



Deposits, Loans At Muenster Bank Gain During Year

Increases in both deposits and loans during the past year were indicated last week in Muenster State Bank's quarterly report to the state banking commission, which had called for the report as of April 20, 1971.

Deposits at the close of that day were \$4,427,214.92, reflecting a gain of \$344,472.18 for the past year but a decline of \$31,433.10 for the past three months.

Total loans were reported at \$2,264,653.32, a gain of \$34,310 for the past year and a gain of \$2,973.27 for the past quarter. Combined deposits of the four banks of the county showed a substantial increase for an all time high of \$39,110,565. The total a year

ago was \$32,660,271. Likewise combined loans of the four county banks set a new record. The new figure is \$20,032,643 as compared with last year's \$17,008,723.
