

Jerry Klement Is Graduate with PhD Degree from NCSU





it is detrimental to racial relations. Being denied the right to go where one pleases is not conducive to a favorable attitude.

It is hard to see anything but bad in the railroad strike set off Monday by signalmen. If the disputing parties continue the stalemate for a long time they can cause serious economic troubles, slowing down the flow of both raw materials and finished products to a mere trickle. Since more than half of the country's goods moves by rail we can imagine what will happen to retail store stocks and to the materials used in factories. Perishable food will rot while consumers do without. Factories will have to shut down and workers will lose their jobs.

At best the parties will compromise on the demands and settle in a hurry, but it will still cause a nudge on the inflationary spiral. It will contribute to the trend which is gradually eroding the value of our money, which is in fact stealing from people who have saved, which has made a mockery of the virtue of thrift.

Indications are that the federal government will take a hand in settling the dispute. And we hope the solution will include the new proposal in which each side makes its best offer and an arbitrator selects one of them. This seems lots more sensible than the traditional head-butting negotiations.

Muenster-Bulcher Voters Turn Down **All Amendments**


Muenster voters went along with the rest of the county Tuesday in both their turnout and their choice. According to a report from Election Judge B. J. Swirczynski, the combined percincts of North Muenster, South Muenster and Bulcher polled only 128 votes and all four of the amendments were rejected.

Local results were as follows. On No. 1, the ethics commission and pay raise amendment: 26 for and 101 against. On No. 2, allowing amend-Patsy Luttmer and ments to be proposed in spec-ial sessions: 33 for and 94 against. On No. 3, for ending the ceiling on welfare pay-ments to needy blind, aged and disabled and setting a \$55 million ceiling on aid to families of dependent children: 35 for and 93 against. On No. 4, for issue of bonds to improve local sewer plants: 44 for and 87 against.

Total voting in the county was 990, about 10 per cent of the eligibles, and the results were as follows. No. 1: 262 for and 719 against. No. 2: 314 for and 666 against. No. 3: 378 for and 603 against. No. 4 426 for and 556 against.

Statewide the first three proposals were defeated and the fourth was approved.

Another issue on the ballot in 46 Texas counties was legalizing liquor by the drink. It received overwhelming approval in all of the counties.
