"Everybody worries about the last 50,000 men", that is, about the last American troop units leaving Vietnam as they disengage themselves from the war. That was the chief concern of Lt. Gen. James Gavin, Retired, in an interview published last week by U.S. News and World Report. From it we can get a better understanding of President Nixon's determination to have the Vietnamization well advanced before pulling out the GIs. From it we also wonder whether the congressional doves who insist on immediate withdrawal have ever stopped to think how it can be accomplished.

Gavin explained that "the thing that troubles a thoughtful person is that the North Vietnamese must have penetrated a great deal of the Saigon establishment through their agents. So I would say that carrying out the withdrawal could run into considerable difficulty if there were a significant penetration of the Saigon Government and an unwillingness on the part of the South Vietnamese to really be stiff and fight.

"Our survival in the last months would depend upon the South Vietnamese ability to carry on. This is the only question mark, and nobody under the sun can answer that one. We can only hope that the Saigon Government has the capability to defend itself."

One can imagine the kind of situation that develops as more and more of our troops are shipped out. The odds against our men get stronger and stronger, eventually reaching the point where the enemy's advantage is overwhelming. Obviously our men cannot hold back hordes of enemies while making their exit by ships, boats or helicopters. When our men's resistance reaches the breaking point the withdrawal comes to a sudden and tragic stop. From then on there would be no more American survivors.

The Nixon program, however, makes allowances for this difficulty. It expects the South Vietnamese army to have become capable of carrying on the defense of its homeland and also to supply the protection of American troops as they disengage from the war.

One dreads to think of the slaughter that would have resulted if our troops had been pulled away suddenly as local war critics suggested more than a year ago. A gratifying number would have been home in a hurry but when the odds in military strength built up sufficiently in the enemy's favor the return of remaining Americans to their homes would have become slim indeed. It would have become one of the worst massacres in our history.

Well, we can thank our president and our military for a way to prevent that catastrophe. The Vietnamization program is serving a double purpose. Besides developing the military strength for South Vietnam to defend itself it is providing the best possible way for our men to make a safe withdrawal.

Even so, our operation exit still is not definitely assured. As General Gavin said, its success depends directly on the South Vietnamese who will be there to hold back the vindictive red hordes trying to spoil our men's departure.

Still another factor figures into Gavin's appraisal of the (Continued on page 8)

Electric Co-op Members Hear Progress Report

Members of the Cooke County Electric Cooperative Association, assembled in the Muenster High School gymnasium Monday night for their annual meeting, heard a report on the continued progress and growth of their organization.

Manager Michael Sloan told the members that their gross operating revenue for 1970 was \$1,916,280 and their net operating margin was \$328,361, an increase of \$18,381 over the '69 margin. He said the Co-op purchased 147,191,545 KWH of current from Brazos Electric Power Cooperative at a cost of 7.55 mills per KWH. This cost accounted for 70.8 per cent of the year's operation.

Sales to customers were 137,576,775 KWH, an increase of 8.4 per cent over 1969. 63 per cent of the current was used by oil field customers, the remaining 37 per cent by farm, residential and non-oil commercial customers. The residential and farm load continues increasing, Sloan said. Sixty six all-electric homes were built last year, making a total of 158 now served by the co-op.

Assets of the association were reported at \$5,747,905, and 96.5 per cent of that amount is owned and has been funded by the consumer-members.

The manager also reported that the co-op during 1970 continued its support of organizations and activities for area development, and of youth groups such as 4-H, FFA and Young Farmers.

At the annual election of directors Jack Crownover, Pete Skinner and Robert Lewis

were re-elected to three year terms. After the election the directors met and elected their officers as follows: Jack Crownover, president; Al Wiesman, vice president; Vincent Zimmerman, secretary-treasurer. Other members of the board J. A. Klement, Doye Doty, Pete Skinner and Robert Lewis Jr.

A special event of the meeting was the presentation of 25 year awards to two employees by Mr. Sloan. Mrs. Earle Otto received a 25 year charm bracelet, Richard Swirczynski (Continued on page 8)

Deposits, Loans At Muenster Bank Gain During Year

Increases in both deposits and loans during the past year were indicated last week in Muenster State Bank's quarterly report to the state banking commission, which had called for the report as of April 20, 1971.

Deposits at the close of that day were \$4,427,214.92, reflecting a gain of \$344,472.18 for the past year but a decline of \$31,433.10 for the past three months.

Total loans were reported at \$2,264,653.32, a gain of \$34,310 for the past year and a gain of \$2,973.27 for the past quarter.

Combined deposits of the four banks of the county showed a substantial increase for an all time high of \$39,110,565. The total a year ago was \$32,660,271.

Likewise combined loans of the four county banks set a new record. The new figure is \$20,032,643 as compared with last year's \$17,008,723.

Muenster VFW States Opinion on Lt. Calley Case

We, the members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 6205, Muenster, Texas, wish to go on record in our views concerning the Lt. William Calley situation.

First, we do not condone the needless killing of innocent men, women, and children. As proven at his Court Martial, Lt. Calley did

kill at My Lai, but we are not satisfied with the wording of the verdict which restricted his sentence to either death or confinement at hard labor for life.

In this war it is impossible to determine who the enemy is until hostile actions are directed at our troops. This hostile action is not limited to gun fire, but also as mines and boobytraps. A leader such as Lt. Calley is under constant strain of concern of these devices. It is well known that

these devices have contributed to the largest percentage of our casualties in this war. Women and children are just as capable as the men in applying these various forms of hostility. So who can say, with out a doubt, that these civilians were innocent?

We commend Lt. Calley's Court Martial Board of Officers. Their's was the difficult and compassionate task in applying their decision according to the present rules of war and the Uniformed Code of Military Justice. In their restriction to these rules, we feel that they did what they thought was right. We respect the attempts of the convening authority of this Court Martial, to appoint members to the board of officers with combat experience in Viet Nam. But the authorization of rank on this level of a Court Martial destroyed the equality and the common factor that was attempted to be established. The war in Viet Nam is a small unit's war, commanded by Lieutenants, not by units commanded by persons with rank as the officers on the Court Martial Board. The nature of these men's rank puts them in an entirely different situation than what Lt. Calley faced.

Viet Nam has brought drastic changes in our tactics, weapons, and even the structure of our units. Shouldn't the same causes of these changes be considered when we attempt to classify a man as a war criminal?

Could the My Lai incident have been caused by inconceivable orders, a poor preparation briefing, or a lack of specific rules of engagement? Was it the misinterpretation of orders by Lt. Calley?

In view of all these circumstances, and others that have been presented to the President, we ask that he weigh his decision carefully. We ask that he reject the sentence, not in mockery to the Court Martial, but in view of the fact that this war presents such a drastic change from any other we have been involved in. We join the other Veterans of Foreign Wars across Texas in asking the President to grant full pardon to Lt. William Calley.

Well Deserved Right

Once again, police-state-type dictation over private citizens by the federal government has been proposed in Congress — in the form of oppressive federal registration and licensing of all guns. For most gun owners, passage of the law would mean disposal of their guns within 180 days — unless they wished to submit to stringent registration and licensing procedures. One provision of the latest antigun proposal magnanimously offers the payment of "reasonable value" for firearms voluntarily relinquished to the Treasury Department.

A great many members of the national legislative body now realize that a federal law aimed at depriving all citizens of the basic right of gun ownership is as unworkable as that ancient atrocity, prohibition. Senator Theodore F. Stevens, for instance, of Alaska has urged a reexamination of the federal government's authority to regulate firearms. He has also introduced a bill calling for mandatory prison terms for persons who use firearms during the commission of a federal crime. He declares, "My bill . . . would punish those who misuse firearms while preserving the constitutional right of law-abiding citizens to purchase and own guns and ammunition . . . More restrictive legislation would do nothing more than create a more lucrative black market in the sale of guns and ammunition . . ." and "leave peaceful citizens at the mercy of gun-brandishing hoodlums . . ."

Law-abiding gun owners have been the moving force behind the century-old work of the National Rifle Association to promote firearms safety, sportsmanship, conservation and marksmanship training. In short, gun owners have demonstrated an outstanding record of responsible citizenship that should put them beyond the reach of antigun fanatics in the exercise of a right that goes back to the founding of the nation. —Industrial News Review.

Let's Have Action

The Administration's plan to reduce seven of the cabinet departments to four would be a major advance toward improving the federal structure.

The four new ones would be the Departments of Community Development, Human Resources, Natural Resources, and Economic Affairs. This would require restructuring the present Departments of Interior, Agriculture, Commerce, Labor, Health-Education-Welfare, Housing and Urban Development, and Transportation. The Departments of State, Treasury, Defense, and Justice would be untouched.

An estimated \$5 billion a year savings could be realized. However, both elected officials and federal workers are expected to resist change.

Public support for Congressional consideration of this plan is essential to keep it from becoming lost in the shuffle of partisan politics and apathy. A \$5 billion incentive should be enough!

Coalition Means Red Take-over

Many people believe that a coalition government is the solution to the war in South Vietnam. A coalition sounds good, but it will not work out where Communism is concerned. We should learn the lesson of Eastern Europe. In Bulgaria a coalition government was formed in 1944. By 1947 the heads of all three non-Communist parties had either been executed or exiled.

In Romania, the Fascists were overthrown in 1944 and replaced by a coalition government. By 1947 the Communist takeover was complete. In Hungary, a coalition government was set up in 1944. By 1948 the Communist takeover was complete.

In Poland in 1944 a coalition government was formed. By 1947 the Communists had either imprisoned or exiled all opposition. In Czechoslovakia a coalition government was formed in 1945. By 1948 the Red takeover was complete. And all this was in spite of the fact that Stalin signed an agreement at Yalta for the liberation of Europe, and promised that the Soviet Union would not impose Communism on Eastern Europe.

In the Far East, General Marshall tried to force a coalition on the Nationalist Chinese government. In so doing he demoralized the Chinese Army and paved the way for a takeover by Mao Tse-tung. Vietnam has already had one tragic experience with a coalition government. Within 18 months after a coalition government was formed in Hanoi, Ho Chi Minh had taken over, having forced the Emperor to abdicate.

For the Communists, a coalition is only a stepping stone toward bringing about full dictatorship of the Communist Party. The battle for Vietnam is the battle for a free South-east Asia, with its 230 million people. It was the fall of China that led to the Korean war a year later, and to the Vietnam war a few years after the Korean war ended. Letting the Communists into a "coalition government" in South Vietnam would not lead to peace; it would be the surest path to further war. —U. S. Press Assn.

Maybe there is something to the reincarnation theory, judging by the way some people come back to life at quitting time. Current developments in troubled spots around the globe indicate that everybody is smoking the pipe of peace, but nobody is inhaling.

'71 Wheat Program**

Producers participating in the wheat program were reminded today by Chester Calhoun, Chairman of the Cooke ASC County Committee, that all acres of wheat, and set-aside acres for producers signed in the wheat program only must be certified to by May 1. Mr. Calhoun further explained that producers participating in the wheat program have agreed to set aside an area equal to 75% of their domestic wheat allotment. "Set-aside acres," he explained, "are acres on which no harvesting will be carried out. This land must be protected from erosion, weeds, insects, and rodents. No grazing will be allowed between April 30 and October 1. "In addition to the set-aside acreage, every farmer must maintain his conserving base which represents the acres of cropland which are normally used for hay, pasture, and other conserving uses", Calhoun concluded.

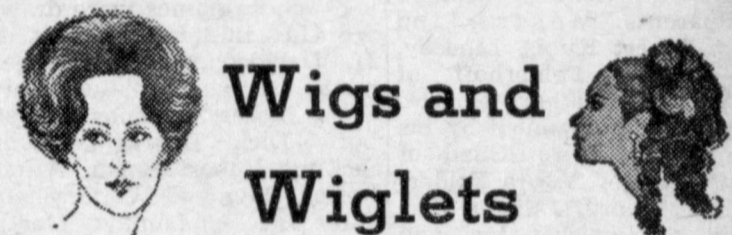

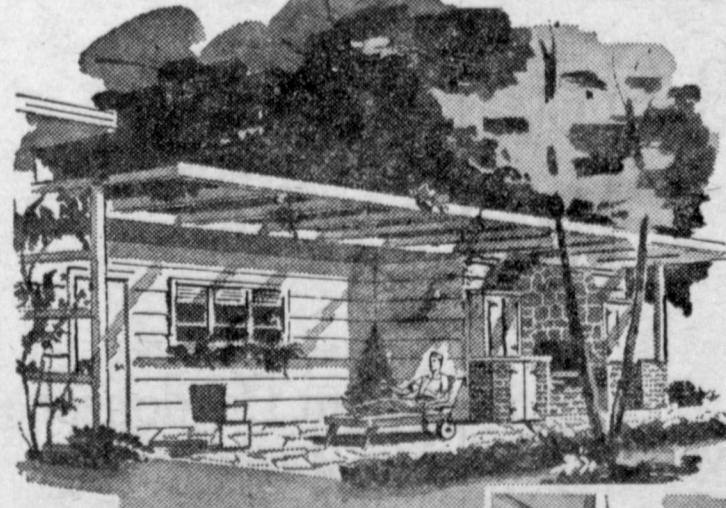

to bring the most of them back. Critics ought to think it over, too. It's time for them to realize that others, like themselves, want to get out. Perhaps this method isn't as speedy as the one they favor, but it also has far less chance of ending in a horrible debacle. It's high-time for them to quit their griping, just in case their cooperation would improve our soldiers' chance of survival.
