Sperry Is First On Lecture Series At Garden Center

Neil Sperry, landscape horticulturist of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, garden editor of the Dallas Morning News and a TV and radio commentator, will be the first speaker of a Lawn and Garden Lecture Series, beginning on Tuesday, December 2 at 10 a.m.

Sponsored by Muenster Garden Center, his talk will be held in the Garden Center Lecture Room at 502 North Main. There will be no admission charge. Mr. Sperry will emphasize indoor landscaping (plants for indoors) and have a list of 12 best plants to use, lighting for plants, and general care of plants. He also has offered to help anyone having special problems with pot plants. They may either bring the question or the plant to show. The meeting is open to the public.

Periodically, lectures will be offered by Muenster Garden Center during the year, on various timely articles according to season. Topics to be covered are fruit trees, their planting, pruning and care; roses; autumn and spring bulbs; macrame' and instructions during class on how to make pot hangers, wall plaques etc.; bedding plants; general landscaping and other topics.

Ambulance Service Drive Ends Dec. 2

Still straining every effort to enroll the required membership for establishing ambulances in Cooke County, Professional Ambulance Service has postponed its deadline 1 day, until Tuesday, December 2.

"If the goal is not reached by then, we'll just have to admit failure," Larry Running of the Dallas based organization said this week.

He also said that the campaign's failure would be distressing news to the county. With the old service provided by funeral homes closing out on December 15, the county will have no ambulance service. Then its only solution to the problem would be to set up a tax supported plan.

The system proposed by Professional Ambulance Service is a prepaid membership plan similar to insurance. The membership costs \$25 per family and \$15 per individual, and it entitles the member to free ambulance service within a radius of 50 miles, plus \$1 per mile beyond that distance.

For a minimum of 3000 members the company will locate two ambulances in the county, both to be located at Gainesville. For an additional 1500 members it proposed to locate a unit also at Muenster, however that number now appears to be out of reach and the drive's immediate goal is 3000.

When Kindness Was a Mistake

Giving a helping hand to someone in trouble turned out to be a costly mistake for aging Edd McGannon Saturday. At about 6:30 p.m. two "young boys" knocked on his door and asked for permission to use his phone. He asked them to go somewhere else but they kept pounding on the door and saying they had car trouble. Eventually he let them in, and discovered his mistake after they were gone. McGannon assumes that they wanted only the money and have probably thrown away the wallet and the rest of its content. Also, he's hoping that the wallet will be found and returned to him.

He was a veteran of World War I, a member of the VFW and Knights of Columbus and a retired superintendent at Humble Oil Company. He is survived by his wife and two children and several grandchildren. Funeral services were delayed until the arrival of a son employed by an oil company in Tripoli. Edd McGannon was unable to attend the last rites.

UF Drive Scheduled To End December 3

United Fund workers have made their rounds in Muenster, leaving with every business firm a packet of forms for listing personnel along with pledges and donations.

Bill Bedrick, community chairman, said that the packets will be picked up on or before Tuesday of next week so that the drive can be cleared on the deadline date of December 3. He urgently asks all to see their employees

soon in order to have the information ready when the workers return.

Bedrick also noted that community coverage is far from complete, because there are many persons not included on the list of firms contacted. He reminds them that their help is urgently needed and they can join in the good work by notifying him or one of the workers.

Those workers are David Bright, John Pangel, Albert Lippe, Henry Weinzapfel, Butch Fisher, J. D. Meurer, Alvin Fuhrman, Dan Hamric, Lennie Haverkamp, Dennis Hess and Bernice Sicking.

The local quota this year is \$2,000, which actually is close to the amount budgeted for local participation in the \$70,000 county goal. Besides \$1,075 set aside for the Muenster Youth Program, the community shares in the amounts that will be received by Red Cross, 4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, plus possible help from the Diabetic Foundation and the Council on Alcoholism.

This year's UF program has been budgeted as follows. Red Cross \$8,675, Boy Scouts \$7,700, Campfire Girls \$6,050, Council on Alcoholism \$550, 4-H & FFA \$3,300, Gainesville Boys Club \$19,243, Muenster Youth Program \$1,075, Salvation Army \$7,900, Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$7,700, Texas Rehabilitation Hospital \$550, Administration and Campaign expense \$6,257.

Combining the needs of the ten participating agencies into a single goal is a definite service of the United Fund. This method enables donors to meet their public responsibility in one campaign rather than several. Likewise it provides a voluntary method of meeting the obligations rather than turning them over to the county and state for support through taxation.

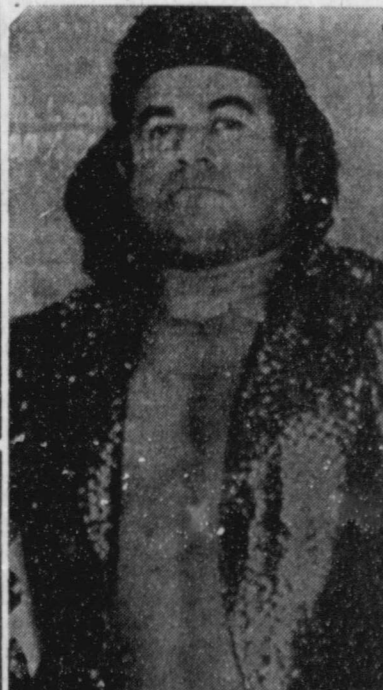

City Council Sets Public Hearing on 2 Street Projects

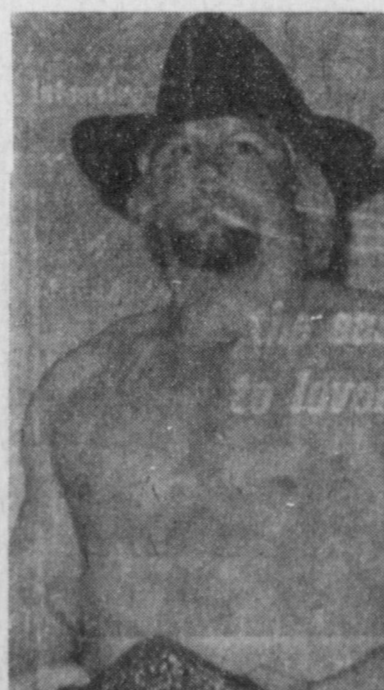

Texas Farm Bureau Reports All Time Membership High

WACO — Texas Farm Bureau has shown an increase in membership for the 23rd consecutive year, according to Carrol Chaloupka, president of the state's largest general farm organization.

Official tabulations just completed show that the TFB now has 180,470 member families in the organization, an increase of 14,254 over last year's total, Chaloupka announced. The TFB's membership year runs from Nov. 1 to Oct. 31.

All of the 210 organized county Farm Bureau organizations had an increase for the third year in a row, the Dalhart grain and livestock farmer said.

"This phenomenal increase in membership indicates farmers and ranchers are depending more and more on organized efforts to solve their problems," Chaloupka said. "Among the more serious problems facing agriculture in the past 12 months has been government and union interference with grain exports, restrictive environmental regulations, and the continuing increases in costs of production."

The ten largest counties in the state in membership size are (1) Harris—2,811; (2) McLennan—2,632; (3) Fayette—2,456; (4) Fort Bend—2,452; (5) Ellis—2,441; (6) Van Zandt—2,387; (7) Wharton—2,319; (8) Bell—2,014; (9) Nacogdoches—1,918; and (10) Hidalgo—1,887.

The Texas Farm Bureau was founded in Texas in 1921, but had ceased functioning by the early 1930s. In 1934, it was reorganized as the Texas Agricultural Association. The name was changed back to Texas Farm Bureau a few years later when it again affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The AFBF is the largest general farm organization in the world with 2.5 million family members in more than 2,800 counties in all states except Alaska.
