Pigs Is Beautiful



An editorial worthy of mention was recently printed in a small Georgia newspaper. It recalled the depresion days of the thirties and how hard times brought people together.

The incident concerned a family in Iowa, a farm family which couldn't make its mortgage payment because of the awful slump in commodity prices.



Making the Most | Dickens' Special Christmas Story Of One's Ailment | Few names are more widely associated with Christmas than that of Charles Dickens, whose memorable Christmas stories

have endeared him to millions. One of Dickens' greatest, and least known works was written especially for his own children. It was called "The Life of our Lord." Dickens left instructions that this work not be commercialized, and it was never publicized until some 100 years after his own death, and the death of his youngest child, Sir Henry Fielding Dickens.

Dickens' deep veneration for the lessons of the life of Christ upon earth are found in these words:

"Everybody ought to know about Him. No one ever lived who was so kind, so gentle, and so sorry for people who did wrong or were in any way ill and miserable, as He was.


Josef Mohr was a young parish priest in Oberndorf a century and a half ago. Franz Gruber was the part time organist at the church. The two were close friends.

Oberndorf had no working church organ in the winter of 1818. It had been damaged by flood waters of the river Salzach. It has been said that the thought of a "silent" Christmas Eve Mass troubled Josef Mohr.

On the afternoon of Dec. wrote some verses and gave them to his friend Gruber to set to music. The result, played and sung by Mohr and Gruber to the accompaniment of the latters' guitar, after the midnight Mass, and in the Church of St. Nikelaus in Oberndorf, brought instant ap-

proval from the townspeople. At Christmas in 1839, a group of Tyrolean folk singers sang the carol for the first time at a public performance in the United States - in a concert in front of Trinity Church in New York.





Other Uses for Christmas Tree

After the holidays use the discareded tree as winter protection for shrubs and garden THOU SHALT NOT: plants.

First, cut off the boughs. Small branches can be placed curved ends up around plantings or over garden beds when the ground is more or less exposed. This will prevent plants from frost heaving.

Another use for the tree after Christmas is as a backyard bird feeder . . . Moreover, they make shelter for winter birds. A fir is ideal since it retains its needles all winter outdoors. The tree should be well anchored, preferably in a hole. Then tie pieces of suet. popcorn, apple, peanut-butter or other morsels of food to the outer branches. Always keep a container of water han-




