On Sunday night's TV program, "60 Minutes," Ronald Reagan made a fine impression as a candidate for the Republican nominee for the presidency. He appears to be the kind of person who will be good for the country whether or not he wins the nomination and the election. The things he will say in his campaign are the principles upon which our nation grew and prospered.

It's high time to bring those principles back to public attention. They are so different from today's standards of a big central government operating through a maze of red tape and imposing enormous taxes on us; so different from the leniency which enables criminals to go free and deadbeats to get a free ride on welfare; so different from the country's official permissiveness with regard to pornography, violence and exploitation of sex.

In case he can rally sufficient support behind those principles, and also in case he is able to overcome the usual stout and well financed opposition of the other party, it is just possible that Reagan will bring some wholesome ideas to the presidency and make some long needed changes. If he fails to make the grade, well, at least the nation will have been favored by exposure to his message. Besides, it's easily imaginable that his political gospel will have a bearing on other contests, possibly influencing voters in other campaigns to lean in favor of candidates with traditional beliefs.

Mike Wallace, who conducted the TV program of Reagan, made a point of having Pat Brown, former California governor, refer to Reagan's apparent lack of compassion for the down-and-outers who live on welfare. The candidate answered that he is concerned with those who are actually in need, but he is also concerned with the millions of honest and hard working people who pay the taxes supporting the government with its extravagance, give away programs, graft and what not. He's for the programs that will reduce their burdens and restore their confidence in the country.

In fairness it must be admitted that Reagan is not far different from Ford on some issues. When he talks energy, for instance, he slaps the Congress and environmental cranks rather than the president. They are the characters who have failed after more than a year to get an energy program moving. His appeal might make a difference to the legislators, his pressure might be stronger.

"Our access to cheap and abundant energy has been interrupted, and our dependence on foreign sources is growing. A decade ago we had military superiority. Today we are in danger of being surpassed by a nation that has never made any effort to hide its hostility to everything we stand for."

Here again he seems to go along with President Ford. He's for making the US number one, but hopefully he can do a better job of selling that idea to the legislators. And we certainly hope he would do a better job at detente than Ford and Kissinger. Those two and the media say that US and USSR are getting along fine, when one incident after another tells us the reds are still working on their old time project of double crossing us and adding to their empire, behind the detente smokescreen.

Few observers can take issue with the issues outlined by Reagan in his opening statement. "In just a few years, three vital measures of economic decay — inflation, unemployment and interest rates — have more than doubled, at times reaching 10 percent and even more. Government at all levels now absorbs more than 44 percent of our personal income. It has become more intrusive, more coercive, more meddlesome and less effective."

## Boyd Announces For Re-election As District Judge

District Judge W. C. (Bill) Boyd has announced that he will seek re-election as District Judge of the 16th Judicial District, comprising Denton and Cooke Counties.

Judge Boyd was first elected District Judge in 1964 by the largest margin ever in a local contested election. He carried every voting box in both Denton County and in Cooke County. Before his term of office was to begin he was appointed District Judge by Gov. John P. Connally to fill the unexpired term of his predecessor, Judge Boyd is the senior district judge of Denton and Cooke Counties, which now also includes the 158th District Court of Denton, the 211th District Court of Denton, and the 235th District Court of Cooke County.

Judge Boyd has completed one of the most impressive records of any district judge in Texas. Of the more than 9,000 cases he has disposed of, less than one percent have been appealed. He has presided over trials of important cases throughout Texas at the request of the presiding judges of Texas' Administrative Judicial Districts.

Judge Boyd has spent his adult life in preparation for a judicial career. He earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Government from North Texas State University and his Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree from Baylor University. His legal experience includes 13 years of private practice of law and 12 years as district judge.

A veteran of World War II, he is a member of the First United Methodist Church of Denton. Judge Boyd and his wife, Betty, live at 2502 Sherwood in Denton. They have three children, Randall, an attorney in Flower Mound, Texas; Don, an attorney with the law firm of Vinson, Elkins, Connally, Searls & Smith, in Houston, and Barbara, a senior at Austin College, Sherman, Texas.

## Muenster Library Admitted to State Library System

Forty-six libraries in the 32-county area served by the Northeast Texas Library System have qualified for system membership for the fiscal year that began September 1. They are among 247 libraries that have qualified for membership in ten Texas systems. A total of 86 percent of all Texans are served by these system member libraries. As members, they are participating in activities to improve public library service in the region.

Among the 32 libraries qualifying for the Northeast Texas Library System are Muenster Public Library and Cooke County Library.

The regional systems are authorized under provisions of the Texas Library Systems Act and are supported by funds administered by the Texas State Library. In order to qualify for system activities, libraries must meet certain criteria concerning number of volumes, amount of local per capita support, and staff.

Each member participates in planning for system activities. Lay representatives from all member libraries attend the annual meeting of the Advisory Council at which council members are elected. The Systems Act gives the Major Resource Center responsibility for drawing up the annual program of service, and Rules and Regulations for its administration direct that the Advisory Council and librarians participate in formulation of the plan.

System funds are allocated according to a per capita formula. They may be used for a variety of cooperative activities including purchase of materials for local collections, development of film collections to which all system members have access, centralized purchasing of materials to obtain discounts for large orders, and technical assistance for small libraries. Books-by-mail and deposit collections extend service to persons who are isolated from library service.

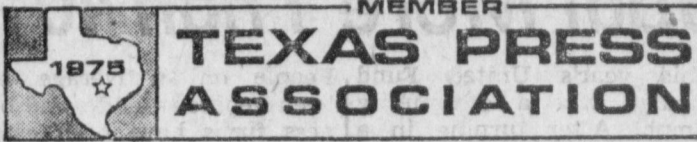

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**State FB Delegates Stand up on Issues**

SAN ANTONIO — Texas Farm Bureau retained its traditional stance in opposition to revision of the state constitution at its 42nd annual convention which ended here Wednesday (Dec. 3).

The some 1,159 voting delegates from 164 counties also took a slap at the Longshoremen's Union for its recent action impeding export shipment of grain sold for and went on record as opposing federal aid for "bailing out" state or local government units.

The total convention registration of more than 1,500 persons was a record attendance at a TFB convention, as was the number of voting delegates certified.

Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart was unanimously re-elected president for 1976 after two nominees — T. J. Richards of Paducah, outgoing longtime director of 14 years from District 3, and Bill Reed of Lamesa, District 7 director — both declined nomination in support of Chaloupka.

Most controversial issue — other than a proposed by-law amendment — was the brucellosis eradication which took some two hours to debate to resolve. When the air was cleared, the delegates had strengthened the organizations stand on eradication.

The approved resolution urges the Texas Animal Health Commission to "promulgate the necessary rules and regulations to achieve and maintain a certified bovine brucellosis free state as charged by the Legislature." Delegates said the present state constitution should be retained "since it is basically sound and can be amended at any time."

Concerning the Longshore-

men's action delaying grain shipments; delegates said that "exporting of agriculture products should be subject only to pertinent existing laws and that appropriately severe penalties be imposed on those who arbitrarily delay such exports." They further declared that "the judicial route should be followed to force labor to fulfill its contracts with shipping supplies in loading ships with export items," and that legislation should be passed making organized labor subject to the same antitrust laws as industry.

In other action during the two-day business session the delegates passed resolutions calling for a legislative study of the California plan or other state plans, with the aim of providing relief to Texas doctors.

They said county commissioners courts should be given authority to regulate sub-developments "due to the moving trend from metropolitan areas to rural areas."

A resolution was approved opposing legislation or regulation by federal or state government to control the withdrawal of under ground water for irrigation.

Voting delegates approved a resolution calling for the widening of farm-to-market roads "as funds become available," but voted down a resolution from the high plains calling for more comfort stations with restroom facilities along the state's highways.

TFB also wants more emphasis on maintenance of the present farm-to-market road system rather than new construction.

Many middle aged and elderly persons suffer from softening of the bones called osteoporosis, due to a gradual loss of calcium in the bones. They become brittle, deformed, and easily fractured. Bones contain 99% of the body's calcium. Studies over several years show that nearly all osteoporosis patients had a low calcium level in their diet, and that by drinking more milk, the calcium level in the body improved. To prevent bone softening, a daily intake of at least one gram of calcium (3 glasses of milk) plus adequate protein, vitamins D and C, is recommended.

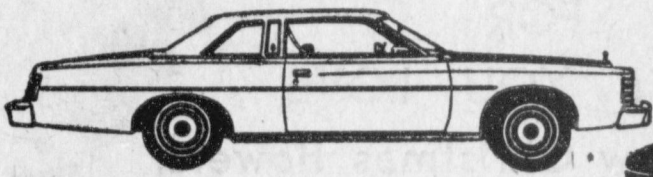

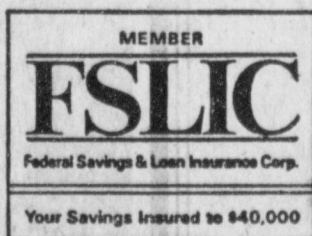

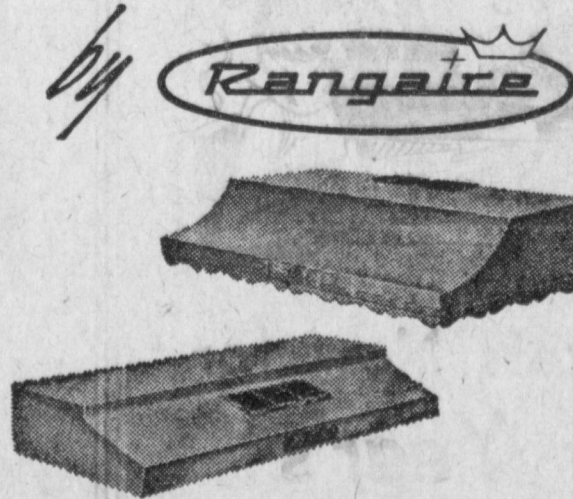

Mothers in North Central Texas have given their children the best Christmas gift of all—a safeguard against disease, their immunization shots.

According to Health Department statistics, Texas Region 5 which consists of 31 counties in the North Central area has had a 240% increase over 1974 in the number of children under one year who have been vaccinated against polio, pertussis, diphtheria, and tetanus. In the

under 4 age group, there has been a 12% increase in children vaccinated against measles, rubella and mumps in addition to the diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and polio vaccinations.

Health Department officials attribute the increase to the Immunization Awareness Campaign that they, along with the March of Dimes, other volunteer agencies, federal agencies, medical organizations have conducted for the past 3 years.

The Awareness Campaign was begun because in the past decade, the concern of parents and physicians over such diseases as polio and measles

has declined steadily. As the percentage of immunized children dropped, the diseases began to reappear. A number of cases of polio are still reported each year. Outbreaks of measles have begun to take place. Children are again suffering permanent disability, even death, from these preventable diseases. Health officials warn that local epidemics are possible and urge parents to begin immunization in early infancy, not to wait until school age since it might be too late by then.
