President Ford took a long step toward coping with the nation's crime problem last Thursday when he proposed legislation mandating prison sentences for violent federal offenders.

One of the principal features of the program is an automatic prison term for adults convicted of skyjacking, kidnaping, narcotics trafficking, or using a dangerous weapon in committing other federal crimes, and for repeat offenders.

In other words, anyone convicted of committing one of those specified crimes, or of using any dangerous weapon while committing any crime will be automatically sentenced to prison.

Along with that proposal the president stated that he is unalterably opposed to federal registration of guns or gun owners. He spells out very clearly that he is concerned with the misuse of guns, not just the possession of them, and does not go along with the cranks who want to confiscate all hand guns, or to register all the guns and their owners.

He has the right idea. Weapons don't commit crimes. Criminals do. And weapons do not become involved in crime except when being misused by criminals. It is absurd to hold the weapon accountable for the misdeeds of a person.

Furthermore it is equally absurd to imply, as some legislators do, that crime can be controlled by anti-gun laws which require registration of the guns and their owners. Such a list, if it could be compiled would give volumes of information—but still would not reveal who on the list would use a gun in a crime.

Actually, such registration would more likely provide only a list of non-criminals. That's because law abiding people would comply with the regulation whereas the criminals would not admit that they have the weapons.

Considering the fact that mere possession of a weapon in a crime is incriminating, the president's proposal seems like a big step toward answering our crime problem—provided of course, that police and the courts and prisons will cooperate by getting tougher with criminals.

The mandatory sentence will be the criminal's first stumbling block. After which the cause can be helped enormously by more vigorous prosecution and less lenient granting of paroles and pardons. It's even conceivable that the tougher attitude toward criminals will prevent a great deal of crime. Some of those characters will be less inclined to get out of line when they discover that the risk is greater.

Another proposal by the president is a \$7.6 million program to compensate crime victims. He suggested payments as high as \$50,000 to injured victims of federal crime not compensated by insurance, by similar state programs or by other means.

One of the more appealing features of that proposal is to raise the money by fines paid by the offenders and by a 20 per cent fee or tax on profits of Federal Prison Industries. It seems a little more like justice when the criminals, even indirectly, have to pay for compensating their victims.

These reforms, obviously, ought to extend to every level of law enforcement, not just to federal offenses. It happens so often that innocent victims are big losers, such as cases of burglary or theft, or in hospital bills after an injury, or loss of a building by arson. Frequently the criminal who causes the loss isn't even caught, or maybe isn't convicted. At worst he spends a while in prison, at the taxpayer's expense, while the innocent victim is left empty handed.

Fairness demands that something be done about it. Society should have a provision for helping those who had to take losses because of crime. Also there's merit in the suggestion of making wrong doers provide the funds to pay the victims. After all, it's reasonable to assume that prison inmates giving up 20 per cent of their profit actually caused some of the losses for which they help pay. The same applies to fines. Let lawbreakers help compensate for their victims' losses.

The community quota for the second time is 100 pints, according to David Bright, hospital administrator. He recalls that the last collection missed the goal by seven pints, so the program sponsors are working for, and hoping for, a slightly better response.

Everyone who can give is urged to make the effort. Meanwhile the KCs, VFW and Hospital Auxiliary will make their usual contacts. Bright specially reminds students, who gave great help at the last two drives, that they can't be contacted as a group during vacation, but their presence is urgently requested.

Use of Fireworks Forbidden In City

This July 4th hopefully will be observed more quietly in Muenster. According to a statement Tuesday by Police Chief James McDonald, fireworks are a definite no-no, and he has been instructed to keep the town as quiet as possible.

He said that anyone caught trying to set off the explosives will have them confiscated, and summons will be issued recommending a fine, which can be as high as \$200. He said that he has already confiscated a number of the explosives.

The ban applies especially to the explosive types, such as firecrackers, Roman candles, cherry bombs, rockets, etc. They are more dangerous, McDonald said, because they can injure by concussion as well as burning.

He said people have to go outside the city to buy fireworks and are advised to use them there.

Election Ordered July 19 on Expansion of Hospital District

An election to determine whether boundaries of the Muenster Hospital District shall be expanded was officially ordered by the Muenster Hospital District directors in their regular meeting Wednesday night of last week.

The document specifies Saturday, July 19, as the election date, also specifies the boundaries of each election precinct in the area concerned and names the election judge and alternate for each precinct.

Those precincts are identified as follows. The area included in the present hospital district is precinct 1. The polling place for this precinct is the Muenster Public School and the presiding judge and alternate are C. O. Cash and Edgar Dyer.

The area permitted to be annexed to the hospital district is identified as precincts two, three and four. Specific areas of those three precincts is further designated as follows.

Precinct 2 includes territory west of extension of FM 373 (the road south of Muenster) to its intersection with FM 922 (the Era-Rosston road) and south of FM 922. Polling place for this precinct is the Rosston Community Center, and the

presiding judge and alternate are George Berry and Mrs. Ruth Christian.

Precinct 3 includes territory east of the extension of FM 373 and between FM 1630 and FM 922. (FM 1630 is the east-west road five miles south of town.) Polling place for this precinct is the Hood Community Center, and the presiding judge and alternate judges are William Hermes and Mrs. Marie Russell.

Precinct 4 includes territory which is east of the present hospital district boundary and north of FM 1630. Polling place for this precinct is the

Myra Community Center and the presiding and alternate judges are Mrs. Bernice Sicking and Ike Fulton.

On election date each polling place will have a presiding judge and two clerks and the voting hours will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Each elector will vote "for" or "against" the following proposition: "the expansion of the boundaries of the Muenster Hospital District and the levy of a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within the expanded boundaries of the district."

Actually the election will be held in two parts. Qualified voters within the area of the present district will decide whether they wish to admit the area which is permitted to be annexed. At the same time voters of the other three precincts will combine their votes in deciding whether they wish to be annexed to the district. A negative vote in either the district or the area permitted to be annexed would defeat the proposed expansion.

Provision has been made also for absentee balloting which can be done from 8 to 5 each day except Saturday, Sunday or official state holidays. In Precinct 1 David Bright is appointed clerk of absentee voting in the office of Muenster Memorial Hospital. And in Precincts 3, 4 and 5 Mrs. Mary Klement is clerk of absentee voting at her home on FM 1193 in the Hood Community. (Route 4, Gainesville).

Perfectly Timed Weekend Rainfall Measures .78 in.

The community's weather continues just as the farmer ordered. Rainfall during the weekend was perfectly timed, waiting until the extra good wheat harvest was more than 95 per cent finished. Also it came in a quantity that helped everyone and hurt nobody. It's total measure was .78 inch, which was fine for pastures, hay crops, and maize, besides mellowing the land for a better plowing job. Meanwhile the remaining grain crop was not disturbed. Rainfall and wind were both gentle.

Everything considered, this harvest season has been very satisfying. Yield and weather were better than normal, and now the weather is fine again, just in time for other farm growth.

The weekend rainfall boosted the month's total to 2.80 inches and the year's total to 21.13. This is somewhat above normal. Local average for a full year is about 35 inches.

Funeral service for Andy O'Connor, 76, who died at his home last week Wednesday, were held Friday morning at 10 in Sacred Heart Church with Father Placidus Eckart officiating. His death ended 12 years as a bed patient, because of paralysis following a stroke in July 1963.

Burial of Mr. O'Connor was in Sacred Heart Cemetery under direction of Nick Miller Funeral Home. Pallbearers were four grandsons, John and Roy Monday and George and Roger Fry, and two nephews Andy Stelzer and Raymond Sicking.

Mr. O'Connor was a native of Tours, Tex., born April 12, 1899, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard O'Connor. The family moved to Muenster when he was a boy.

On October 19, 1919 he was married to Sadie Nieman in Sacred Heart Church. They farmed in the community until about fifteen years ago when they moved to the city to retire. He was a member of the local Fourth Degree KC assembly.

County Trio Buys Control of First Savings and Loan Assn.

In a major financial transaction, a group of Cooke County investors has bought the controlling stock in First Savings and Loan Association.

Headquarters of the association is in Bowie, with branch offices in Gainesville, Weatherford and Azle.

Edwin E. Wright, Henry Spaeth and Norbert Felderhoff, all of Gainesville, have been elected to the First Savings Board.

Both Wright and Spaeth were formerly associated with a local Savings and Loan Association—Wright as president, manager and director and Spaeth as a director. Felderhoff has been associated with another savings and loan association in the North Texas area.

Wright said that First Savings and Loan has assets in excess of \$25,000,000. Wright has been named chairman of the board and chief executive officer of First Savings and Loan. He succeeds Douglas E. Baer of Houston in the post. Baer was one of the principals in the selling group, and he resigned his office.

Gerald Free of Bowie will remain as president of the association, and Joe Falsone of Bowie, executive vice president, and all other officers and employees of the association will be retained under the revised ownership structure.

Managers of the three branch offices are Jerry Henderson, Gainesville; Rex Shoulders, Weatherford; and Roger Pettigrew, Azle.

The purchase came as no great surprise in the Gainesville area as it had been widely rumored for several weeks. Negotiations were in progress for several months during which the group acquired 75 per cent of the stock.

The transaction was handled by Richard Klement and Billy Ray Hill, Gainesville investors.

Speaking for the new First Savings and Loan stockholders, Wright expressed pleasure that the ownership of the controlling stock has been returned from Houston to the North Texas area. He said, "we consider this a splendid opportunity for the association to serve the entire area better through investment of deposits in the primary area that it serves."

New Board Members

Wright was president of the state's oldest savings and loan association, when he resigned several months ago.

A native of San Angelo, Wright received his B.S. degree from Texas Christian University and his MBA degree from North Texas State University. He has resided in Gainesville since 1949.

Wright and his wife, Ona, chairman of the English department at Cooke County College, reside at 208 Fairfield in Gainesville. They have two sons.

Wright has long been active in civic, church and business affairs.

Spaeth, who was born in Lindsay, was educated in

schools there and at Draughn's Business College. A farmer and rancher in Cooke County for 35 years, he is also agent for the Mississippi Chemical Corp. for the North Texas area.

Spaeth's wife, Marie, is a kindergarten teacher at St. Mary School. Both are active in church work and community projects. They have two children and two grandchildren. They reside on their farm on S. 1-35.

Felderhoff was born and reared in Muenster and attended schools there. After service in the Navy and completion of his education, he entered farming and ranching with his father, Hubert Felderhoff, and later began a partnership with his brothers, August and Thomas Felderhoff. This partnership has continued for 28 years.

Felderhoff has a long record of service to his church, community and state. He has been a member of the Knights of Columbus for 25 years, a director of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, president of the Cooke County Beef Cattle Association and a director of the Muenster Hospital District board for 10 years.

He has also been active in State Democratic Party affairs and headed the Cooke County Democratic delegation to the state party convention. Felderhoff and his wife, Marge, reside at 800 S. Rusk St. in Gainesville. They have three daughters, Lynn, Lisa and Amy.

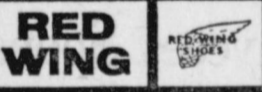

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Muenster Hospital District has determined that such an election shall now be called to determine whether the boundaries of said District shall be expanded; and WHEREAS, it is further found and determined that according to the last preceding federal decennial census, Cooke County, Texas, contains less than 5% inhabitants of Spanish origin or descent and, therefore, bilingual election materials (as required or permitted by Senate Bill 165, Acts of the 64th Legislature, Regular Session, 1975) are not required and shall not be utilized in the election herein being called; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MUENSTER HOSPITAL DISTRICT: SECTION 1: That an election shall be held on the 19th day of July, 1975, which date is not less than thirty (30) days nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of the adoption of this order, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the qualified electors residing within the boundaries of the area permitted to be annexed to the Muenster Hospital District and the qualified electors residing within the current boundaries of the Muenster Hospital District for their action thereupon: To-wit:

"WHETHER the boundaries of the MUENSTER HOSPITAL DISTRICT shall be expanded and shall all taxable property situated within the expanded boundaries of the District be subject to the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on each One Hundred Dollars valuation of taxable property for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's bonds and for the care of indigents?" SECTION 2: That paper ballots shall be used in said election and such official ballots shall be prepared in accordance with Chapter

6, V.A.T.S., Election Code, so as to permit electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be printed thereon in substantially the following form:

THE EXPANSION OF THE BOUNDARIES OF THE MUENSTER HOSPITAL DISTRICT AND THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75c) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE EXPANDED BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT. The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of said proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 3: That for purpose of conducting said election, the current boundaries of the Muenster Hospital District shall constitute one election precinct (Hospital Election Precinct No. 1) and the area proposed to be annexed to the District shall be divided into three election precincts, as follows:

No. 3: To include all territory East of County road extension of F.M. 373, North of F.M. 922 and South of F.M. 1630.

No. 4: To include all territory North of F.M. 1630.

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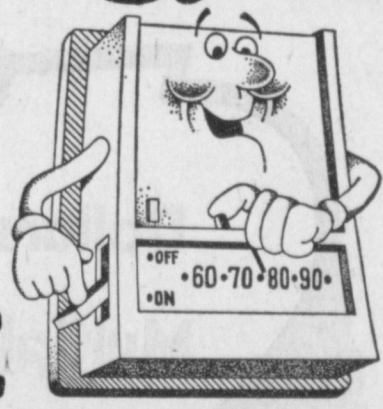

Reducing plan for energy users



Plan E How to save electricity when using air conditioning

- Central Systems
1. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
 2. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
 3. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean often.
 4. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
 5. Keep fireplace damper closed. Draft pulls cool air up the chimney.
 6. Proper home insulation keeps the cool in, cuts energy use. Attic ventilation helps, too. Insulation questions? Call TP&L.
 7. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
 8. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.
 9. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.
 10. Set thermostat on 78° and leave it there. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.

Follow all above suggestions, plus these:
11. Buy unit with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to

cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recirculation, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.

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Safety Association Issues Warning on Fireworks Misuse

Having the 4th of July on a Friday this year gives Texans an extended holiday, but young and old alike may "blow" more than a three-day weekend if they get careless with fireworks. The misuse of fireworks causes injuries ranging from minor burns to fatalities every year, and Texas Safety Association is deeply concerned with this unfortunate statistic.

Although some municipalities have ordinances banning individual use of fireworks, most varieties are still sold in Texas. Legislation is not a solution, because it is usually aimed at so-called "dangerous" fireworks. Many people fail to realize that any variety of fireworks — even the "harmless" sparkler, which burns with the heat of a welding torch, and can leave a brand on the skin more indelible

than a branding iron — is dangerous in the hands of a careless individual or a child.

Fireworks have set houses and buildings ablaze after landing on roofs, and can burn off entire fields of crops. Using fireworks anywhere near combustible materials is "playing with fire" in its purest sense. Always use a cleared area, away from structures and free of dry plant life.

Fireworks should always be shot away from spectators, and should never be placed in the hands of practical joker or people who have been drinking and may throw firecrackers toward people or animals, or into cars or buildings.

The best fireworks display is a supervised one, put on by a civic group, etc. and run in a safe manner by professionals. It will be a quality program far better than what an individual could concoct or afford. But if the only display you attend is the one your family puts on, designate a responsible adult as supervisor. Don't allow a child to maim or blind himself for life because of a moment's carelessness lighting a fuse.

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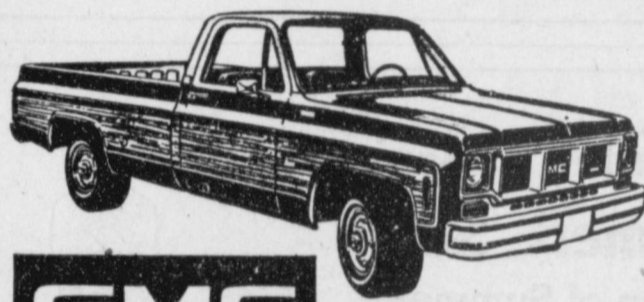
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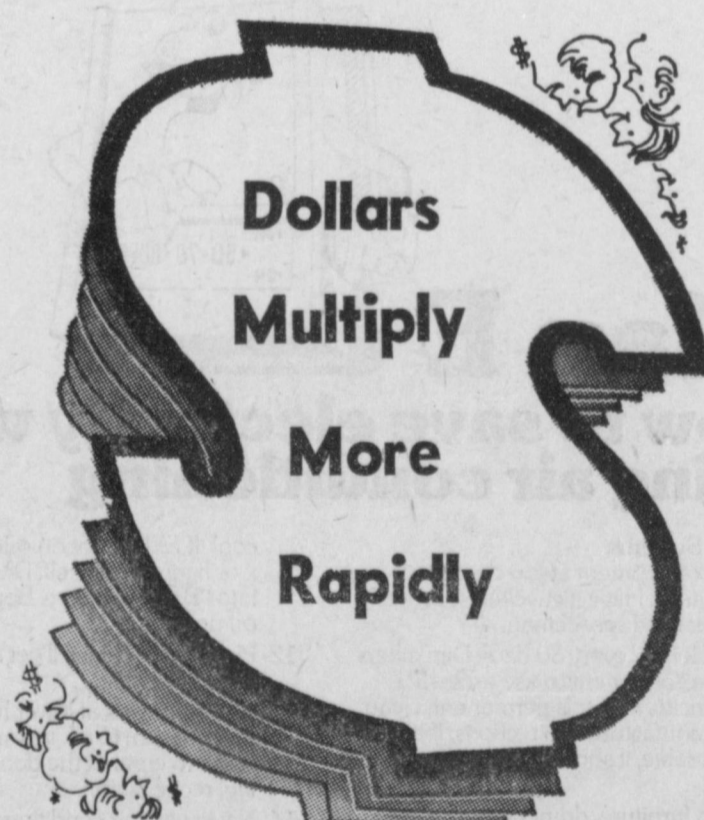
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Jenny Schilling Celebrates 92nd

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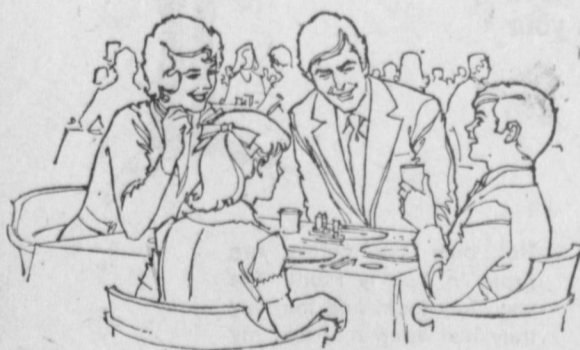
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
