A big headache facing this country is the changeover from our system of weights and measures to the metric system. Wall Street Journal recently said the switch is to be made within 10 years, also that a number of big companies are well advanced in their conversion program.

Competition for world markets, they say, spurs the change. Our products are more saleable abroad if they're engineered to measure the prospective customers are already using. Business here in the USA is also increasing its demand for the system, so that we can work on the many foreign imports we get, particularly cars. A tool company in Dallas, making metric wrenches, predicts that in four to five years every mechanic will need both kinds in his toolbox.

In spite of all the trouble it's going to cause, the change is a good idea. It's just good sense to adopt standards that apply everywhere in the world. Also it's smart to adopt the one that's more practical even though it's not the one we've been using. Anybody can appreciate that simply multiplying by 10 to go from one measure to another is better than our present complex way — 12 inches to a foot, 3 feet to a yard, 1760 yards to a mile — and equally arbitrary tables in weights and liquids. Once we get accustomed to it we'll be glad we changed.

While we're making this big changeover we hope other countries will make the relatively simple change to our kind of money. Strangely, in this respect it's we who have the simple method whereas the others have the complications. Imagine how it would assist world trade or world travel if our dollar could be swapped evenly for another country's dollar and the same pricing system were in effect everywhere.

The idea has lots of appeal. We're definitely in favor of better communications and better understanding among nations in both money and measures. And, of course, we want to phase out the old difficulties of servicing items that were not made to our measures.

We're even willing to adjust to the garbled effect on some well known old adages. Such as "a miss is as good as 1.6 kilometers; there isn't .06 gram of truth in it; he felt 3.05 meters tall; he wears a 455.43 liter hat."

## Muenster Second Nocona First in UIL Total Score

Final tabulations of scores in this year's UIL district competition finds Muenster in second place with a big gap between itself and Champion Nocona but a still bigger gap between itself and third place Pilot Point. Actually Muenster's count was higher than the combined count of the remaining five.

Official figures as reported by Superintendent L. B. Brunns were as follows. Nocona 339, Muenster 241, Pilot Point 74, Callisburg 59, Frisco 44, Petrolia 20, Sanger 10.

## Council Accepts Applications for City Policeman

The city of Muenster is presently accepting applications for a peace officer following termination of an agreement which has been in effect with Sheriff Bill Pratt for a number of years.

Discussion at the city council meeting Monday night revealed that Pratt has ended the agreement because the deputy too often is tied up with duties here. At the same time the city was displeased because the man had to spend too much time away from here. The new arrangement will cost slightly more but is expected to be more satisfactory.

The council meeting was the first since the election of two new members last week. They are Mayor David Bright and Alderman Sue Endres, both of whom were given the oath of office at the opening.

Concerning a board of equalization the council decided again to do the job themselves. Review of the tax rolls is due to begin soon.

The group approved payment of its second \$1,000 installment to the city library and also voted to ask Dr. Alfredo Antonetti to serve as health officer for the coming year.

In other action the council discussed cooperation with the Texoma Regional Planning Commission to build a pavilion in the city park. Jaycees have offered \$8,000 for the project if it can be developed.

## New Trustees Begin Terms with Wee Hour Session

Two new trustees of the Muenster school board started their terms Tuesday night with a session that extended into the wee hours. Included on their agenda was a long list of subjects including kindergarten, bus trouble, building plans, hiring teachers, shortage of funds, etc.

First order of business was swearing in new members, Theresa Walterscheid and Dan Hamric, and electing the board's officers. They are Urban Endres, president, Robert Bayer, vice-president, Ray Wilde, secretary-treasurer. The board also decided to send certificates of appreciation to Dr. Larry Tisdale and Jerry Wimmer for their dedicated service.

Discussion on funds brought out the fact that tax income is going down because of declining oil production but expense keeps going up, mostly because of annual salary raises and rising prices. Members decided that an adjustment of valuations will be needed for the next year and selected names of several persons who will be asked to serve on the equalization board.

Regarding next year's faculty the board re-hired all who had applied, however it prefers not to name the teachers until near the end of the year.

The kindergarten class will be under a new arrangement next year. The federal Title I program is discontinued and the Texas Education Agency has taken charge. Superintendent Brunns says that 46 applications have been received up to now. Regulations will require several remodeling changes in the classrooms.

Another building job is a pair of tennis courts between the elementary and cafeteria buildings. It will have an asphalt surface, backstops, lighting and surrounding cable.

A bus breakdown brought on a problem. The unit is due to be traded in on purchase of a new bus. Rather than abandon it now the board will invest in an overhaul job in order to get more use as well as a better trade-in.

## Catfish Farming Meeting Set for Tuesday at CCJC

A meeting on Catfish Farming under sponsorship of the A&M Extension Service will be held next Tuesday night, April 17, at 7:30 in Room 412 of the Science Building at Cooke County Junior College. County Agent Neil Tibbets says the meeting is in response to many inquiries he has received recently.

The program will be headed by James T. Davis, fishery specialist of the A&M Extension Service. He will talk on all the phases of producing fish.

## Late Cold Wave Threatens Fruit

This week's late siege of winter weather has a lot of local people in a sweat. They're worried about fruit trees, many of which were in bloom and many more that had small fruit formed. For a few more days it's a matter of waiting for the final answer.

The wintry blast moved in Sunday on a late norther that broke long standing cold records for this time of the year. The mercury dropped to the freezing mark early Monday and to 28 early Tuesday.

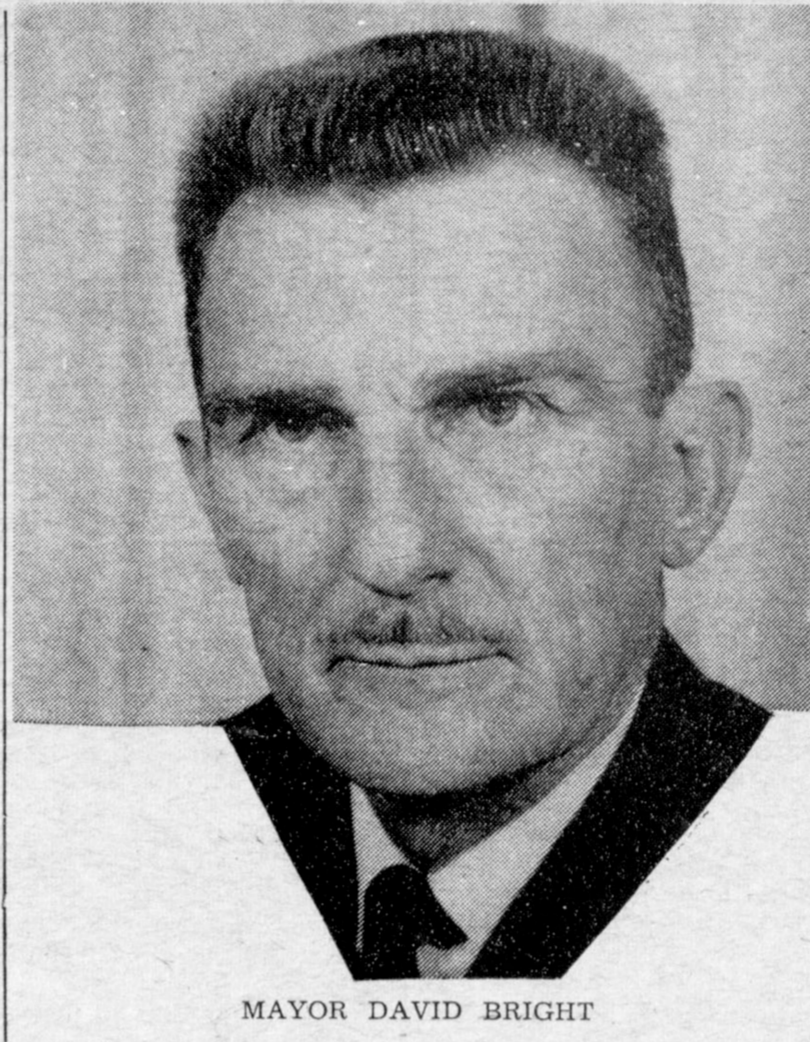
## Burleson Reveals Approval of Grant

## Muenster Entries Second in UIL Literary Events

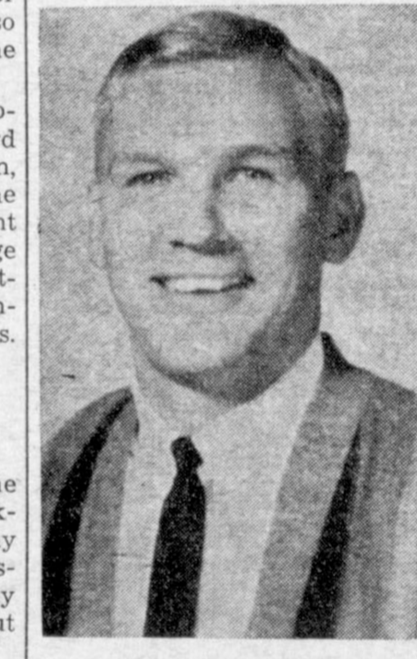
## Muenster Voters Elect Two Women

In comparatively light balloting last Saturday the voters of this community, for the first time in local history, chose two women on their governing bodies.

One of those is Sue Endres, who won 209-122 over Roy Monday in a contest for the city council seat vacated by Albert Herr.

The other is Theresa Walterscheid, who defeated incumbent Jerry Wimmer 288-136 in the race for Muenster School Board.

At the same time another challenger, Dan Hamric, was successful by a 321-102 count in unseating incumbent Dr. Larry Tisdale.

Otherwise the election was a formality, with all other candidates coasting in without opposition.

Out in front of the list is David Bright, who got the city's top position. He was unopposed as successor to Mayor Arthur Felderhoff, who choose not to seek re-election. Bright received 281 votes.

Another unopposed city candidate was Herbert Miller. He received 291 votes in his bid for re-election.

Likewise Urban Endres had clear sailing in the school board election. He received 355 votes as an unopposed candidate for re-election.

Finally, there was the hospital board's ballot on which four unopposed incumbents coasted back into office. Those men and the votes they received are Jimmy Jack Biffle 385, Paul Fetsch 380, Alphonse Felderhoff 380, Al Trubenchbach 376.

Two candidates for the county school board also were unopposed. They are Doyle Selby and Alphonse Felderhoff, representatives of Precinct 3 and 4 of the county school board.

## Tom Hess to Run Next Monday in Boston Marathon

A long awaited day is coming next Monday for Tom Hess. He will be participating in the nationally famous Boston Marathon over a route of 26 miles and 385 yards through and outside the city of Boston.

Tom says he feels ready for the big event having followed a rugged training schedule since last September when he joined the NTSU track staff as graduate assistant. He has run more than a thousand miles in practice and has run in two marathon races. He has clocked times comparable to those run at Boston.

Over a thousand runners are entered in the race. Time expected to win is 2 hours 15 minutes or better.
