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

- 3. Preheat oven only when needed and only to temperature stated. Normal preheat is 10 minutes; any longer wastes
- 4. When broiling, do not preheat. Leave door ajar...air circulation insures proper broiling.
- 5. Use oven fully. Fill it with foods that cook at same temperature. Freeze extras for later use. 6. Center pans in from oven

- more; wastes energy. 8. Thaw frozen meats before cooking.
