Social Security Has New Method of Reporting Changes

Immediately other events that affect the before planting, he will disc payment of their monthly lightly and sod to Coastal benefits may now do so bermudagrass in February. through the social security office at 315 West Mulberry in Sherman, Gus Jones, district manager, said today. Reports may be made by mail, telephone, or personal visit.

Jones said that up to now beneficiaries were encouraged to notify the Social Security Administration about the occurrence of these events on postcard forms pre-addressed to one of six social security record centers throughout the ountry. Beneficiaries received the postcard forms when they initially applied for monthly benefits.

Jones said that the change in reporting methods is designed to reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. The change is prompted by the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information over high speed communications circuits to record offices.

In addition to address changes, Jones said that events that affect receipt of monthly social security checks include employment, marriage or remarriage in some instances. divorce and death.

Jones also announced that effective after Thursday evening, September 26, the Sherman Social Security Office will no longer be open past 4:45 p.m. Its hours will be 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday. A representative may also be seen in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon in the Federal Building.




