Families falling within the unusual circumstances or possible, adding: "Even if oyur hardships are urged to apply for the free or reduced price lunches. They can do so by filling in application forms sent to parents, additional copies of which are available at the principal's office. Applications may be submitted any time during the school

The form requests information needed to determine economic need based on gross income, number of family members and unusual circumstances or hardship affecting formation is confidential and used only to determine eligibility.

The form is reviewed and eligibility determined by the principal. If a parent is dissatisfied with that ruling it may be appealed to Superinendent L. B. Bruns.

The policy provides that there will be no identification cost of a lunch.
