Progressive starvation, isolation from other human contact, the numbing cold, lack of medical care for wounds, as well as illnesses or injuries contracted during captivity, are part of the picture.

The Geneva Conventions, to which Hanoi is a signatory, . . require repatriation of the sick and wounded, as well as the release or transfer to a neutral nation of men whose long confinement jeopardizes their health." Hanoi continues to break every rule in the book by its treatment of the 781 men captured and missing in North Viet Nam. Also, Viet Cong and communist forces in South Viet Nam and Laos have failed to even identify almost 800 other Americans captured or missing in these areas.
