The only other choice is additional water wells, and the probability that they too will go dry a few years hence.

The engineer also said that either method would require an increase of water rates . . . about \$1.00 per month to finance more wells and \$2.08 per month to pay for the lake, treatment plant, pump, water lines, etc.

The proposed reservoir is planned a mile northwest of town to be constructed as a joint venture by the city and the U.S. Soil Conservation service. Along with supplying city water, the lake is planned to include flood control and recreation features. Because to be divided about equally between the city and the Soil Conservation Service.

This general picture of the situation also has elements of urgency. Regarding duration of well-water availability the time is indefinite even though eventual failure of the wells is accepted as definite. But time is running short on the permit, issued by the state water board, which allows Muenster to impound water for its own use. The permit expires in November unless the city before then indicates an intention to proceed.

Another matter of urgency is the cost sharing arrangement with the Soil Conservation Service. The offer to Muenster cannot be extended indefinitely and if it should be withdrawn the local share of the cost would jump from 50 to 100 per cent. Still another matter of urgency is inflation. The cost increases every year.

Those are the things Muenster residents are asked to consider in deciding to answer "yes" or "no" in the opinion poll.





Some people at the Federal Reserve say that one of the reasons the \$2 bill never gained popularity is that there never were enough issued, and thus they were not circulated as widely as other denomina-

With their scarcity came suspicion, some Treasury officials say, and along with the suspicion came old wives' tales about the bill bringing bad luck. Old timers can recall when people tore the corners of a \$2 bill before they cashed them to break the spell.

Issued first in 1918, the Treasury is going to make sure this time there are enough of the bills available. They plan to issue at least 400,000,000 each year from now on. The Treasury says it expects to save \$30 million over the next five years in printing and handling costs with the new bill in circulation.


