

Farm Facts, the weekly report on agri-business published by the Texas Department of Agriculture, tells us that as of February 1 Texas is no longer the number one cattle feeding state of the nation. Its number of cattle on feed has declined to 1,237,000 whereas Iowa now has the lead with 1,250,000 head in the feedlots.

In this state the latest figure represents a drop of 47 per cent from the 2,340,000 which were on feed a year ago. On a nationwide basis, including the seven major cattle feeding states of Texas, Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas, Arizona and California, the year's decline is a more moderate 37 per cent.

As of February 1 those states had 6,050,000 head on feed, compared with 9,632,000 a year earlier.

The Agriculture Commission's report further states that the decline of feedlot cattle is the probable cause of about \$2.00 per hundred decline in the price of grain sorghum since last November. It is estimated that two thirds of Texas' sorghum crop is used in cattle feeding, so the decline of a million cattle on feed would definitely affect the sorghum market.

This is good news for the feed lot people who, hopefully, will be able to save enough on their feed bill to realize a profit on the cattle. But at the same time it is bad news for grain farmers whose profits are slipping.

Over all, this is the way of the old economic law of supply and demand. Various factors including the big Soviet grain deal and efforts to reshort gulate meat and grain prices service. brought on the outrageous prices of a year ago. A natural result was the drop in meat consumption, and increased sale of the more economical grass fed beef. And that was followed by declining numbers of feeder cattle and declining prices of feed.

The lower feed price brings on lower beef price but it also brings on the problem of whether grain farmers get discouraged and reduce their production, thereby tending to MUENSTER ENTERPRISE

The important point, however, is that supply and demand tend to cause a steady market in spite of minor fluctuation. If allowed to operate without interference of misguided do-gooders trying to regulate prices, it can and will provide a stable economy for us. Over many years it has done a good job for the nation, but price fixing has caused grief every time we tried it.

Another application of the law of supply and demand is involved in a bill just introduced in the new 94th Congress. It proposes to make labor subject to anti-trust laws just as business and industry have been for many years.

The bill is backed by the United States Industrial Council which is mounting a nationwide campaign to generate support for the legislation. USIC points out that last year Congress had passed, with Ford Administration backing, a bill providing stiffer penalties for antitrust law violations, on the basis that monopolistic practices by business firms contributed to inflation. USIC contends, however that union monopolies had been more responsible for inflation than monopolies created by business enterprise.



in effect. In addition to Hulcy, six other company wtinesses and two expert outside consultants were scheduled to give largely technical and financial testimony to the hearing examiner during the day.
