WHEREAS, this perfect record proves dedication to hard work and training, as well as cooperation and team spirit, which qualities are so essential in life, and


WHEREAS, by their sportsmanship and team effort, they have done honor to Muenster,

Being human beings as well as officers they had plenty of provocation for their display of anger. After all, the filthy Worth. and degrading attack on them by the demonstrators is the worst on record in this country's history. We wonder what percentage of normal people, in or out of uniform, could endure such vile treatment without giving in to the retaliatory urge.

This column believes the investigators are out of line in condemning the violent reaction of police without admitting that average people cannot be expected to tolerate such depraved and vicious provocation. Perhaps that is where Mayor Daley finds fault with the report. The ugly details are revealed and present adequate reason Mrs. Mary Stermer and Sister for the officers' behavior, but still the officers are condemned.

The report also demands punishment of the police who let their anger get out of control, but news releases made no mention of demands for punishment of mob leaders who started the trouble. It Community 4-H makes us wonder whether the Yule Fete Dec. 10 investigators found any fault in their savage rioting and barbarism. It's hard for the finger pointing.

All in all the report is best described in the words of Mayor Daley. It is a disservice to the country. It blames those who were on our side protecting society's interests, and fails to direct proper blame on those who caused the whole mess.

The former British protectorate which won its independence and full status as a free nation just recently raises the membership total a little closer to three times what it was when the Charter of the U.N., born in hope and nurtured in ideals, went into effect 23 years ago.

Swaziland has a population of 375,000 — less than that of the City of Jacksonville scattered over an area of 6,705 square miles, slightly smaller than the State of Massachuselts.

Yet this fledgling, untried nation takes its place in the organization of nations as a full-fledged member, with a vote equal to that of the United States, the Soviet Union or any other member state. There are, indeed, 69 smaller nations including Swaziland, and many of them like Swaziland were newly formed from former African colonies and protectorates. They are now full fledged members of the U.N. and combined have less population than the United States. Yet they cast 69 votes, to the United States' one.

It is therefore hardly surprising that the U.N. has become largely a "cave of the winds," with Uncle Sam, who still picks up most of the U.N. tab, playing the role of Uncle Sugar. It seems a good place to be-
