Penalizing

The Producers Social security benefits are going up by 11 percent, and social security taxes are being raised once more to pay for the increase. In short, the treadmill of inflation has taken another turn. Annual benefits will rise sharply, moving from \$53 billion in 1973 to \$73 billion in 1976 and, according to U.S. News & World Re-

port, nearly \$84 billion in 1978. Any one who is self-employed will be hit hard. In the maximum social security tax paid by a selfemployed person stood at \$538.20 annually. By 1973, it was up 60 percent to \$864. In 1974, those making \$13,200 or more will be paying \$1,042.80. And, in the years following that, the tax bite will keep going right on up as the social security tax takes its cut out of ever-higher levels of income. This approach to collecting evermore social security taxes protects low-wage workers from having to pay increased social security taxes, but it places a heavy penalty on millions of the bettertrained and most productive people - the ". . . higher-income farmers, small businessmen, and self-employed professional people." It takes a little more incentive away from those who are willing to work hard providing they have some prospect of benefiting from their efforts. What a way to run a country.

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

Energy Crunch Is Saving Lives

The good news is that 1,000 fewer persons died in traffic accidents in 1973 than in 1972, according to the National Safety Council.

The council credits reduced speed limits and the shortage of gasoline in December for the "spectacular" reduction.

The bad news is that there were still 55,600 traffic fatalities last year compared with the 56,600 in 1972, a two per cent reduction.

Speed reductions, according to Council statisticians, played an important role in December's low fatality total. Nearly half of the states (24) had adopted reduced speed limits as of December 10, and these states, according to the Council, collectively experienced a 22 per cent fatality reduction in December. The states without reduced speed limits experienced a 16 per cent reduc-tion in traffic deaths, the statisticians added.



At the end of February the lines got as long as five and six hours at 10 pump station and when you finally got up there you could buy only \$3.00 worth.

Joan and her husband Nick each have a car and both cars have odd-numbered tags. They're on odd-even day rationing so she has to spend two days a week to keep gas in the car. Stations won't sell to anyone with over a fourth tank and rationing requires a minimum \$3.00 purchase but stations have set \$3.00 as the maximum. Most stations sell out of their daily allotment by 10 a.m. Last few weeks have been some easier since the governor brought suit against the Energy Office for errors in Maryland's allotment.

Nick works over 26 miles away and no public transportation is available. Gasoline is now selling at 55.9 and 59.9 for regular and high test.

Other prices are also outrageous Mrs. Demshock says. She lists a few including round steak \$2.29 a pound, ground beef \$1.19 a pound milk \$1.79 gallon, store-brand bread 59c for the pound and a half


