Confrontations of State Fair officials with members of the Hare Krishna religious sect during this year's fair has resulted in a proposed change in the city ordinance requiring sect members to identify themselves adequately when soliciting funds. They would be expected to wear name cards showing their own names as well as the sect they are soliciting for.

Fair administrators said they received many complaints of improper sales practices by the solicitors, especially the failure to give proper change when a donation was given or a sale was made. There were cases when they refused to give any change, or even the item offered for sale, after payment was made.

Favorite victims of these leeches, of course, are the type of people who seem less able to cope with their methods. So officials of Dallas are considering the advisability of the name tags which can serve as a warning to everyone.

The suggestion appears to be reasonable, perhaps one to add to Muenster's recently passed ordinance which allows sects to call on local homes as a religious right. The solicitors are free to circulate as they wish, but proper identification would serve to warn people they attempt to bother, just as it would alert people in the crowds.

The irony of this situation is that a regulation which was intended to guarantee freedom of religion is being perverted so that religious phonies can impose on other people. At the fair their method was about the equivalent of stealing. In cities like ours the method was to set a trap enabling them to sue for denial of religious rights. We know as well as they that their intention was not to solicit in a respectful way but rather to be a nuisance, thereby provoking arrest or threat of arrest. It was, plain and simple, a scheme that defrauded our city of \$500. And the report is that it victimized other cities for considerably more.

All of which leads up to the big question: Can an organization using such methods be properly identified as religious? If so, it seems to us the name ought to be Satanism or anti-religion, because it is obviously out of harmony with the old time acknowledged spirit of religion. Legislators need to do some thinking about this situation... such as amending the clause on religious rights so as to nullify its application to the nullity of the constitution likewise ought to be thinking about a solution. After all, it should be some of its members are in cahoots with the religious fakes. They share the blame in bringing about the unethical suits. Well, if they are unethical, shouldn't they also be illegal? There were times when the law of the land was in harmony with the commandments of God. Now it seems we have too many exceptions, especially those favoring the Gods.

Another effort to do something about mistakes is cooking in the legislature now in the form of a proposed constitutional amendment reserving in the people of Texas at all levels of government the rights of initiative, referendum and recall. Governor-Elect Bill Clements made frequent mention of it in his campaign. Senator Ron Clower is laying the groundwork for submitting it to the next legislature. The amendment, if adopted would allow the people of the state or a subdivision thereof to submit a petition signed by a designated percentage of qualified voters in order to place a certain measure on the ballot for consideration, to veto measures enacted by the legislature or passed by local governments, and to recall public officials from all levels of state and local government.

These provisions are not contained in the present state constitution, but the author recommends them as a part of any democratic form of government... giving the people a stronger and more direct opportunity to participate in government.

If the majority of voters feel that a public official is not responsibly fulfilling his or her duties of office, if they do not approve of certain governmental action, or if they feel the need of a particular measure...

Johnnie French, 68 Dies of Coronary, Funeral Thursday

Survivors are his wife; one son, Robert French of Fort Smith, Ark.; two daughters, Peggy Louise Masters of Dana Point, Calif.; and Nancy Bright of Euless, one step-son, Bill Richter of Houston, one sister, Josephine Taylor of Fort Gibson, Okla., and five grandchildren.

Hornets Win First Trophy of Season In Slidell Tourney

Muenster High teams broke even in last week's tournament at Slidell, winning three of their six games. In addition, the boys team won the third place trophy, the first prize of the season for MHS, and a member of each team was selected as all-tournament. They are David Felderhoff with a three game total of 61 and Robin Walterscheid with a total of 44.

The Hornets started with a 60-55 win over Era, after surviving a strong fourth period rally in which they were outscored by 10 points. Todd Richey led the scoring with 24 and David Felderhoff was next with 19.

Next was the semifinal of the champ bracket, in which Richey received a second quarter injury and will be out of action indefinitely. From their 27-22 half time lead the Hornets gradually fell back to a 47-42 loss, the winner being Paradise. David Felderhoff led with 19, Ricky Winn had 7, Don Grewing 5, Todd Richey and Floyd Felderhoff each had 4 and Mark Felderhoff 3.

As semifinal loser MHS had a chance for No. 3 honor and rolled over Chico 63-33. David Felderhoff scored 23, Floyd Felderhoff 14 and Ricky Winn 12.

In the girls division MHS was clobbered 53-25 by Era as Kathy Davidson hit 6 and Robin Walterscheid and Renee Wilde each got 5.

Next game was better, however, with the outcome almost as one-sided the other way. After trailing 10-6 in the first quarter, Hornets had a big second for a 23-16 lead and coasted to their 46-33 win over Decatur. Robin Walterscheid made 24 points and Lou Dyer was next with 8.

Hornettes Lose 2 Games to Celina

Muenster High girls lost both of their games in a double header with Celina last week, the varsity by 55 to 45 and junior varsity 30-24.

The Hornets made a good start leading 15-13 and 27-26 in the first periods and falling behind in the second half. Top scorers were Robin Walterscheid 18, Kathy Davidson 11, Lou Dyer 8.

The JV Hornets were cold and hot. They trailed 0-6 the first quarter and led 11-8 at the half. Again in the third they fell behind 18-21 but could not overcome Celina's momentum in the fourth. Charlotte Fleitman was top scorer with 11 and Renee Wilde was next with 4.

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
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
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

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ure, they would have the power to take corrective action. They themselves could initiate the action by means of the petition. And with the petition they could call for a public referendum on their issue.

Actually these powers are already held by the legislature, but the new provision would serve as a constant reminder that people, too, have the power, and that the legislators now have more inducement than ever before to keep in line. It's conceivable that they will do a better job when they know the public can do something about it.



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


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
