Muenster has rural electrification! Current to farmers first surged through the lines at 8:30 Tuesday morning. Meter installation is going forward at full speed. Drilling and leasing activity south of Muenster peeps up. Throat infection is fatal to baby son of the George Gehrigs. Community is alarmed over the epidemic of throat infections. More than 100 persons hear talks by priest, minister and rabbi, speaking at Gainesville, to defend Americanism. Cemetery committee buys power mower.

April 28, 1944

Clarence Hoehn is victim of airplane crash at Galveston, funeral service with military honor will be here for the young pilot, a former gunner who saw action with the 19th Bombardment group over Lae, New Guinea. Joe Trachta's drug store is robbed of \$400 cash Sunday. Muenster hosts KC initiation with 42 candidates. Servicemen heard from this week: Ferd Yosten in China, Emil Rohmer and Carl Schilling who met in Hawaii, Anthony Luke and Leo Haverkamp who met in England, Tony Koesler, new Guinea. Armella Yosten and Werner Cler marry Tuesday.

25 YEARS AGO

April 29, 1949

Classes resume at parochial school but attendance is low in measles epidemic. North Texas District of Catholic State League holds meeting here Sunday. Michael Neu's calf wins top award at County Roundup Stock Show. Century plant at Clarence Wilson home start blooming. Betty Jean Klement breaks left arm in a fall. Pat Fisher undergoes eye surgery. Local Saddle Club is set for biggest horse show in local history. New arrivals: daughters for the Bruno Fleitmans and John Mosmans; a son for the J. W. Fleitmans. VFW Auxiliary begins rehearsing for minstrel show. Since Friday this community has no peace officer — Andy Harrison resigned as precinct constable. Ceremony at Lindsay unites Lucille Fuhrmann and Ray Hess.

Cheapest Cut Not Always Best Buy

What is the best buy at the meat counter? Sometimes the cut with the higher price. "Cost per serving is the way to figure price when buying meat," said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. "Often more expensive cuts will provide more meat and reduce the cost per serving."

A Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) chart has been designed to determine at a glance the cost of meat per serving. It is small enough to fit into a purse.

According to TDA home economists the number of servings per pound usually depend on the cut. A chuck blade or arm roast yield two servings per pound but a pound of boneless chuck or sirloin tip yield three. Ground beef, sausage and poultry breasts usually yield four servings a pound.

Dividing price per pound by number of servings per pound equals cost per serving. An arm roast at \$1.19 a pound costs 60 cents a serving. A sirloin tip at \$1.59 a pound costs 53 cents a serving.
