A story of that kind is told about a primary race in California. Two candidates ended Made. Let us rejoice and be in a tie and the two contenders drew lots in the presence of the secretary of state for the party's nomination. The incumbent lost and from there sank into political oblivion. The sad ending of this is that the man's secretary on election day was too busy with office work to go and cast her vote.

The lady lost her job by one vote, but she was lucky compared with Charles I of England who was condemned to execution by one vote.

Many other cases are on record of history being drastically changed by a single vote. For instance, Oliver Cromwell, in 1645 became virtual dictator of England by a margin of one vote. And in 1776 just one vote decided whether the language of this country would be English or German.

Also, a single vote in the national congress was the margin by which our state of Texas was admitted into the United States. It was also the margin by which President Andrew Jackson was saved from impeachment.

Two of our presidents, Thomas Jefferson and John Quincy Adams were elected by a single vote in electoral






4-H'ers Shine in District; Will Go To State Roundup

His victory by a single vote was contested and the issue was referred to a commission which decided in favor of Hayes, again by one vote. And, believe it or not, the congressman who cast that decisive vote was sent to Washington by just one vote.

Many other stories bring out the fact of one vote's importance. In 1876 France changed from a monarchy to a republic by just one vote. And in 1923 Adolph Hitler was placed in lead of the Nazi party by a single vote. More than 250 years ago the British House of Commons chose the House of Hanover as the royal family by one vote. Even now Queen Elizabeth can credit that vote for her throne.

We'll never know for certain whether the nation's survival ever depended on a single vote, but it was at least important if not vital in 1941 when Congress decided by just Parish in Muenster. one vote to continue the military draft.
