise some to learn that average daily use is that high, and it will really shock them to see how much they use on peak consumption days. Last year the peak was 635,000 on June 26, almost three times as much as an average day, or about 400 gallons per person. This covers all uses — household, lawn watering, industrial, etc.

Obviously a big factor is the weather. Lack of rain increases use on lawns and gardens. In fact the rain record and the pumping record are related. The peak months invariably are the hot, dry months of July and August. Likewise peak days are usually in those months, however a few have occurred in June and May. In 1966 the big day was May 31. And four times in the past 21 years the peak came in June.

stockholders' deposits of \$19,250 the bank's deposits have been growing steadily, but with occasional declines reflecting the economy of the time. By 1928 deposits were up to \$137,765, but in 1933, in the big depression, they had slipped back to \$83,292. After that it was mostly up as the figure reached \$175,992 in 1938 and \$449,019 in 1943.

During the next five years the post war combination of inflation and business increase got under way pushing deposits past the million mark. The figure was \$1,321,052 in 1946; \$1,720,711 in 1953; \$2,081,623 in 1958, and \$4,008,201 in 1963; but back to \$3,641,288 in 1967.

CDA Court Nears 60th Anniversary

In December 1974 Muenster Court St. Mary No. 249 Catholic Daughters of America will celebrate its sixtieth anniversary. It was organized Dec. 6, 1914, as the Daughters of Isabella with 23 charter members. Two, Mrs. L. A. Bernauer and Miss Theresa Luke, continue as members. In 1921 the name was changed to Catholic Daughters of America.

Through the years the court's projects have been numerous and varied — religious, patriotic, civic, educational, and charitable — in keeping with its motto "Unity and Charity."

Members sewed and knitted for the Red Cross, engaged in seemingly endless mission work and World War II projects, furnished a room at Muenster Memorial Hospital, contribute for communion bread, cheer shut-ins with baskets at Christmas, help supply religious needs for the girls at the State School, provide for an adopted untaunted leper child in Korea, started Muenster Public Library and continue as its sponsor.

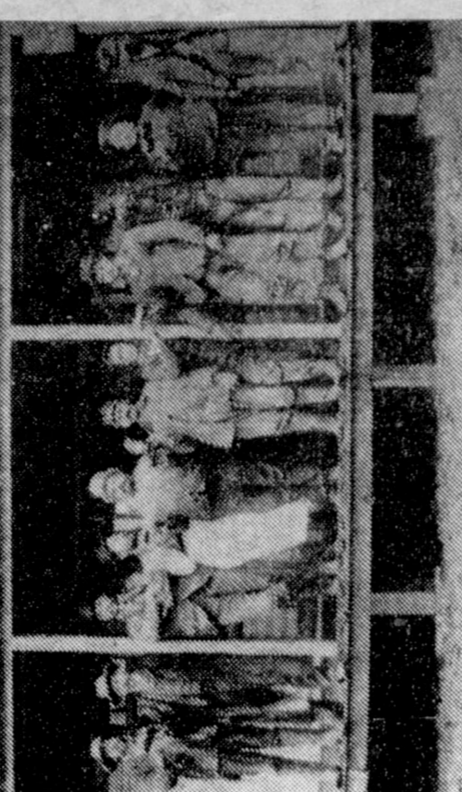

Present membership is 160 and current officers installed



Hillcrest Manor Cares for the Aged

Hillcrest Manor, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Garland since March 1970, was built by Mr. and Mrs. Richard Cain who opened it in October 1964 as Golden Years Rest Home for extended nursing care for the aged and infirm. Mrs. Cain was its first administrator and continued in that capacity following her husband's death and after the way of life at Hillcrest Manor.
