Farmcast, the weekly report of agri-business news from the office of John C. White, state commissioner of agriculture, discloses that the average size of a Texas farm at this time is 678 acres. That, he adds, is almost twice the size of an average farm for the nation.

He offers a few more interesting statistics, as follows. The state now has about 209, 000 farms whereas fifteen years ago it had 252,000 farms with an average size of 600

Also the total number of farms in the U.S. now is about 2,821,000, a decrease of about 23,000 in the past year. And the average size of a U.S. farm is 385 acres, an increase of almost 100 acres in the past 15

Total acreage of all Texas farms is estimated at 141,800, 000, whereas the nation has slightly more than a billion acres in farmland.

Considering the growing demand of the world market, that seems to be very good news.

We regret, of course, that the reds got the big bargain and we consumers had to pay for the skyrocketing price of grain. Even so, the price has not been so terrible. Our price of living has gone up about 10 per cent for the year whereas wheat price went up over 200 per cent.

In fairness we should take notice of a similar situation in gasoline prices. While crude oil prices rocketed the price of gas went up moderately. Regular, which sold at about 35 cents a year ago is up to 46 or 47 now. Or, going back considerably farther, we can recall that wages during the past two decades increased a lot more sharply than filling station prices did. Gasoline prices really aren't out of line. They're only catching up.

Many of us are inclined to feel sorry for ourselves nowadays while toughing out high prices and the energy crisis, but we could be lots happier realizing that things may not be as bad as they seem. Miseries are relative. A broken arm is more of an injury than a skinned knee but less than a concussion. Similarly the new conditions seem like a big problem when compared with the affluence we've become accustomed to, but they are still a lot better than those through which many of us have lived.

We can recall hard times of the depression, and plain living when we simply did not have the luxuries we have come to take for granted. So, when making comparisons let's think about the more remote experiences and acknowledge that we still have a lot to be thankful for.

Meanwhile a few cheers are in order. Necessity is forcing the country to overcome some of its extravagances and provide for the future. When it's over we'll be happy with the changes to a more sensible way of life and we'll even be proud of any belt tightening.

Schedule Changes At Sacred Heart

School will start a half hour earlier at Sacred Heart beginning next week. Father Placidus Eckart, superintendent, announced this week that class time effective Monday will be from 8 a.m. to 3:30 pm. Rural parents are reminded to expect the school buses a half hour earlier.

Postage Rates Go Up Saturday

Here we go again! The next advance in postal rates becomes effective Saturday, March 2, Postmaster Arthur Endres announced this week.

At that time the following rate increases will apply. Letters go up from 8 to 10 cents per ounce. Post cards go up from 6 to 8 cents. Airmail letters go from 11 to 13 cents per ounce, and airmail post cards go from 9 to 11 cents.

The new minimum rate for gretting cards and other third class mail will be 10 cents for the first 2 ounces, and this increase applies also to small packages.

International postage rates are similarly increased. Airmail rate to Europe is upped from 21 to 26 cents per half ounce and the airmail rate to South America is up from 17 to 21 cents per half ounce.

The increases were originally scheduled for January 5 but delayed to March 2 by the Cost of Living Council.

The increase is the third, and has doubled the price of letter postage in six years. In 1968 the stamp went up from 5 to 6 cents, then to 8 cents in 1971 and 10 cents in 1974.

In the memory of today's senior citizens the postage for a letter was only 2 cents. It went to 3 in 1932, to 4 cents in 1958 and 5 cents in 1963.





Ronnie describes Tom, who is now in the Army, as an "outstanding" runner. "I see if I can outdo him at comparable ages," Ronnie said, adding that he thinks he is doing "a little better" than his brother so far.

He runs from three to five miles four or five mornings a week on his own, and he runs from 10 to 15 miles in the afternoons as part of the team workout.

"I think I'm in the best shape I've ever been in," he said, "but there's different competition from high school."

He said Tom is trying out for the Army track team and eventually wants to return to school for his master's degree and then go into coaching. Ronnie, who is a P.E. major and biology minor, plans to coach track after graduating from North Texas, probably at the high school or junior col-





It is impossible to overemphasize the importance of promptly notifying the Social Security Administration, as well as the Post Office, of any change of address.

Notice can be given by mail, telephone, or in person at any social security office. The caller should be able to furnish his served to 31 guests including (the social security number of the person on whose account he gets benefits) as well as his new address - which includes the zip code.



TP&L Will Spend \$193 Million on Generating Plants

Texas Power & Light Company will spend \$193,116,000 for the construction of new facilities in 1974, J. F. Skelton, TP&L president, an-

The construction budget is the largest in the Company's 62-year history, and expenditures will allow TP&L to keep pace with the growing elec-Holy Childhood adoptions of trical demands of customers

> A large part of the expense is involved in the construction of eight major generating units. One major TP&L project now underway is a 775-000-kilowatt gas/oil - fueled generating unit at the De-Cordova Steam Electric Station near Granbury in Hood County.

> Additionally, TP&L is participating with Dallas Power & Light Company and Texas Electric Service Company in constructing three lignitefueled units at the Monticello Steam Electric Station near Mount Pleasant in Titus County. Two units will be 575,000 kilowatts in size and the other 750,000 kilowatts. Four 750,000 kilowatt lignite-fueled units at the Martin Lake Steam Electric Station near Tatum in Rusk County are also under construction.

In addition, TP&L recently announced plans to build a 750,000-kilowatt lignite-fueled generating unit near Athens in Henderson County.

In 1972, the three companies announced plans to build two 1,150,000-kilowatt nuclear generating units near Glen Rose. The first plant is scheduled for completion in 1980 and the second in 1982. Construction of walker. the nuclear facility is subject to approval of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Also in 1974, the Company will build or improve transmission lines, distribution lines, substations or switching stations in numerous parts of its service area.

As back in 1970, his purpose will be to prevent the sales of those products to the extent that growers will again be forced to sign an agreement to hire none but the members of his UFW. Now as then Chavez will claim that he's dedicated to the worker, and again he'll be lying. The Little Ceasar is concerned only with getting back some 70,000 captive members and their payments of tribute.

The fact is that the workers want no part of him. They refused to join before the 1970 boycott, which eventually ended in surrender by the growers and enslavement of the workers. But growers broke away from him in 1973, so he's starting the old campaign again. He plans to have 3000 agitators in 65 cities very soon, trying to put the squeeze on growers as before.

There's a difference this time, however, that could cramp the dictator's style. More people are wise to his real motives. Also more are fed up with his years of whining half truths. They know this time that the way to help workers is to buy, not boycott, the lettuce, grapes


