



Supporters of Dolph Briscoe in Saturday's Democratic primary runoff really have but one thing to fear, and that's complacency. Naturally they are inclined to take his victory for granted because his strong lead in the first primary was not far short of a majority over the entire field. So, now it's easy to assume that he will have no problem getting the comparatively few required votes from the candidates who were eliminated.

That kind of overconfidence prompts a person to think that Briscoe has it in the bag and doesn't really need one's vote. After which one might discover that too many had the idea, allowing that woman to win by default.

This week is the time to realize that Texas is very near to assuring an improvement in government, but the change still is not certain. Briscoe backers can't afford to take a chance now. They've got to turn out Saturday and make sure to finish the job. They've got to turn the top spot of state government over to a man who has shown his preference for the sound conservative principles which used to prevail.

In campaign developments of recent weeks Farenthold continues preaching that kind of liberal political philosophy which is more likely to intensify troubles than to solve them. For instance she favors forced busing of school children to achieve racial balance even though bitter experience has shown busing to be the country's outstanding social and educational blunder. It's a waste of tax money and of children's time. It retards children, removes them from their own neighborhood and keeps parents miles away from the children's school. A referendum in the first primary shows that Texas wants no part of it, but Sissy wants it for Texas. Briscoe, on the other hand says that he wants better education, not race mixing.

Regarding taxes, Farenthold makes a bid for the "people's" vote by proposing a corporate income tax and other soak the rich schemes. In that the woman by-passes a very obvious fact of the business world. She ought to know by now that corporations would not really be the taxpayers. If forced to pay they'd do as they have always done — just add the tax to the price of goods or service they sell to us.

This fallacy is partly responsible for the mess we already have. Politicians have been buying votes by promising things to be paid by soaking the rich. In reality they were soaking us other people who deal with the rich.

Briscoe has the better idea on this subject. He thinks the smart course is to give first attention to the spending, restricting the state's want list to a program that can be paid out of existing revenue. Old timers especially can appreciate that attitude. They remember the old advice of living within one's means.

The two also differ sharply on the marijuana issue. Sissy wants to reduce the penalty, inevitably allowing an increase in drug traffic. Briscoe thinks the drug laws should be tougher, also that quantity in possession should be a factor in assessing penalty.

Through the list of issues one fact stands out. Farenthold is strong on liberalism. She's the spokesman for a number of social elements who demand more leniency for drug addicts, more clemency for criminals, more money and less work for those who seek something for nothing, more power for labor bosses who already have fouled up the country's economy. All of those elements have big hopes for Sissy because they know that if she gets the job they'll get more liberties and handouts at the expense of average people.

We who want the more responsible state government should make sure not to let that happen. No matter how confident we feel we definitely ought to vote Saturday.

There's some satisfaction, too, in knowing that we'll help decide several other important races Saturday. Besides Briscoe-Farenthold there's Sanders-Yarborough, Connally-Hobby and Creighton-Holmes, an important and interesting ballot that merits every voter's attention.

While government is designed to serve the people, it cannot be expected to support all of them.

Membership Drive Begun by Jaycees

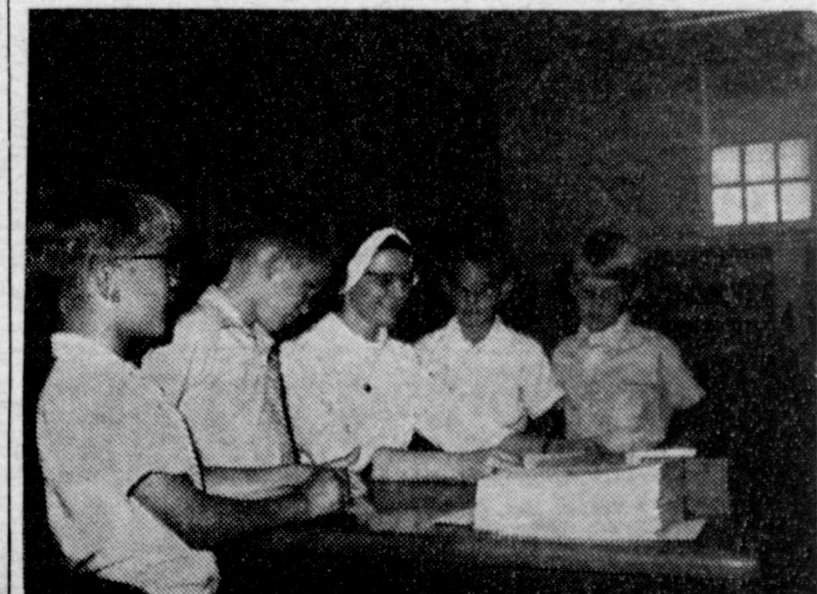

Sister Alberta of SH School Gets Certification as Language Therapist

Sister Alberta Krebs, OSB, special reading teacher at Sacred Heart Grade School has received her certification as a language therapist from the Language Training Center at Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas. She studied under Dr. Lucius Waits on a scholarship given by the hospital.

She is the only language therapist in this area and has acquired a wide reputation for working with students who have reading disabilities, including dyslexia in school classes and private tutoring.

Sister Alberta has been actively engaged in this special training the past three years. She received her BS degree from St. Mary College, Xavier, Kansas, and did graduate work at ETSC, Commerce, and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

She directs two different programs at Sacred Heart. With the addition of a complete reading laboratory at the school this past year, she initiated the EDL (Education Development Laboratory) program with sixth graders and

older students. She also conducted night classes for high school students. This program is aimed at improving reading and listening skills.

The Language Training program, now in its third year at the school, is Sister Alberta's other project and directly involves her therapy training.

A language therapist, it is explained, is one who has been trained at the graduate level to re-train individuals with severe language disability. Since the problem is a medical one, the therapist's training is medically oriented and directed. Language Therapy, in short, is a medically prescribed treatment for language disability. It differs from other approaches to teaching language skills in that the therapist must follow precise procedures and exercises.

The student learns to replace habits of guessing with deliberate, conscious thought processes and through drill, can learn to function at the automatic level in reading, writing and spelling.

After two to three years of language training, a student should be able to go into the EDL reading program.

In the combined program Sister Alberta has worked with 147 students at the school and three private students the past year.

Sacred Heart reading lab is set up for groups of eight students to work in each area, with each working at his own lesson at his own pace. In all, about 40 students can work in the lab at one time. Eight students, for example, might be working at controlled readers, another eight at listening stations, and other groups in other areas.

Harvest Featured By Good Yield, Good Weather

One of the shortest wheat harvest seasons remembered here is about to end. As of Wednesday the indication was that little if any will be left by the end of the week.

The season is also featured by a remarkable yield, which probably is the best here for all time. The average crop, as gathered from scattered reports by local farmers, is at least in the mid thirties, and possibly near forty. Very few reports fell below 30 bushels and a number of them were above 40. Also a few were in the high forties and at least one report was over 50.

However quantity does not match the quality. Persistent wet weather last fall limited planting to about half of the normal acreage. The net result was that people got to harvest about half their usual acreage, so they were able to finish in a hurry.

And their operation was hastened by ideal harvest weather. There hasn't been a day of delay because of rain. In fact, farmers generally would have been highly pleased with a few days of delay while other vegetation got a soaking. The grain would not have been hurt, but ranges and row crops are hurting.

The oats crop too seems to be doing fine, though not as good as wheat. Harvesting is just started, except that which was cut down early for baling. Like the wheat, it's limited in acreage and the yield is better than average.

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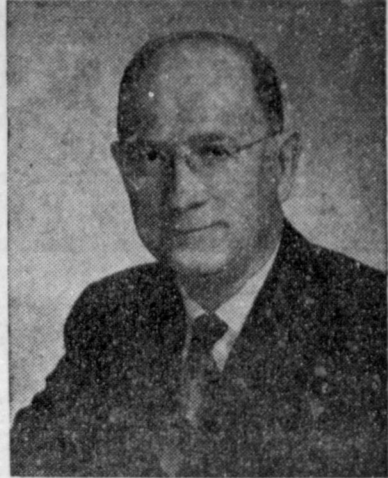

Skelton and two other Texas businessmen were named to the TP&L board. They are Marvin Gibbs of Paris and R. E. Roberts of Cleburne.

Skelton was executive vice president and general manager of TP&L and joined the Company in 1937. He served in the executive department in Dallas and as district manager in Cleburne and Paris and division manager in Irving. He is a native of Corsicana.

Austin became president of TP&L in 1967. Previously, he served as executive vice president and assistant to the president. He joined TP&L in 1959 after spending six years as an official of Industrial Generating Company at Rockdale.

Lynch, an area civic, business and agricultural leader, joined TP&L in 1923 and worked his way up through the engineering and power departments in both the Dallas office and in the field. He was elected vice president in 1936 and executive vice president in 1947. He became president in 1949.

4th Graders Hear Resource Speakers

The final two weeks of the school year in Mrs. Barbara Robison's fourth grade at Muenster Public School got a very definite lift from four resource speakers as a grand finale in science.

Tom Fluker, school counselor talked about building and flying model airplanes, including his experience in model plane contests across the state. He explained the science of flying the models — getting them off the ground and controlling them in flight.

His program included a display of three model planes which students were permitted to examine. And he illustrated his talk by pointing out the parts of a plane and their functions and by chalk board drawings. Along with that he answered questions for the children.

The next speaker's subject was the real thing rather than a model. Henry Weinzapfel, a pilot, talked about airplanes and requirements for a pilot's

license. Next he landed his plane on a field near the school and the class walked over to see it. He explained the plane in detail and made short take-offs and landings then allowed the children by two to come into the cockpit and see the controls.

Ernest Jaska of Texas Power & Light Co. talked and demonstrated on electricity. He discussed the many uses of electricity also generation and transmission, and supplemented his talks with drawings. He warned that electricity is man's friend but will be an enemy if not handled with respect.

More on the subject was provided by Kenneth Selby, TP&L lineman. He brought in standard equipment and tools for his job and put on the full set of gear he uses in his work. His demonstration especially emphasized the need of keeping alert and observing safety regulations at all times.

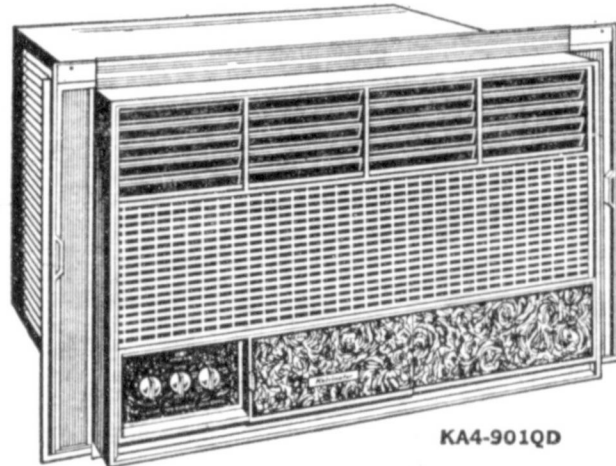

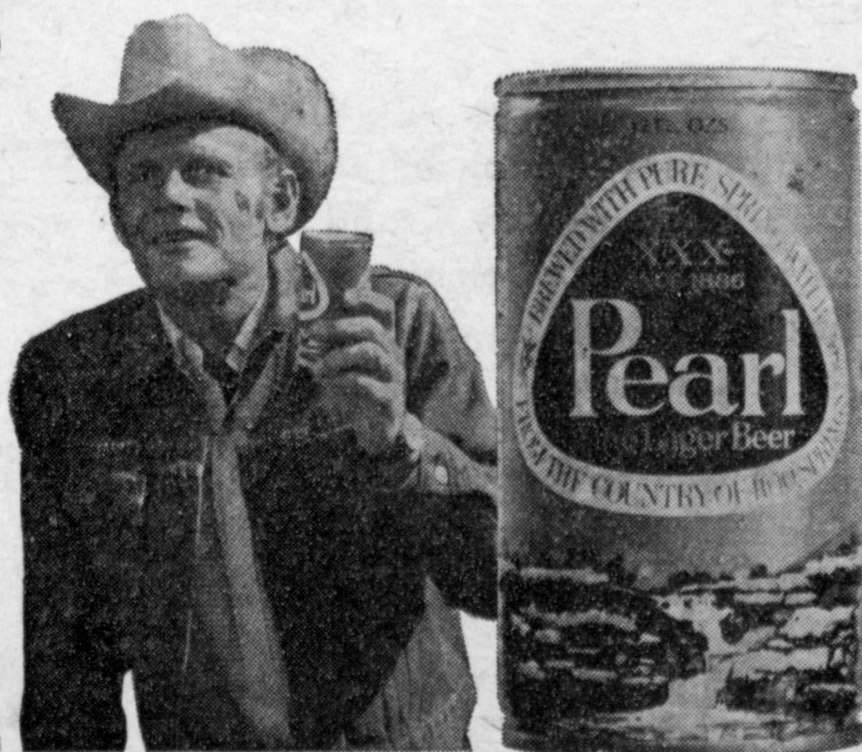
