



We hear so much nowadays about the coming shortage of gasoline that we're already becoming resigned to it. We accept as fact the prediction that the price is sure to go up and that rationing is very probably on the way. Meanwhile we hope that the big fellows in government and industry will find a way to keep us out of a strain.

Doing that, you can bet, will require some close looks at a number of factors which have combined to bring on the crisis. Then it will become necessary to look for ways to accomplish all possible changes which seem to be advised by past experience.

Of course we find some unavoidable causes — such as the severe winter we have had. Vast increases in the demand for heating oil resulted in use of more crude for that purpose, hence a decrease in the crude that was available for gasoline. So, now we are approaching the season of increased automobile travel with a shorter supply of fuel on hand. To make matters worse we have increasing numbers of the federally required emission control devices which sharply decrease the mileage per gallon. We can't do anything about the acts of God, but hopefully something can be done about the acts of man.

Perhaps the greatest of all our problems is the fact that we have gone to extremes in ecology demands. Air quality standards have been set unrealistically high, ruling out the use of some fuels that could relieve the strain but are not permitted to. Those include large amounts of residual fuel oil and large amounts of coal with a relatively high sulphur content. Official restrictions also prohibit extraction of major coal deposits by strip mining.

One wonders whether the high quality of air demanded by ecologists is really necessary. Obviously a big step toward solution of the energy crisis could be taken if the nation would settle for a little less perfection and go back to using the forbidden fuels. As regards automobiles a great deal could be accomplished by demanding less quality in exhaust while developing engines that use the gasoline more completely.

The automotive industry's approach to the problem seemed absurd from the beginning. It has been performance conscious, striving for speed and acceleration rather than economy. A result was dirty exhaust, which could have been changed by improving engine efficiency. But no, the aim is still high performance even though that expensive junk has to be banged on to clean up the emission.

Still more mistakes by environmentalist groups need to be considered in looking for solutions. They have delayed the construction and operation of nuclear power plants. They have prevented vast projects of offshore drilling because of comparatively few oil leaks. And the prize of all absurdities was blocking construction of the Alaska pipeline which could be relieving much of our present oil shortage. The first question is why be afraid of it when dozens of such lines are operating successfully? Next question is where could a leak cause less trouble than in the wide open spaces of Alaska?

A few official policies in Washington can also be included as having a bearing on the situation. Tax reformers eager to remove a so called tax loophole had depletion allowance reduced and the result was a decline in oil exploration. It's been demonstrated that the oil industry needs a generous depletion allowance even though a few people are making big money at it.

The same can be said for regulating gas prices. Because the price has been held down inducement for exploration is also curtailed. At the same time use has rocketed because the controlled price keeps it cheaper than other fuels. This fact is given as a reason why gas pressure was down and some factories had to close during severe weather of last winter.

All of those factors had a bearing on the energy crisis now facing the country, and all of them are mistakes. So, it's obvious that some of the answers the country is looking

## Hennigan Auto Parts Moves to New Home

Following a big moving project during the past weekend, Hennigan Auto Parts is in business since Monday in its bright and spacious new location.

About fifteen helpers from the firm's major suppliers joined the Hennigans in transferring merchandise from one place to the other.

It adjoins the concrete block building which has been the firm's home since it was organized in 1960, and which had less than half the floor space of the new location.

Construction is pre-fab metal measuring 50x100 feet with the front 50x30 partitioned off for sales, display and office space. It has glass across the entire front, side walls of

orange painted metal, tornginal plastic covered floor with flakes of white, orange and black, wide Formica top counter and a number of display racks. The ceiling of acoustical tile is topped by insulation in addition to the spread of wall and rafter insulation throughout the complete building.

The front section also has year round air conditioning, and the back has only heating for the winter.

The spacious 35x50 back area is more than adequate for the stock which was crammed into the other building, and room is left for expansion. Principal additions there are 24 new sections of bins and a big A-frame rack for V belts.

Formal opening to show off the new facilities is in the plans but the date still is not decided. The most likely time is about a month from now.

Pat Hennigan got his start in business working in the automotive service owned by his father, H. P. Hennigan, in the location now occupied by Hoedebeck GMC. In 1946 they built a sheet metal building one location north of the Highway on Maple and moved into it. Pat took over the business in 1957 when his father moved to Albuquerque, N.M., and enlarged the building by constructing one of concrete tile around it and then removing the old building.

Pat started the automotive supply business in August 1960 and it grew steadily until the space was severely cramped. Adjoining space on which the new building is located was bought last fall from Community Lumber Co. and erection of the pre-fab structure started in January.

Hennigan Auto Parts is now a family affair with four sons... Pat Jr., Mike, Tim and Tom... as helpers. It has also extended its territory, delivering twice a week to customers in Valley View, Sanger and Slidell, and three times a week in Saint Jo and Forestburg.

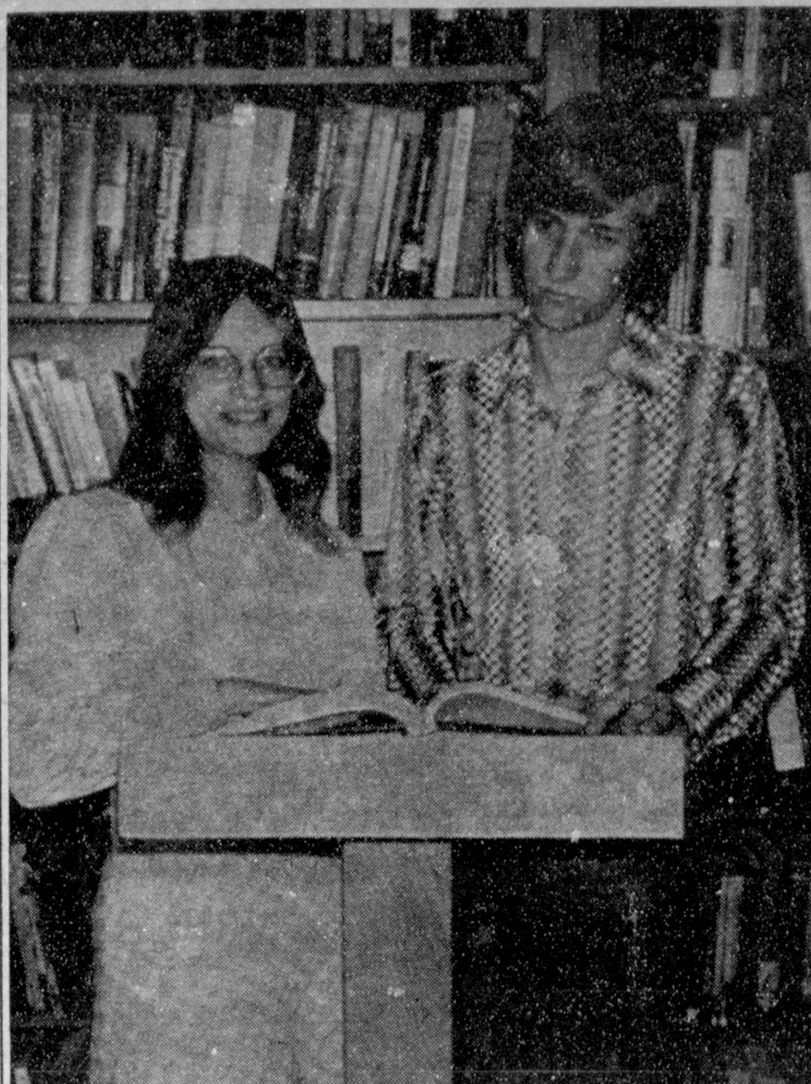

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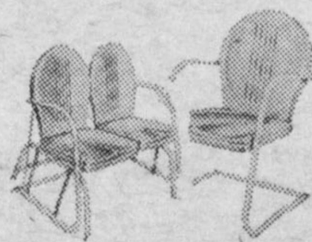
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### 25th Anniversary Is Celebrated by Mr., Mrs. Joe Hess

**'72 Texas Traffic Kills 3,688 and Injures 128,158**

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that a record 3,688 persons died last year in 3,099 fatal traffic crashes on the streets and highways of Texas. Another 128,158 persons were injured in 83,607 injury accidents.

Rural areas led in traffic deaths, but city crashes produced the greatest number of reported injuries.

Of the deaths, 1,409 were in cities and 2,279 in rural areas. Some 94,855 of the injuries were in rural crashes.

Overall, a total of 432,998 traffic accidents were reported last year in the state. Reported accidents increased 10 percent from the 394,166 occurring in 1971.

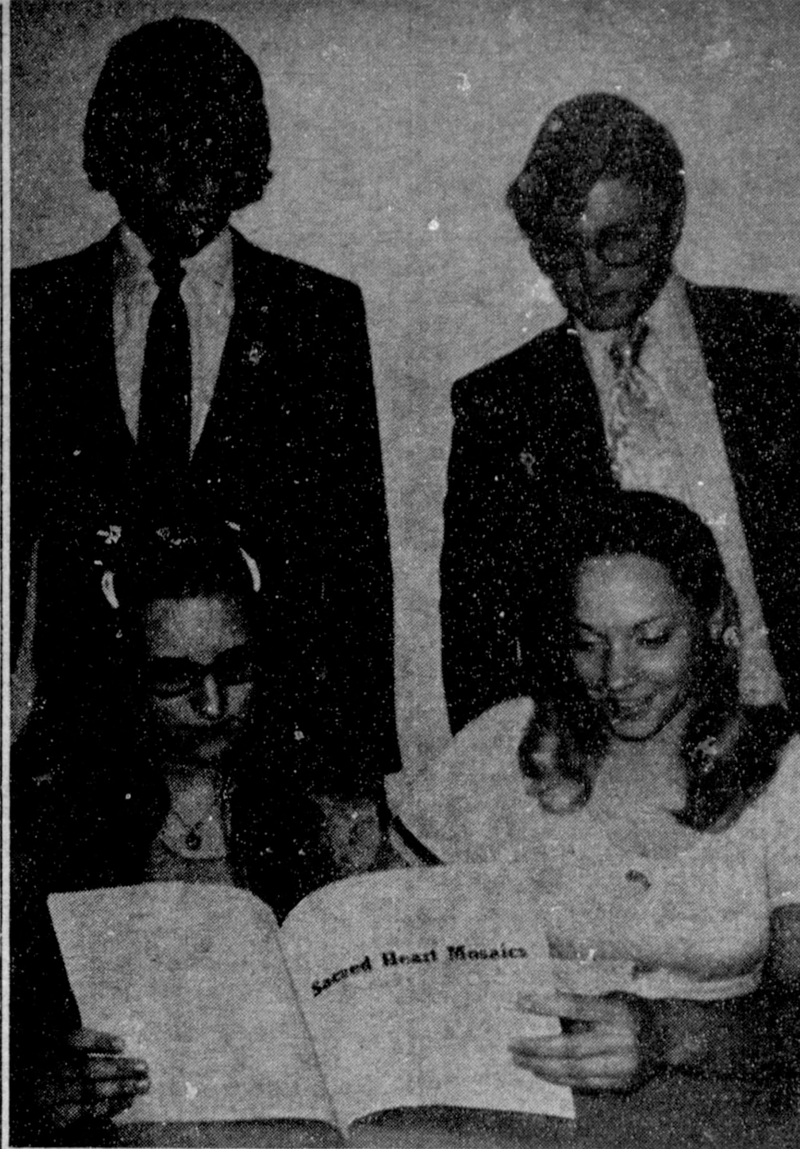
The total economic loss to Texans from traffic accidents during 1972 was \$1-billion, 35-million. (\$1,035,000,000)

Speir observed that almost 76.7-billion vehicle miles were driven in Texas last year — an eight per cent increase from 1971.

On a positive note, the DPS director pointed out that due to the fact vehicle miles increased faster than fatalities, the traffic death rate per 100-million vehicle miles decreased from 5.1 in 1971 to 4.8 in 1972.

Speir observed that a death rate as low as 4.8 has been achieved in Texas only one other time (in 1961) since the DPS began making such calculations in 1937. It was 6.2 in 1966, 14.6 in 1937.

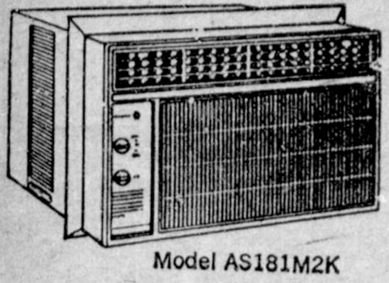

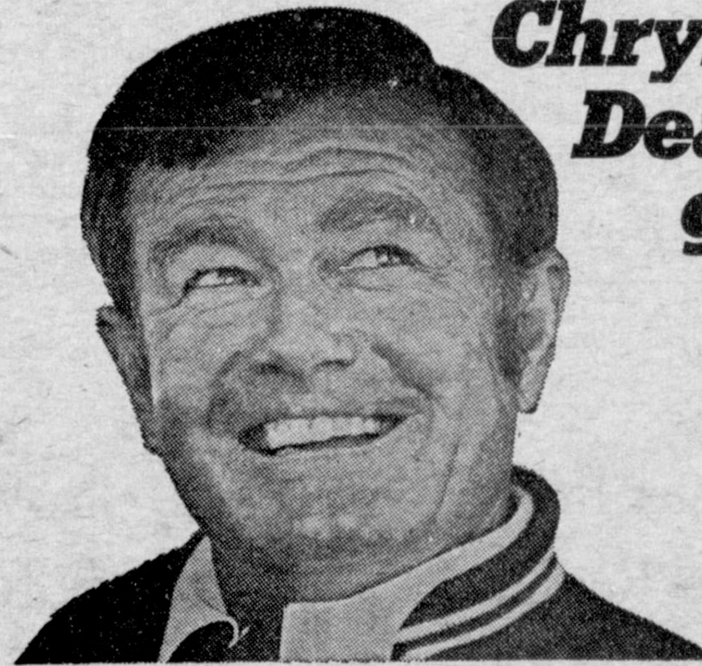

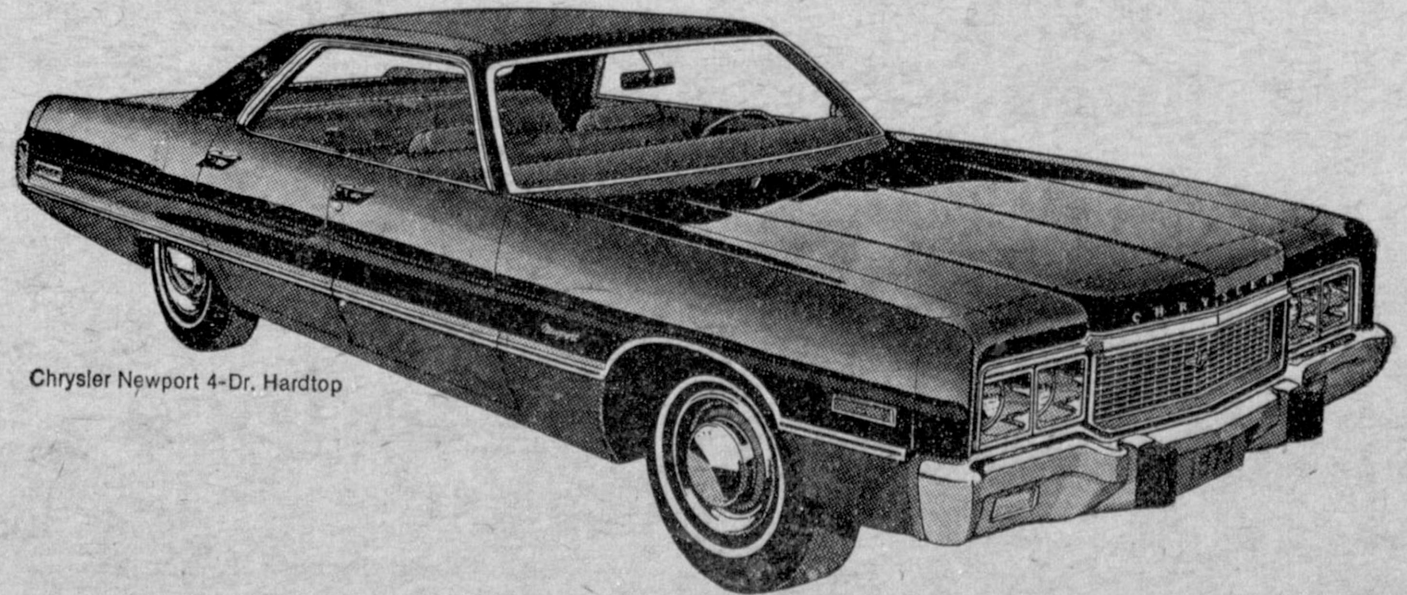

**Use of Pesticides Now Governed by Firm Set of Rules**

Summer is coming and so are the insects — a plague to farmers and housewives alike.

This year it is more important than ever to read the directions on the container before spraying that rosebush or dusting that cotton field, Agriculture Commissioner White explained. "The Federal Environmental Pesticide Control Act of 1972 set out some firm rules on how pesticides can be used in insect control. The rules are printed on the product label and any use of the pesticide other than that indicated is a violation of this federal law."

The printed directions are for the protection of both the user and the environment, Commissioner White noted. Many products are very specialized in what they will or will not do. And the misuse of insecticides often can be harmful.

"It just makes sense to read and follow directions," he added.

Farmers are especially urged to check the product labels this season. Pesticides represent a big investment to the grower. He should get his money's worth by making certain he uses the proper product at the right time in the most effective manner.

"Beware of misleading statements in newspaper advertisements," the Commissioner emphasized.

**Local Group on Hawaiian Holiday Shook by Quake**

All the natural beauty and entertainment offered tourists in Hawaii was on the itinerary of a Muenster group but the earthquake they experienced April 26 at Hilo is their chief topic of conversation.

Mrs. Needham, on the seventh floor of the hotel, ran down all the flights to safety and escaped a flood of water pouring from the eighth floor where water lines had broken. Mrs. Grewing, on the fourth floor, had no problem getting downstairs.

Mmes. Hamric, Evans and King were exploring a shopping center when the earth started waving and Mmes. Hamric and Evans scrambled under furniture with other shoppers. In the hustle and bustle Mrs. King took it standing up. They have many interesting sidelights to tell.

Otherwise the seven-day trip was a perfect. Unbelievably many beautiful flowers, fresh pineapple, swimming at Waikiki and Maui Beaches, a visit at Honolulu with Alfred Walter who took them sight-seeing to many places of special interest including a Chinese restaurant, the largest floating restaurant in the world.

They toured Pearl Harbor and the Punch Bowl, the King's Palace, and attended a luau. Their tours included many other interesting and entertaining sights, all completed before the quake hit the Islands. They returned to the mainland on an overnight flight. All have Hawaiian newspapers telling about the quake's damage, estimated at three and half million dollars.

Know your product! Read the label! Follow directions! "Those are the ABC's of safe, effective and legal chemical use," said White.

"How you spend your time is far more important than how you spend your money," says Los Angeles management consultant David B. Norris. "Money mistakes can be corrected but time is gone forever."

**Girls Track Team Scores 10 Points In Kilgore Meet**

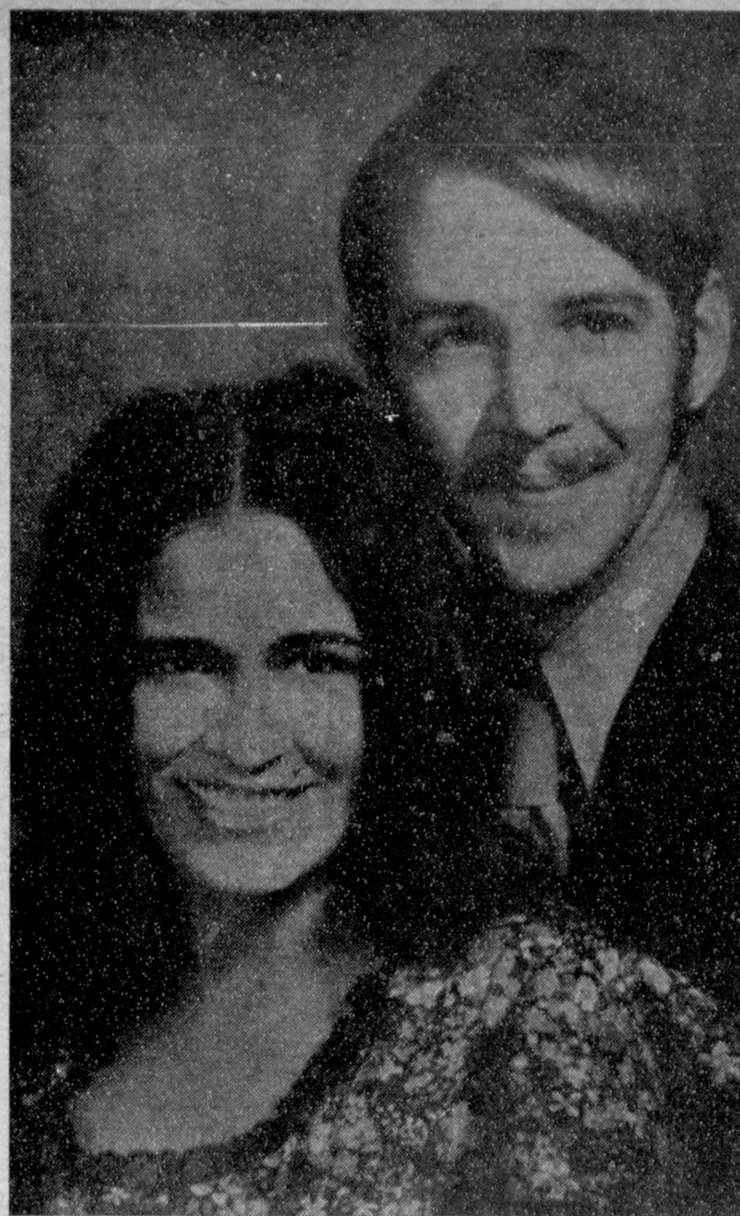
Muenster High's entries in the girls regional track meet in Kilgore last week scored a few points but failed to qualify for the state competition.

### Poultry Industry Is More than Just "Chicken Feed"

The poultry industry in Texas isn't just "chicken feed" or "pin money" any more. A check of the value of this industry shows gross income from production of eggs chickens and broilers during 1972 totaled more than \$3,500,000. "Several years ago, almost every farm had a small flock of chickens. But that situation has changed, and the poultry industry in Texas is a dynamic, progressive leader in the state's agriculture picture," Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White noted.

The gross income figure for poultry during 1972 was up about \$100,000 from 1971.

Of the 1972 gross, 51 per cent was from egg production, and 46 per cent was from broiler production.

Egg production in Texas during 1972 showed a slight decline from 1971. Broiler production in the state, however, was up four per cent in 1972 from the previous year.

Egg prices to producers averaged 30.9 cents per dozen during 1972, down slightly from 1871 levels. Broiler prices for 1972 averaged 14.1 cents per pound which was up slightly from 1971.

"Consumers who are on the lookout for good buys in food should take a close look at the egg. Eggs are one of the best protein buys on today's market."

"With eggs at 75 cents per dozen retail, you are paying only about 50 cents a pound. Compare that with other foods and you can see why eggs are such a good buy," Write said.

### National Service Asks for Reports On Severe Weather

In late March the National Weather Service mailed a special Severe Storm Report Form to nearly every resident on rural mail routes in this area. A reminder was issued today asking those individuals who received such forms to remember them when thunderstorms occur in their vicinity.

The forms request information on such events as hail occurrences, winds which cause damage, tornadoes, etc., if these events happen to occur near the respondent's home. The success of this special project will be greatly improved, when severe thunderstorms occur over an area, if as many residents as possible provide the requested information.

Each time a severe event occurs, the information should be entered on the form. It is designed so that information from a number of storms can be recorded and should be returned when it is full or after May 31, whichever comes first.

Approximately 130,000 forms were mailed to rural box-holders in 50 selected counties in Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas. There is no other feasible way to obtain the requested information than to call for the cooperation of the residents of these areas. The results of this survey will be used with information from special weather radars in studying severe thunderstorms. The information thus collected from area residents will help in improving the severe thunderstorm detection and warning services of the National Weather Service.
