Ordinance OKd Has Observance of For Speed Zones Sth Anniversary Muenster Veterans of Fore- On Hy. 82 in City

An ordinance to achieve better traffic control on Highway with 81 chapter members, the 82 in Muenster was passed by the City Council in its reg-April 24 and 25 at the post ular session Monday night. It home beginning with a dance included a number of changes which had been recommended by the Texas Highway Department on the basis of a survey conducted on that portion of the highway.

According to Steve Moster, city superintendent, the ordinance specifies four speed zones within the city limits and another zone east of town at the approach to the east city.

A west bound car going through will find a sign near the convergence of the divided

roads marking entry of the 55 m.p.h. zone. Another sign at the city limit marks entry of the 45 m.p.h. zone. A sign at Hickory, by the flashing signal, marks entry of the 35 m.p.h. Main Street, at the stop and go traffic lights, is the entry of

the 45 m.p.h. zone leaving town. A sign at or near the bridge west of town marks entry of the 55 m.p.h. zone leaving town. And regular highway speed may be resumed at a sign by the west city limit a few hundred yards farther west.

The same zoning applies to east bound traffic. That is, slow to 55 at the west city limit, to 45 at the bridge and to 35 at the traffic light - unless stopped by the light then increase to 45 at the flashing light, to 55 at the city limit and to highway speed where the road divides.


Moster said that the ordinance will become effective as soon as the highway department installs the signs. He also said that the survey indicated excessive speed coming into town from both sides, but the drivers were not at fault because they were not properly informed.

Theme of Law Week 1971 is 'Channel Change Through Law and Reason.'


Mr. Smith explained the theme which would change the riots and unlawful carrying-on actually enacted in court rooms.




