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For nearly forty years the Gallup Poll has conducted a survey which checks periodically on the progress of inflation. It asks what is the smallest amount of money a family of four — husband, wife and two children — needs each week to get along at this time.

The latest such poll brought out a cross section of opinion indicating that the four member family needs \$152 a week. That's more than five times as high as 1937 when the figure was \$30, and more than twice as much as 1957 when the figure was \$72. To fill in the story of the shrinking dollar, the minimum need for four was \$43 in 1947 and \$101 in 1967.

Just, notice! the cost was upped by more than 50 per cent in only six years. At this rate the cost will likely reach more than \$200 a week in a few more years. And after that, is there any basis for hope that the raises will finally stop? If government intends to guarantee this level of income for everyone we'd better hope for some big increases in wages. Unless earned pay runs a lot higher lots of people will loaf and accept the fat handouts.

The development of our inflationary spiral is one of the saddest stories of our country's economic history. It has made a mockery of saving, which until a few years ago was a favorite way of attaining security. Imagine, the dollar that was invested in life insurance or a saving account 35 years ago has lost four fifths of its original purchasing power. Or, to put it another way, our system has stolen that much from the people who saved.

Fortunately there have been compensations, even though they usually come a little late and a little inadequate. Most of us have current income which is in line with outgo. We make ends meet, so we tend to forget how much we lost in our depreciated savings, that is how much was stolen from us.

Thank goodness there have been other compensations too. Production technique has improved and the unit cost of almost everything has decreased while inflation worked the other way. The net result of those two forces is that we have had a constantly improving standard of living. Liberals who are responsible for our soaring inflation like to point out this fact, reminding us that we never had it so good.

On the other hand the public can reply that this very high standard of living is still less than we could and should have. Furthermore, the good old free enterprise system rather than the economic liberals have given us our gains, while big government and big labor have put the brakes on our progress.

All of us recall that a farmer some three decades ago provided for himself and a dozen other people. Today he provides for almost fifty. In the meantime, however the deficit spending of government and the unwarranted demands of union bosses — such as feather bedding, decreased production and the cost of strikes — has brought on the inflation. We're still the world's most fortunate people, but we got there in spite of government and the labor bosses, not because of them.

Earl Butz, secretary of agriculture, says America will always be a good place to buy food products because "we haven't learned yet on our farms how to goldbrick on the job. We haven't learned yet to have two drivers in a tractor cab, nor to punch the clock at 40 hours. We haven't learned yet to go out to the cow and say Look, Bossy, I've got to be gone over the weekend. Let's shut it off for three days. As long as we haven't learned these things, we're going to be a good source of food and fiber for all the people of the world."

An insurance statistic says that at any given time it is estimated that only four or five per cent of the drivers on our roads are drunk, but they are responsible for at least half of the highway deaths that occur each year. You can't find a better reason for the admonition: If you drink don't drive, if you drive don't drink.

President of CCC Addresses Grads At Public School

"Is my life really going to make a difference." That is the question posed to high school and elementary graduates of Muenster Public School by Dr. Alton Laird, president of Cooke County College, in commencement exercises last Friday night in the MHS auditorium.

He assured them that it will make a difference no matter where you go or what your goal in life if you apply the four qualities of enthusiasm, courage, faith and love.

The first of those, Dr. Laird said, is enthusiasm, as personified by Dale Carnegie, a poor farm boy who worked his way through college and eventually became fabulously successful in telling people how to win friends and influence people. A primary part of Carnegie's advice is to be excited about what you do.

The next quality is courage of a degree that stands firm through disappointments and refuses to abandon one's chosen goal. In spite of such determination there are times when great courage runs thin, as with the tortured prisoners of the Vietnam war. Courage then is not enough. It needs to be backed up by faith — in one's self and God, in the importance of one's goal.

The final quality is love, which Dr. Laird illustrated with the story of a man in a Nazi prison camp. In the hellish existence which exterminated most men in just a few weeks this man was sustained more than a year by his deep love for his wife. He endured hunger, torture and a terminal illness by keeping his mind on the time when they would be reunited. Then came the crushing report that his wife died in the gas chamber and he died a short time later.

Dr. Laird ended his talk with a poem given by the theatrical great, Oscar Hammerstein, to Mary Martin in the early struggle of her career: "A bell is not a bell until you ring it, . . . a song is not a song until you sing it, . . . The love in your heart wasn't put there to stay, . . . Love isn't love 'til you give it away."

Other speakers on the program were Curtis Klement and Dan Sicking, the high school valedictorian and salutatorian; also Mike Richardson and Deryl Zimmerman, eighth grade salutatorian and valedictorian in the invocation and benediction.

High school diplomas were awarded by School Board President Urban Endres assisted by Superintendent L. B. Bruns, and elementary diplomas by School Board Vice President Robert Bayer assisted by Principal C. O. Cash. Special awards were presented by Mr. Cash.

A vocal selection was given by Mrs. Roman Klement and another by a quintet including Mary Lou Fleitman, Cheryl Hermes, Lisa Mollenkopf, Debbie Reynolds and Diane Yosten. Bettye Dodds played for the processional and recessional.

SH Seniors Hear Fr. Jerry Mosman At Graduation

"You are writing a book to be published in eternity — the story of your life" Father Jerry Mosman told the graduates of Sacred Heart School's twelfth and eighth grades at commencement services Sunday night in Sacred Heart Church.

Harvest Starts on Sub-Normal Crop Of Local Wheat

The wheat harvest in this area got under way during the past weekend and is gradually gaining momentum. With continued favorable weather, it should be going at full speed by the end of the week.

At this time no yields are reported, because no one has finished a field and determined its total production. However guesses are running at 25 bushels per acre or less, but the lower yield is being offset, at least partly, by a better market. Prices now range from \$3.10 to \$3.25 per bushel, whereas they were about \$2.50 at last year's harvest.

Muenster Milling Co. and Tony's Seed and Feed are the two grain dealers operating here this season. Muenster Mill got the first load, from Weldon Bezner of Lindsay, last Saturday. The first at Tony's was from Hermes Bros., also of Lindsay. Almost all of the deliveries to date are from Lindsay, which is traditionally a few days earlier than Muenster. Locally grown grain started arriving at the elevators Wednesday.

Another kind of harvesting has been under way here for more than two weeks. As usual, a good percentage of the oats crop was baled for hay. But the percentage drops slightly this time because of the short straw resulting from the winter and spring drought. Combines are preferred over balers for harvesting the short stuff.

The wheat crop here generally reflects that of the entire state, according to a recent report from Ag Commissioner John White. From last year's 98.6 million bushels it is down to 69.3 million.

But the drop is more than offset by reports of increases of 20 per cent on the national and global levels. Total US wheat acreage is up 20 per cent and total yield is expected to be up 300 million bushels. Likewise, big crops are expected in Canada, Australia and Argentina.

The important result of all that, says the agricultural Extension Service, is a probable drop in price later in the season.

Mini-Park Space Made Available By City Council

The way was cleared Monday night for setting up a mini park for the tiny tots in the southwest corner of the city baseball park.

Members of the city council in their regular session voted to make the space under and adjacent to the city water tower available or that purpose. Work is to be done by the Garden Club.

Another park project also moved forward at the meeting. After their previous request for bids on an arched walk-over bridge connecting old and new areas of the park, they also considered a flat bridge floor. So now they want bids for both the arched and the flat floor, intending to let the price help decide, if the difference is considerable. Other specifications are the same: 50 foot span, 46 inch width, 5,000 pound load capacity, sides of 3 or 4 foot chain link fence. Bids are due before the next meeting on June 3.

Councilmen also approved the purchase of 48 new model residential water meters to replace worn out units of an old obsolete design as they are taken out of service.

Likewise they okayed purchase of a 10 h.p. Case riding mower for control of grass and weeds in the city parks and other city properties.

And they set May 29 and 30 as the dates of their annual meeting as a tax equalization board.

Plan C How to save electricity when using ranges
