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REAL CAUSE TO PROTEST

The Vietnam war protesters — from hippy to college professor to baby doctor — speak of America's effort to defend South Vietnam as immoral. The fact that there is no similar protest of Ho Chi Minh's tens of thousands of murderers in the north, and his

thousands of terrorist murders of some of South Vietnam's finest citizens, implies that these are not necessarily immoral acts. These protesters must use a dictionary vastly different from our own.

There is one reasonable protest that could be made, yet none has voiced it. It is the criticism that the government failed to heed expert advice offered early in 1950.

William D. Pawley, who had extensive business experience in the Far East, and who served as US Ambassador to Peru and Brazil, told a Senate

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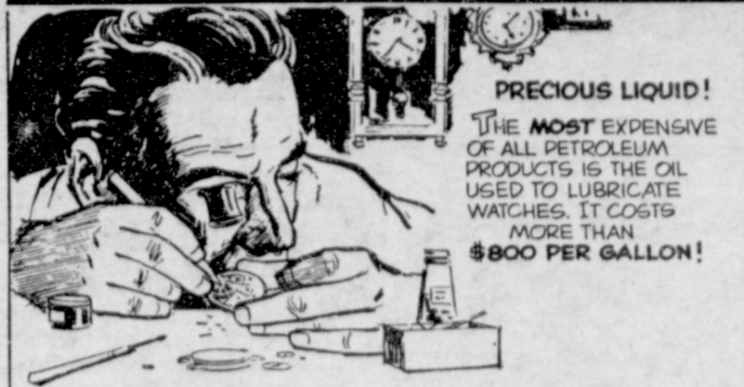

Committee in 1960, under oath, that he had been very close to President Truman and that only six months before the Korean War he told the President that if he did not "support with tremendous effort the Nationalist movement... China will be lost and you will have a war on your hands in Burma, Indochina, or Korea within one year and you will either commit America or you will lose Asia... There are millions... willing to fight for their freedom — who don't have enough to eat — and who can be recruited and made into marvelous soldiers. You can do it for 10 cents on the dollar to what it would cost you if you do have to use Americans."

Well, we had Korea, where we declined to win. We negotiated. Now we have Vietnam, and we are negotiating. On Formosa, the Republic of China maintains the largest and best-trained non-Communist army in Asia. But that army is immobilized by the Mutual Defense Treaty. South Korea's army, second in number and training in all of Free Asia, has furnished troops in South Vietnam, but its main force is required to defend against violations of the armistice negotiated in 1953.

Not one of the vociferous critics has criticized the Government of the United States for failing to follow Pawley's obviously sound counsel to develop a defense against Communism manned by Asians — a course which would negate the silly claim that it is a war of colors, or race, or imperialism. Having done so, we wouldn't have 25,000 Americans dead in South Vietnam, and a 1968 budget deficit of \$25 billion.

The failure to heed Pawley is a valid cause for protest.

FREE LOVE

There is a lot of argument about the morals of today. Some insist that morals have declined greatly. Others claim that this generation is no worse than generations past, and that the only change is one of more openness about sex and other matters. In any event, one of the expressions that has found its way into our vocabulary is "free love." In common usage, the phrase has come to mean promiscuity.

But the US Supreme Court has brought a new form of "free love" into existence. The Court says that a woman and her lover of the moment may engage in a continuing affair without fear of losing her ADC subsidy. ADC, of course, is Aid to Dependent Children.

Some 18 states and the District of Columbia were under the impression that if a man was living in the house with a mother they had the right to assume that he was picking up the tab for the family. That, it now appears, is an archaic concept, although a few state welfare agencies have indicated that they will not bow to the Court's ruling. Arkansas' welfare commissioner, Len Blaylock, says that he will continue to ban these sex-subsidies until specifically required to conform. At issue is the 80 percent of such ADC payments which comes out of Washington, while the individual states pay only 20 percent. Presumably Washington would cut off the 80 percent payment to any state which failed to conform to the Court's ruling. At the moment, it appears that a number of states will balk until test cases bring decisions specifically applicable to each individual state.

A few years ago a New Jersey welfare official was chastised for daring to suggest that women on welfare rolls who bore illegitimate children should be persecuted under the state's laws against premarital and extramarital relations. Like many other state officials he was wrestling with the problem of the women who keep turning up on welfare rolls with newborn dependent children, and receive increased welfare checks as the brood increases. They couldn't do better if they were unionized. How many unions can

negotiate a new contract every 9 months?

It is estimated that the Supreme Court's free love ruling may increase the number of children on relief roles by as much as 15 percent.

CITIZEN MAFIA?

The emotional cackling for "gun registration" has begun to die down a bit. Those who sought to persuade Congress that sportsmen who own hunting guns, and home-owners who own weapons, are all potential assassins, have talked themselves hoarse enough to listen for a moment, perhaps. They wailed that the National Rifle Association was some sort of citizen mafia, without being able to cite a case when a member assassinated anybody. It is certain that not one of the assassins cited as the reason for gun registration was a member, past or present.

In fact, if the Kennedy-King-Kennedy assassinations were the pressing reasons for registration — and they were so represented — then clearly it would be more effective to register Communists than guns. But in our society the thought of registering Communists is unthinkable; it would violate their "civil rights." It is better to restrict the civil rights of every citizen in the land?

The effect of registering firearms would be nil, nor next to nil, in reducing crimes of violence. The millions of home-owners who own guns did not acquire them to commit crimes; they possess them because they no longer trust the authorities to provide protection. Further, can you imagine how many thousands of bureaucrats the Federal Government would have to employ to enforce gun registration. Truly a national police force.

A realistic argument in the gun controversy would be aimed at the criminal — the punk who operates as a stick-up artist, the bandit at the service station, the liquor store, the bank — the armed robber. Does anyone think any gun law will keep a firearm out of the hands of these street assassins? The answer has to be a big NO. Too many guns are available to these thugs, guns such as those stolen during the Plainfield, New Jersey, riots, and never recovered.

Instead of gun controls, how about a mandatory sentence of five years or so, with no parole, for any crime involving firearms, or any other deadly weapons, in the hands of a criminal. That kind of control would side-step overly lenient judges and give some second thoughts to weapon-wielding criminals.

Gun registration would not have prevented a single one of the tragic Kennedy-King-Kennedy assassinations.

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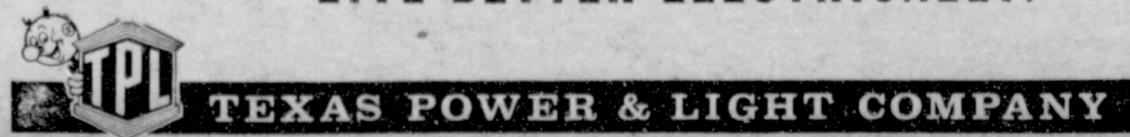



14 Amendments To Be on Ballot of General Election

AUSTIN—Campaigns will be shaping up soon on 14 more amendments to the state constitution. All 14 of the proposed changes in the state's basic laws will be voted on at the general election November 5. Some are far-reaching, others routine.

Here are the amendments in the order in which they will appear on the November 5 ballot.

- 1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.
2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.
3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, within the "prudent man rule."
4. Allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.
5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session. Present limit is 120 days.
6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.
7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.
8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.
9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. (Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.)
10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texarkana.
11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant Counties.
12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit private concerns to operate plants thus financed.
13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.
14. Spelling out that legislators will not be ineligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

"The Legislature may define
