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## Annual Report Shows Library Had Busy Year

Annual report of Muenster Public Library shows another busy year with 29 new members registered and a visual aid reading program conducted during the summer.

Mrs. Joe Luke, librarian, and other volunteer staffers logged a total 2,769 hours and students working during the summer vacation put in 339 volunteer hours.

They check out 6,449 books, 614 periodicals and 241 pamphlets for a total of 7,404.

During the summer reading program 102 children registered, checking out 3,683 books, and 82 of the youngsters read the required number of books to receive reading certificates.

The visual aid program conducted for 10 weeks during the summer had 11 students registered with total attendance at 62.

Story Hour conducted for six weeks with one-hour sessions each week had 494 children attending, with 94 the top attendance of any one day.

New books added total 431, donated books, 227; memory books, two; free books 10; for a grand total of 670. In addition, 231 periodicals were added.

Interlibrary loan books from Sherman, Dallas and State Libraries totaled 467. Three hundred and eighty two students were assisted on term papers.

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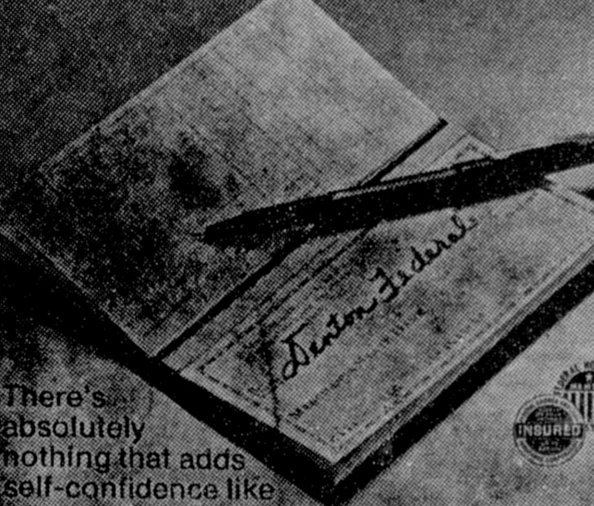

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**Finance for Local Industry Available From State Fund**

A financing aid administered by the Texas Industrial Commission has just become available for industrial development in Cooke and Montague Counties, according to Gene Davenport of the Cooke County Electric Cooperative.

The aid was made possible by an act of the State Legislature in 1972 enabling non profit corporations and local foundations to borrow money from the state up to 40 per cent of the amount required.

A requirement was to be designated as a rural area by the TIC and approved by the attorney general. Davenport appeared before the industrial commission in behalf of the two counties and asked Judges Larry Sullivant and C. W. Chandler to officially request the designation. Both have now been notified that their counties are eligible for the aid if and when the Act is funded.

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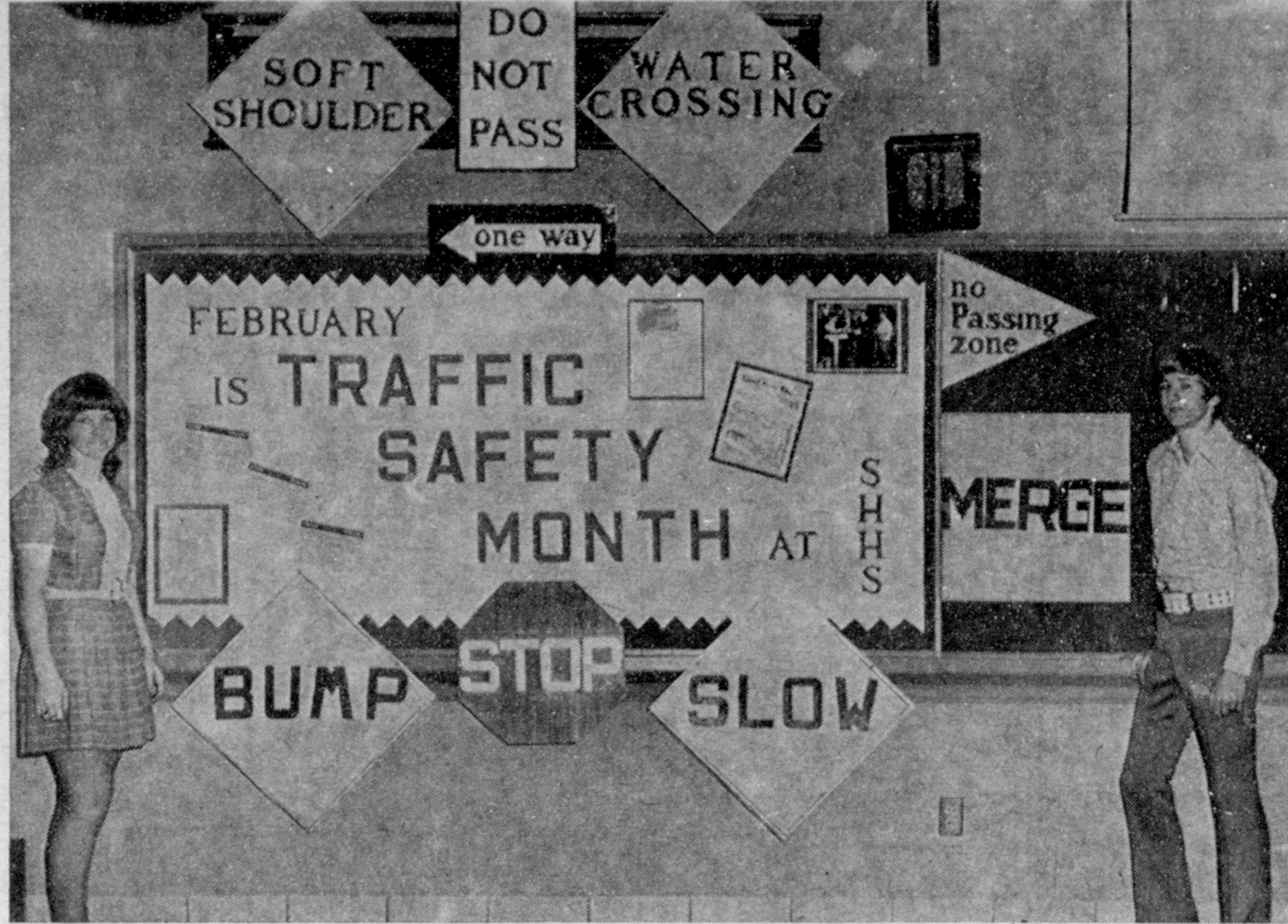

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**Hallways Are Highways at Sacred Heart High School While Students Participate in Traffic Safety Program**

February was Traffic Safety Month at Sacred Heart High School and various programs were designed to encourage safe driving in the community.

The program was sponsored by the student council and school-oriented organizations as well as curriculum depart-

ments participated. Sacred Heart High's hallways were transformed into highways February 5 and 6 to familiarize students with traffic laws governing the highways. Laws were enforced by officers Larry Bayer, Mark Schmitt, Ernest Martin and Myron Hess.

Tickets for speeding, traveling in the wrong lane, running stop signs, and illegal passing were the most common. Signs along the "highway" denoted no passing zones and other special restrictions. The National Honor Society sponsored a Traffic Safety program on Cable Television, Channel 2, during February.

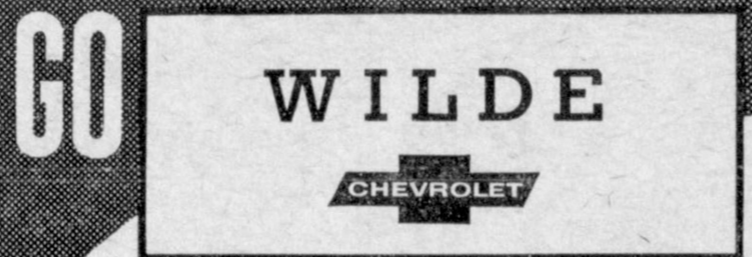

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**Muenster Decreases Traffic Violations For Past 12 Months**

Muenster experienced a decrease in the number of traffic violations during 1972 as compared with 1971 violations. There were 175 offenses in 1971, and 144 in 1972.

According to Steve Moster, city judge, a total of \$2,874 was received in fines and the number one offense, with 54 tickets, was minor in possession of alcoholic drinks.

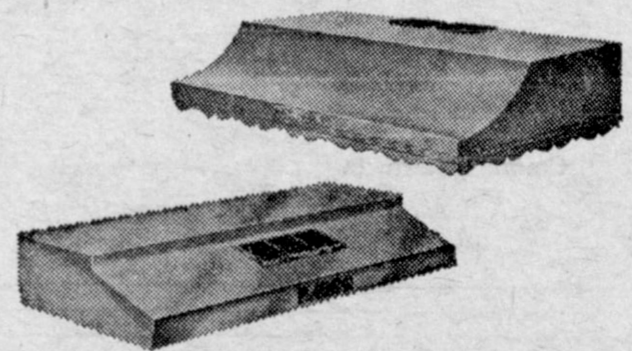
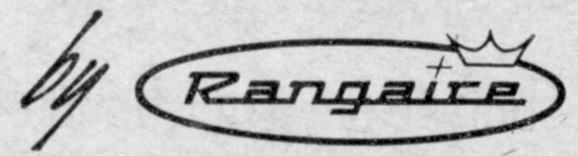
Operating a motor vehicle without a license or without license plates accounted for 30 tickets. Thirteen offenses were recorded for running red lights and stop signs. Failure to keep vehicle under proper control was the offense on 13 counts. Speeding and excessive noise accounted for 2 and 1 offenses, respectively.

Miscellaneous offenses accounted for 17 tickets, and 14 of the total offenses included accidents.

Mr. Moster concluded: "There appears to be a slacking off of law enforcement. Teenagers aren't the only ones who are the offenders, besides, we don't fine them for the money — just to keep law and order."

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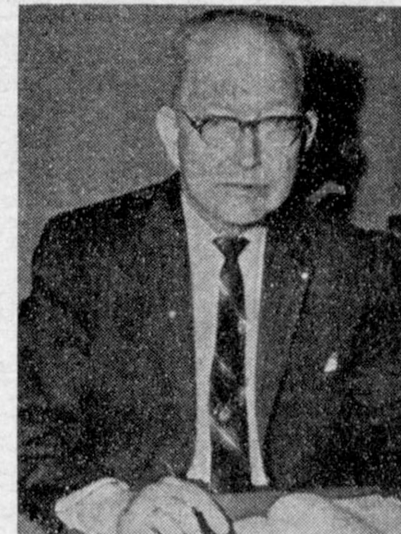

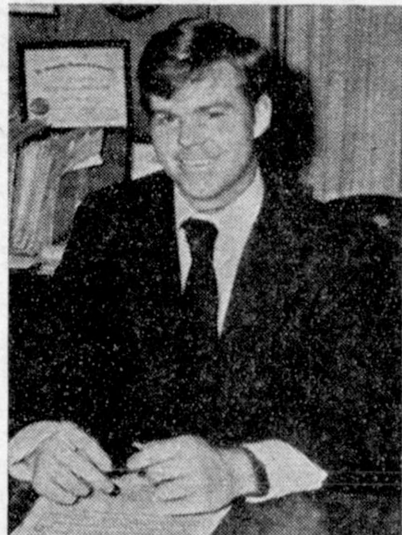
