There are good reasons for the many gripes we hear about last Saturday night's Channel 4 report on Muenster. The show was a huge disappointment to everyone who has a spark of pride in the home town. It revealed a pitiful lack of planning as well as a lack of consideration for the people of Muenster. It missed dozens of scenes which give a more realistic picture of the town and it also by passed a multitude of facts that present Muenster as an industrious and progressive community.

We like the bit which tells that three Flusche brothers founded the community and a descendant of one of them is still doing business here. We also appreciate a plug for the milk plant while regretting that it gave a puny idea of its vital importance to the town and surrounding rural area for a half century. Otherwise the show was mostly a flop.

People who put on that kind of show must know that they can't do justice to a town by a spontaneous effort. The random selections for interviews and small talk about energy shortage, cost of living, politics, etc., were pitifully irrelevant. The proper way would have been to present persons and dialogue which give a more accurate impression of the town.

A few things that should have been told are that this is a progressive community with a good rural area featuring dairy, beef and grain farming along with a sound conservation program and also a substantial oil industry. The town has lots of good looking homes with well kept yards, also better than average streets, two parks and a good swim pool. It has a magnificent church, two good schools, and one of the finest hospitals in North Texas. It has the headquarters of a three-county rural electric system, a livestock auction a dress factory and a machine tool plant, a bank, four car agencies, two meat processing plants, three feed plants, two building centers, plus stores and restaurants that are good enough to attract folks from other areas.

For many years it's been widely known that Muenster is well above the average for its size. The TV program had good reason and ample opportunity to convey that idea, but it goofed miserably. The presentation was embarrassing and belittling.

Without a doubt the kidnapping situation in this country can be improved somewhat by President Nixon's recommendation to restore the death penalty in cases where the victim is murdered. Conceivably a smart kidnapper would be influenced not to take the chance if he is aware that he faces the ultimate penalty if caught, whereas now he has more incentive to kill than to let the victim live.

Under present law the penalty is no worse for killing than just for kidnapping. So it's to the kidnapper's advantage to eliminate the person who later can help convict him of the kidnapping. He has all to gain and nothing to lose when he commits the second crime in an attempt to escape punishment. One might say that the law actually encourages kidnappers to go all the way with the crime.

That's why this column likes the president's suggestion — but only as far as it goes. Anything to save the life of a kidnapped person is lots better than we have now. But it would be still better if it helped prevent the kidnapping in the first place. The president should have suggested the death penalty for both kidnapping and murder.

An even better idea is to restore capital punishment for all major crimes including rape, robbery with a deadly weapon, first degree murder, and especially murder of police officers and prison guards. Since our nation has abandoned the moral standards which are essential to better behavior it ought at least be practical and use severe punishment as a means to combat crime.

The idea isn't expected to appeal to liberals and sob sisters. They are horrified at the thought of punishment being more severe than the crime. On the other hand, however, we ought to remember that we had less crime when our laws were tougher, and when we were more concerned with

Council Bans Late Drinks, Assembly In Public Places

Gatherings in the wee hours for the purpose of drinking or mischief or disturbing the peace in any way has become subject to more than just a reprimand. A new ordinance passed by the city council last week says that it is a violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200.

The ordinance states that after legal closing time of bars and restaurants it will be unlawful to consume alcoholic drinks in any public place. Also it will be unlawful for two or more persons to assemble in a public place within the city for the purpose of commencing a violation of an ordinance or to create a public nuisance or hazard to the well being of any citizen.

Prolonged Delay Of Sewer Repair Ended Wednesday

Sewer problems which have been haunting the city since December 10 apparently are coming to an end this week. City Superintendent Steve Mosler said Wednesday that a part which had been awaited more than three months was finally being installed then.

The failure was on a paddle wheel of the sewer's race-track, the wheel which keeps sewage in rapid flow to promote oxidation. With one of the two wheels out of order the chemical action was inadequate and allowed pungent odors to develop, as during the past weekend.

A prompt order for the replacement part got no results and a re-order five weeks later was equally ineffective. Eventually Steve and Joe Mosler had a special casting made in Fort Worth and machined by Flusche Enterprises. The job of installation got underway Wednesday.

15.2 Miles of I-35 In County to Get Resurfacing Job

A contract for hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement and seal shoulders on 15.2 miles of Interstate Highway 35 in Cooke County has been announced by the Texas Highway Department.

The project, which will require an estimated 120 working days, extends the MKT Railroad in Gainesville to the Denton County line. Work will be under direction of Engineer John C. Simpson of Gainesville. Contract was awarded to Jagoe-Public Company of Denton on a low bid of \$205,076.65.

The project is described as a heavy maintenance and betterment project on the heavily traveled highway. Work on the main lanes consists of the application of a mat of hot mix asphaltic concrete. The aggregate in this material will be a lightweight expanded clay which has a very high resistance to skidding and will maintain this characteristic over a long period of time. The seal coat on the shoulders will be applied using a light colored aggregate which will provide a good contrast between the main lanes and the shoulders.

Community Garden Project Is Relief To High Food Cost

Something new in local gardening, and well timed as a part solution to rocketing food prices, is the community garden just established by J. M. Weinzapfel. It's named the Willow Creek Gardens, after the creek on which the Weinzapfel lake is located.

An area of almost three acres on Maple Street north of the former Katy right of way has been divided into twelve areas measuring an average of 100 x 100 ft., which is slightly less than a quarter acre. The locations can be leased for a year at \$10 each. Half the space is available for \$8 and a 30x30 area for \$5.

The lease includes free water which is piped from the Weinzapfel lake some two blocks north. To tap the water supply a plastic pipe was installed through the overflow drainage pipe and draw down tube then over to the draw down to the water. The flow begins by siphoning and continues by gravity to five hydrants located at the garden.

By way of preparation the area has been plowed three times with a serated tandem disc harrow then fertilized with 1450 pounds of 8-16-8 and leveled with a heavy drag.

3 Baseball Teams Remain in District

The 14-A baseball district, originally consisting of five teams, was reduced to three teams this week as Petrolia announced that it was pulling out of the race. Callisburg withdrew earlier. Member teams now are Muenster, Sanger and Frisco.

Coaches of those three teams met in Sanger Tuesday night and drew up a revised schedule, which begins Friday. Muenster's games were booked as follows:

No Contests in Local Elections

Three local elections without a single contest await Muenster voters when they go to the ballot boxes on Saturday, April 6. After the passing of deadlines for filing candidacy the elections for city council and school board and hospital board had a candidate for each vacancy but no more.

The same applies to the county school board election, but voters will have two choices in the election of

trustees for Cooke County College.

Final date to qualify for a place on the city ballot was March 6. When it had passed City Superintendent Steve Mosler disclosed that Richard Grewing and A. T. Tuggle had announced intention to seek re-election, however Rody Klement declined to ask for another term and Leo Hess had filed for his position.

March 6 was also the deadline to announce candidacy for the Muenster school board. When it had passed Robert Bayer was unopposed for re-election to Place 2 and Adam Wolf was unopposed to succeed Ray Wilde in Place 1.

A similar situation developed in the list of candidates for Muenster hospital district board. Following the March 11 filing deadline, Rufus Henschel, Albert Dangelmayr, Norbert Felderhoff and Ray Voth chose to seek re-election whereas Sylvan Walterscheid decided not to continue. His place on the ballot was taken by Norbert Walterscheid.

The net result is that the community has a total of ten candidates for the ten open positions on three ballots. There are no contests in the local elections.

Nor is there a contest on the ballot for county school board election. Herman Hartman is unopposed for re-election as member at large. Board members for Precincts 3 and 4 do not have expiring terms this year.

The only action will be that in the election of board members for Cooke County College. Don Howeth and James Spires are in a contest to succeed Paul Campbell in Place 6 and Billy Farr is challenging incumbent Boyd Ware for Position 7.

Coach Glenn Richardson's Hornet trackmen overcame some powerful competition last Saturday in winning second place at the Holiday invitation meet. Also there and putting the pressure on Muenster boys were Community, which made a strong showing in the Class A state meet last year, and Rule, which won the Class B state championship.

Muenster had 105 points in the Holiday meet and Community took top honor with 143. Rule was third with 97, Chidress was fourth and Quannah was fifth. There were 22 teams participating, mostly Class AA and several Class A. Rule was the only Class B entry.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE IN THE CITY OF MUENSTER, COOKE COUNTY TEXAS, AFTER LEGAL CLOSING HOURS, AND THE ASSEMBLY OF PERSONS IN PUBLIC AREAS OF THE CITY OF MUENSTER, TEXAS; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE: WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Muenster, Texas, has found and hereby finds that the consumption of Alcoholic Beverage in Public Areas within the corporate limits of the City of Muenster, Texas, and the assembly of two or more persons in public areas within said City of Muenster, Texas, after legal closing hours of Bars and Restaurants, has on occasions created a public nuisance and a public hazard to the well-being of Citizens of said City of Muenster, Texas; and

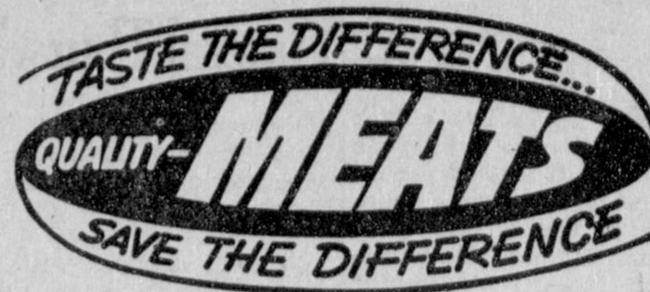
WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Muenster, Texas, has determined that it is necessary to exercise the Police Power of said City of Muenster, Texas, to abate the nuisance created by reason of the foregoing described acts and conduct;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MUENSTER, COOKE COUNTY, TEXAS, SECTION 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to consume Alcoholic Beverage of any kind in any Public Place, Public Streets, or Alley within the corporate limits of the City of Muenster, Texas, after legal serving hours of any Bars and/or private clubs, as set forth by the State of Texas. SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for any two or more persons to assemble in any public street, alley or other public place within the corporate limits of the City of Muenster, Texas, for the purpose of consuming any violation of the ordinances of the City of Muenster, Texas, or of the State of Texas, or if such assembly shall create a Public nuisance or a Hazard to the well-being of any Citizen of the City of Muenster, Texas, or to any property located within said City of Muenster, either Public or private, or any lease property under control of the City of Muenster, Cooke County, Texas. SECTION 3. Any person violating the terms of this ordinance, shall upon conviction, be fined any sum, not exceeding two hundred

red dollars (\$200.00). SECTION 4. The need for the immediate protection, safety and general welfare of the Citizens of the City of Muenster, Texas, creates an emergency and requires this ordinance to become effective immediately and the same shall therefore be effective from and after the date of its passage. 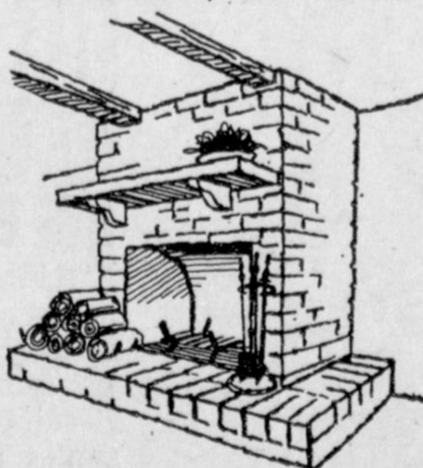
Walls and ceiling should be well insulated. Since heat rises, ceiling insulation should be at least six inches to keep the warm air in and the cold air of winter out.

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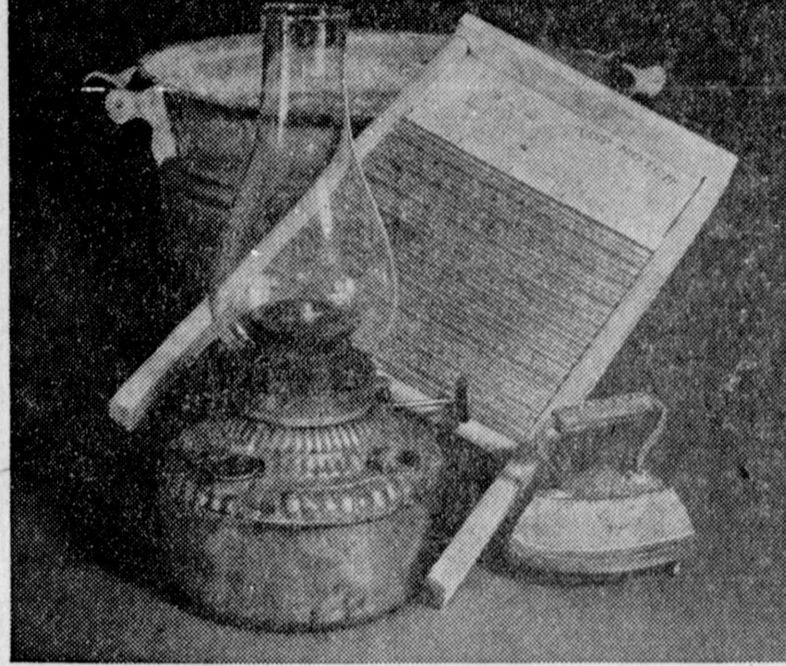

Robert Bayer, Vice President, Ray Wilde, Secretary, Ed Cler, Theresa Walterscheid, Dan Hamric, and the following absent: Urban Endres (President) and Ray Swirczynski constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Ray Wilde (position 1) and Robert Bayer (position 2) members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1974, said first Saturday being April 6, 1974, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF MUESTER INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 6, 1974, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District trustees for positions 1 and 2.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the Muenster High School Building in Muenster, Texas, in said School District, with C. O. Cash as Presiding Judge and Edgar Dyer as clerk.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m.

4. L. B. Bruns is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Superintendent's Office, Muenster Public School, Muenster, Texas, within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least 8 hours on each day for absentee voting which is not Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's

mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

7. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said postings shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient to the public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the day of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Cooke County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

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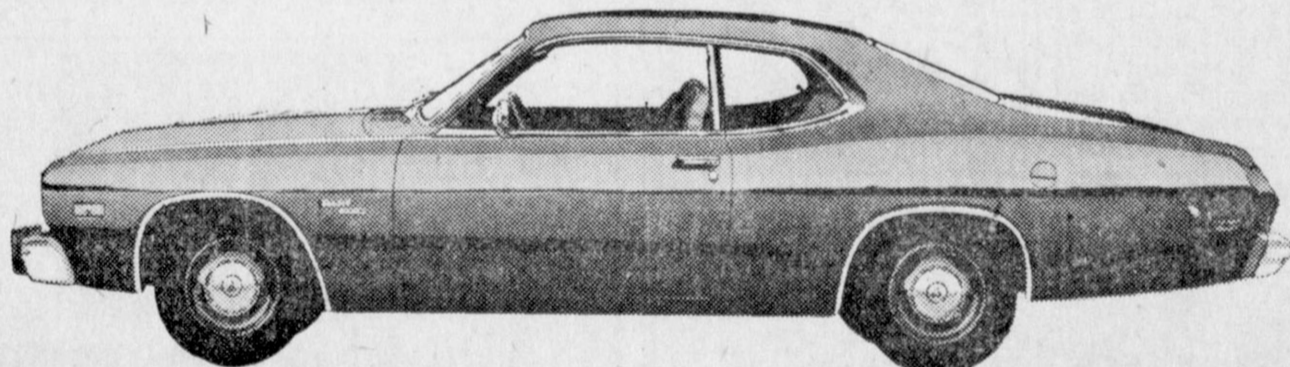
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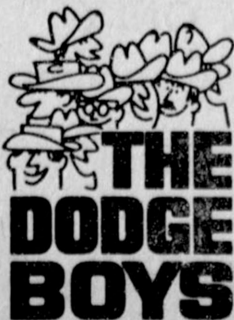
We wanted to know what our Dodge cars would do in gas economy in situations as close to actual driving conditions as possible. At the same time, we wanted to know how well Dodge would do against the competition's cars—cars of comparable size and even smaller.

The United States Auto Club (USAC) conducted its "Miles-Per-Gallon Showdown" in the Arizona-Southern California area between January 10 and 13, 1974. All automobiles used in the test were acquired by USAC through normal retail channels. Many of the drivers were sports car enthusiasts and amateur rallyists. However, none were professional automobile drivers.

The "Showdown" was divided into three distinct driving cycles:

1. Highway driving. Los Angeles to Tucson and return. A total distance of 972 miles. Average speed, 53 mph.
2. Light city traffic. Los Angeles area. 108 miles, total. Average speed, 25 mph.
3. Heavy city traffic. Los Angeles area. 61 miles, total. Average speed, 20 mph.

A Dart Sport coupe with the new standard 2.76 rear axle, 225 Slant Six engine, and manual transmission got 8.1 more miles per gallon than a six-cylinder Nova with manual transmission in the "light city traffic" cycle. The Dart Sport also got better mileage than the Nova in the other two driving cycles.

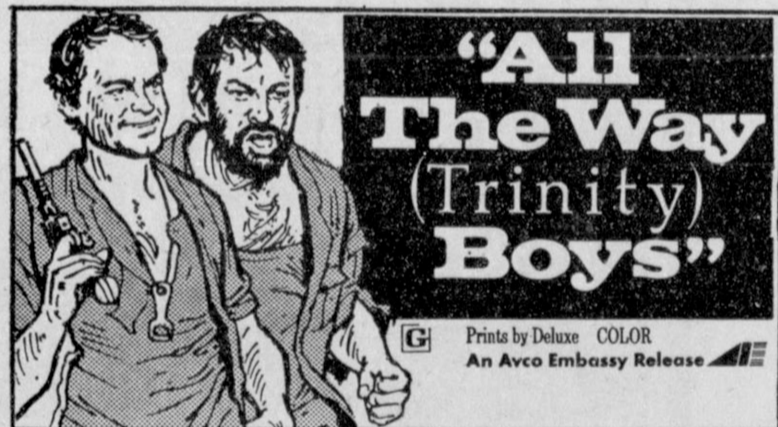
