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Texas Utilities Company, of which TP&L is a member, has just earned the gratitude of all its customers by refusing to add a \$36 million anti-pollution scrubber in the lignite fueled generating plant now under construction in East Texas. The installation had been ordered by the Texas Air Control Board.

The firm's board chairman quotes environmental experts plus the FPC to the effect that scrubbers are not technologically feasible. On the other hand they create a solid waste that is actually detrimental to the environment. He expects lots of public indignation a few years hence when people discover that hundreds of millions of dollars have been wasted on scrubber systems that spread gunk all over East Texas.

Those people don't need to be told who paid for the scrubbers. They're not misled by that old line about the rich corporations being able to pay. They know that this, and tax, and any other expense eventually has to be paid by the customers.

It's gratifying to hear that someone has finally decided to talk back to the environmentalists. Our country has had more than its share of Naderism, which uses its professed concern for our welfare as a motive for pushing us around. It's the well known attitude that the bureaucratic experts know what is best for us, so we have to live by their orders. It's a long way from harmonizing with our concept of freedom or fiscal responsibility. By what right do they insist on the brainstorms of questionable value and leave us to pay the bills? More power to Texas Utilities. Hopefully this is the beginning of a trend that will get across the country.

Still on the subject of piling expense on us individuals, we have a newsletter this week from Senator Lloyd Bentsen saying that government presently churns out ten billion sheets of paper work for small business each year, enough to fill fifty major league stadiums. Just to print, shuffle and store all this paper costs government an estimated \$18 billion a year, to be paid of course, by taxes.

But that's only the beginning. Estimated cost to the nation's business men for filling out the many forms is another \$18 billion a year. All of which, like the environmental brainstorms, become a part of business expense, which has to be paid by customers.

Bentsen says he's sponsoring a bill to study the paperwork problem and possibly arrive at a solution. Without doubt a lot of ways can be found to save money, but what makes the senator think that the Washington politicians will allow jobs to be taken away from their bureaucratic friends?

A report from the American Automobile Association says that the nation's traffic fatalities in June were 20 per cent under those of June, 1973, also that the figures for June were 1.4 per cent better than a year ago. The idea was to present figures showing that the 55 MPH speed limit is reducing the number of car crashes. It's a point worth remembering as we drive along under the legal limit and notice how many cars are whizzing past. Life is more secure when we resist the urge to step on it.

Less compelling perhaps, but other good reasons to drive slower are economy and conservation of a very vital source of energy. The AAA Gas Watchers have a slogan "Make 5 do for 6", which can be achieved partly by slowing down, partly by cutting out unnecessary driving and partly by improving driving habits — such as avoiding jumpy starts, alternate accelerating and braking, etc. The AAA estimates that these methods could reduce the nation's oil consumption a million barrels a day.

As long as we can get gasoline every time we go to the pump we are inclined to ignore the slogan. Though griping about the price we go on using it lavishly without bothering to think that this resource, like all the others, is limited. We don't know when it will be exhausted, but surely we can understand that we're going to be in trouble if the supply runs low before the other energy sources become available.

Hornets Pluck Eagles 21-6

Homecoming fans of Muenster High Friday night had the pleasure of seeing their favorites clobber the previously undefeated Valley View Eagles 21-6, and also mark up their own fourth win in as many starts.

The game was a picnic for Mark W "Curly" Sicking, who romped for a total of 271 yards, and for Bob Endres, who stepped off a total of 102, while Mark L. Sicking and Mark Mollenkopf helped account for the rushing total of 402.

By comparison the heralded trio of Eagle Steppers, Miller, Kuntz and Myers, had to settle for only 46 yards from the alert and scrappy Hornet defense.

However the Eagles are not to be denied their moment of glory. Theirs was the big play of the night, a bomb from Jeff Windle to Rusty Jones for 65 yards and a touchdown.

Opening the game the Eagles made a first down and missed by inches on fourth down of the next series. The Hornets also got a first down and fumbled on the next series.

After Valley View's kick on the next series MHS had to start from its 15. Sicking stepped off 41 in 3 carries, a penalty gave 15 for free and Bob Endres made 16 before fumbling on the 13.

Following that the Eagles made their only successive first downs of the game, getting back to midfield and punting. Then came an exchange of kicks after which the Hornets got going on a 73 yard scoring drive.

Postal Service Invites Patrons To Report Gripes

A Nationwide Consumer Service Program designed to improve and broaden the quality of mail service was announced today by Postmaster Virgil Henschel.

On Oct. 1, the U. S. Postal Service introduced a program at Post Offices across the nation to encourage mail users to register problems they may have with their mail service.

At the core of the program is a consumer service card, through which problems are identified and which postal managers attempt to expeditiously resolve.

The Consumer Service Program reflects Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar's determination that mail services to the public will be friendly, courteous and efficient, as well as speedy and reliable. Postmaster Henschel urged customers to bring their inquiries and complaints to the attention of postal personnel. And if people feel their problems have not been properly handled, the Postmaster said, they should see him personally.

To make it easier for a customer to make a suggestion or complaint about postal service, the new consumer service card will be available from letter carriers and at post offices.

According to Postmaster Henschel, the card is two postal cards with carbon paper between them. "One copy goes to me or a station superintendent so work can begin on the problem," he said. "The other goes to Postal Service Headquarters in Washington for cataloging and analysis. The cards will help management spot problem areas and trends and take corrective action if necessary."

The card should take no more than two minutes to fill out. The postmaster also said he and his staff are willing to discuss any problems, including lack of courtesy, irregularities in deliveries or collections, collection box convenience and postal office hours. "The whole point of this service program is to bring your problems and gripes out into the open where we can attempt to resolve them," Postmaster Henschel concluded.

Oversize Coons Await Hornets Friday at Frisco

Muenster Hornets will have to rely on coordination, quickness and speed Friday night when they take on the oversize Coons at Frisco. They will be at a definite disadvantage in weight and strength, so they hope to compensate by getting the jump on the big boys and possibly spring a few break-away plays.

Now holding a 4-0 record the Hornets have done a great job so far, especially on defense and the rushing game. Following their 21-6 win last week over twelfth rated Valley View, Coach Jones said the boys played "another fine game, in spite of four fumbles. Another weakness was completing only two out of ten passes. Improvement in those areas is urgently wanted for the tough games ahead. And it may be needed this week if Frisco's muscle starts showing."

The Coons will go into the game with a 1-3 season standing, however the losses are misleading because they have been to strong teams.

With the exception of Bert Walterscheid, all the Hornets came through last week's game in good condition. Bert has a sprain and is presently on the doubtful list for Friday.

New Ownership Takes Over Monday at Fisher's Market

The end of an old era and the beginning of a new one for Fisher's Market and Grocery will arrive next Monday when J. A. Fisher and J. W. Fisher turn over the ownership and operation of their store to Johnny and Francis (Butch) Fisher, both sons of J. A. Fisher.

Dating back to St. Patrick's Day 1927, the business was founded while the community's 1927 oil boom was still going strong and thrived for a few years until encountering the hardships of the great depression. Like some other business men who pulled through the hard times, the partners wondered several times whether their business would survive. The fruit of their labor was little inducement, and a possible reason for keeping going was that prospects were no better in any other business.

But conditions improved in the mid thirties with an upturn of the national economy and renewal of local oil field activity. Money was not plentiful but at least some was in circulation. Also, business volume picked up after the market added groceries in 1933.

The business started as a meat market with the two brothers and Walter Pulte and O. J. Huchton. Their sales, besides small quantities of cured meats, were principally fresh beef slaughtered and dressed the day before the sale. Neither they nor the customers had facilities for storing meat. Business was always best on Sundays when people returning home after church service got fresh meat as a change

from the usual diet of cured meat and chicken. Harvesting, too, was good for business. Thresher meals usually rated fresh meat, like Sunday.

During those early days the market averaged slaughtering and dressing a beef a day. Volume increased gradually as more customers moved into the area and, with the depression fading out, as people managed to have more beef meals. Besides, business picked up when people started buying in volume for freezer lockers and later for home freezers.

During their nearly fifty years, John and Joe can recall both high and low of the livestock market. In the thirties they bought fat cattle for \$3.00 per hundred and hogs for \$2.90. By comparison cattle have been to \$60 per hundred lately, and hogs now are \$63. But retail prices were in line with the livestock prices. Steak sold for 15 cents a pound and a government subsidy helped make ends meet.

Original location of the meat market was the Farmers Union building adjoining the old cheese factory and presently a part of the milk plant. After eighteen months it was moved to the location now occupied by Norbert Koesler and Ola Roberg. After the hard times business expanded there until it outgrew the space. When

Wilde Chevrolet moved into its new building the Fishers bought from Wilde and remodeled, more than doubling their floor space. They moved there on August 13, 1962.

Still another addition, completed in 1970, was a modern new slaughter house adjoining the back of the store. This facility replaced one that had been enlarged and improved a number of times since the market started in '27. The old one was two miles into the country on the farm of Joe Fisher Sr.

With the new facilities, the store has returned to meat as its principal business. And most of the meat is processed for home freezers, either custom slaughtering and processing or custom processing the market's meat. That department now has ten employees whereas the balance of the store has five.

From an average of 30 head per week when the processing plant was opened, the present average is near 60. Over half of that volume is for customers outside the county. The expansion speaks well for quality, service and price, considering especially that another slaughter and processing plant in the city is enjoying comparable success.

Tigers Blast Trojans 21-0

A fired up pack of Sacred Heart Tigers demolished Windthorst's Trojans 21-0 Saturday night on the Tiger field. The three touchdown margin was only a part of the story, as Sacred Heart led 305-87 in total gains and held the visitors to a yardage of minus 5 in the second half. And while the stubborn defense stopped the Trojans cold, the determined offense hammered away for steady gains.

First half was most a stalemate with seven punts, a fumble recovery, and two failures to convert on fourth down. The visitors got three scattered first downs and the Tigers two. The big play was a pass from Roger Endres to Fred Koesler for 55 yards to the 26, but the Tigers could not keep going.

However they took inspiration a few minutes late in the half when Bruce Fuhrmann blocked a punt and gave SH a start from the 42. Six plays reached the 20 and an interference call advanced to the 13. From there Endres hit

Mark Hess with a touchdown pass, with only 10 seconds left on the clock. Hess kicked true for an extra point.

Shortly after intermission the Tigers made two first downs from the 10 and got into foul trouble the third series and had to punt. Three

Then in close succession: a fumble recovery by Karl Koesler, an interception in the end zone by Windthorst, and a badly smeared play following a bad snap to the punter. It gave SH a set up with 15 to go. Two plays later a pass to Joe Sicking reached pay dirt and Hess booted an extra point as the scoreboard clock showed 8 minutes remaining in the final period.

Exchanges came frequently in the second half, five in all, three still waiting to happen. Windthorst had to kick ending the next series and got a nice fat break. The kick was fumbled and Trojans took possession on the Sacred Heart 44.

Two plays later, another fumble, recovered by Melvin Hess, sparked a drive that moved 24 yards to the 23 before Sacred Heart fumbled it away. Windthorst, still not able to go, kicked again putting the Tigers exactly in midfield. Next two tries gained 1, then Mark Hess broke through right tackle and suddenly found himself in the clear, and (Continued on page 10)

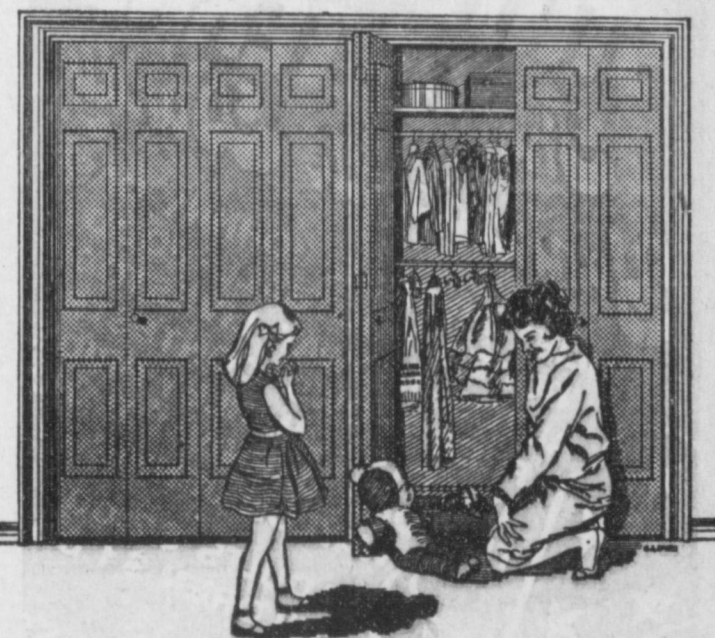
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Fleitmans Visit Kin in Germany

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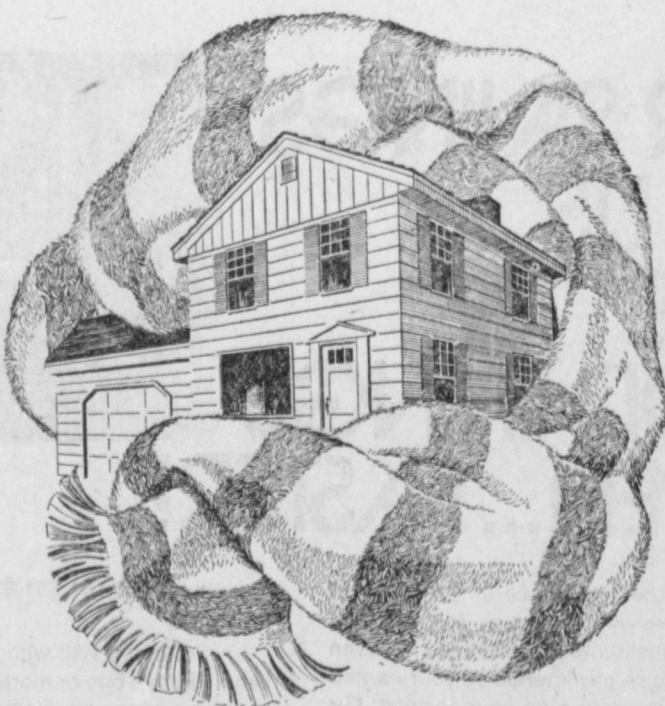
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Teachers Attend OLV Meeting on Teaching Religion
