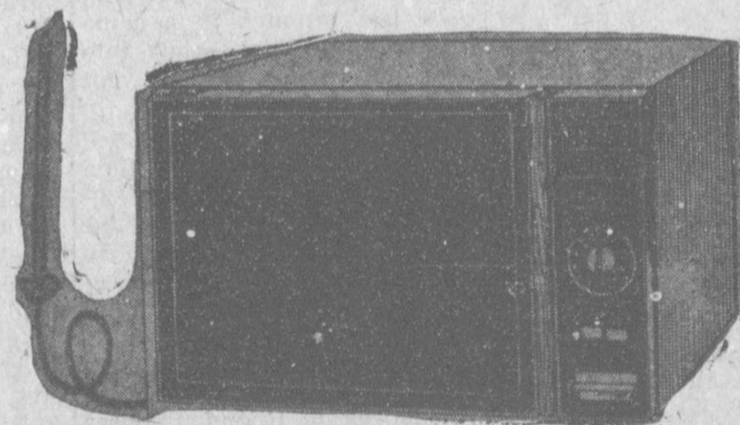

The Sacred Heart Senior girls 4-H Club meeting was held November 8 at 12:35. Council delegates reported on the Project Fair on November 13 when entries may be brought to Cooke County College Library on Friday 4 p.m. and Saturday 8:30 a.m. to 9 a.m.

The County Food Show will be on November 20 in Gainesville and the District Food Show on March 12 at Town East Mall. The Share-the-Fun contest will be Monday, December 6.

Mary Hinton reminded the girls of rule changes in Share-the-Fun. It is now permissible to combine two clubs for one act if only one act is presented. A "just for fun" category is something new. This entry may be presented at the county show but will not advance to district level.

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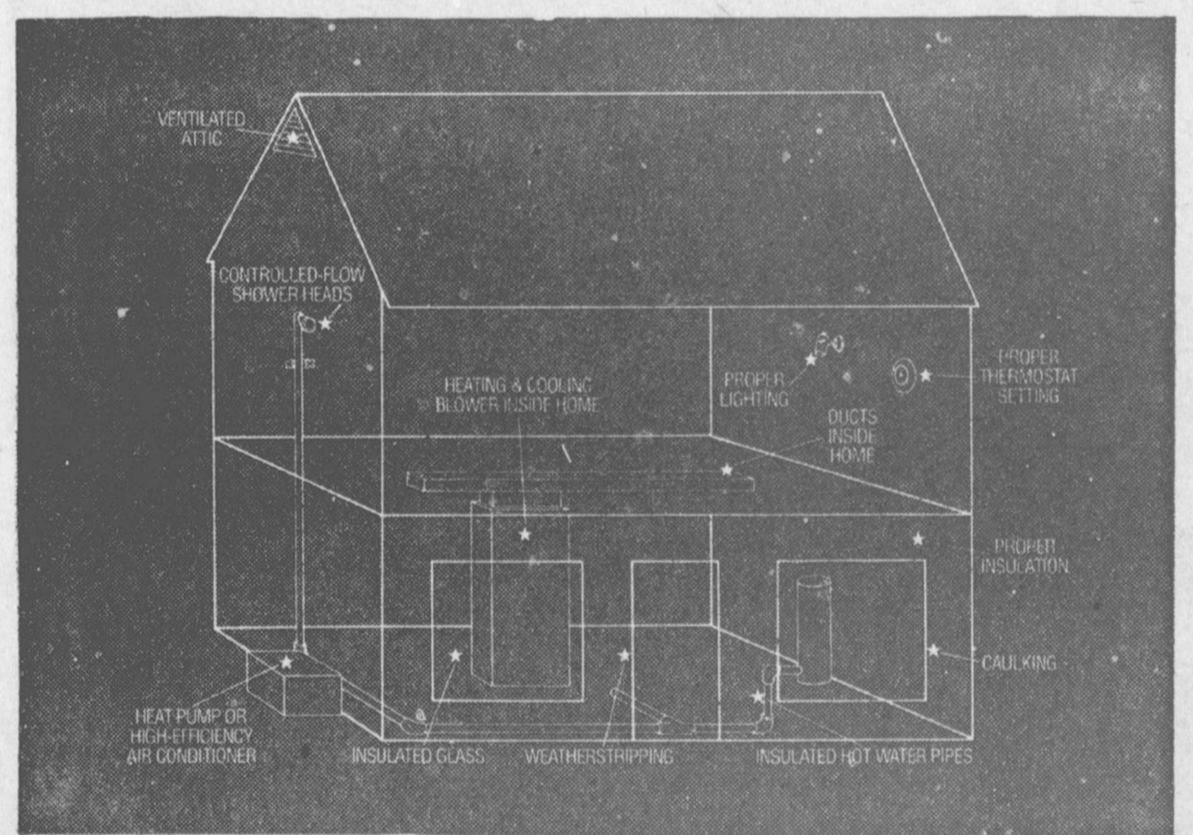
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Muenster HD Club Hears Program on Calico Art Craft

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Plans Proceeding Funds Delayed in Hwy 82 Projects

Planning proceeds but funding is delayed on the overpass replacement job in Muenster and completion of the four lane highway from Muenster to Saint Jo.

The information received recently from the Department of Highways and Public Transportation offers a hope that the paper work will be finished by the time financing is available and the job then can proceed without further delay. The Department's statement follows.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement on U.S. Highway

82 in portions of Montague and Cooke Counties.

The proposed project begins near the East City Limit of Saint Jo in Montague County and ends at Main Street (F.M. 373) in Muenster, which is in Cooke County. The total length of the proposed project is 8.754 miles. The section of U.S. 82 from 2.2 miles east of the Montague-Cooke County Line eastward to the West City Limit of Muenster has already been constructed. This completed section is 4.2 miles long.

On the section of U.S. 82 from the East City Limit of Saint Jo to 2.2 miles east of the Montague-Cooke County Line, the proposed improvements provide for a four-lane highway. Although the proposed construction consists of grading, drainage structures, base and surfacing, the funds now available to the Department are not adequate to finance

the construction at the present time under existing revenue levels. However, plans for the construction will proceed awaiting proper funding.

The existing right of way is usually 240 feet, 140 feet of which was acquired within the last three years. There will be no displacements as a result of these improvements.

The remaining 0.366 mile section of U.S. 82 in the City of Muenster, beginning near the West City Limit and ending at Main Street. The proposed construction consists primarily of removing the existing two-lane M-K-T RR overpass structure, over the abandoned railroad section and providing a four-lane divided highway at ground level. The existing right of way is usually 100 feet wide. The proposed width varies from 100 feet to a maximum of 215 feet. There will be no displacements as a result of these improvements.

Since the Federal Highway Administration has approved the route and design proposed for this project, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will begin work on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project. This action does not constitute approval for financing of construction. The proposed project will be constructed in stages as funds become available.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office in Gainesville, Texas, and from Roy F. Lanford, Supervising Right of Way Engineer, 1601 Southwest Parkway, Wichita Falls, Texas.

Maps, studies and all other available data may be inspected and copied at the Office of the Resident Engineer, Charlie Hildebrand, I. H. 35 North, in Gainesville.

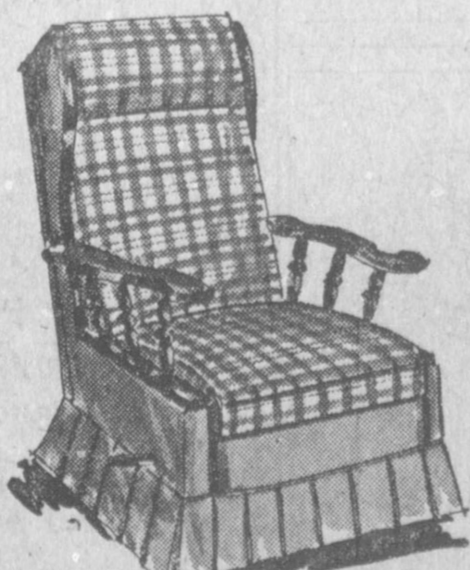
