## Advanced Plans Revealed For 96-Bed Nursing Home

A 96-bed nursing home for Muenster is in the advanced planning stage and contingent on a certificate of need from the Texas Health Facilities Commission, according to a statement by Mrs. Bill Qualls of Saint Jo at Tuesday's Chamber of Commerce meeting.

She said a site for it has been acquired across Sixth Street from Muenster Hospital, an ideal location because of its nearness to the hospital and the Medical Center. And construction can start as soon as approval is received from the health department. Chamber of Commerce members voted their approval and offered to send their letter endorsing the application for certificate.

## 94 Pints Donated to Local Blood Bank

Though short of the quota, Muenster's semi-annual collection for its blood bank was satisfying. The goal was 100 pints, and the amount given was 94.

But considering other factors, the response was exceptionally good. As pointed out by the Red Cross technicians, summer collections in the Wichita Falls area are usually poor. With its 94 per cent score Muenster ranks as one of the best. Along with problems of heat and vacations there is the absence of students, who usually make a good showing during the school year.

Counting registrations, the record looks slightly better. Ninety seven came to give but three failed to pass qualifying tests.

Three of the donors became members of the "Gallon Club". Kenneth Walterscheid, Frances Vosten and Harvey Schmitt gave their eighth pint Wednesday while many others were contributing toward their second or third gallon. The local champion is James Roark, who completed his sixth gallon Wednesday. Twenty seven persons are now listed in the local gallon club.

The quota of a blood collection is based on the average need of the area for six months, and a community that misses by a big percentage is expected to have another collection. However, as reported by Red Cross technicians to David Bright, hospital administrator, Muenster probably will not be expected to have the additional collection. They were not aware that ants were streaming in and out of a crack in the concrete beside Cindy's foot... not until the ants started biting and they saw that dozens of them were on the foot. By the time the shoe was removed and the foot brushed off she had received many bites.

After the attack the family returned to the motel where Mrs. Gehrig showered and rested, not realizing that she was allergic to the bites. Instead of improving she kept feeling worse and a rash broke out on her body. They knew then that they needed medical help.

When they arrived at the emergency room of Santa Rosa Hospital her blood pressure was near zero and she was in shock. In spite of the critical condition she responded promptly to emergency treatment, but after effects of the shock and the fright have been lingering on.

## Faculty Complete For Coming Year At Muenster High

The faculty at Muenster Public School is complete for the coming school year, according to an announcement Tuesday by Superintendent L. B. Brunts after filling vacancies caused by the resignation of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Petro.

Mrs. Sandra Klement succeeds Mrs. Petro as teacher of remedial reading. She graduated in December 1975 from Stephen F. Austin University with a BS degree in Education, majoring in language learning disabilities. Her special concern will be students of all grades with language problems resulting from either handicap or retardation.

Mrs. Klement is a native of Tom Ball, Tex., was recently married to Karl Klement of Muenster.

Succeeding Mr. Petro is Wade W. White Jr., who will be assistant coach in football and head coach in basketball. He graduated from Tarleton State University in 1973 with major in physical education and minor in history. As a student there he was director of regional basketball and tennis tournaments and intramural programs and was president of St. Brennan's Newman Club. In high school he lettered four years in football and basketball, three years in track and one year in tennis at Winters.

During the past two years he has been at Keller High School teaching Texas history both years. He was in the lower grades athletic program the first year, and was assistant coach in football and track and head basketball coach last year. Also at Keller he was active in the summer athletic program for boys and girls.

## Opinions Asked in Lake Project Poll

The opinion poll on Muenster's proposed lake gets under way this week as water customers receive their regular monthly bills. On the stub of that bill is a "yes" or "no" choice to indicate whether a person favors or opposes the project. The customer is asked to mark the stub according to his or her preference and return it along with the regular monthly payment. Persons whose

bills are paid by draft will receive the stub to be marked and mailed or delivered to the City Hall.

The City Council and the Water Board, who are empowered to proceed without consulting anyone, preferred to seek out public opinion before making the decision. Also they want the situation thoroughly understood and have indicated they will arrange briefing meetings if needed, to discuss all phases of the project.

Along with the bill and the ballot will be an explanatory letter prepared by the city engineer for the council and the board. The letter points out that Muenster depends on wells of declining production which can and may go dry in only a few years. An alternative is a surface water supply with capacity to provide for the city's projected growth for the 50 years.

The only other choice is additional water wells, and the probability that they too will go dry a few years hence. The engineer also said that either method would require an increase of water rates... about \$1.00 per month to finance more wells and \$2.03 per month to pay for the lake, treatment plant, pump, water lines, etc.

The proposed reservoir is planned a mile northwest of town to be constructed as a joint venture by the city and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service. Along with supplying city water, the lake is planned to include flood control and recreation features. Because of that, the project's cost is to be divided about equally between the city and the Soil Conservation Service.

This general picture of the situation also has elements of urgency. Regarding duration of well-water availability the time is indefinite even though eventual failure of the wells is accepted as definite. But time is running short on the permit, issued by the state water board, which allows Muenster to impound water for its own use. The permit expires in November unless the city before then indicates an intention to proceed.

Another matter of urgency is the cost sharing arrangement with the Soil Conservation Service. The offer to Muenster cannot be extended indefinitely and if it should be withdrawn the local share of the cost would jump from 50 to 100 per cent. Still another matter of urgency is inflation. The cost increases every year.

Those are the things Muenster residents are asked to consider in deciding to answer "yes" or "no" in the opinion poll.

## July Featured by Pleasant Weather

The hot and dry weather of July ain't what it used to be. Instead cloudy weather has prevailed most of the time keeping temperature exceptionally mild and yielding 1.25 inch of moisture in the bargain.

Including Wednesday's reading of .01 the community has had seven entries for the month or Steve Myster's official record. Total for the month is 1.25 and for the year is 20.72 inches, which is slightly more than normal for the period.

Area vegetation continues to thrive. Pastures, hay crops, corn, maize and sorghum are all doing well, and gardens are little less than phenomenal. Whopper vegetables are commonplace and keep producing at a time when, in normal years they have been wiped out by heat and drought.

A Thursday morning reading of .62 ups the month's total to 1.87 inch and the year's total to 21.34.

## Updating Suggested for Muenster Business Firms

Suggestions on modernizing a store's appearance featured the regular Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday. The message was presented by Doug Ousley and Troy Allen, professional exterior and interior decorators of Irving, who directed the recent face lifting of Fisher's Market. The men have also planned and directed the modernization of a number of large chain stores of North Texas.

Ousley said that the records show an invariable increase of business where appearance and convenience have been improved. It is business taken from stores that do not change. Likewise stores in

new shopping districts hurt the old stores downtown.

To prevent the loss he suggested modernization to keep competitive. He also recommended cashing in on a community's heritage, as New Braunfels is doing very successfully. With a similar heritage Muenster can create a widespread popular image by emphasizing its German background. The more who participate, the more effective the program can be.

He referred to Gainesville's new shopping center as a possible competitor taking business away from Muenster. But by making the most of its potential Muenster could reverse the flow of trade.

In the chamber's business, David Bright gave the final report on the German Week bicentennial festival. He said that the \$2000 starting capital plus receipts added to \$5171.65, and total expenses were \$3,098.00. That left a balance of \$2073.65, a profit of \$73.65. Bertha Hamric, president, added that putting on that event without going into the red was a big achievement, an inducement to start planning a bigger and better one for next year.

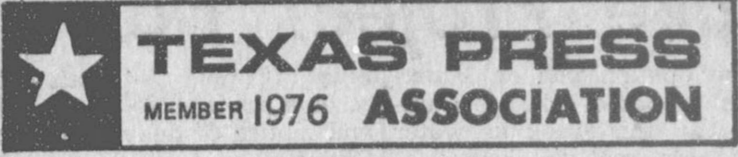

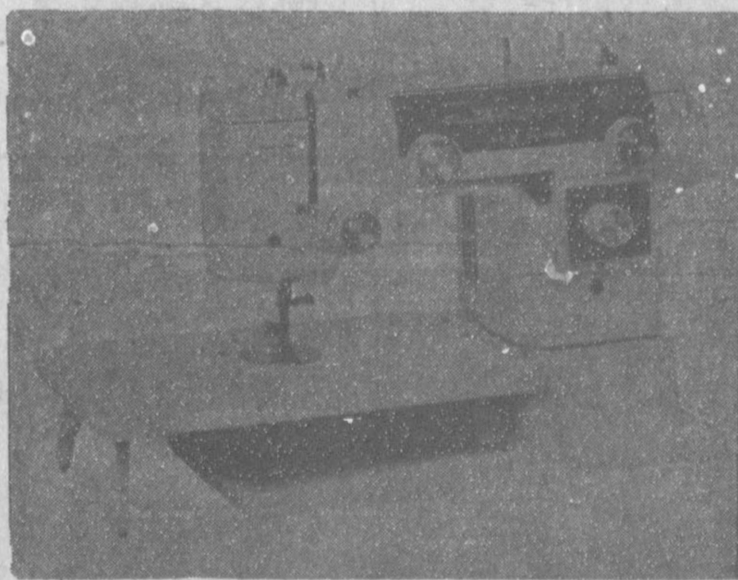

Thomas Jefferson is back with us again — it is his visage that appears on the face of the new \$2 bills that returned to the monetary scene after an absence of some 10 years.

Some people at the Federal Reserve say that one of the reasons the \$2 bill never gained popularity is that there never were enough issued, and thus they were not circulated as widely as other denominations.

With their scarcity came suspicion, some Treasury officials say, and along with the suspicion came old wives' tales about the bill bringing bad luck. Old timers can recall when people tore the corners of a \$2 bill before they cashed them to break the spell.

Issued first in 1918, the Treasury is going to make sure this time there are enough of the bills available. They plan to issue at least 400,000,000 each year from now on. The Treasury says it expects to save \$30 million over the next five years in printing and handling costs with the new bill in circulation.

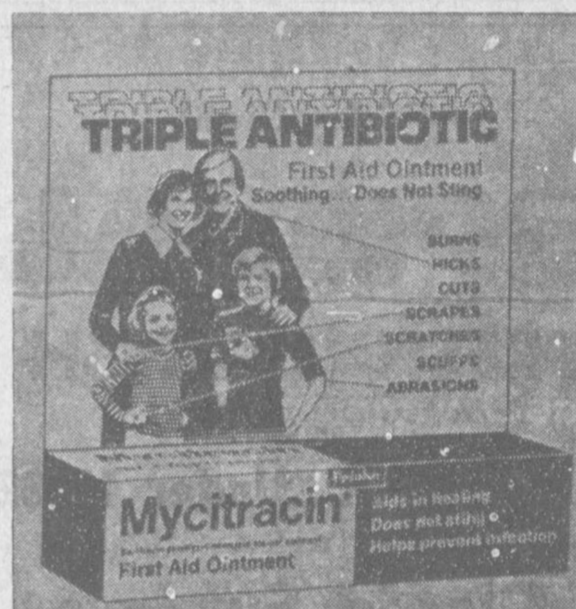

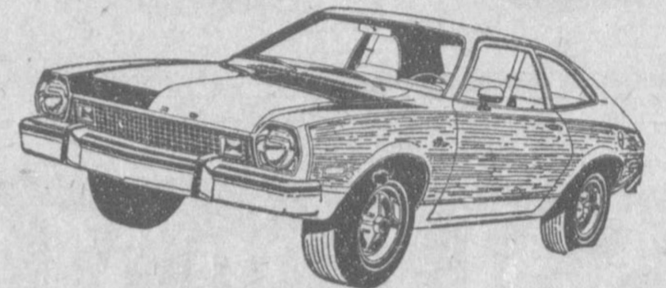

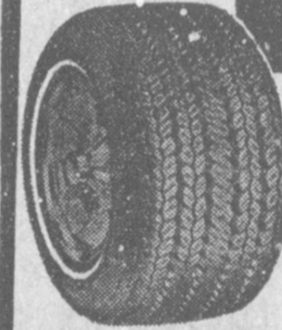

**Judge Sullivant  
Sets July 25-31  
Farm Safety Week**

County Judge, Larry B. Sullivant, has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1976 as "Farm and Ranch Safety Week" in Cooke County at the request of Cooke County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

Using the combined reports of statewide and Farm Bureau member accidental death reports, Judge Sullivant said "records show that at least 300 Texas farm and ranch people died during 1975 at the following rate: traffic — 123; tractors — 35; drownings — 28; fire-arms — 21; fires and burns — 16; machinery — 14; animals — 14; falls — 11; electric current — 10; other

vehicles (trailers) — 9; suffocation — 6; poisoning — 6; lightning — 3; tornadoes — 3; other & specified — 3; struck by object — 2; and stepped on nail — 2. Cooke County recorded 3 farm/ranch deaths.

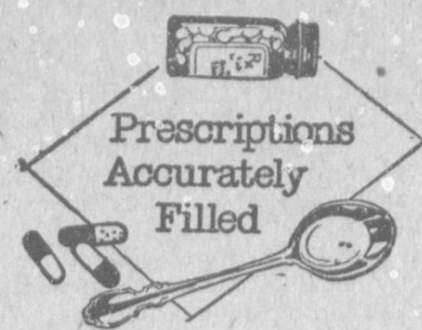
Cooke County Farm Bureau President J. A. Klement, said, "the theme for 'Farm Safety Week' is 'Educate for Safety.' Education is one of three 'E's' of safety. The other two are engineering and enforcement. 'Our Farm Bureau Preamble states in part — 'to achieve educational improvement' — and to carry out just one phase of this part of our philosophy, we maintain a full-time Safety Education Department in Texas Farm Bureau," he added.

Safety representatives from the Texas Farm Bureau state office in Waco travel the thirteen TFB fieldmen areas a week at a time presenting animated and graphic safety education programs in the areas of: traffic (auto stopping); fire prevention; tractor and machinery; and a demonstration to prevent electric shock. Approximately 300 of these programs are presented each year. The programs are presented free, as a public service of the TFB and the 210 organized county Farm Bureaus. Schools, civic clubs, youth groups and other organizations may schedule one or more of these programs by contacting the Cooke County Farm Bureau.

**CCC Gets Aid for  
Veterans' Program**

Congressman Omar Burleson announces a Veterans' Cost-of-Instruction Program award, administered by the U. S. Office of Education, to Cooke County College in the amount of \$10,352.

The awards to postsecondary institutions are for the 1976-77 academic year. This program of institutional aid provides cost-of instruction payment to institutions, based on undergraduate veteran enrollment. Payments are based on the number of veterans receiving vocational rehabilitation assistance or veterans' educational assistance for undergraduate study, and the number of veterans who have participated in special pre-discharge or remedial programs. The institution in return must establish and maintain a full-time Office of Veterans' Affairs to provide counseling and tutorial services, outreach and recruitment activities, and special programs for educationally disadvantaged veterans. Institutions may use up to 25% of the award for general academic/instructional programs.

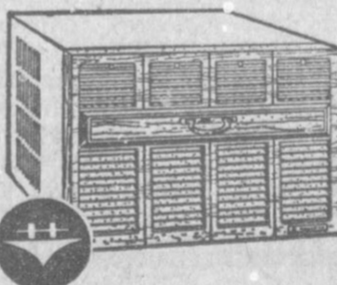

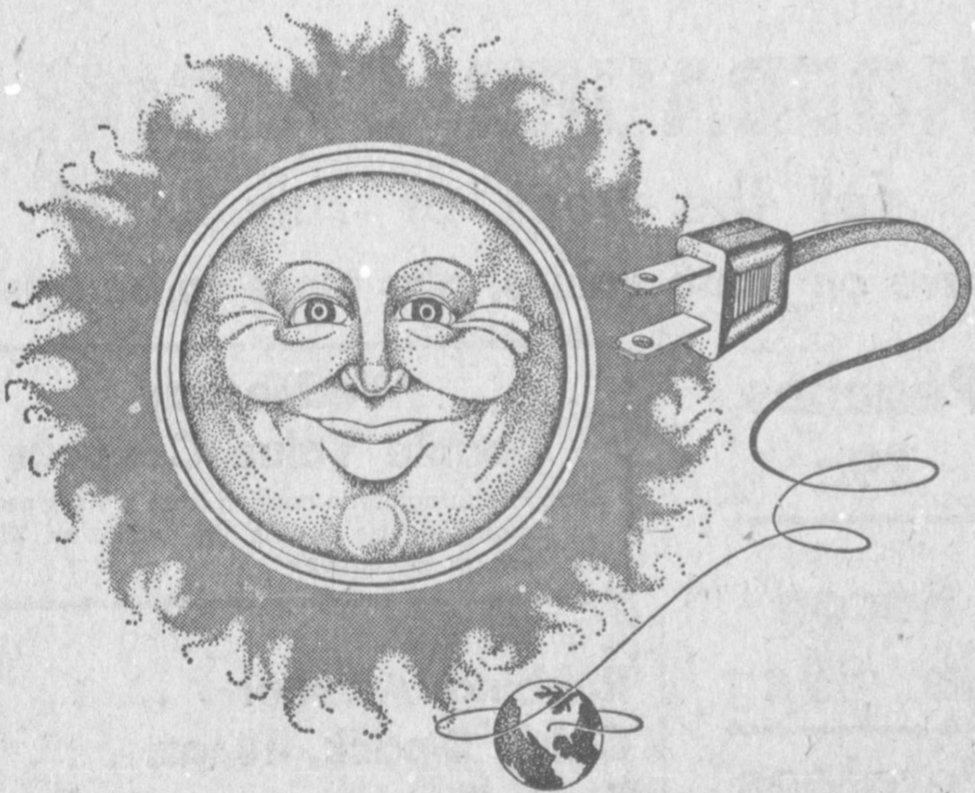

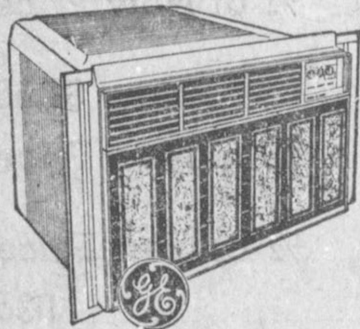
