A statement that ought to shake you is presented in a new film prepared by the Committee on Political Education (COPE) for use in the 1974 political campaigns. It says that only 23 new "friends" of Labor are needed in the House and seven in the Senate to override presidential vetoes.

The implications in that remark are frightening. It's as much as saying that labor unions will be that close to controlling the country. Obviously if labor bosses attain the power to influence the rejection of a veto they will also be able to influence the passage of whatever legislation they want. In other words, we are dangerously close to an indirect kind of dictatorship whereby labor leaders will be the power behind the government, manipulating the legislature and possibly also the president if he happens to be the person they favored in the election.

To elect these "friends" to office, the labor leaders have set a goal of raising \$2.00 in contributions from each of the 13.5 million members in AFL-CIO unions for use in the 1974 elections.

This goal and its purpose are especially significant in relation to all the preaching we hear nowadays about election reforms. Direct contributions to a candidate's fund are denounced on grounds that the elected official later may feel obligated to his benefactor.

AFL-CIO has been particularly insistent on this point, and has made a great issue over the hundreds of thousands in contributions given to Republican candidates by AT&T, AMPI and big oil companies. Accordingly Labor's "friends" in congress are harping on the possible corruption that can result from the direct help. And they seem to be well on the way to eliminating big contributions and setting up a system whereby future campaigns are to be paid by taxpayers. Each candidate is to receive an equal amount from the government to run his show.

At first glance the idea looks fine. Seemingly it gives both sides an even break and it does not make the winner feel obligated to any special interest. It appears to be an answer to the old problem of corruption in politics.

However, the reform proposal is carefully presented so as to omit "in-kind" contributions, which have long been a specialty of the union bosses. Their principal help is not given in direct payments to candidates but rather in a variety of services and other values provided by the union in behalf of their candidates. This could include cost of printing and mailing campaign literature, travel expenses, paying workers at the campaign or election, providing office space, telephone, etc.

The guys who are clamoring for election reform are not asking for a ban of in-kind contributions. They want the half way measure which would leave their political foes with limited funds but still keep the old system of helping their friends. It is a scheme to give Labor an advantage in campaign financing, nothing else. And ultimately it is a scheme to establish additional friends in the House and Senate until the unions are able to control legislation, even to the extent of overriding a presidential veto.

The plain fact is that union efforts for election reform are just so much hypocrisy. They insist on abolishing the customary system of campaign financing only because they are ready with their own system. To make matters worse there is far more corruption and injustice in that system than in the old one.

As stated, the goal is to raise \$2 in "voluntary" contributions from each of the 13.5 million AFL-CIO members, when, actually, it is an assessment that each member has to pay to keep his job. It's a lie to say that the money is raised voluntarily.

An even greater injustice is the use of a member's money without any regard for his wishes. The law of averages tells us that several million of the 13.5 million members do not agree with the political views of their bosses, but their money is used to support candidates whom they personally oppose. Here is a corrupt and unjust form of election financing.

14 Local Animals Entered in Junior Livestock Show

Fourteen members of the Muenster 4-H and FFA chapters had animals entered in the Cooke County Junior Livestock Show held in Gainesville last Thursday, and all shared in the premium prices paid Friday night at the auction in Gainesville Livestock Auction arena.

There were 217 animals in the show. Sharon Fangman of Lindsay and Lana Bryant of Valley View had the champ and reserve champ in the fat steer division in which 33 were classified as blues, 20 as reds and 18 as whites. Steve Petty and Tony Strickland, both of Callisburg, showed the champ and reserve champ in the fat lamb division which had 36 blues, 30 reds and 5 whites.

Dennis Proffit of Callisburg and Troy Davis of Era had the champ and reserve champ hogs. Totals in that division were 33 blue, 23 red, 19 white.

Lively bidding at the auction rewarded all the 4-H and FFA boys and girls with handsome premiums for their efforts. The top lambs, weighing 83 and 98 pounds sold for \$5.25 and \$5.40 a pound. The top hogs, weighing 212 and 218 sold for \$1.10 and .70 a pound.

A combination of two prices made up the total for steers. The person who wanted the animal paid the top market price or higher and someone else paid the premium. The champ steer, weighing 1019 brought \$1.67 1/4 a pound and the reserve champ, weighing 829, sold for \$1.34 1/4 a pound.

Enduro Was a Good Show

The Motorcycle Enduro races sponsored by Muenster Jaycees near Bulcher last Sunday have been acclaimed as a great success in spite of a rough siege of winter weather.

With 484 riders, it was the second largest of the eight races in this year's Texas State Championship Enduro Circuit, and contestants were lavish in their praise of the terrain and marking of the trails as well as the efficiency of conducting the races.

Besides, it was a good show for 475 spectators who had a good view of the start and finish on the trail which was traveled twice in completing the race. Total distance of the run was 70.2 miles. The assigned time was 4 hours and 50 minutes for an average of about 15 miles per hour.

The only blemish on the event was four injuries, mostly broken bones. Most serious hurt of the group was Jim Hughes of Gainesville, whose condition in a Dallas hospital is described as critical.

Only one of the eighteen

trophy winners was from this area He is Pete Horn Jr. of Gainesville, who took second place in his class. Muenster had an even dozen entries and three of them made good finishes but still far from the kind needed for trophy contention. The winners generally were experienced riders with computers or slide rules to help them keep on sched-

The cold wave was a part of this year's topsy turvy weather. This area had spring weather far back in the winter, and then, as spring arrived on the calendar, it was in the grip of some of the most severe cold since arrival of the new year.

Meanwhile there's still a shortage. Pasture land needs it even though grain crops do not appear to be suffering. Total measure for almost three months is only 3.02 inches.

Tiger trackmen of Sacred Heart High made a strong showing in two meets during the weekend. Four of boys participated in the distant medley relay, and won first place, at the Henrietta Relays Friday. And the complete team participated Saturday, winning third place, in the Cardinal Relays at Pottsboro.

The Pottsboro meet was so bitterly cold that several entries failed to show up and others declined to run when they got there. Out of more than 20 originally booked there were 14 in actual competition. Temperature was down to 28 and the chill factor was 2 below zero.

Boys running the medley relay at Henrietta were Bruce Fuhrmann in the 880, Davy Krahl in the 440, Karl Hess in the 1320 and John Bartush in the mile. They came in first followed closely by Bridgeport, then Bowie in third and Henrietta in fourth.

Penalizing The Producers

Social security benefits are going up by 11 percent, and social security taxes are being raised once more to pay for the increase. In short, the treadmill of inflation has taken another turn. Annual benefits will rise sharply, moving from \$53 billion in 1973 to \$73 billion in 1976 and, according to U.S. News & World Report, nearly \$84 billion in 1978.

Any one who is self-employed will be hit hard. In 1970, the maximum social security tax paid by a self-employed person stood at \$538.20 annually. By 1973, it was up 60 percent to \$864. In 1974, those making \$13,200 or more will be paying \$1,042.80. And, in the years following that, the tax bite will keep going right on up as the social security tax takes its cut out of ever-higher levels of income. This approach to collecting evermore social security taxes protects low-wage workers from having to pay increased social security taxes, but it places a heavy penalty on millions of the better-trained and most productive people — the "... higher-income farmers, small businessmen, and self-employed professional people." It takes a little more incentive away from those who are willing to work hard providing they have some prospect of benefiting from their efforts. What a way to run a country.

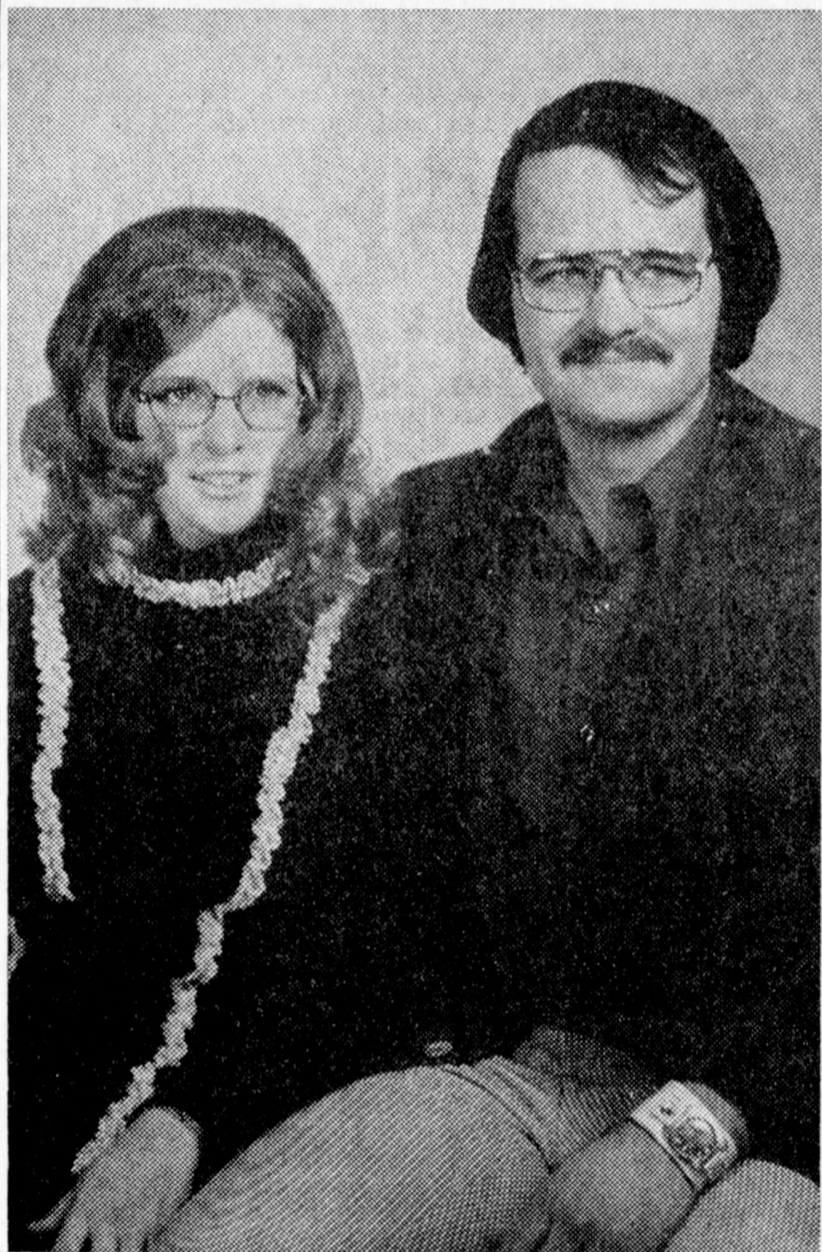

**Energy Crunch
Is Saving Lives**

The good news is that 1,000 fewer persons died in traffic accidents in 1973 than in 1972, according to the National Safety Council.

The council credits reduced speed limits and the shortage of gasoline in December for the "spectacular" reduction.

The bad news is that there were still 55,600 traffic fatalities last year compared with the 56,600 in 1972, a two per cent reduction.

Speed reductions, according to Council statisticians, played an important role in December's low fatality total. Nearly half of the states (24) had adopted reduced speed limits as of December 10, and these states, according to the Council, collectively experienced a 22 per cent fatality reduction in December. The states without reduced speed limits experienced a 16 per cent reduction in traffic deaths, the statisticians added.

Omar Burleson Asks Reelection To 17th District

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May

4, 1974 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 33 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 466,500 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years.



In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions,"

he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the Congress.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental in our system." (Pd. Pol. Adv.)

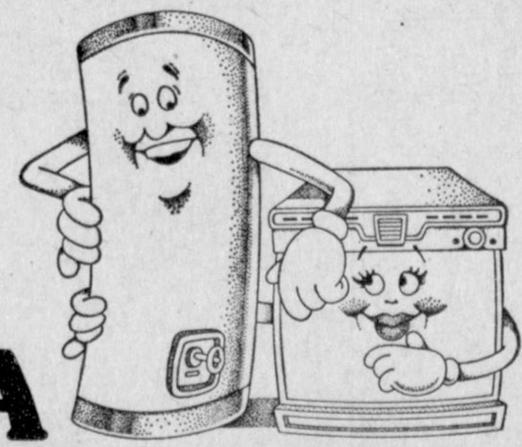

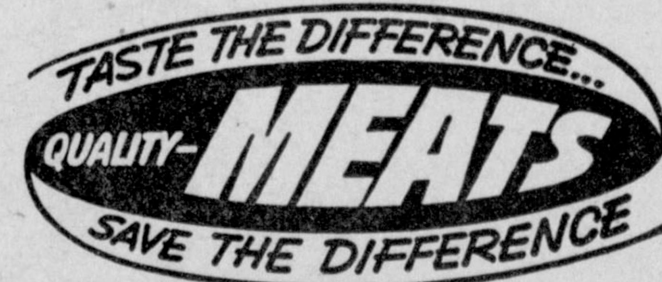
