## When costs go up, solving the problem isn't easy for TP&L

Texas Power & Light Company's costs of bringing you dependable electric service have risen drastically in recent years. And, they're still going up. For example, TP&L uses thousands of racks... a small but essential piece of hardware which is attached to poles as a support for power lines. In 1952, the price of a rack was only 49¢. Today, the price is \$1.00.
