THEY DON'T KNOW COMMUNISM!

One of the great dangers ahead for our country lies in the fact that younger generations, who have already begun to influence political and governmental decisions, know virtually nothing of the true nature of world Communism. Fifteen years ago the person who is 30-years-old today was only 15. I think it is fair to say that 15 is about the age that some youngsters begin to have curiosity about contrasting political and ideological philosophies in the world in which we live. They begin to be aware of government. Before 15, the average youngster usually is unaware of what's happening in the world.

Yet er. And still more are availthey have become a force in able, at a small charge, to cuspolitics. Fifteen years ago, when the 30-year-olds of today were 15, Fidel Castro took over Cuba. Fidel was pictured Police Officer in much of the American press as "the George Washington of Cuba." When Castro himself Cuba." When Castro himself revealed two years later, that he had been a Communist since his college student days, the 15 - year - old American youngsters couldn't possibly have understood the significance of this revelation. Today Cuba is a Russian fortress.

Remember Hungary?

That same year, Soviet Premier Khrushchev came to America, all smiles; and the image we saw on TV and elsewhere gave the 15-yearolds no reason not to like him. The 30-year-olds of today were only 12 when the citizens of Hungary rose in rebellion against the brutal yoke of Communist tyranny. For several days, the Hungarians overcame the Communists and held the government. Then Nikita Krushchev ordered the terrible might of Soviet armor into Hungary. Through deceit, Soviet diplomats captured leaders of the freedom rebellion.

Droves of Soviet tanks and bombers ravished Budapest, killing thousands; Russian military might conquered the rebellion. The leaders were shot. Thousands of innocent people were slaughtered, tens of thousands torn from their homes, placed in cattle cars and carried to the unspeakable atrocities that the Soviets always hold in store for those who challenge their rule. Most wound up in the living death of slave labor camps.

"We Accuse"

The New York Times, which to say the least had never been an anti-Communist newspaper, said in an historic editorial: "We accuse the Soviet Un-

ion of murder. We accuse it of the foulest treachery and basest deceit known to man. We accuse it of having committed the Hungarian people yesterday that its infamy can never be forgiven or forgotten. Gone now are the last illusions. Moscow now stands self-exposed. . . . Can we have any doubts now of what awaits us if we ever relax our vigilance and permit ourselves to become prey to Soviet might as was Hungary yesterday?"

But the 12-year-olds of America didn't read that 1955 editorial, and I'm afraid the adults who read it promptly forgot it. Just exactly four years before our 30-year-olds of today were born - 1939 -Adolf Hitler and the mass murderer of the Kremlin, Joseph Stalin, signed a nonaggression pact. It was a notorious deal between butchers of the human race. It permitted Hitler to unleash a blood-bath across Poland and begin World War II. Our 30year-olds of today weren't born until nine years later. They did not experience what more than ten years or less followed.

Katyn Forest Killings

Texas Penal Code

The following sections of the New Texas Penal Code are quoted by Police Chief McDonald for the information of Muenster people.

Under Chapter 22, Section 22.01, a person commits an Assaultive Offense if he (she):

1. Intentionally, knowingly or recklessly causes bodily injury to another person; or, 2. Intentionally or knowingly threatens another person

with imminent bodily injury;

3. Intentionally or knowingly causes physical contact with another, when he (she) knows or should reasonably believe that the other will regard the contact as offensive or pro-

vocative. An offense under the above section is a Class A Misdemeanor unless the offense is committed under sub-section 2 or 3, in which event it is a

Class C Misdemeanor. NOTE: Misdemeanors are classified as follows.

Class A misdemeanor is subect to a fine not to exceed \$2000 or jail not to exceed a year, or both jail and fine.

Class B misdemeanor is subject to a fine not to exceed \$1000, a jail sentence not to exceed 180 days, or both jail and fine.

Class C misdemeanor is subject to a fine not to exceed

Under Chapter 22, Section 22.02, a person commits an Aggravated Assault if he (she) commits assault as defined in Sestion 22.01 and he (she):

1. Causes serious bodily injury to another; or,

2. Causes bodily injury to Any Peace Officer in the lawful discharge of official duty so monstrous a crime against when the offender knows or has been informed the person assaulted is a Peace Officer,

> 3. Uses a deadly weapon against another.

> The actor (offender) presumed to have known the person assaulted was a Peace Officer if he was wearing a distinctive uniform indicating his employment as a Peace Offi-

detailed investigation of school busing in ten major U.S. cities, shows that "In every city studied, busing failed to reduce the gap between black and white achievement. In fact, most cities reported that the achievement gap has grown even larger after bus-

Professor Leech further rethat "in no city did busing appear to increase interracial contact or better understanding." Indeed, it was shown that the busing programs have proven to be "psychologically harmful rather than benefic-

The study concluded: "In light of the tremendous social, political and economic costs being paid for busing, the absence of any consistent educational gains, the deleterious psychological impact of busing upon black children, and the increasing polarization of the races . . . a reexamination is long overdue."

Doing something for a good cause, even at great expense and inconvenience, is a good but in forceful, no-nonsense American habit. However, when it is shown that the expense and inconvenience has failed to produce the desired results, the continuation of the program is utter foolishness.

Other and better ways need to be found to increase the educational opportunities and achievements of all school children. And, in the meantime, those thousands of buses now serving no good purpose can be better used to provide additional public transportation in our large cities, thus saving gasoline being used for private automobiles.





Curriculum for Nursing Sudents At CCJC Approved

Mrs. Rebecca McClelland, director of nursing education at Cooke County Junior College, announced that the new curriculum for nursing students was approved by the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas at the December meeting.

Students enrolling in nursing will begin in June of each year and will graduate in May two years later. This will permit nursing students to graduate at the same time other students graduate and will make it possible for them to take the state board examinatons in July following gradu-

Besides changing the date of enrollment, considerable changes are being made in the organization and sequence of nursing courses as well as methods of teaching nursing The nursing care of persons of all ages will be considered in all nursing courses. Nursing techniques, communication skills, mental health concepts, and adjustment to illness and hospitalization are considered throughout the currculum.

Individualized instruction will be used. Each student will have a weekly conference with his/her instructor in which learning experiences for the week are planned. Such learning experiences may include small group discussions, practice in the classroom laboratory, practice in a clinical setting such as a hospital or nursing home, use of audiovisual materials, and reading references.

In order to implement this curriculum, a larger classroom labratory is being provided. Practice areas will include six beds, a medicine room, and other work spaces. Wideotape will be used to assist students in the classroom practice of nursing skills. For example, a student could be videotaped while preparing an injection and immediately replay the video tape to see himself per-

forming the procedure. A variety of clinical facilities will be utilized in the practice of nursing. These include Gainesville Memorial Hospital, Muenster Memorial Hospital, Flow Memorial Hospital, Wichita State Hospital, Denton State School, public health departments, day nurseries, doctors' offices, and nursing homes. Arrangements are being made with additional agencies at this time. Each student will have the opportunity to give nursing care in the smaller hospital and nursing home as well as in the larger hospital.

This program is open to both men and women. Requirements for admission include graduation from high school or a satisfactory GED score, a satisfactory score on the ACT test, and good health. Applicants who do not meet these requirements may enroll in courses at Cooke County Junior College to make up deficiencies. There are no age limits nor restrictions regarding marri-

Persons who are interested in applying should contact the Nursing Department for appli-cants to take the ACT test and have a personal interview with one of the nursing faculty members. The next class is to begin in June of 1974. Arrangements can be made to enroll on a part-time basis.






HEATING

- 1. Have a qualified serviceman check
- your electric heating system annually. 2. If you have a forced-air heating system, replace or clean filters frequently.

- 4. Keep furniture and draperies clear of air outlets and returns.
