O. L. Davis To Head San Benito Schools Number

New Water Mains From Own Funds Decision Reached To Abandon Plans For Borrowing PWA Funds For Construction.

Plans of the city of Brownwood obtain a \$31,000 PWA loan and grant for the purpose of replacing about 10,000 feet of water mains in the downtown business district have been definitely abandoned work without securing the loan, Mayor W. H. Thompson announced early this week. In making this water department would be used o lay the 10,000 feet of mains

the belief that the city can do the ly abandoning plans to secure the \$31,000 grant.

By doing the work itself, the city can begin work immediately and by so doing afford employment for many needy Brownwood men who main idle to several months while officials completed negotiations for he loan and grant.

Bids for the 10,000 feet of 8-inch pipe to replace present mains have been asked. Mayor Thompson approximately \$5,000. The remaining \$10,000 of the total sum to be City officials expect to use only local labor and state that those half to apply on water rent. In this way \$20,000 worth of labor will be obtained for the \$10,000 cash outlay.

smuggling into the State Penitentiary pistols used in the escape of the three condemned outlaws July 22, stated there is no law in the Texas statutes making it a punishable offense for a state prison guard to aid a convict to Patterson was convicted and sentenced to fifteen years

in the penitentiary where he previously had served as a guard, but it was through a legal technicality that the charges could be filed. The prisoners had filed appeals. which had not been acted upon, and hence technically were charges of shehiffs of counties where they were convicted, pending appeals, and not prisoners of the state

In this case, justice was served, but only by the mere chance of a technicality. The incident probably will furnish an opportunity for the new crop of legislators to do some effective law-passing in the next legislative session, if the forthcoming special session does not remedy the sit-

Some purist on the editorial staff heaped criticism on the Fort Worth Star-Telegram for inaccuracy in headline writing. The Fort Worth paper, in recording a Dallas meeeting had said: "Repeal of Horse Racing Law Urged At Dallas

The Dallas News correctly points out that this is in error, as no one seeks to prohibit horse racing. The objective is to bar betting on horse races, and the News deplores such inaccuracies as conducive to a condition that creates popular misunderstanding. "The unthinkable," says The News, "who unforunately are many, confuse the absence of racing when betting is not permitted with a law against it. . . Consequently, opponents of the costly system of encouraged public betting should insist on correct presentation of their case.

Texans are not sufficiently Centennial-minded at present. If the celebration in 1936 is to be worthy of the state, it must have the whole hearted enthusiasm of the entire people of Texas. And such is the purpose of Centennial Week -- to start that spirit of enthusiasm.

It is needless to point out to Texans the greatness of their state, the achievements of the pioneers who first settled Texas, or the greatness of those who have contributed to its advancement. Texans naturally are proud of their state, more so, perhaps than residents of any other state unless it is California.

They seem to be a bit slow to realize, however, what a great thing the Centennial can be for their state and for themselves. That it will bring millions of people to Texas for the first time seems to be generally recognized. That many of these people are potential future residents of Texas, or potential future investors in this state seems to be a secondary consideration. It is a fact that should come first in considerating the importance of the Centennial.

On September 1, several cities in Texas will submit formal bids for holding the major celebration in their localities. With these bids in, the Centennial will begin to take form as an actual achievement; and with the defir : location of the Centennial City, interest in the celebration will grow by leaps and bounds.

Centennial Week is a proper time for Texans to begin to put into operation the Centennial Pledge: "I will think--talk--write . . . Texas Centennial in 1936! This is to be my celebration. In its achievement I may give free play to my patriotic love for Texas' heroic past; my confidence in its glories that are to be.

rifty Famous rontiersmen By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

His a "National Monument"

IT TOWERS nearly a thousand feet above the surrounding country, a silent sentinel over the beaua pioneer in the Covered Wagon days of the old Oregon Trail. It is a landmark today for many an automobile tourist speeding west, for when he reaches the city of Scotts Bluff, Neb., he sees off at the south across the river this huge mass of sandstone which bears the name of Scotts Bluff and perpetuates the name of Hiram

As a member of General Ashley's famous fur-trading expedition up the Missouri in 1823, Scott had first seen this mountain which was to become his monument. Then he became a free trapper and later a partner with Narcisse Le-Clerq in a company of trappers along the Platte

Louis to market their furs. A hundred miles up the river from the mountain Scott was taken ill and left behind with two trappers, Roi and Bissonette, who were to bring him down the river by bullboat But soon after they launched the clusmy craft, it upset and all their provisions and ammunition were lost. They managed to reach Laramie fork, 60 miles up the river from the mountain where LeClerq and the others were to await their

They were half-starved and leaving Scott in camp, the other two set out in search of food. Then they came across LeClerq's trail and deliberately decided to follow it and leave Scott to his fate. When they overtook LeClerq they told him that Scott had died, so he pushed on toward St. Louis.

Back at his camp near Laramie fork the realization soon came to Scott that his friends had deserted him. So he set out to follow them.

A year later Bissonette and old Joe Robideaux, seeking water from the spring that gushes from the southern slope of Scotts Bluff, found a skelton not far away. From the buttons on the fragments of clothing still clinging to the bones and from other trinkets Bissonette recognized the skeleton as that of Hiram Scott. Then the story of the betrayal of the trapper by his two comrades came out. Tradition is that Bissonette and Robideaux buried the remains of Hiram Scott there and from that day the sandstone mountain which had been the goal of his weary journey was known as Scotts Bluff. A few years ago a tract of 2,300 acres surrounding it was set aside as a public reserve and became a "national monument."
