The anti-gun advocates seem to be as determined as ever about their over-simplified claim that gun confiscation legislation is the way to eliminate crimes with guns.

First fault of that theory, of course, is the fact that the good guys will abide by the law and criminals will ignore it. As the National Rifle Association slogan puts it, "When guns are outlawed, only outlaws will have guns."

Even supposing that such legislation would work, one has to admit that it is ridiculous. The estimate is that only two per cent of the handguns owned by US citizens are used in crime. In other words the proposal is to take away the 98 per cent from people who did nothing to deserve the loss in order to take over control from those who should rightfully be deprived. To penalize the wrong people is bad enough, but in that proportion it's unthinkable. And now, to make an absurd situation still worse, we've got to admit that the two per cent of guns can't possibly be taken away from the criminals.

To pursue this brainstorm even further, one can go so far as concede that all the handguns owned by criminals might possibly be confiscated — but the problem would not end there. Next we have to face the fact that anyone with a lathe and average skill at metal working can make a gun. Crude, perhaps, but still deadly and certainly effective in a hold-up. In fact, the manufacture of such weapons would develop into bonanza business in the underworld. The gun market would flourish as much as the drug market does now.

Finally we come to still another consideration. Criminals would likely become bolder and more active because of decreasing danger of gun play by victims or their friends or neighbors. When the 98 per cent of guns have been taken away from good guys the bad guys have more incentive than ever before.

It does not take a lot of thought to understand that the proposed gun control law makes no sense whatever. There is so much about it that simply will not work out according to theory. On the other hand there is a solution that will work. Just set up a stiff penalty for anyone caught using a gun in a crime and prosecute to the limit of the law when any one is caught at it. Things will improve a lot when some criminals are apprehended and put away by the law and some others discover that crime does not pay as well as it used to.

The ease with which holes can be punched into that anti gun theory makes a person wonder whether there is a more sinister motive behind it. Are the fanatics on this subject interested principally in the 2 per cent of guns held by the lawless, or do they want the 98 per cent held by other people? Perhaps someone needs to spread the word that the 98 per cent of guns could be useful to discourage revolutionaries as well as criminals.

Now and then we find news items informing us that prices we complain about are a lot lower than in other countries. We're still enjoying the world's highest standard of living, and by a big margin. Now comes another item telling us that we're far ahead of the communists in shopping time and convenience.

Swimming Pool Will Have Course In Scuba Diving

A scuba diving course will be available at the Muenster swimming pool during the next two weeks.

Poor Harvest More Than Half Finished

After about ten days of harvesting at a steady pace the wheat crop of this area is mostly gathered and put away. Reports are that a number of farmers at Muenster have finished the job and the percentage runs higher east and south of here.

Weather has been very cooperative until now. The only exception was last Saturday when a light shower about 6 p.m. stopped combines for the rest of the day.

As regards yield the story is disappointing. Those who have made estimates say that production per acre averages about half of last year. Figures range from 15 up to 40, with most of them being in the twenties. Test, too, varies a great deal, and generally is poorer than in previous years. Principal cause for the drop in both quantity and quality is the abnormally dry winter and spring.

The one redeeming factor is price, which has remained rather consistently in the area of \$3.15 per bushel. That's better than last year, however the combined product of price and yield is not as good as last year.

Harvesting of oats is still to come. Indications there too is that drought took its toll, which will be reflected in lower yields. A considerable portion of that crop has already been harvested by baling, but a lower portion than last year. One reason is a scarcity of baling wire, another is the shortness of straw because of dry weather.

Another week of favorable weather is expected to leave very little grain in the fields.

Texoma Planning Commission Gets \$31,500 U.S. Grant

Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$31,500 Economic Development Administration grant to help continue a program of planning for long-range economic growth and new jobs in a three-county area of North Texas.

The Congressman indicated the Texoma Regional Planning Commission, with headquarters at Denison, applied for the Federal grant. The Commission is the official planning agency for the Texoma Economic Development District which consists of Cooke, Fannin and Grayson Counties. The local organization will provide \$10,500 to complete the \$42,000 total cost of continuing the program for a year.

Congressman Omar Burleson advises that the United States Postal Service will advertise for construction bids for a new Post Office at Lindsay, Texas. Mr. Joseph B. Bruning, Manager of Dallas Postal District, said bids will be opened at 2:30 p.m., June 13, in his office, at the Dallas Post Office at Bryan and Ervay Streets for the new Post Office at Lindsay.

The building is to contain 1,067 sq. ft. of net interior floor space and will be located on an assignable option site containing 12,500 sq. ft. of land area located on the west side of Highway 1199 adjoining the Lindsay Town Hall.

The Postal Service will lease the building for ten years with lease renewal option on 20 additional years.

The same policy needs to be restored in this country — to eliminate featherbedding, time lost in strikes, and wage levels that price our products out of the world market.




